Village Approves Summer Help

KEWASKUM - After a lengthy discussion, the Kewaskum Village Board last Monday night approved the hiring of two summer workers in the Public Works Department.

Questions were raised by a couple of Board members, asking DPW Director Jerry Gilles whether the two individuals were needed. Trustee Harry Roecker pointed out that a total of 1500 man-hours were gained by the Village's decision to contract out for garbage removal.

But Gilles said the additions were justified, noting that the Board has called for additional work to be done this summer, including the painting of half of the communities' fire hydrants.

"I don't have a problem not hiring help if there is nothing for them to do," Gilles told the Board. "But you can't cut back on personnel and keep adding work."

While Roecker and fellow trustee Gary Gavin cited their concerns over the additional workers, trustee Robert Beisbier backed Gilles, saying, "I think we should trust (Gilles) enough to make the decision (about hiring the additional help). That's what we pay him for."

In the end, the rest of the Board agreed, but trustee Tom McElhatton, serving as President in the absence of Mary Krueger, told Gilles he should keep close watch over worker's duties this summer.

In other matters before the Board, Protection and Public Safety Committee Chairman Beisbier recommended placing a stop sign at the intersection of Timblin Drive and the Kewaskum Mall entrance.

The intersection has been the spot of several accidents, as drivers entering the Mall often fail to yield the right of way to oncoming traffic heading east on Timblin.

The Board voted to place a stop sign east-bound on Timblin, and will approach the mall owners about adding a warning to drivers coming out of the mall. Drivers entering the mall will now have the right of way, with no stop sign heading west.

The Board also acted on an ordinance requiring construction sites within the village to have portable sanitation facilities on the premises. An exception to the ordinance could occur if public access to a sanitation facility is provided within 300 feet of the construction.

VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM **News Notes - Recycling Tips NEWSPRINT and MAGAZINES**

TYPE OF NEWSPRINT AND MAGAZINES: Basically all types of newsprint and magazines can be recycled. Waxed paper and other paper goods are not accepted. Office paper and computer paper may also be recycled.

PREPARATION: Tie in bundles with twine or strong string. Bundles should be limited to 8" in height. Office and computer paper may be bundled or shredded and stored in plastic see through bags Place bundles at the curb next to the dark green recycling bin or blue recycling bag. Place the bin or bag, at the curb on the same day that your solid waste is to be collected. Pick up will be Wednesdays for both solid waste and recyclables. Multi-family dwellings of six or more remember your recycling pick up will be the first and third Wednesday of each month.

NOTE: If raining on collection day, please hold cardboard until the following week.

50 Years Ago

April 30, 1943

The Grand View Lunch Room in Kewaskum has on display a large collection of camp banners, pictures of our servicemen, sleeve insignias and pillow covers sent by the men and women in service from this community, along with the names and addresses of most of those from here in the armed forces. The collection now totals 56 different banners or pennants from the various camps, a Chinese flag, two pillow covers, 53 pictures of our sailors and soldiers and 17 sleeve insignias. The list of names, pictures and insignias are posted on large, patriotically designed bulletin boards and the banners, pillow cases and Chinese flag are hung on the walls. Many requests have been received from the local men and women in camp for information regarding the collection and the above totals will answer their questions. The collection was started by Sylvester "Tiny" Terlinden and when he was inducted into the army last October, his sister and co-partner, Ione Terlinden, took over the work of keeping the collection up.

A total of 43 men from Washington County were accepted for military service at the Milwaukee induction station on April 22, and left April 29 for

Fort Sheridan, Illinois to enter active service. Two from the group are from rural Kewaskum. They are Cyril N. Wietor, Route 3, Kewaskum, and Roger J. Reindl, Route 2, Kewaskum.

75 Years Ago

APRIL 27, 1918

This week Friday, Kewaskum with many other villages and cities of the United States gave up several of its popular young men to take part in the world's conflict to fight for Democracy. The men called to the colors are Alex Klug, Alvin Haug, Peter J. Haug, Robert Little and Edward Guth and Art Bassil of the village, and Herbert W. Ramthun, Arthur K. Laatsch and Arthur Bertram of rural Kewaskum. The young men were ordered to report at the local board of exemption at West Bend on April 25, and will leave for Fond du Lac on April 26, where they will join other area men. The men called to the colors for May 1 thru 10 are as follows: Art. F. Martin, Kewaskum, Route 3, and Richard E. Ruel, Kewaskum, Route 5.

