We Definitely Want to Stay in Kewaskum

# **Future for Barrel Haus Owners Undecided**



The landmark Barrel Haus building, like other century-old Kewaskum structures, will soon be a part of the past when wrecking crews move in to clear away the remnants of the January 14 fire.

Like the billowing smoke that rose hundreds of feet during the Barrel Haus fire two weeks ago, the plans of owner Jim (Derby) Rinas remain in the air. "One thing we know, we definitely "want to stay in Kewaskum, one way or another," stated Rinas.

Whether we rebuild or look into other options in town, noted Rinas, should be decided in the next few weeks. "The building has been declared a total loss by the insurance company so one thing is sure, it will be torn down in the near future. Other than that, we're now in the process of trying to salvage what we can and take inventory so we have some idea of where we stand." Rinas said he was to have some meetings this week that should answer some questions about rebuilding.

Rinas said he has a verbal okay that he would be allowed to rebuild on the Barrel Haus site. He feels the property is large enough to rebuild on or it may even fall under a grandfather clause which would allow him to put up a new building.

Jim noted he was very happy with all the assistance he has received from people in the community including his insurance agent, Tom Bartelt. They have made the whole situation a little bit easier to deal with, he noted. A real blow for Rinas in losing the building was the fact that he had recently completed some remodeling in both the tavern and

upstairs apartments.

Jim, and his father, the late Ervin Rinas, purchased the former Flynn's Tap from Bob Flynn in 1980. They took over operations in spring of that year under the new name of Erv and Jim's Barrel Haus. Upon his father's death, Jim took over full operation of the business

Although no one can put a specific date on it, the building was apparently constructed in the middle to late 1800's, making it one of Kewaskum's oldest structures. At that time, it was known as the Continental Hotel.

Under various operators the building, besides being a hotel and tavern, housed other businesses according to longtime village residents. They included a beauty parlor operated by Viola Casper, a bakery and Gilbert's Shoe Store.

Over the years, according to sketchy records, the tavern was run by Nic Merts, Sebastian Casper, Lester Casper, Philip Sower, Jake Filbert, Bill Hess, Ray Casper and Will Dreyer, Peter Bies, Clarence Bingen, John Wink, Boyd Smoley, Oscar Ortman, Andrew Gruber, Russell Kohl, Bob Flynn and lastly, Jim Rinas.

The age of the building and the fact that it had been renovated or remodeled countless times undoubtedly contributed to the building's demise according to Kewaskum Fire Chief Bob Stoltzmann.

False ceilings and walls at 33 hampered the firemen in their atp.m.

tempts to save the century-old building. There were three ceilings in the structure, the original 10-foot high one and two dropped ceilings. Over the years of remodeling, new walls and paneling were installed over old. When the fire got started, it simply got in between those ceilings and walls making it virtually impossible to extinguish.

A benefit dance for the fire victims will be held on Saturday, Feb. 1 at the Riverview Tap at Newburg.

# Gettysburg/Washington D.C. Tour Offered this Summer

A seven day/six night motorcoach tour of Gettysburg-Washington D.C. from Otte Bus Service of Cedar Grove will again be offered this summer, June 15-21. The tour is open to all community residents. It will be guided and chaperoned by Mr. Kenneth Soerens. Mr. Soerens has been teaching United States History for the past seventeen years in Kewaskum High School.

The first day of the tour is spent on the road with the first night stay near Cleveland, Ohio. The second day the tour will arrive in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, the the of the bloodiest Civil War battle. The group will see the National Park Service display, electric map program cyclarama painting, and the cemetery where Abraham Lincoln gave his famous Gettysburg Address. The group will stay overnight in Gettysburg and have a guided tour of the battlefield the next morning and then proceed to Washington D.C.

In D.C. the tour will visit the Washington, Jefferson, and Lincoln Memorial, Arlington Cemetery, The Smithsonian Institution, The Capitol, The Vietnam Memorial, Mount Vernon and much more. After two days in D.C. the tour will travel south to Thomas Jefferson's home Monticello. The next stop is the first English colony in the New World - Jamestown Settlement settled 13 years before the pilgrims landed at Plymouth Rock. Then it's on to Williamsburg, a 1700's colonial city, where costumed residents, guides and craftsmen add to the atmosphere.

