A 48 year old Kewaskum man is the latest \$250,000 Wisconsin Lottery SUPERCASH! winner.

John Oelhafen, a farmer and feed mill laborer who works at Farmers, Inc. in Allenton is glad he is a daily player after six Quick Pick numbers on a SUPERCASH! ticket bought at Romie's Service in Allenton (Washington County) were drawn Thursday, May 23.

Oelhafen, who claimed his prize at the Lottery's Hales Corners office Wednesday, May 29, said he "heard there was a winner who purchased a ticket at Romie's Service in Allenton. I stopped at Kohlsville at the Hitching Post Bar to have two beers and checked my numbers."

Oelhafen says he'll keep playing SUPERCASH! and plans to "stay working and enjoy some of the money. I'll the rest so my lifestyle won't change much." son and two daughters ranging in age from 19 to 21.

. "This has been an experience I'll never forget," he said as he left with his check for \$182,675 (\$250,000 less taxes).

Oelhafen is the 42nd winner in the SUPERCASH! game. Two winners have still not come forward to claim their prizes: A winning ticket from the February 9 drawing sold at Sentry Foods in Waterford has not yet been presented, nor has a winning ticket from the March 6 drawing, sold at Superamerica 5712 West Burnam in West Allis. A winner has 180 days from the date of the drawing to come forward and claim a SUPERCASH! prize.

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Police Service Costs Small Part of Taxpayer's Dollar Village to Seek Certified Part Time Police Officers

Despite the facts and figures presented by Police Chief Richard Knoebel over the last two meetings, the Kewaskum Village Board, Monday night, declined the chief's request to add one more full time officer to the department instead of more part time hiring personnel. The trustees did, however, give Knoebel the okay to seek certified part time replacements for those part time officers who have, or will be leaving to take full time positions with other departments.

Knoebel told the trustees there was some misconception on the part of village residents regarding the cost of their police protection. "I've heard figures like \$500.00 a year," said Knoebel. To clarify the cost issue, the chief furnished a breakdown showing the actual cost per taxpayer.

Of the gross village tax rate of \$6.99 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation of 1991, \$1.27 is applied to the Police Department budget. However, of that \$1.27, only 47c actually comes from the property tax. The remaining 80c or 63c, comes from other non-property tax dollars such as fines, forfeitures and state aids.

He was pronounced dead at 4:15 p.m. at St. Agnes Hospital. Fond du Lac County Coroner Susan Casper said Hodge died of massive internal injuries related to the accident.

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KHS Students Experience Letters to **Real-Life Science**

On May 13, 1991, Physics students from Kewaskum High School again journeyed to Gurnee, Illinois to participate in Physics Day at Great America. Kewaskum Physics students have participated in this annual event for the past three years.

Part of the day is spent, of course, enjoying the attractions and the out - of - doors. However, there is also serious work to be done. Students are required to analyze at least five of the major rides at the park. The analysis includes measuring heights of various components by triangulation, measuring times of fall or rotation, plotting the paths of some of the more intricate rides, and measuring accelerations with student - made accelerometers. With these the measured quantities, students can then calculate accelerations (when the Eagle screams down the first hill), "g" forces (when the Tidal Wave enters its loop), or centripetal force (when the floor of the Cajun Cliffhanger drops away, leaving the student pressed against the wall). Len Soller, Physics teacher at Kewaskum High School, calls Great America," the biggest Physics playground in the area' and plans to continue the yearly outing. He says, "These students will never again go to a carnival or amusement park and look at the rides without thinking about physics. This is learning that should last a lifetime.

GED Testing Readily Available in Area

For a variety of reasons, many adults have not completed high school. Nearly 72 million American adults do not have high school diplomas and 40 percent of Wisconsin's adults are members of that group.

This does not mean that their educational growth and experiences stopped after leaving high school. Many make considerable people educational progress through a variety of experiences encountered in everyday life.

In 1942, the General **Education Testing Service was** created to develop a battery of tests, called the General Educational Development (GED) tests, for U.S. military personnel who had not completed high school. With the GED certificate, veterans were better able to pursue educational and vocational goals when they returned to civilian life.

Today, the GED tests are available to all adults who have not completed high school.

