We Definitely Want to Stay in Kewaskum

Future for Barrel Haus Owners Undecided



The landmark Barrel Haus building, like other century-old Kewaskum structures, will soon be a part of the past when wrecking crews move in to clear away the remnants of the January 14 fire.

Like the billowing smoke that rose hundreds of feet during the Barrel Haus fire two weeks ago, the plans of owner Jim (Derby) Rinas remain in the air. "One thing we know, we definitely want to stay in Kewaskum, one way or another," stated Rinas.

Whether we rebuild or look into other options in town, noted Rinas, should be decided in the next few weeks. "The building has been declared a total loss by the insurance company so one thing is sure, it will be torn down in the near future. Other than that, we're now in the process of trying to salvage what we can and take inventory so we have some idea of where we stand." Rinas said he was to have some meetings this week that should answer some questions about rebuilding.

Rinas said he has a verbal okay that he would be allowed to rebuild on the Barrel Haus site. He feels the property is large enough to rebuild on or it may even fall under a grandfather clause which would allow him to put up a new building.

Jim noted he was very happy with all the assistance he has received from people in the community including his insurance agent, Tom Bartelt. They have made the whole situation a little bit easier to deal with, he noted. A real blow for Rinas in losing the building was the fact that he had recently completed some remodeling in both the tavern and

upstairs apartments.

Jim, and his father, the late Ervin Rinas, purchased the former Flynn's Tap from Bob Flynn in 1980. They took over operations in spring of that year under the new name of Erv and Jim's Barrel Haus. Upon his father's death, Jim took over full operation of the business.

Although no one can put a specific date on it, the building was apparently constructed in the middle to late 1800's, making it one of Kewaskum's oldest structures. At that time, it was known as the Continental Hotel.

Under various operators the building, besides being a hotel and tavern, housed other businesses according to longtime village residents. They included a beauty parlor operated by Viola Casper, a bakery and Gilbert's Shoe Store.

Over the years, according to sketchy records, the tavern was run by Nic Merts, Sebastian Casper, Lester Casper, Philip Sower, Jake Filbert, Bill Hess, Ray Casper and Will Dreyer, Peter Bies, Clarence Bingen, John Wink, Boyd Smoley, Oscar Ortman, Andrew Gruber, Russell Kohl, Bob Flynn and lastly, Jim Rinas.

The age of the building and the fact that it had been renovated or remodeled countless times undoubtedly contributed to the building's demise according to Kewaskum Fire Chief Bob Stoltzmann.

False ceilings and walls hampered the firemen in their at-

tempts to save the century-old building. There were three ceilings in the structure, the original 10-foot high one and two dropped ceilings. Over the years of remodeling, new walls and paneling were installed over old. When the fire got started, it simply got in between those ceilings and walls making it virtually impossible to extinguish.

A benefit dance for the fire victims will be held on Saturday, Feb. 1 at the Riverview Tap at Newburg.

Gettysburg/Washington D.C. Tour Offered this Summer

A seven day/six night motor-coach tour of Gettysburg-Washington D.C. from Otte Bus Service of Cedar Grove will again be offered this summer, June 15-21. The tour is open to all community residents. It will be guided and chaperoned by Mr. Kenneth Soerens. Mr. Soerens has been teaching United States History for the past seventeen years in Kewaskum High School.

The first day of the tour is spent on the road with the first night stay near Cleveland, Ohio. The second day the tour will arrive in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, the site of the bloodiest Civil War battle. The group will see the National Park Service display, electric map program cyclorama painting, and the cemetery where Abraham Lincoln gave his famous Gettysburg Address. The group will stay overnight in Gettysburg and have a guided tour of the battlefield the next morning and then proceed to Washington D.C.

In D.C. the tour will visit the Washington, Jefferson, and Lincoln Memorial, Arlington Cemetery, The Smithsonian Institution, The Capitol, The Vietnam Memorial, Mount Vernon and much more. After two days in D.C. the tour will travel south to Thomas Jefferson's home - Monticello. The next stop is the first English colony in the New World - Jamestown Settlement - settled 13 years before the pilgrims landed at Plymouth Rock. Then it's on to Williamsburg, a 1700's colonial city, where costumed residents, guides and craftsmen add to the atmosphere.