A hearing was held at the courthouse in West Bend last Saturday morning in the matter of the proposed new highway between Kewaskum and St. Michaels. Some of the farmers asked exorbitant prices for land needed for the new road, as high as five hundred dollars an acre. They had the choice between coming down voluntarily with their price or having commissioners appointed to appraise the land and be compelled to sell to the town at the fixed price. At the hearing they agreed to a reasonable figure, and no coercive measures will be taken. They will receive at the rate of \$150 to \$200 an acre for their land.

The saloon property of James B. Day of this city located at 143-145 South Main Street, and purchased by Mr. Day from Mrs. Rudolph Herman last fall, again changed hands Wednesday, when Mr. Day traded it to Anton Liska of North Lake, besides a cash consideration which is private. Mr. Liska takes possession of his property May 1, as also does Mr. Day. Since purchasing the place last fall Mr. Day had had the building rented to John Courtney, who conducted the saloon and occupied the living rooms upstairs. Mr. Liska is no stranger in this city as he formerly owned the Badger, a general saloon and rooming house business here. About four years ago, he sold out and moved to North Lake where he conducted a saloon up to last spring when the village went dry after which he conducted a soft drink and near-beer parlor.

On Monday, April 22, the Ho-

ly Trinity Church was the scene of a very pretty wedding, when Miss Mary Ann Schmidt, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Schmidt of the Town of Kewaskum, and who for many years successfully conducted a millinery store in the Mrs. Jacobitz building on Main Street in this village, was united in the bonds of matrimony to Mr. Joseph Honeck of Milwaukee.

Herman Gilbert, who is manager of the Leather Novelty Manufacturing Company at Kewaskum, sold his residence property at West Bend to Martin Rilling and will move his family to this village where he will occupy the upper flat of the George H. Schmidt building at the intersection of Main Street and Fond du Lac Avenue.

A baby boy was born last Saturday to Mr. and Mrs. William Baumgartner.

WIS 143 to Be Reconstructed in Washington, Ozaukee Counties

Road construction was expected to start this week on the reconstruction of WIS 143 from County P in Washington County to County Y in Ozaukee County. The work will consist of grading hills and filling low areas to improve site distance throughout the project.

A 24-foot wide asphaltic pavement will be constructed having eight-foot shoulders, three-foot paved. A new wider bridge and a box culvert will be built at project stream crossings. Intersections will be widened and in some cases realigned.

The work will be performed under a contract let to James Peterson Sons, Inc. of Medford, Wisconsin, at an estimated cost of \$3,364,000. Financing will be shared on approximately a 76/24 percentage by the Federal government and the state of Wisconsin respectively, from funds provided primarily by gas

WIS 143 will be closed to through traffic during construction operations, with access only to local property owners. It was anticipated that WIS 143 between County P and County Y will be closed during the week of April 26. Traffic is urged to use caution in the construction.

County G (Jackson Road), County M and County Y will be kept open to through traffic across WIS 143 during construction operations.

A marked detour will be provided and will follow County P. WIS 60 and County Y.

Every possible effort will be made to provide continuous and safe ingress and egress to all business and residential properties during this reconstruction, but pedestrians and motorists are urged to use caution in the construction zone.

Governor Approves Contract to Rehabilitate 4.7 Miles of County V in Fond du Lac County

Governor Tommy Thompson has approved a \$2.14 million contract for major rehabilitation of County V between Lime Road in the Town of Eden and Pioneer Road in the city of Fond du Lac.

The contractor, Musson Brothers, Inc., of Rhinelander, is expected to begin work on the 4.72 mile project this spring.

The roadway now carries 2000 to 2600 vehicles each day. By the year 2012, this number is expected to be 3000 to 3600 vehicles per day. Trucks account for 17 percent of the present traffic volume. The road serves both farm and residential areas as well as local trucking of aggregate and asphaltic materials. Time, traffic and weather has caused moderate to severe pavement deterioration on County V.

"In addition to pavement decay, sight distance is inadequate at some intersections and there are deficient acceleration and deceleration lanes. All intersections will be upgraded to present design standards," said Roger Sikorski, design supervisor on this project.

"The roadway will be widened from the present 22 feet with unpaved shoulders to 24 feet with 3 foot paved shoulders and where curb and gutter is added, to a minimum of 36 feet curb face to curb face," Sikorski said.

