The ATJ probringing trained Japanese adults into the actual classrooms as language and cultural resources persons for the students, staff and communities. They offer a cross-cultural learning experience containing many elements, both inside and outside the classroom. This program was created to promote a better mutual understanding between countries.

The winning products were brats, bacon, and beef sticks.

The show, held in conjunction with the 54th annual state convention of the Wisconsin Association of Meat Processors, is the largest meat product show in the United States. It involves meat processing plants and meat markets from throughout the state.

This year just under 1,000 products were entered into the 27 product categories of the show. The competition was judged by food scientists from the University of Wisconsin, visiting meat processors from other states, and other foodindustry professionals.

The size of this product show and the quality of its entries demonstrates the important role that sausage and processed meats play in Wisconsin's meat industry and among state consumers. The state ranks third in the nation in total sausage production. The popularity and wide variety of sausages and processed meats available in Wisconsin reflects the state's German and middle-European ethnic heritage.

KHS Forensic Success Continues at State

Sixteen KHS students were a very small portion of students converging in Madison on Friday night, April 23, and Saturday, April 24.

The KHS students participated in the 7:00 p.m. round on Friday. The Wisconsin High School Forensic Association State Speech Festival is held on the UW-Madison campus each year. It involves approximately 4,500 students from 435 high schools coming together from throughout the State of Wisconsin for one final festival of speaking and acting. The Kewaskum students may have been a small group, but they accomplished some big things!

These students had earned the ability to be state competitors by advancing from three rounds of participation at both the subdistrict and the district levels earlier this spring. The Critic's Choice Award recognizes the student who earned a perfect score (25 points) at state. This means those students earned a rating of <u>excellent</u> in all five <u>areas</u> of critique. One KHS student brought home the GOLD from State Speech last

weekend. That speaker was Tammy Hames, a sophomore who wrote her own prose selection entitled "Raining on Her." This was Tammy's first year in forensics, and she had made an impressive record all season.

Close behind Tammy were sophomore Kara Palmer in farrago, reading selections about war, and freshmen Jennifer Straub and Jennifer Schulte in prose. In poetry, Straub read "On the Pulse of Morning," and Schulte read "Thidwick the Big-Hearted Moose." All three girls received near-perfect 24 scores. They were given All-State ratings and silver medals.

Receiving silver medals and All-State ratings also were sophomores Anne Mertz and Meredith Frac and freshmen Jenny Goodsell and Jenny Ebert. Anne spoke about "The Vanishing Voter" in her original oration while Meredith read "How to Talk to your Mother" in prose. Jenny Goodsell presented a memorized solo acting humorous selection of the same "How to Talk to Your Mother," while Jenny Ebert read "If I Ran the Zoo" in poetry. These four girls all scores 23's.

The Finalists who received bronze medals were freshmen Carrie Stoffel who wrote her four-minute speech about stress and Renate Wilke who read the prose selection "Under the Spreading Grapefruit Tree." They were each awarded a 22. Junior Angie Klug read her prose selection "Under the Spreading Grapefruit Tree" and received a 21. The group interpretation students (seniors Chad Harlow, Carrie Fellenz, and Jenefer VanAssche and sophomores Weston Duenkel and Sabrina Maul) also received 21's with "At Wit's End."

Head coach Barbara York was impressed with the team's state showing. "It was a very young team this year with six freshmen and six sophomores. Only Kara, Anne, Weston, Meredith, and Sabrina had state experience, but all of the freshmen and sophomores came through with great scores. It was a rebuilding year," York stated, "and my assistant Judy Jacak and I have been pleasantly surprised how strong the young team turned out to be!"

Making their third appearance at state were Harlow, VanAssche, and Klug, while Fellenz made her second trip to the state in as many years. "These seniors and juniors led the way!" York also noted.

SPRING TIME IS BIKE TIME

The Kewaskum Police Department would like to take this time to remind everyone about bicycle safety and laws pertaining to them.

Wis. State Statute 346.03(9), Rules of the Road, states: "Subject to the special provisions applicable to bicycles, every person riding a bicycle upon a roadway is granted all the rights and is subject to all the duties which this chapter grants or applies to the operator of a vehicle..." In short, this means that all laws pertaining to motor vehicles apply to bicycles, including, but not limited to: Riding on the right side of the road, abiding by all traffic signs and signals, riding single file, etc. NOTE: In the event a child needs to ride on the sidewalk due to safety reasons, they should be aware that pedestrians have the right of way and ride only in single file.

Also, Village of Kewaskum ordinances require that all bicycles operated on the streets of Kewaskum to have a current license affixed to them. The cost of these licenses, which are non-expiring, is \$5.00. They can be obtained at the Municipal Building between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

A few safety tips to everyone operating a bicycle are: Keep your bike in good working order, wear bright colored clothing to make it easier for motorists to spot you, put a safety flag on your bike, ride single file, be aware of the area you are riding in and be ready to take evasive action if an obstacle appears and make sure the bike is the right size for the person riding it.

If we all follow these rules and safety tips we should have a safe bicycle season.

Federal Grant Funds KM Tree Planting

MILWAUKEE... State forests in southeastern Wisconsin will be greener this summer because of financial help from the federal government and a private association, said Richard Denney, Department of Natural Resources district forestry supervisor.

Two grants will allow the DNR to plant trees in the Northern and Southern Units of the Kettle Moraine State Forest in southeast Wisconsin. The trees were to be planted in April, weather permitting, prior to Forest Appreciation Week, April 26 to May 2.

