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

Village Sludge Storage **Problem Becoming Critical**

Advertising for Sidewalk, Sewer, Water Projects Bids Authorized

In a preliminary review of a Needs Study, Water Pollution Control Superintendent Pete Albers told the Kewaskum Village Board, Monday night, that storage of the plant's sludge was at the critical stage.

Albers said, "We have enough capacity to store one month's sludge (300,000 gallons), and if I can't get on the fields next week we're in trouble." "If I can't get on the land, I'm going to have to find a farmer with a storage facility that has room and rent space.

Albers has been pushing to get the study going so the village can begin construction of a larger storage facility which is needed to meet Federal and DNR mandates. "Right now the Federal requirement is a capacity to store six months worth of sludge," said Albers.

The DNR doesn't want us spreading during the winter, he told the trustees. Trustee Gary Gavin then asked Albers what he had done with the sludge from the other winter months. Albers said he was able to spread it on a few farms. "The trouble is," said Albers, "it has to be done on almost level land with a grade of no more than 2% and there's not a lot of flat land around here."

Albers told the board the village is running out of time to remedy the problem. "It won't be long before no one will be

allowed to go on the land in the winter, even the farmers will have to store their manure in some way until spring." The next thing will be that no one will be able to top spread on the land, all the sludge and manure will have to be injected into the ground.

The survey also showed that while the treatment plant was doing a good job, there were several areas where the equipment, besides the sludge storage tank, were undersized and being overloaded. The study shows where we have to expand to meet present and projected needs for the next 20 years, Albers told the board.

Albers said there were a few things that had to be added to the survey and then he would bring the finalized copy back to the board.

In other business the board voted to award the contract for the River Hill Park's band stand reconstruction to Heberer Bros. Construction, with some minor changes. Parks Committee Chairman Tom McElhatton advised the board that Jim Schaub had retracted his bid because of health reasons which will not allow him to work for several months.

In other action the board approved a Class 'B' malted beverage license for the Kewaskum Athletic Club, contingent upon a letter of approval from Kewaskum

Property Tax Relief Plan Creates New Problems, Highlights Old Ones

The measure receiving great publicity and fanfare this legislative session is Senate Bill 48, an initiative aimed at reducing property taxes.

The plan is bold, innovative and comprehensive. But, in my opinion, it's a misguided, band aid approach.

Let me say from the start, that I'm one of those who believe the real way to provide meaningful property tax relief is to modify the state's mediation-arbitration law and affix enforceable cost controls on schools.

I'm also one of those who believes better quality education could come from a school choice

Having said that, Senate Bill 48

reduce property taxes by approximately 23%.

But Senate Bill 48 also wants to raise taxes to pay for the relief. First, by raising the state's sales tax a penny and second, by expanding the higher sales tax to a number of goods and services presently exempt.

In order to fund such a high degree of property tax relief, more dollars must come from somewhere. SB 48 proposes that it come from realtors, engineers, accountants, lawyers, etc.

What the bill says is: pay for education by shifting taxes, with the finger pointed at large and small businesses.

In my opinion, this tax shift would be anti-growth and anti-business.

Supporters of SB 48 would suggest I'm straying from the plan's goal... to reduce property taxes. I believe the bill can indeed produce temporary relief. But I'm skeptical it can sustain relief.

It would be a mistake for the State Legislature to enact such a dramatic plan unless it ensures us long-term results.

What happens if we relax, or repeal school cost controls in five years? What happens if education costs continue to rise at a rate sometimes twice that of inflation? What happens if the cost controls develop loopholes?

Answer: We look for new taxing sources. Maybe we raise the sales tax to seven cents or eight cents. Maybe we expand the sales tax to more goods and services. Maybe we do both again.

I submit that such a scenario would initiate a taxing and spending nightmare reminiscent of Massachusetts.

There are other problems. A recent Department of Revenue analysis concluded that if SB 48 were enacted in its present form, an individual's cumulative tax burden may actually increase rather than decrease.

And, finally, an even greater problem.

In trying to improve and maintain quality public education, our state has done what the rest of the nation did over the last ten years: we threw record amounts of money at our education problems.

The result has been astounding and tragic. By most measures, we have failed to achieve our educational goals.

More money has not translated into better education. Higher teachers salaries have not produced better educated students. Expanded curriculums have not insured higher standards in reading, writing and arithmetic.

Here in Wisconsin, there's no

question our property taxes are too high and our schools are spending more and more tax dollars.