The tour travels through the mountains of Virginia and West Virginia as it heads back to more

If you can remember when... The high school prom was held in the South Side Park Hall.

Bill Gossman played the piano at the silent movies at the Opera House. He would really pound the keys when Bill Hart chased the villain on horseback.

Twenty five miles per hour was the speed limit for cars.

Kewaskum had a pocketbook factory. May have been Enger-Kress.

Crackers came packed in wooden barrels.

Roasted barley was used for coffee during W.W.I.

School desks had an inkwell. Fountain pens were a luxury.

The large alcohol still on the Knippel Farm was raided. Roman Smith got the broken mash vats.

New Prospect was called Jersey, New Fane was Ebelsville. Children could go to a saloon

to get a pail of beer for the family. Malt House employees could get a pail twice a day.

Railroad workers, packing house employees and butchers and other groups would come to the North Side Park on special trains. The train went to Fond du Lac to turn around and then would park on the side track. Some would have to be carried on the train.

The Main Street railroad crossing had gates that could be lowered. Jake Remmel was gateman.

Kewaskum had board sidewalks.

Kewaskum had 12 saloons. The Republican House was famous for its good food and liquor.

The men always wore a tie, coat and hat at picnics, no matter how hot it was.

Many bloody fights between the Dundee Irish and the Kewaskum Germans on 'Fair Day.

My grandfather - "Chicago" Fritz Andre - had a saloon where Marion Erdman now lives. I was always told that he was not afraid of the devil.

Cars had side curtains with eisen glass windows for bad weather.

And you are over 90 if you can remember the winter of the blue snow. The post card shows the corn crop the next summer. The Wisconsin Agriculture Dept. tested soil samples and found it contain a lot of "kosekus" - a very rare fertilizer. Two years later crops were again normal.

# Ida B. Wells Film at UWWC

Ida B. Wells, the pioneering African American journalist, activist, suffragist and anti-lynching crusader of the late 19th and early 20th centuries, is the subject of IDA A. WELLS: A PASSION FOR JUSTICE. For 40 years Wells' stature in Black America was equal to that of such leaders as Booker T. Washington and W.E.B. Dubois.

Now almost forgotten, the story of this courageous woman's fight for justice is told through her own writings, read on camera by Pulitzer Prize-winning author Toni Morrison. 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#### Minutes of Village Board Meeting

Mid-Monthly Meeting January 29, 1992 8:00 p.m.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Mid-Monthly Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First St.

President Mary Krueger presided. All Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee Thomas McElhatton, seconded by Trustee Gary Gavin and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the January 6, 1992 meeting were approved as printed.

Mr. and Mrs. Michael Korneli were present to discuss with the Board the proposed charges for joining the annexation regarding the installation of sewer and water for their properties on USH 45. The Korneli's felt the Board should be willing to work with them to reduce the cost of providing service to their two residences. The Board indicated they have looked at the three alternatives for special assessing the improvements and September 23, 1991 voted to use the unit price method. The matter was again reviewed January 6, 1992 after receiving a letter from the Korneli's Attorney suggesting an alternate method. The Board again indicated the method of unit pricing was a fair and equitable method and took no action to change. The Board reiterated it's feelings that the method of unit pricing is fair and equitable and that they would not change. They informed the Korneli's that the Village planned on proceeding and would not be able to guarantee any pricing/cost if they decided to annex at a later date. Note: The unit pricing method would equal \$5,147.57 per unit with the Korneli's projected cost for his two residences equalling \$10,295.

Chairman of the Public Services Committee, Trustee Mark Vechart reported on the committee's recommendation regarding the possible alterations for the Fire House Meeting Room. It was recommended to the Board to drop the matter regarding any renovation of the Fire House Meeting Room and noted that the facility could be used for other village government related functions. On a motion by Trustee Robert Wagner, seconded by Trustee Robert Beisbier and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board dropped and closed the matter of any type of renovation work on the Fire House

Chairman of the Public Works Committee, Trustee Robert Wagner reported the committee reviewed the specifications on the pick up and dump truck as well as the vehicle inventory. He informed the Board that the time table regarding the replacement of vehicles is going to be reviewed. The recycling/storage building items up for consideration were also reviewed by the committee.

