Washington County June Dairy Breakfast On the Farm Saturday

The Washington County "Breakfast on the Farm" will be held on Saturday, June 12, at Dornacker Prairie Acres. The breakfast activities start at 6:30 a.m. and continue until 11:30 a.m. Leo and Pat Dornacker and Ralph and Arlene Dornacker families are hosting the event.

Activities start out with a pancake breakfast, including butter, syrup, sausage, cottage cheese, applesauce, assorted cheeses, and ice cream topped with either strawberries or maple syrup. Other activities on the farm include live music, farm tours, petting zoo, hayride, square dancing, door prizes and a chance to sample dairy products in the sample shack.

The event is sponsored by the Washington County Dairy Promotion Committee, but receives support from a number of businesses and organizations in the area. The organizers are planning to serve over 5,000 people for breakfast this year. With the experiences of past years the breakfast is well organized to reduce the waiting time to a minimum.

The "Breakfast on the Farm" is an activity for the whole family. It provides an opportunity for people from urban areas to visit a dairy farm, and learn a little about this important industry. The activities are family oriented with something of interest to people of all ages.

The farm is located at 5047 Cedarview Road, West Bend. This is between Hwy. 144 and Hwy. 41. There will be signs to

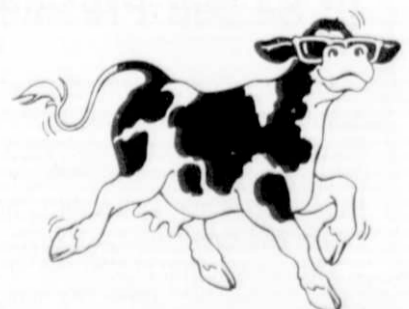
the farm and the Washington County Sheriff's Department will help assist with directing traffic and parking.

Hilltop Cross Field Mass at Ashford

St. Martin's traditional outdoor Hilltop Cross Field Mass is scheduled for 10:30 a.m. June 13 at the Hilltop Cross south of Hwy. 67 at Ashford, Wisconsin.

Year after year several hundred people of all faiths have joined with the members of St. Martin's Parish in worshipping at the fieldstone altar near the foot of the huge cross. The tradition dates back to 1886 when the first cross was erected on the hilltop. In the 1960s the tradition was revived when a two foot high cross was erected on the site. The present cross stands 43 feet high with the crosspieces extending approximately 14 feet. In 1977 a permanent altar was built of fieldstones from the area farm fields. This is where the Mass is read each year, overlooking the scenic area for miles around.

The outdoor Mass will open with a Knights of Columbus Color Guard followed by the Lomira Bintzler-Wachler American Legion Post #347 posting the colors. At the end of Mass, the VFW will retire the colors following the singing of "God Bless America". Mass will be celebrated by Fr. Wayne Barta, pastor of St. Martin's.

The Choir will be comprised of parishioners from St. Martin's, St. Matthew's, and St. Killian parishes. There will be a special parking area for the handicapped so they can stay in their cars. Holy Communion will be brought to the cars.

