



UW-System President Katharine Lyall will be on hand to congratulate 400 sixth, seventh and eighth graders for their outstanding academic achievements at the Southern Wisconsin Talent Search Awards Ceremony on the UW-Madison campus on May 27.

Twenty-six students from eastern Wisconsin are among those participating in the awards ceremony, which is being hosted by the Wisconsin Center for Academically Talented Youth (WCATY).

Area participants include David Mertz of Kewaskum.

Students qualified for the academic awards through their participation in Talent Search, a national program for administering advanced-level tests to upper elementary and middle school students. Over 4,400 Wisconsin sixth, seventh and eighth graders who scored in the 95th percentile or higher on their grade-level standardized achievement tests elected to take the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) or the American College Test (ACT). Both tests are typically administered to juniors and seniors for college admission.

The Talent Search program encourages school districts to have qualified children take the advanced tests to assess students' capabilities in math and verbal reasoning beyond their current grade level. Schools can then use the test score information to plan course work appropriate for students' needs and abilities. Many Wisconsin schools participate in Talent Search as part of an overall program for gifted and talented students.

The award winners in the Madison ceremony have scored at or above the mean score for college-bound seniors on either the SAT or ACT. All students taking part in the ceremonies will receive medals and certificates to commemorate their achievement. Ellie Schatz, Executive Director of WCATY, explains, "The Awards Ceremonies are really very important for these young people and their families. Our society likes to reward other sorts of talents in young people, particularly athletic ability. These ceremonies are, in a way, modeled after athletic honors banquets. Such recognition serves to strengthen the pursuit of academic excellence not only for these students, but as a goal for all society.'

The Wisconsin Center for Academically Talented Youth is a non-profit organization that provides programs and services for gifted and talented students in the state. WCATY offers programs beyond what local school districts can provide, including weekend enrichment workshops, summer residency programs, and parent and teacher guidance and support services.

The Southern Wisconsin Talent Search Awards Ceremony is made possible in part with support from American Family Insurance Group in Madison and the Unversity of Wisconsin-Madison. Major funding for WCATY has been provided by the Norman Bassett Foundation, Madison, and the Lynde and Harry Bradley Foundation, Milwaukee.

75 Years Ago

MAY 18, 1918 CONDENSED HISTORY OF KEWASKUM

By an act of the Legislative in 1846, the Town of Kewaskum was part of West Bend. In 1847, it was divided and named Kewaskum in honor of an old Indian Chief of the Pottawatomies, who owned this land before the white man settled here. The town is watered by the Milwaukee River and a few tributary streams and has a dearth of lakes. The first election of the Town of Kewaskum was held at the home of Nathan Wheeler, April 2, 1850. The first settlers here were Mr. P. Barnes and wife who settled here in 1844. The first post office was established in Kewaskum Village in 1847, with James Thompson as first Postmaster. The first school was established in 1851, with L. Clarke, Supt. and Calista Colvin, teacher. In 1852, J.H. Myer built the first loghouse on the banks of the Milwaukee River. He then built a sawmill in 1854 and a grist mill in 1856. The first frame house in the village was built by Henry P. Eames, near the river on the south side of Main Street, opposite West Water. The nearest settler was William Pickel, a half mile away. The first store was built by William Spicer. In 1852, F.W. Buchtel started a blacksmith shop. In the spring of 1854 the first religious society was organized, The Dutch Reformed with Rev. M. Davenport as Pastor. There were four attendants at the first meeting. The first church was built by the Catholics. The first Sunday school was organized in 1855 with Mrs. Eames as Supt. The school was very successful and was maintained until 1879. The village has grown to be the thriving business center of the surrounding county. The C. & N.W. Railroad passes through the town and village. We now have several stores, butcher shops, blacksmith shops, garages, elevators, milliners, etc. The Catholic Church was built in 1862. The Lutheran Church in 1868, and the German Methodist in 1866. The latter congregation has disbanded and a new congregation has been organized, known at the Ev. Peace.

What have I done that I'm allowed to be burned, trampled and treated with disrespect?

