Costly Train Derailment in Eden

The derailment of a Fox River Valley Railroad train in Eden last week resulted in considerable damage to a local business and the line, but miraculously, no injuries or deaths.

The accident occurred shortly after 8 p.m., Tuesday, June 23, just as the three engines of the northbound 116-car train traveled

James Pitzen of Eden and his carload of passengers were sitting on the west side of the crossing waiting for the train to pass. Pitzen saw a derailed freight car heading toward his auto. He managed to throw his vehicle into reverse and get out of the freight car's way. Pitzen said the car unhitched right in front of

On the east side of the crossing a Fort Atkinson woman, Cathy Blaine, was coming from her nephew's soccer game. She also was waiting for the train to pass through when her father William, noticed a car derail and yelled for her to throw her car in reverse. The detachment of a set of wheels from the car caused it to dig into the ground preventing it from striking the Blaine auto. While no one was injured in either vehicle, the experience left everyone shaken as a result of their close calls.

One freight car was thrown into the side of the Eden Farm Supply feed mill on the south side of the street. Another freight car tore down the front portion of the building. The company's office building on the north side of the street was also damaged.

The force of the moving train piled freight cars up on the roadway like a log jam on a river. When the dust cleared, sixteen cars had derailed and were strewn about the area. Track was torn up for several blocks and huge furrows, some several feet deep, were dug up by the derail-

DOT to Resurface Section Of Hwy. 45 in Kewaskum

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation plans to resurface a section of USH 45 (Fond du Lac Avenue) in the Village of Kewaskum as part of their Six-Year Improvement Plan.

The section of Fond du Lac Avenue between CTH "H" and the north end of the existing curb and gutter in the Village is proposed to be resurfaced, and the section from the existing curb and gutter to STH 28 headed west out of the Village is proposed to be reconstructed to an urban roadway with curb and gutter. Both

roadway sections are scheduled for construction in 1995.

Mid-State Associates, Inc. has been hired by the State to design the new roadway, and will begin surveying activities in the last two weeks of June and first week of July. Alternative roadway designs and traffic handling schemes will be developed shortly thereafter.

The general public will be invited to review and comment on the preliminary plans and traffic control concepts in the summer and fall of 1992 prior to final plans being developed.

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
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



Veterans Have Two Years to Apply for Service Connected Disability Coverage

West Bend, WI - Veterans with service connected disabilities now have two years, from the date the service connection for disability was established, to apply for coverage. The two year eligibility period applies to those veterans whose service connected disability was recognized on or after September 1, 1991

The eligibility period was extended to two years by Public Law 102-86. Veterans whose service connected disability was recognized prior to September 1, 1991 must apply within one year after the date of establishment. Application can be made



Our weddings were primarily held in the homes, although occasionally some were held in halls. Most were church weddings, and a shivaree was something that seemed to be a must. Of course in those days, we were allowed to shoot in town, and shotguns were used for making noise as well as large circle saw blades were pounded on and you had to get enough money for beer and lunch. The bride and groom had to come out of the home to take care of this obligation.

In those days, our conveyance, at weddings, was horse and buggy, as a rule and later on cars with signs painted all over them, and a string of tin cans in back. Now it is not unusual to see

limousines and, again, horse and buggies at weddings.

Our weddings were made to last, not a convenience for a few years.

We had more time to visit with our neighbors, yet our working days were longer than they are today. Cutting grass and seeing how nice we could keep our yards wasn't that important.

Our first sidewalks were wooden. The first cement sidewalks were put in by Strachota.

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

Farm Supply, said no one was in the buildings at the time of the accident. While the wayward cars caused considerable damage to the building, they missed the mixers and electrical panel.

Railroad employes worked until dark Wednesday, trying to clear away enough of the wreckage to allow emergency vehicles access to the west side of the village should they be called out. The tracks were reopened at 6 p.m. Thursday.

Railroad officials said the accident is still under investigation and it could be as long as a month before the cause of the derailment is found. A FRVR official said it is thought, at this time, that a car may have derailed as it came out of a curve just south of Eden. The investigation will include examination of the physical condition of the cars and track. Speed tapes from the locomotive will also be reviewed to determine if the train was handled poorly.

WB Gallery Gala Intended to Develop Public Awareness



Get Ready for Strawberry Picking

Wisconsin strawberries — red, ripe, juicy, flavorful, mouthwatering...and nutritious — will be available from June until mid-July at pick-your-own operations, onfarm markets, municipal farmers markets and retail grocery stores.