The Northern Unit includes portions of Fond du Lac, Sheboygan and Washington counties. The Southern Unit is located in Walworth, Waukesha and Jefferson counties.

"A \$12,720 grant from the Small Business Administration will help fund the planting of 95,000 trees on 112 acres in the Southern Unit," Denney said. "The American Forests Heritage Global Re-leaf Project will provide \$26,000 for planting 180,000 trees on 208 acres in the Northern Unit.

"We are pleased to receive these monies for our tree planting programs on the two forests," Denney continued. "The trees will not only add to the aesthetics of these two recreational forests, but will also provide wildlife enhancement, increase biodiversity, reduce water and wind ero-

sion, and it will also provide wood to our forest industries."

Hardwoods and conifers will be planted at both sites, including red and white oak, walnut, white and red pine, and white and Norway spruce. Private contractors will plant the trees. Seedlings are provided by the department's nurseries.

The small Business Administration grant is designed to provide assistance to small businesses while creating a better environment through tree planting. The Heritage grant is funded by private donations. The goals of both programs include reforesting areas through private and public cooperative efforts. This is the first time the department received a Heritage grant and the second time it has received an SBA grant to find planting efforts on state lands.

Property management Master Plans were recently completed for both the Southern and Northern Units. The plans call for reforestation efforts over the next 10 years.

"The goal of these reforestation efforts is to minimize forest fragmentation and restore native plants." Denney said. "These public and private efforts become a win-win situation for both the department and our customers, the public. Trees are the answer to America's growing environmental concerns.

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

50 Years Ago

MAY 7, 1943

In conformity with the new uniform warning system for the Sixth Region, new air raid signals are being inaugurated in Kewaskum. On May 10, at 5 p.m., the new signal system will be tried and demonstrated so that all in this community will be familiar with them. The first or 'yellow'' warning will assemble the control center staff and be the first warning to all points on the control center "yellow" list. This "yellow" warning remains confidential. On the "blue" warning all whistles will be blown in a steady tone for two minutes. This means the probability of attack by hostile planes. The defense forces will mobilize. Dwellings, business places, industries not under war production and all street lights will be blacked out, except those necessary for traffic safety. The "red" warning will be an audible signal of two minutes or more of all whistles in rising and falling tone. All lights remaining after those extinguished after the "blue" warning, will be blacked out for the duration of the "red" warning . The public will seek shelter. All traffic will cease. The "blue" or semi-clear will always follow the "red" signal after the immediate danger has passed. The community will then return to regulations of the "blue" stage, as set forth in the paragraphs above, for with the possibility of hostile planes returning it may be necessary to resume the "red" stage of alert. There will be no audible "all clear" or "white" signals. The "all clear" will be indicated by turning on street lights. Public radio will also indicate the "all clear." Certain designated radio stations will remain on the air even during "blue" and "red" signals. The revised system of of air raid warnings went into effect as of April 27, 1943, throughout the state of Wisconsin. The principal actors and singers include Ione Koenig, John Stellpflug, Marjorie Bartelt, Marvin Kempf, Dolores Hammen, Marjorie Schmidt, Donald Koerble, Joy Zanow and Gilbert Seil. The queen's court is made up of: Trumpeters - Eleanor Schaeffer, Dorothy Harter; Couriers - Lois Zanow, Grace Zanow, Margaret Nigh, Marian Nigh; Ladies in Waiting - Bernice Luepke, Evangeline Schmidt, Ursula Thull, Audrey Ehnert, Rose Ellen Schmitz and La Verne Siegfried.

The third member of the Elwyn Romaine family of this village left on Sunday morning to begin training in the armed forces. She is Miss Charlotte Romaine, who enlisted in the WAVES in March, and has been called into active service. Charlotte followed in the footsteps of her brother, Seaman Second Class Robert Romaine. KEWASKUM - Perhaps the competition the night before helped prime the Kewaskum boys track team for its meet last Wednesday here with Kiel.

Whatever the case was, the Indians turned in some of their best efforts as KHS rolled over the Raiders, 108-28. The effort please Indian coach Jerry Gosa, whose team finished fifth in the tough Washington County Indoor less than 24 hours earlier.

"I think the kids were really psyched for this meet," Gosa said, explaining that it was the team's lone home meet of the season. "We ran real well." So well, in fact, that the Indians won all but four of the 16 events.

Junior Brad Jackson returned to action for the Indians, and was immediately paid dividends. After missing several weeks due to a foot injury, Jackson cleared 12-9 in the pole vault to win the event.

Damien Doherty also did well, according to Gosa. The freshman won the 3200 (11:06.9), knocking almost 10 seconds off his previous personal best. "That was nice to see."

Soph Travis Jacak won the high jump (6-2), while David Gosa took the 1600 (4:49.8), edging teammate Randy Thull, whose 4:59.3 was also a personal best. "That's a great time for him, seeing it was the first time he ran that event," Gosa said.

Other personal bests noted by Gosa were Dan Schulteis (124-5 in the discus), Dean Kreis (11-0) in the pole vault, Chad Harlow (46.0) in the 300 hurdles, Tyler Dieringer (10-0) in the pole vault, and Kevin Kohn (2:14.9) in the 800, and Jim Rix in the shot put (44-8.25).

Other firsts for KHS included Chrissy Neumann in the 1600 (5:58.7) and the 1600 relay (4:16.0).