Since 1982, school costs rose \$2.07 billion; our property tax levy rose 83%.

Ten years ago, our cost per student was \$3,141. This year it is \$5,826... an 85% increase.

I, for one, am not prepared to support an expansive antibusiness and anti-growth tax shift in an era when we can't even guarantee improvements in the quality of our education.

No matter how much our property taxes are cut, or to what extent business is asked to pay the freight - what about our kids? What are they getting for the buck?

How many millions of dollars must we ante up, in whatever form, before we seriously and collectively consider the possibility that our educational system is flawed.

Wartime Veterans It's a Boy! May Get 8.1% Home Loans

The new interest rate for the Department of Wisconsin (WDVA) Veterans Affairs' primary mortgage home loans has been set at 8.10 percent. The 8.10 percent interest rate also applies to WDVA home improvement loans.

The primary mortgage home loans are being financed through the sale of \$30 million in state general obligation bonds. This makes the home loan program completely self-supporting and requires no state tax funds. Since the program began in 1974, WDVA has made more than 44,000 home loans totalling nearly \$1.5 billion.

To be eligible for WDVA home loans, a veteran must state residency requirements and have served on active duty during a wartime period or period of hostilities. In addition. the veteran's combined annual household income (veteran plus spouse) cannot exceed \$39,000.

Byproduct Feeds Can Replace **Dry Corn in Dairy Rations**

If you need to purchase corn for your dairy cattle, you may be able to develop a cheaper ration by replacing corn with byproduct feeds when the prices are comparable. Wheat middlings and corn gluten feed are two byproducts feeds that can replace corn as an energy source in dairy rations.

When corn is supplemented in the dairy ration, it provides a source of starch. The starch in corn gluten feed and wheat middlings is digested more rapidly in the cow's rumen than starch in corn. This difference is an important factor in ration balancing.

Corn gluten feed is the part of commercial shelled corn that remains after manufacture of corn starch or syrup. It is available in wet or dry form.

The nutrient composition of wet and dry corn gluten feed is identical except for dry matter content. Dry corn gluten feed has 90 percent dry matter compared to 43 percent for wet corn gluten feed. What to Do If You're Away When a Tornado Threatens

Although most people know where to seek shelter from a tornado in their own home, they become confused or panic if a warning is issued while they are at work, out shopping, or in their car, according to the Division Wisconsin Emergency Government.

Some basic rules apply, no matter what your location. The best shelter is on the lowest level of a building, away from windows and doors. When possible, get beneath a sturdy piece of furniture. Protect your head and chest, storm-related deaths frequently due to injuries to these parts of the body.

If you're in a public building, look for a predesignated shelter. Always stay inside the building. Don't run for your car, since you're generally safer inside a structure than in the

Beware of long-span roof areas, like those found in malls and gymnasiums. Instead, try to find a smaller room, such as a closet, restroom or storeroom. Stairwells also make good shelters

In mobile homes or cars, leave them and find shelter in a building. If there is no nearby shelter, lie flat in the nearest ravine, ditch or culvert with your arms shielding your head. Keep alert for flash floods that often accompany such storms. Share your knowledge with those around you. Direct co-workers, companions, and fellow shoppers to safe shelters if they appear confused when a tornado threatens.


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
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
Bridgework Progressing

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

Byproduct Feeds Can Replace Dry Corn in Dairy Rations

If you need to purchase corn for your dairy cattle, you may be able to develop a cheaper ration by replacing corn with byproduct feeds when the prices are comparable. Wheat middlings and corn gluten feed are two byproducts feeds that can replace corn as an energy source in dairy rations.

When corn is supplemented in the dairy ration, it provides a source of starch. The starch in corn gluten feed and wheat middlings is digested more rapidly in the cow's rumen than starch in corn. This difference is an important factor in ration balancing

Corn gluten feed is the part of commercial shelled corn that remains after manufacture of corn starch or syrup. It is available in wet or dry form.

The nutrient composition of wet and dry corn gluten feed is identical except for dry matter content. Dry corn gluten feed has 90 percent dry matter compared to 43 percent for wet corn gluten feed. Corn gluten feed contains 22.5 percent crude protein, 3.5 percent far, 13 percent acid detergent fiber percent neutral and 45 detergent fiber (dry matter basis).

Corn gluten feed is a low-starch feed. Its fiber is easily digestible in the cow's rumen, so despite its high neutral detergent fiber level, corn gluten feed will slightly improve rumen pH and fat test.

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