The tour travels through the mountains of Virginia and West Virginia as it heads back to more

familiar landscape of Indiana, Illinois and back home to Wisconsin.

The total package price of \$340 per student quadruple occupancy and \$395 per adult double occupancy does not include meals but does include admission to all the sites. It really can be a trip to be remembered for a long time. Anyone interested in this historic tour may sign up and pay a deposit of \$100 by March 13 and final balance by May 15. Deputies Become Santa to Needy Children

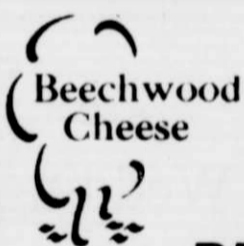

You Are Over Sixty

If you can remember when... The high school prom was held in the South Side Park Hall.

Bill Gossman played the piano at the silent movies at the Opera House. He would really pound the keys when Bill Hart chased the villain on horseback.

Twenty five miles per hour was the speed limit for cars.

Kewaskum had a pocketbook factory. May have been Enger-Kress.

Crackers came packed in wooden barrels.

Roasted barley was used for coffee during W.W.I.

School desks had an inkwell. Fountain pens were a luxury.

The large alcohol still on the Knippel Farm was raided. Roman Smith got the broken mash vats.

New Prospect was called Jersey, New Fane was Ebelsville.

Children could go to a saloon to get a pail of beer for the family. Malt House employees could get a pail twice a day.

Railroad workers, packing house employees and butchers and other groups would come to the North Side Park on special trains. The train went to Fond du Lac to turn around and then would park on the side track. Some would have to be carried on the train.

The Main Street railroad crossing had gates that could be lowered. Jake Rimmel was gateman.

Kewaskum had board sidewalks.

Kewaskum had 12 saloons. The Republican House was famous for its good food and liquor.

The men always wore a tie, coat and hat at picnics, no mat-

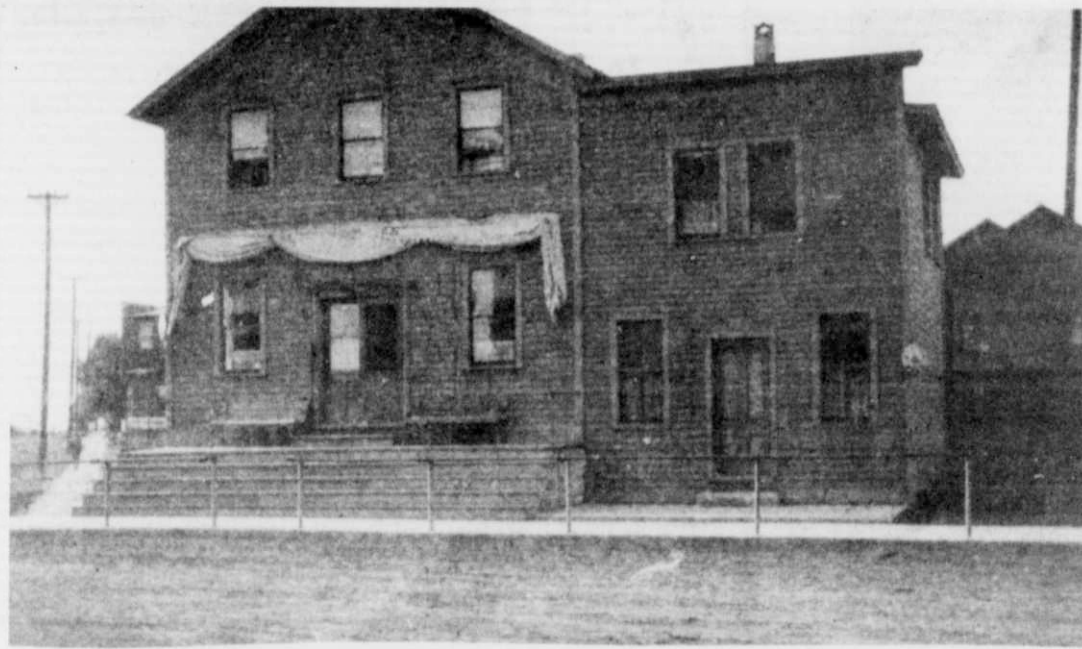
ter how hot it was.