Why are so few allowed to desecrate what so many died to protect? For 214 years I've flown to represent this country and its people. Who will be there for me when the next call to arms is made? Will I burn on foreign soil as I do on my own? Who will be there for all of us?



It's time to let the government know we will not stand for the burning or desecration of the symbol which stands for this country and its people.

Anyone who feels he has that right should visit Arlington Cemetery, Pearl Harbor or any one of the cemeteries where our war dead lie in honored respect.

There are enough of them.

Tell them about the right to burn their flag. If they say it's OK, do what your conscience tells you to. But not in front of me because I was There.... WERE YOU?

A Message from the Postmaster

Hello Kewaskum Statesman readers! Well, Chrystal is at Great America for the summer, mom and dad are all settled in, and I AM BEAT! Rented a van for "all the moves" and think I should just trade the Probe in and buy a van... would be cheaper (in the long run).

In this week's column I have some questions and answers and hopefully many of you will find them interesting and helpful.

QUESTION: Are money orders available at the Post Office and what is the fee?

ANSWER: This is a very good question. PLEASE do not send cash through the mail. Money orders are the safe way to send money. The special color blend, Benjamin Franklin watermark, metal security thread and twice imprinting of the dollar amount are incorporated security features. You can buy domestic money orders at all post offices in amounts up to \$700. The fee is 75 cents. If your money order is lost or stolen, present your customer receipt and it can be replaced. For a small fee, you can obtain a copy of a paid money order for up to two years after the date it is paid. Please remember... you CANNOT write a check for a money order.

QUESTION: I went to the post office and the clerk told me that the piece of mail I was sending was "non-standard" and she charged me an extra 10 cents. What does this mean?

ANSWER: First class mail weighing one ounce or less is nonstandard if it exceeds any of the following size limits:

-Its height exceeds six and an eighth inch

- Its length exceeds eleven and a half inches or

-Its thickness exceeds on quarter of an inch

Postal regulations specify that "non-standard" mail be returned to the sender for the 10 cents surcharge. Please keep in mind that this only applies to mail ONE OUNCE OR LESS.

QUESTION: I love the new display of stamps at the Kewaskum office. I can just look and see "what's new" BUT I was disappointed on the quantity on hand.

ANSWER: A mint set is a collection of every commemorative issued during the year. My daughter is going to be 20 in June and she has every mint set from the year she was born until now. These sets are unique and make a wonderful "baby gift" as each year, the next one can be purchased. The stamps are "mint" and "the worse thing that can happen" is that whoever you buy them for would use the stamps on the letters, etc. These are "collector items." Stop in and check one out today!!

QUESTION: I mailed a card and it was returned to me with an explanation that it was "nonmailable." Why?

ANSWER: Minimum size standards are: Pieces must be rectangular in shape, at least three and a half inches high, at least five inches long (items sent to foreign countries must be at least five and a half inches in length) and at least .007 of an inch thick (about the thickness of a postal card). Mail not meeting these standards will be returned to the sender.

QUESTION: I sent a piece of mail to Germany with a 29 cent stamp and it was returned to me for 21 cents postage. Why didn't it go on "postage due?"

ANSWER: Mail to foreign countries is 50 cents per HALF OUNCE, 95 cents for up to a FULL OUNCE. Mail within the United States is 29 cents UP TO A FULL OUNCE. Foreign countries WILL NOT accept postage due mail. It would behoove you to stop in, have us weigh those pieces for you so that proper postage is applied and you will not be inconvenienced by having the piece returned for extra postage.

Well, that is about it for this week. It is just overwhelming to know that so many of you enjoy my article. I LOVE WRITING IT ... that is for sure. Customer satisfaction is OUR PRIORITY at the Kewaskum Post Office. Have met so many of you ... it is GREAT! Please remember ... my door is ALWAYS open to each and every one of you. Stop in, chat for awhile and remember ... if you would like a little tour of the inside of the office, I will be more than happy to show you around. Until next week, try to have a good day ... A HAP-PY EVERY DAY!!





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