County V will be closed to through traffic during construction, but local access to homes and businesses will be provided. The marked detour northbound will be County B to US 41 to WIS 175 to County VV and back to County V. Southbound will be in reverse order. All sideroads and all streets, except County K, within the project limits will also be closed to through traffic. County K will be kept open to two-way traffic at all times.

The project is slated for completion in late fall of the year and will be paid for with 20 percent Fond du Lac County dollars and 80 percent federal dollars.



A Message from the Postmaster

Hello Kewaskum Statesman Readers! Well, in just two short weeks, my parents will be returning from "wintering" in New Port Richey, Florida. I am anxiously awaiting their arrival and hope that we can have some great weather when they return. Mom and Dad are looking forward to meeting many of you this summer.

Before I begin this week's column,., I just have to tell you all that I LOVE KEWASKUM. Have met so many of you and enjoy all of your visits to our Post Office. So many of you like the "open door" policy. That is just a small part of the "customer satisfaction" that ALL of us at the Kewaskum office take pride in sharing with you.

Being the "new" Postmaster, I have implemented many changes and want each and every one of you to know that they have been made for the betterment of customer service, FIRST and FOREMOST Yes, we do sell stamps, envelopes, postcards, tape, mailing envelopes... BUT, I would like to feel that SERVICE is our "biggest seller."

YOUR postal problems, questions and concerns are extremely important to my staff and I. We may not always be able to give you the answers that you like but will always strive to provide the best possible service that we possibly can. You have my word (as the Postmaster) on that!

PLEASE... continue to stop in, say "Hi" and let us know how we can better service you, okay? Thank you!

On to this week's column. Questions and answers to things you may just have thought about and "never asked."

QUESTION: I picked up a free "Express" envelope at the Post Office. Decided to send a letter to my son in it. I applied the proper postage (52 cents) and it was returned to me with a note that I could only use this envelope for Express mail specifically. What gives?

ANSWER: Express mail is the ONLY type of mailing that "carries with it" an explicit guarantee. Depending on destination that would mean either a one or two day guarantee (excluding foreign addresses). The envelopes MUST only be used for items specifically meant to be sent EXPRESS mail as every postal employee knows "the envelope," knows it carries a strict guarantee and it is handled accordingly. I am sorry for any inconvenience this may have caused you but... only if you are paying the Express rate, may you use this type of envelope.

QUESTION: What time is the mail in the Box Section at the Post Office?

ANSWER: First and second class mail for the Post Office Box Section will normally be completed by 9:30 a.m. My employees have been instructed of this and unless there is an emergency (incoming mail truck being late), we will always do our best to meet this "time frame."

QUESTION: I have noticed the new deposit slot at the post office. It states that mail for out-of-town wanting the Kewaskum postmark should be put in there. Will my mail be delayed using this slot?

ANSWER: Mail deposited in this slot will not be delayed. The only difference is that it will aready be postmarked and will bypass that operation once it gets to Milwaukee.

QUESTION: My roommate has

been opening my mail. I feel that is an "invasion of my privacy." What can I do about it?

ANSWER: Tampering with the U.S. Mail is a very serious offense. Willfully opening another person's mail and/or going into someone else's mailbox (without their permission) is indeed an 'invasion of privacy' and cannot and will not be tolerated. You will have to file a report with the local police, who will, in turn, give a copy to the Post Office. That report will be sent to the Postal Inspection Service for complete investigation.

QUESTION: I continually receive another person's mail. We both have the same last name but have different addresses. We both must have post office boxes. I put the letter in the Kewaskum "slot" and many times, I get it back again... WHY?

ANSWER: First and foremost, allow me to apologize for the error. Speaking on behalf of all my employees, WE DO MAKE MISTAKES and appreciate it when you bring them to our attention. Dropping the erroneous letter back into the mailstream could possibly give the letter right back to you, through human error. PLEASE... if you receive mail into your box in error, bring it to the window or call us on the matter. Mistakes do happen but I have personally found out that 99% of them can be corrected by just "showing us our mistake." As your Postmaster, I apologize for the error. You can help us and your neighbors by letting us know... "we made a

QUESTION: I bought a house and am getting some mail addressed to the previous occupant. I called on this matter but still get some of their mail. What do I do?