Many bloody fights between the Dundee Irish and the Kewaskum Germans on 'Fair Day.'

My grandfather - "Chicago" Fritz Andre - had a saloon where Marion Erdman now lives. I was always told that he was not afraid of the devil.

Cars had side curtains with eisen glass windows for bad weather.

And you are over 90 if you can remember the winter of the blue snow. The post card shows the corn crop the next summer. The Wisconsin Agriculture Dept. tested soil samples and found it contain a lot of "kosekus" - a very rare fertilizer. Two years later crops were again normal.



The above memories photo shows the Barrel Haus (recently gutted by fire) around the year 1900. The structure was probably built sometime between 1875 and 1880 after the railroad came through Kewaskum in 1873 or 1874. Math. Altenhofen had the saloon and hotel after he lost his fortune in the 1880s. S.N. Casper had it during Prohibition Days. The part on the right was once a shoe store run by Herman Gilbert. Later on the building also contained a bakery shop.

Ida B. Wells Film at UWWC

Ida B. Wells, the pioneering African American journalist, activist, suffragist and anti-lynching crusader of the late 19th and early 20th centuries, is the subject of IDA A. WELLS: A PASSION FOR JUSTICE. For 40 years Wells' stature in Black America was equal to that of such leaders as Booker T. Washington and W.E.B. Dubois.

Now almost forgotten, the story of this courageous woman's fight for justice is told through her own writings, read on camera by Pulitzer Prize-winning author Toni Morrison. Hundreds of archival photographs, rare lithographs, as well as interviews with historians and scholars (one a grandson of Wells) recreate the period and shed light on Wells' place in history. The film was produced, written and directed by William Greaves, the Emmy Award-winning producer, whose documentaries have won over 60 international film festival awards.

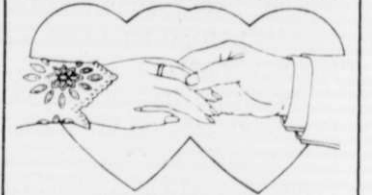

The program, presented to an audience of parents, friends and classmates included skits, essays and singing of the DARE song.

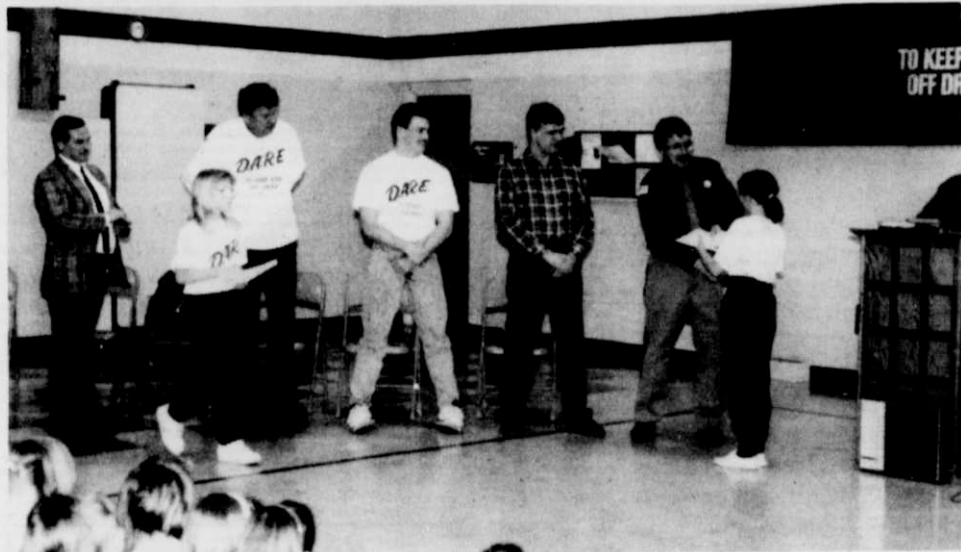
Project D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education), is a seventeen-week program

Members pay dues, invite speakers and conduct regular business at the meetings.