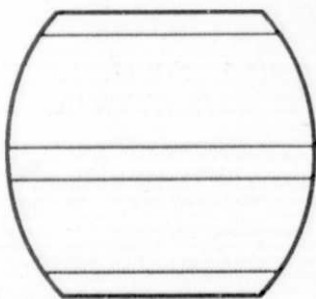

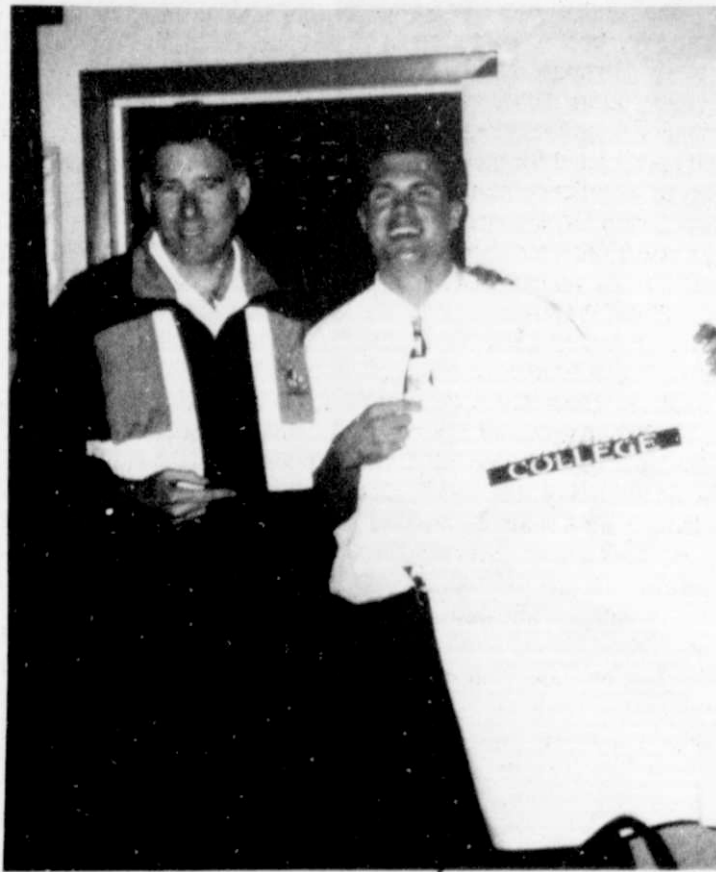
Smith Headed to Carthage College

small for that position, Miller says that many colleges were hesitant to sign Smith.

"That was one of the questions on him... that he came from a small school, and that he played the post," Miller said. "But that's what they (KML) needed him to do. I say that no matter where he plays, he will still be able to do what he does, and I like what he does."

What Smith can do is shoot the ball, and Miller acknowledges, "I like guys who can shoot."

Another aspect that caught Miller's attention was Smith's work ethic.

"He's a hard-worker, very competitive and intense," Miller went on. "He has what I call the intangibles. He doesn't mind mixing it up, and that's important. He is capable of adapting to the college game, which is a lot more physical."

Miller is unsure whether Smith will have an immediate impact for the Redmen this season. Carthage returns two starters, and another player who started about half of the time.

"A lot has to do with the individual player," Miller said of Smith's impact. "I don't know how he will react," although he added that Smith's competitive nature should help him in that area.

Carthage is located in the Kenosha-Racine area, and has an enrollment of 2000 students. The Redmen compete in the College Conference of Illinois and Wisconsin (C.C.I.W.).

Miller is in his second year at Carthage, having served as an assistant coach at both the University of Portland (Oregon) and Stanford University.

Division III school located here.

Redmen head coach Tim Miller, who led the team to a 13-12 record in his first season at the helm, thinks that Smith could become a valuable commodity to the squad this season.

"I see him potentially playing three positions," Miller said of the 6-2 Smith. "Anybody who can do that becomes a real asset to a team. In our system, I think he can play the two, three or four positions."

Smith, who averaged over 20 points per game this past season at KML, mainly played the post position in high school. Being

Village of Kewaskum NEWS NOTES

The Village of Kewaskum recently had the water rates reviewed by the Public Service Commission. The rates were adjusted as well as some of the rules governing the operation of the utility. One of those rule changes is addressed in schedule B-1 which refers to the Bulk Sale of Water. This provision allows the Village to sell bulk water and to fill swimming pools and establishes the appropriate charges.

The utility personnel shall supervise the delivery of water and the customer shall be charged as follows:

Service charge - \$12.00
Plus volume charge - \$2.00 per 1,000 gallons

If the pool is filled the contemporary method the customer pays \$1.03 or \$.81 per 1,000 gallons for the water and \$1.718 per 1,000 gallons for sewage.

EXAMPLE: To fill a 15,000 gallon swimming pool using the new method the cost would equal: \$12.00 plus \$2.00 times 15 equalling \$30.00 for a TOTAL of \$42.00.