Passing the GED tests qualifies individuals for certain jobs, to gain promotions or to pursue higher educational or personal goals.

based on that 47c figure, the cost for police services on a \$40,000 home is actually \$18.80 per year or \$1.57 a month. On a \$70,000 home, the cost is \$32.90 per year or \$2.74 a month. Even on a \$100,000 home, the cost is only \$47.00 per year, or \$3.92 per month, well below the rumored \$500 a year cost.

Knoebel again stressed the fact that part time personnel, especially certified officers, are becoming extremely difficult to hire. He reminded the board that after this year, departments will have to bear the entire cost of training new officers, which will run about \$7,000 per man. There will no longer be state aids and reimbursements.

Knoebel told the trustees, as of January 1, 1992, one full time officer, including salary and benefits would cost the village \$30,946. He said there would still be a need for two part timepositions to cover about 8 to 12 hours a month, which would cost about \$2,200 for the year. Those figures would represent a total of \$33,000 per year for one additional full time and two part time officers as compared to the \$28,000 - \$29,000 the village is paying just for part time officers.

Board president Marv Krueger told Knoebel she had received several calls and all of them were opposed to increasing the department's staff. "Some of the people feel we're overprotected," said Krueger. She questioned why the village could not provide police service like Slinger and Campbellsort, which rely on the Sheriff's departments and do not provide 24-hour police protection. Knoebel replied that those communities only have their calls answered if a deputy is available. "If someone's banging on your door and there's no officer in the area, you're out of luck," said Knoebel. He also noted that Slinger wants to go to full time with its department. "They want the service, they just don't want to pay for it.'

Knoebel told the board, "Things are getting worse, we're getting the transients from Milwaukee." "This past week-end there were two

The information provided by Knoebel, however, was not enough to convince the board to approve his request to hire a full time officer.

"Full." From the paper it made us sound like bad guys, as though grease was bubbling out of the manhole, noted Beisbier.

The two men were angry over a letter they had received notifying them that they must install a grease trap to meet state codes. "We're never gotten a letter before, why didn't we get a letter before this if it was such a problem?" asked Beisbier. Albers replied, "Because we've been trying to do it verbally." 'We added on in 1972," said Beisbier, "and had everything dug up, why weren't we told to do it then?" Albers said he did not know why or what the code was at that time, now, a grease trap is required.

Because the village is looking at a facilities report compiled by its consulting engineers, Albers was asked about the treatment plant's capacity and the need to expand some of its facilities. "Hydraulically we're okay; biologically, we're in trouble. Trustee Gary Gavin asked, "Is the grease trap going to solve the problem up there (at the plant)?" Yes, replied Albers, from them anyway.

Village of Kewaskum **NEWS NOTES**

It has been brought to the Village of Kewaskum's attention that several properties located within the village have vehicles standing around the yard on driveways and streets as well as other items being stored.

Under Chapter 7.09(1) of the Kewaskum Municipal Code it states:

Any vehicles, licensed or unlicensed, remaining on any street, highway, or road in the Village for more than 7 days without the written permission of the Chief of Police or his authorized agent, shall be an abandoned vehicle, with the meaning of this section. Under Chapter 7.09(3) Removal and Storage states: the Police Department may direct removal of any abandoned vehicle. Such vehicle shall be removed to an area for storage and remain in storage not to exceed 30 days. At the end of 30 days, the Police may direct the removal and sale of the vehicle. Any costs received in the sale of the vehicle shall be used to offset the cost incurred in storage of the vehicle. Upon removal and sale of the vehicle, the Police department shall keep a record setting forth the name of the party removing the vehicle, the price paid for the vehicle, the costs of the storage of the vehicle and reasonable identification of the vehicle.

Chapter 9.08 of the Municipal Code also addresses the storage of vehicles, junk and etc.

Another concern would be leakage of oil onto the streets and yards. The oil causes a deterioration of the asphalt and does eventually run into the storm sewer system. This is an environmental issue and one we should be concerned about.

You are hereby requested to comply with the above order immediately. If you choose not to comply, the Village and District Attorney will undertake to correct the condition by whatever means may be necessary and will charge the expense thereof against such owner.


