Plans for the Annual Kewaskum Christmas Parade are marching along smoothly, and residents of the Community are busy tying up the phone lines as they invite family, friends, and neighbors, to join them on Sunday, Dec. 8th at 6 p.m. in celebrating Christmas in Kewaskum. Your hosts for the evening are the jolly members of the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce, with lots of tricks up their sleeves!

Holiday surprises include over 30 parade entries, musical marching units, sparkling floats, costumed characters to delight young and old, church choirs, elves handing out bags of candy, llamas, and many more festive participants. Student and community organizations, and local

businesses are encouraged to join in the parade - there's still time to register your entry! Come on - you don't want to feel left out, and as a very special attraction the Jolly Old Man himself, yes that's right, Santa, will be making a grand appearance.

Cash prizes will be awarded for first, second, and third prizes, plus three honorable mentions, selected by a panel of seven distinguished judges that take their job very seriously. Preliminary judging will take place on the north side of the firehouse at 5 p.m.

sales and service, and eventually became division manager for a large propane gas company in the western part of the state.



WB Christmas Parade Route Announced


In an effort to accommodate the thousands of people that come to West Bend to watch the Christmas parade, the parade committee has extended the parade route and reversed the direction. Participating floats, bands, units and costumed characters will form up in Regner Park and commence south on Main Street. The parade willcross Hwy. 33 (Washington Street), turn left on Cedar Street to Main Street, turn right and follow Main Street south through the downtown area. The parade will disperse at Oak Street, north of Badger Middle School.

The parade last year attracted over 20,000 spectators, in some areas six or more deep. Parade organizers anticipate an increase this year and have put in an order for mild weather. To avoid overcrowding, people are encouraged to park on side streets and watch the parade on Main Street between Oak and Walnut Streets. Spectators are also encouraged to take advantage of the added viewing area along Main Street north

of Hwy. 33.

Traffic will be detoured around the Hwy. 33 and Main Street intersection. The West Bend Police Department will control traffic with assistance from the Communications Patrol and the State

Board Representative for the Mid-Moraine Municipal Association. Legislative Committee, Trustee Mark Vechart informed the Board that a meeting was held and that upcoming legislation was reviewed.

Action was taken on Resolution No. 91-27 a Resolution to Request Tax Exempt Properties to Report and Pay the Municipality for Their Assistance as Provided for Under Provisions of Wisconsin Statutes 70.09 as attached hereto:

Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt reviewed the proposed budget for 1992 with the Board. The budget sheets as prepared represent a property tax levy of \$403,783 an increase of \$11,887 from 1991's budgeted amount of \$391,896. This \$11,887 represents an increase of 3.03 percent. The 1990 property tax levy was \$402,400.

This property tax levy must then go through the TIF formula adjusting the amount to be levied to \$443,133.24. This amount can be compared to the 1991 amount of \$421,901.63. This reflects an increase of \$21,231.61 or + 5 percent.

This \$443,133.24 is then divided by \$62,470,300 the assessed value of the village to give the village a tax rate of \$7.09. This compares to the tax rate of \$6.99 from 1991, which reflects an increase of \$.10 or 1.48 percent increase.

The process and details of how the additional cuts/reductions were made were reviewed with the Board. The information to go in the notice for public hearing was also reviewed. The Board by consensus agreed to bring the proposed budget to public hearing on December 2, 1991 at 8:00 p.m.

A review of the proposed TIF/CIP. Special Revenue Fund and Debt Fund budgets for 1992 was held sending them to public hearing on December 2, 1991 at 8:00 p.m.

A review of the Water Pollution Control Department budget for 1992 was held. There were no significant changes and the projected revenues exceeded the expenditures. Superintendent of the Water Pollution Control Department Peter Albers was present to review the departments capital improvements for 1992.

A review of the Water Department budget for 1992 was held. The budget reflects projected revenues and expenditures even. This would coincide with the Auditors and PSC's recommendation to check into a possible rate increase. The paper work has already begun regarding that review, but is unlikely to be complete until early next year.