To fill a 15,000 gallon swimming pool using the contemporary method the cost would equal: \$1.03 times 15 equalling \$15.43 plus \$1.718 times 15 equalling \$25.77 for a TOTAL of \$41.22

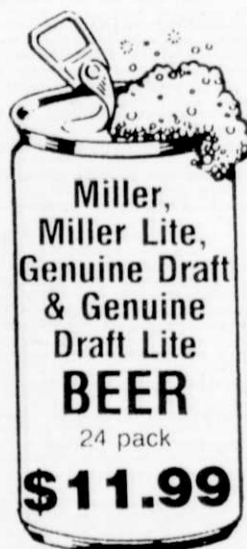

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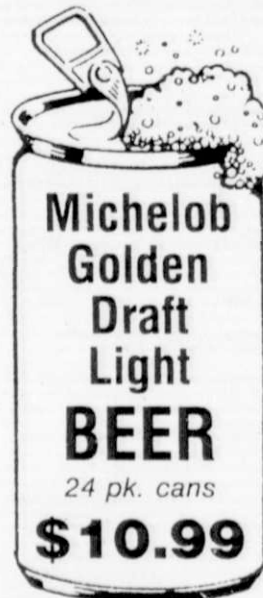
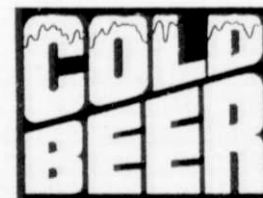

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Wisconsin Remains Number One In Dairy Production

MADISON -- The nation's leading dairy state has much to celebrate heading into June Dairy Month, according to Secretary Alan T. Tracy, Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection.

In 1992, dairying provided a \$3.3 billion boost to the state's total \$5.7 billion agricultural products sales income, new production statistics from the Wisconsin Agricultural Statistics Service state.

Although it was not helpful for crop production, cooler summer temperatures helped boost dairy income from \$2.85 billion in 1991 to 1992's \$3.13 billion. Much of that increase came from milk sales. Wisconsin produced nearly 16 percent of the nation's milk -- a whopping 24.1 billion pounds of it -- about the same last year. Average milk production per cow jumped to 14,643 pounds, up about 600 pounds. That translates into an extra 1,200 glasses of milk or 60 pounds of cheese per cow.

In addition, throughout the year, farmers received an average increase of \$1.16 per hundredweight for milk sold.

"Wisconsin is the envy of the world," says Tracy. "Not only do we lead the nation in milk production, but we have the largest number of dairy farms. In addition, Wisconsin is the home of the country's dairy breeding and dairy equipment industries. Our milk supply is pure. During June Dairy Month we promote Wisconsin's best."

The boost to the state's economy was accomplished even though the number of dairy farms declined from 32,000 to 31,000. About four out of every 10 Wisconsin farmers are involved in dairying, with the leading counties in milk production being Marathon, Clark, Grant, Dane and Dodge.

Wisconsin milk cows are estimated to be worth \$1.8 billion, with an average value of \$1,120 per head. More than 95 percent of Wisconsin's 1,646,000 dairy cattle are of the Holstein - Friesian breed.

Wisconsin dairy manufacturers produced more than one-quarter of the nation's butter and almost one-third of its cheese. American cheese -- which includes Cheddar, Colby, and Monterey Jack -- accounts for almost half of the state's total

cheese production.

Italian cheese, Wisconsin's second leading cheese variety, makes up another 40 percent of state cheese production. Italian cheese production continues to increase, reaching a record high of more than 800 million pounds in 1992, up 8 percent from 1991. Italian cheese production has more than doubled in the last 10 years.

Mozzarella is the most popular style Italian cheese, accounting for nearly 80 percent of the Italian produced in the state.

In addition to being a major producer of the nation's American and Italian cheeses, Wisconsin produces all the country's Limburger, 84 percent of the blue, 67 percent of the Muenster, and 57 percent of the brick.

Wisconsin also produces nearly 40 percent of the dry whey in the nation. It is used for both human consumption and animal feed. The state has 250 dairy plants that manufacture one or more dairy products.

The Wisconsin Agricultural Statistics Service is a state-federal cooperative program to collect and publish state and county agricultural statistical data. The data depends on the voluntary cooperation of farmers and agribusinesses who answer survey questionnaires to provide information for reports.