"The quality of berries should be very good this year. However, due to winterkill of berry plants in some parts of the state, production may be down in certain areas," says Bob Williams, marketing consultant, Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP)

Strawberry harvest should start in the middle of June in southern, western and central Wisconsin, says Williams. "In the southernmost parts of the state, there could be some growers with berries starting about June 10.

Harvest dates will vary due to variations in weather, soil types, plant varieties and cultural practices. Picking will continue until late July in northern Wisconsin.

"For the freshest possible fruit and a fun family outing, you may want to visit a fresh-picked or pick-your-own strawberry farm in your area," he says.

Before driving to a strawberry farm, Williams strongly advises consumers to call the grower and check hours, crop availability and whether or not the producer provides fresh-picked berries and, if you're going to pick your own, picking containers.

To choose a strawberry operation in your area, check local advertisements or contact DATCP for a brochure listing over 100 growers. To get the brochure, send a stamped, self-addressed

business size envelope to Strawberries, DATCP, P.O. Box 8911, Madison, WI 53708. We will also enclose the Municipal Farmers Markets brochure.

Wisconsin New Personal Water Craft Law

Personal Water Craft (PWC) operators should be aware of the new PWC law. A PWC is classified as a boat and must therefore follow the same operation and equipment laws as other boats. In addition they must follow the new Wisconsin PWC Law. A synopsis of the new law is as follows.

- 1. No person may operate a PWC from sunset to sunrise.
- 2. All persons riding a PWC must be wearing a PFD of the proper size and type (type 1, 2, 3 or
- 3. No person may operate a PWC unless the lanyard is attached to the operator or the machine has a self-circling device.
- 4. No one under the age of 12 may rent or operate a PWC.
- 5. Persons between the age of 12 and 16 must have a valid Boat Safety Certificate with them when operating the PWC. Parental supervision is not a substitute for the Boating Safety Certificate as with other boats.
 - 6. It is illegal to operate a PWC

7. There is no towing of persons engaged in water skiing or similar activities unless the PWC is at least 9'11" in length and designed to seat 3 persons.

8. PWC towing of stranded or disabled boats is only allowed if speeds do not exceed slow-no-wake.

9. It is illegal to operate a PWC within 100 ft. of another boat at a

speed greater than slow-no-wake. 10. It is illegal to operate a PWC within 100 ft. of the following:

-another boat towing a skier or similar activity.

-the tow rope of another boat. -a person involved in skiing or similar activity.

11. No person operating a motor boat of any kind, including PWC may operate while pulling skiers, aquaplaning, or similar activity within 100 ft. of any occupied anchored boat, any PWC, or any marked swim area or public boat

12. No person water skiing or engaged in a similar activity, may get within 100 ft. of a PWC or allow the rope to get within 100 ft. of a PWC.

Again all other boating laws apply to PWC. Be sure to check the boating regulations before you head out.

Tips On Swimming Pool Safety:

Recreational Diving Do's and Don'ts

Dive into summer-but do it safely, say the experts at the National Swimming Pool Safety Committee (NSPSC)

Safe diving habits can prevent accidents which occur when swimmers hit the bottom of a pool, resulting in severe spinal cord injury and paralysis. As part of its "Operation Water Watch" program, the safety experts at the NSPSC offer these do's and don'ts for divers and parents of children who may dive:

Do's

- · Do know the depth of the water is sufficient for your dive. Many recreational swimmers are seriously injured each year as a result of diving into shallow areas of lakes, ponds, streams or swimming pools.
- · Do plan your dive path. Make sure there are at least 25 feet of clear water ahead.
- Do be sure there are no submerged or floating obstacles, such as other swimmers, rocks, tree branches, etc.
- Do remember to steer your body upwards as you

dive. Keep your head up and your arms extended over your head. Steer up with your hands once you enter the water.

- Do keep your dives
- Do take diving lessons from a qualified instructor.
- Don'ts · Don't dive into the shallow end of a pool or into shallow water.
- · Don't dive into an above ground pool.
- · Don't drink and dive. Statistically, more than 50 percent of all diving accidents involve alcohol.
- · Don't attempt any fancy or competitive-style dives in residential pools.
- · Don't try to dive

through an inner tube or other pool toy.

- · Don't push or throw anyone into the water.
- · Don't dive off the side of a diving board, slide or any other pool equipment.
- · Don't slide head first down a pool slide.
- · Don't take a running
- · Don't forget to be careful, and have fun!

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


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
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KEWASKUM — When a baseball team reaches double digits in the errors committed column, the opposing team should have a field day scoring runs and taking control of the game.