Both of the proposed utility budgets will also be heard at a public hearing on December 2, 1991 at 8:00 p.m.

Fond du Lac - Moraine Park Technical College has added a new course registration option for students registering for second semester classes. 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Deer/Vehicle Accidents Continue to Increase



The deer/vehicle accident problem continues to grow. Over 400,000 recorded deer/vehicle accidents are occuring annually in the U.S. and are growing every year. Over 130 human lives are lost per year along with 7,000 human injuries. Nationally each automobile repair claim is averaging over \$2,000 per vehicle thus totalling approximately \$800 million per year in claims. Loss of a valuable wildlife resource is increasing. Based on deer hunting expenditures, the worth of one deer is figured at. \$1,000. Thus the U.S. is experiencing a \$400 million per year loss in deer fatalities. The cost of carcass removal and accident investigation continues to grow.

In 1990, the Wisconsin Department of Transportation recorded 19,919 deer/vehicle accidents, up from 8,977 in 1981. Due to many accidents not being reported, the DNR estimates the actual accidents at 30,000 to 35,000. In 1990 deer related crashes accounted for 14% of the total number of vehicle accidents, up from 8% in 1981. The Wisconsin Insurance Alliance estimates that in 1990 deer related claims amounted to about \$45 million or 4.5 cents of each insurance dollar spent.

What are the answers to this problem? Highways can be fenced, but the cost ranges anywhere from \$50,000 to \$150,000 per mile. One very viable option is the Wildlife Warning Highway Reflector System which utilizes reflective devices on each side of the road to direct reflected light from vehicle headlights across the road and into the roadside area. The unnatural and apparently moving light patterns deter deer from crossing the road in darkness when 80% of the deer/vehicle accidents occur. The cost of this system ranges from

\$5,000 to \$10,000 per mile.

The accident reduction results of the Wildlife Warning Highway Reflector System have been very impressive and significant. In 1980 the Minnesota DNR installed a test system on 1½ miles of Interstate near St. Cloud, Minnesota. The deer/vehicle accident collision rate was reduced 91% from 38 deer killed the year prior to installation to a mean of 3.25 the next four years.

In 1981 the Washington Department of Transportation placed reflectors on four test sections and alternately covered and uncovered the reflectors during late fall and early spring for a three year period until 1984. Each section was from .45 to .68 miles in length. During this period 52 deer were killed at night in sections where the reflectors were covered and 6 deer were killed when the reflectors were uncovered. The end result was a 90% reduction in deer/vehicle accidents with the use of the reflectors.

As the accident problem and loss of wildlife grows, installation of viable solutions are a must.

Need Volunteers to Help With Free Tax Assistance

VITA and TCE, two programs that provide free tax assistance to people who can't afford professional tax help, are asking people to "volunteer and make someone's taxes less taxing." According to the Internal Revenue Service, VITA and TCE are now recruiting volunteers for the tax filing season ahead.

VITA stands for Volunteer Income Tax Assistance, and it's designed to help your neighbors who are elderly, low income, handicapped, or have difficulty with English with their taxes. TCE - Tax Counseling for the Elderly - is a companion program cosponsored by organizations such as the American Association of Retired Persons.

Nationwide, some 80,00 VITA and TCE volunteers answered tax questions and filled out basic federal and state tax returns this year. Volunteers come from all walks of life and include business and accounting professionals and students, as well as former teachers and other retired people.

The IRS provides free training to all volunteers. Then volunteers offer free help at convenient community locations such as schools, churches, and shopping centers.

* WINTER PARKING *

The Winter Parking Restrictions and Snow Emergency Parking Restrictions go into effect on December 1, 1991.

Municipal Code Section 7.04(3) **Night Parking Restrictions**, reads as follows: Signs have been erected at or reasonably near the corporate limits as provided in Section 349.13, Wisconsin Statutes, no person excepting physicians or licensed emergency vehicles on emergency calls, shall park or stop any vehicle on any public street or highway within the village between the hours of 2:00 A.M. and 6:00 A.M. from December 1, to April 1, of each year; provided that, notwithstanding such restrictions vehicles may be parked a period of time not longer than 3 minutes for actually loading or unloading of passengers, and provided further that no other regulation restricting parking as to place, time, or manner violated thereby.