ANSWER: Please bear in mind that some mail does come addressed with "a name and/or current resident." If YOU are the current resident, you will continue to receive that mail. If it does not bear

the endorsement "or current resident"... please call me personally and I will do my utmost to rectify the situation. I have successfully had a program in place at every office I worked at, that I will take your name and phone number. I will talk to those responsible for the error and then call you back after a two week time-frame to make sure that the error has been corrected and the service has improved."

Well, that is it for this week and hope that many of you found the questions and answers to be informative and helpful. YOUR input into our operation is important. I like to feel, "to the best of our ability," we do it ALL FOR YOU.

Like any business, customer input is important to the success of an operation so continue to feel free to stop in and/or call me at 626-2575 for assistance in your postal needs. Until next week, TRY to have a good day... A HAP-PY EVERY DAY.

KHS Track Teams a Combined Fourth at Red Knight Invitational

MILWAUKEE - The high winds, along with a unique Invitational setup made for an interesting day for the Kewaskum track teams here, last Saturday.

Competing in the Red Knight Invitational on the campus of Concordia University, the KHS track squads combined to finish fourth in the eight-team meet. A total score for both boys' and girls' teams was kept, with points being awarded through 16 places.

Wisconsin Lutheran won the meet with 734.5 points, easily runner-up outdistancing Milwaukee Lutheran (595.5). Burlington was third (485) and the Indians fourth (457).

The Indian boys did quite well in the meet, according to coach Jerry Gosa. Kewaskum registered a pair of firsts, three seconds, and two more thirds in the highlycompetitive meet.

Sophomore Tyler Dieringer had a hand in both of the Indian firsts, as he won the pole vault, clearing 9-0, and helped the 800 relay team also take the top spot with a 1:41.2 clocking. Joining Dieringer on the winning unit were Joe Rettler, Aaron Kurth and Wayne Stearns.

"That's the first time Tyler's cleared event he opening height (8-0)," Gosa said of the pole vault win. That competition didn't count towards the team total, so not many athletes competed in the event, according to the Indian boss. As for the 800 unit, "We don't get to run that event too often," Gosa said, adding that the unit nipped Wisconsin Lutheran by just .1 of a

Leading the barrage of seconds for the KHS boys was soph Travis Jacak, who cleared 6-2 in the high jump. Jim Wichtoski surpassed the 20-foot barrier (20-3) in the long jump, also taking second, while Jeff Dirmeier's 2:06.1 in the 800 was just off his personal best.

"He needs to get that down just a little more," Gosa said of Dirmeier, who also added a fifth in the 1600 (4:57.3). The senior also teamed with Wichtoski, Andy Rix and Matt Tonn to take third in the 1600 relay (3:44.3). Wichtoski, meanwhile added a fifth in the 400 with a personal best of 53.9.

Chad Harlow was fifth in the 00 hurdles (17.8), and placed third in the triple jump with an official jump fo 41-2.5, although Gosa said that he believed the officials made a mistake. Harlow's previous best mark was almost six feet shorter.

"Jim Rix also did quite well," Gosa said, noting the senior posted a personal best of 122-6 in the discus, good enought for sixth. Gosa also praised the 3200 relay unit (Brian Butschlick, Damien Doherty, Kevin Kohn, Rettler) for their fifth place showing (9:21.6).

"We had some pretty good times," KHS girls coach Perry Koth said of his team's performance. Still missing several key athletes due to injury and vacation, the Lady Indians recorded a first, three seconds and a third in the meet.

Junior Ginger Wiesner got the lone win for KHS, taking the 400 in 1:02.8, her fastest outdoor time of the year.

Taking second for the Indians were Christa Schmidt in the 300 hurdles (50.6), Nicole Hetzel in the 800 (2:39.9), and the 1600 quartet of Schmidt, Wiesner, Mary Yahr and Tracy Jacak (4:24.7).

"That's really getting down there," Koth said of Schmidt's time in the 300. "For Nicole, that's a little off yet," while the 1600 relay "had a pretty good







2. The public improvements shall be the installation, repair and replacement of sidewalk and curb/gutter on Forest Avenue, Western Avenue, Roseland Drive, Fond du Lac Avenue, Midland Avenue, Meadow Lane and Main Street and other related improvements deemed necessary by the Village Engineers and meet the specifications contained in Section B of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum and under the Village Engineers specification for sidewalk installation.