Chairman of the Park and Recreation Committee, Larry Williams informed the Board that the Kewaskum Athletic Association attended the committee meeting and brought along all of their financial records and also presented a check to the Village for \$1,194.32; the Village's 50 percent share of the 1991 proceeds. It was noted that the Association paid for the utilities during 1991 as well as for the diamond lighting in fall of 1991.

The Park and Recreation Committee and Association reviewed the Agreement and discussed a couple of minor points to be changed for 1992. The Agreement will be prepared and brought to both parties for review. It was noted the Village will be checking into doing some additional fencing on the north side of the NE Diamond and to upgrade the screening on the first and third base lines.

In other action the committee directed the Administrator to acquire quotes on providing a portable toilet at RHP (west side) and to provide a portable toilet for KKCP (west side) for a period of two months. Also the committee recommended the purchase of a 15' aluminum bleacher for the KKCP at a cost of \$1,135.

Board Representative for the County-Wide Library Board Trustee Gary Gavin informed the Board of some trouble that exists with reference to the Fond du Lac Library serving as the system's resource library

Discussion regarding the 1992 capital improvements projects as to the sidewalk rehabilitation project and how it will affect the Holy Trinity Cemetery. The Administrator was directed to send a copy of the engineers information to the church and to work with them if they wanted to set up a meeting with the engineers. It was noted that the Fond du Lac Avenue corridor was to be

done in 1992.

Action was taken on Ordinance No. 92-1 an Ordinance amending general government, regarding the addition of an ADA Coordinator as attached besets:

Discussion was held on the proposals received for installing siding on the storage shed/recycling building. It was the consensus of the Board to finish painting the structure and take up the matter at a later date.

On a motion by Trustee Robert Beisbier, seconded by Trustee Robert Wagner and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized the abandonment work to be completed on the well adjacent to the storage shed/recycling building at a cost of \$800.

Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt reviewed with the Board the information from the Public Service Commission as to their amended findings on the proposed Water Utility request for a rate increase. The PSC adjusted the Village's rate of return to 6 percent which basically reduced the residential increase to 18 percent and all other groups accordingly. The Public Hearing is scheduled for Friday, January 24, 1992 at 1:30 p.m. at the Hill State Farm Building, Madison, WI.

Mr. Peter Albers was present on behalf of the Kewaskum Lions and asked the Board if any plans to go to mandatory recycling have been decided. The Board said it is looking at alternative forms of collection and is hopeful something can be discussed by the Public Services Committee in a couple of months.

On a motion by Trustee Gary Gavin, seconded by Trustee Robert Wagner and carried by the majority roll call vote, to adjourn to closed session under Chapter 19.85 (1)(c) of the statutes to consider employment, compensation and performance of public employees over which the government body has jurisdiction. Roll call vote was 7 "Aye," 0 "Nay," 0 "Absent."







RANDOM LAKE - It wasn't their most impressive performance of the year, but it was enough to get the job done.

The job was to beat Random Lake in a non-conference tilt, and the Kewaskum boys basketball team did just that, downing the Rams on their home floor, 55-43.

The win snapped a three-game losing skid by the Indians, and improved their overall mark to

Things didn't look all that good for the Indians in the early going. Kewaskum shot poorly in the opening period, making just 2 of 11 shots as they fell behind by a 13-8 count.

"I have to give Random Lake credit," Westphal said regarding the Rams. "They played real good defense. It was a real physical game, and we're not a physical team.'

Matt Seiser led Kewaskum offensively, as he pumped in 15

points, while senior guard Kim Marx came up with one of his best efforts of the year in hitting for 14 points.

'Kim did a real good job in the second half," the Indian boss said. "He struggled in the first half, we all did....but we made some adjustments at halftime and played much better.'

Westphal also praised the play of Joel Fleischman, who only scored six points, but pulled down a game-high 12 rebounds before fouling out. "He's been doing a real good job in that respect. He and their big kid (Paulus) were really pounding on each other all night.