The fine for violating the ordinance is:

\$5.00 if paid within three (3) days of the issuance of the parking citation.

\$10.00 if paid after ten (10) days but before 28 days.

After 28 days, the amount is \$20.00 and a notice will be sent to the Motor Vehicle Department to suspend your vehicle registrations and refuse renewals until the citation is satisfied.

An important fact is the owner of the vehicle is responsible for the payment of the citation whether or not he was the operator.

Municipal Code Section 7.04 (4) **Removal of Illegally Parked Vehicles.** This section covers the issuance of citations to and possible removal of such vehicles in violation of this ordinance. In addition to other penalties provided by Section 7.04(6) of this code, the owner or operator of a vehicle so removed shall pay the cost of the towing and storage.

Volkert has lived in the Northern Kettle Moraine area since 1977 and has conducted numerous studies in the area. He also has travelled world-wide, including such places as Canada's Hudson's Bay where he conducted goose research and Baffin

Island where he camped in the Canadian arctic observing and photographing wildlife.

During 1991, Volkert and his wife visited southern Siberia, touring the Lake Baikal region with scientists working on management of the lake, a vital resource in the area.

UWWC Men, Women Open with New Coaches

WEST BEND — The faces will be familiar, but the roles will be different for the coaches of the men's and women's basketball teams at UW-Washington County this year.

Tom Brigham, after coaching the Wildcat women for the past 15 years, stepped down as the women's boss to take on the challenge of rebuilding the Wildcat men's program.

Brigham should have an improved group of players to work with this year, as four players return from last year's 2-21 team, including Terry Howell, who was an all-state honorable mention selection a year ago. Howell (6-4 F) will be the Wildcat captain this

Also returning to the fold hoping to make contributions will be Ken Breuer (5-11 F), Marty Dobson (6-0 F), and Jay Leberecht (6-5 C). Leberecht and Dobson were also starters last year.

Newcomers who will make an impact this year include a pair of Slinger High School grads, Buddy Mechinech (6-0 G) and Keith Hosking (6-3 F), who look to have won starting spots. Other team members include Doug Wilkens (5-8 G), Glen Allen (6-0 F), Jim Neuberg (5-9 G), Dave Swanson (5-10 G), Joo Han (5-8 G), and Jim Lenz (6-3 F).

"We should have more depth this year," said Brigham, who held the men's coaching post for nine years before taking over the girls' job. "We should be strong on the boards, and we got some good outside shooters.

Brigham's assistant for the past

two years, Debbie Butschlick will assume the women's head coaching duties. "I'm pretty excited about it," Butschlick said of the opportunity. "I've been assisting coach Brigham for two years, but I've never been a head coach before, so it'll be a challenge."

Helping Butschlick in her first year will be the return of firstteam all-starter Jenny Meyer (5-10 C), who last year set UWWC single game scoring and rebounding records. The bad news for Butschlick is that Meyer is the only returning player that saw extensive playing time last season, when the team went 18-6 overall (finishing second in the state tournament), 10-2 in conference (first place).

Michelle Schwalbe (5-10 F) and Jackie Murphy (5-6 G) saw limited action last season, and the newcomers this season are not exactly familiar with each other, so communication will be a key this year, according to Butschlick.

"It's not like all of (the new players) came from the same school, so nobody really knows each other's game very well," she said.

Players who will make an impact will be Judy Rosenthal (5-7 G), Jenny Muckerheide (5-5 G), Kelly Rohlinger (5-7 F), Sally Fechter (5-8 F), Michelle Kraus (5-6 G) and Tammi Dutton (5-5

Kraus will assume the playmaking role vacated by another all-starter, Rocky Justmann. Kraus "has great hands and is very quick," according to Butschlick, and will help the Wildcats transition game.