3. The total amount assessed against the properties in the defined assessment district shall not exceed 100% of the total cost of the improvements. The Village Board determines that the improvements constitutes an exercise of police power and the amount assessed against each parcel shall be based on the lineal footage of said parcel on aforementioned streets,

4. The assessment against any parcel may be paid in cash or in annual installments the number of which shall be determined at the public hearing on the proposed assessment. The Village Engineer shall prepare a report which shall consist of:

a. Preliminary or final plans and specifications for the improvements.

b. An estimate of the entire cost of these proposed improvements.
 c. Schedule of proposed assessments against each parcel.

5. When the report is completed, the Village Engineer shall file a copy of the report with the Village Clerk for public inspection.

6. Upon receiving the report of the Village Engineer, the Clerk shall cause a notice to be given stating the nature of the proposed improvement, the general boundary lines of the proposed assessment district, the time and place at which the report may be inspected, and the time and place of the public hearing on the matters contained in the preliminary resolution and the report. This notice shall be published as a Class 1 notice and a copy shall be mailed at 10 days before the hearing to every interested party.

7. The hearing shall be held in the Kewaskum Municipal Building, 204 First Street, at at time set by the Clerk in accordance with Sec. 66.60(7), Wis. Stats.

Adopted and approved this 19th day of April, 1993 by the Kewaskum Village Board.

MADISON ... Ice, cold weather and high water may give anglers some unique challenges when Wisconsin's game fish season opens statewide on Saturday, May 1.

Harland Carlson, fisheries manager in Vilas County, says there's some uncertainty as to what conditions anglers will find on opening day in northern Wisconsin.

'Right now it's touch-and-go whether the ice will be out on the bigger northern lakes," said Carlson. "If we get some warmer weather over the next week, most of the ice should be gone. It's pretty rare to have ice remaining at the start of the fishing season, although we have had some years where the ice went out on open-

Carlson expects walleye fishing to be good, especially on smaller, shallower lakes where the fish will have finished spawning. On lakes where the walleyes are actively spawning, he said that anglers may have to wait until they've finished spawning and are ready to feed.

"Walleye spawning isn't totally a function of water temperature," added Carlson. "It's also seasonal, and they're ready to go.'

In addition to walleye, northern pike and perch should also be biting in the north. "Northerns will be pretty much done spawning, and they'll be catchable," said Carlson.

Carlson emphasized that if the ice isn't out on northern lakes, it definitely WON'T be safe to travel on, even on foot.

High water in southeast Wisconsin brings mixed blessings, according to Doug Welch, fisheries manager in Kenosha County.

"The 'higher' lake levels in southeast Wisconsin now are actually near normal after the recent years of drought we've had," said Welch. The water level shouldn't affect angling success, though and he expects a traditionally typical opening day fishing pressure and success.

The situation on southeast Wisconsin rivers isn't so promising, according to Welch.

'The larger rivers are very high, which makes for tough fishing," said Welch. "The fish have a hard time seeing the bait in turbid water, so success will be down. If water levels stay up on the rivers, you'll need to be very careful if you're fishing from a boat. I would't even consider wading into larger rivers like the Fox, Root and Pike.'

Welch offered a little advice for opening day anglers: "If the weather stays cool, work your bait or lure slower and you should do well with bass, and OK with bluegills and crappies.

Dodgeville Fisheries Manager Gene Van Dyck says that anglers in southwest Wisconsin can expect essentially normal conditions on opening day of fishing season.

"The Wisconsin River is high now, but it's hard to predict what the water level will be on opening day," said Van Dyck. "If the Wisconsin is a little high, it shouldn't effect fishing too much. Walleye fishing will likely be fair; the spawning run is over, so the fish should be settled down and ready to feed.'

Largemouth bass might not be as active on the nests as in previous years, according to Van Dyck, but a little sun will warm up shallow areas and could potentially make for some good largemouth action on opening day.

With the cold spring, the outlook for smallmouth bass in southwest Wisconsin isn't so promising.

"I don't expect smallmouth bass to be up in the streams yet," said Van Dyck. "They need to have water temperatures up near 60 degrees, so they likely won't be moving in the streams, and biting, until much later in May."

Flowages in southwest Wisconsin are not affected by high water, so bass and panfish fishing in them should be good, according to Van Dyck. "Right now we're in a cycle with panfish where the average size is very good. We've got fewer panfish but bigger ones, rather than lots of little