Jim Strachota, Developmental Disabilities and Long-Term Support Coordinator of CCSA, spoke to the members in West Bend at the January 7 meeting. He spoke on the 1992 Developmental Disabilities Task Force goals such as improving services for persons with disabilities.

Since West Bend is planning changes in transportation providers, times of service and fares;

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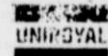


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Comebacks Key Indian Win

Muckerheide got just that, as he threw Thomas to the mat with :10 to go, and nearly pinned the Owls athlete, getting three more near-fall points to post a 7-3 decision, giving the Indians the victory.

"Todd did a real nice job," Nell said of his junior grappler. "He did a good job for himself, and for the team also, and that's great to see."

Muckerheide got some help

from his brother Chad, who came away with an important 2-0 win over Chris Schultz at 160 pounds. Also playing a big role in the win was 152-pounder Rich Farchione.

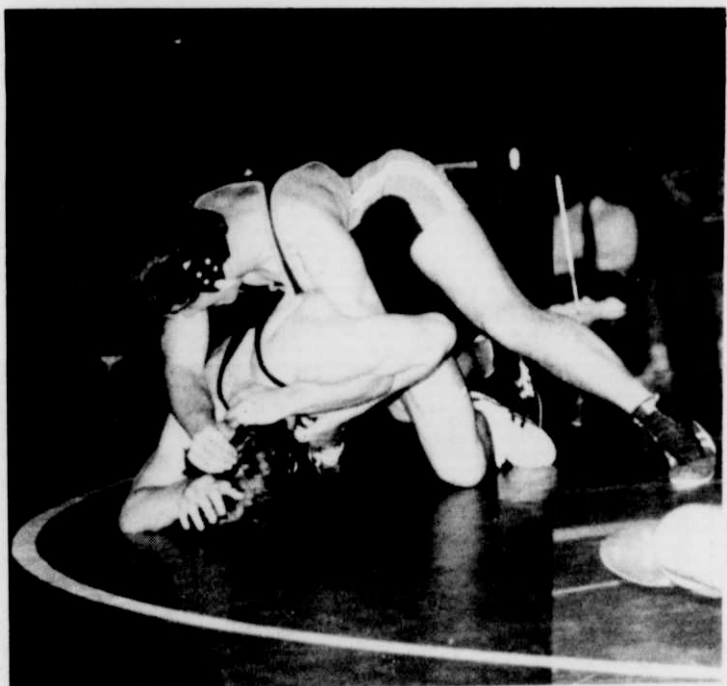

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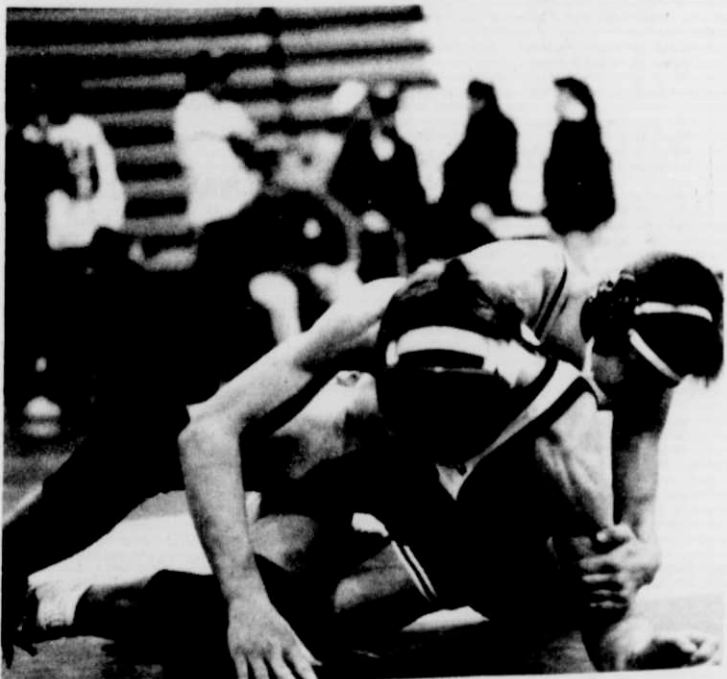