Dairy Council Warns Against Quick Weight Loss Fads

Losing weight quickly may present a health risk and increase the chances of gaining unwanted pounds back, according to nutritionists at the Dairy Council of Wisconsin.

The Dairy Council suggests dieters bypass fad plans that make big promises since many of them may compromise good health. Instead, persons wanting to lose weight should stick to a basic plan of exercise, limiting the intake of sweets, and eating smaller portions at mealtimes from the food groups of meat, milk, fruits, vegetables and grains.

Dairy Council of Wisconsin is a non-profit nutrition marketing and communication association funded by the dairy industry. DCW serves Wisconsin, northern Illinois and northwest Indiana.

Before morning's first light, Wisconsin's 31,200 dairy farms spring to life. These farms dot the fertile countryside with 1.7 million dairy cows. JUNE 7, 1968

While swimming in the Milwaukee River at the Village Beach on Tuesday, a group of local boys made a startling

discovery when they came across a large number of human bones imbedded in the river bottom. The boys accidentally stepped on the bones while swimming. To satisfy their curiosity, the youth brought the objects to the surface and found that they were human bones. They then started an intensive search and brought up 100 or more bones during the afternoon before they discontinued their search. The boys who "fished out" the bones are Brian Ludwig, Rick Eichstedt, Mike McDlain, Tom Bohn and Jeff Lawrenz. On Wednesday morning the larger bones were laid out and pieced together on the sidewalk in front of the Municipal Building where they were viewed by District Attorney Robert Kauffman, Coroner Bob Boltz and other officials, including County Patrolman Don Mertens, Chief Pledl, the writer and Eugene LaMarche, high school biology teacher. The collection of bones included a skull, jaw bone and teeth, hip socket bones (indicating the bones were from at least two persons), upper leg and lower leg bones, upper and lower arm bones, finger bones, ribs, neck bones, vertebra bones and many other smaller bones. The assorted bones, numbering at least 100, filled two cardboard cartons. There was no way of telling how old the bones are but they are well preserved. It is not known whether they are the bones of Indians or white men. Coroner Boltz took the bones to send them to the state laboratory at Madison to have them checked for possible age, identification and how long they were deposited on the river bottom. The reason the bones were first discovered now is believed to be because the river was dredged late last fall.

Refreshments of all kinds were furnished in abundance and we doubt if anyone went home hungry or thirsty. This affair, which is given annually by the patrons of the Kleinschay cheese factory, is getting to be the one big event of the season as was demonstrated by the large crowd of people in attendance.



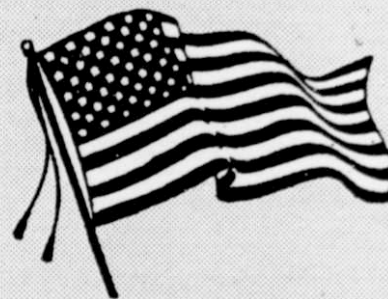

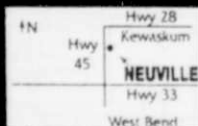

Alfalfa Scissors Cutting Program

Washington County crop producers will be able to receive information from the alfalfa scissors cutting project again this year. The scissors cutting involves taking scissors and cutting a small sample of growing alfalfa and having it tested to evaluate the feed value. This can be used to determine the advancing maturity, and when to start making the first cutting of hay.

Samples are being taken each Monday, starting on May

17th for a period of four weeks. The cooperating farmers are Dan Neuburg, in the Slinger area, and Gary Schladweiler in the Kewaskum area. This will provide a representation from both the northern and southern parts of the county.

The alfalfa samples are being tested for (CP) crude protein (ADF) acid detergent fiber, (NDF) neutral detergent fiber, and (RFV) relative feed value. These values can be used to determine the advancing maturity of the crop. Relative feed value can be used as the prime indicator of when to start cutting alfalfa fields. It is suggested that producers start cutting when the relative feed values are at about 150. This will allow growers to complete harvest before the forage becomes too mature and loses feed value.

The results of the samples taken on May 17th are as follows. Dan Neuburg farm: CP = 26.83%, ADF = 21.36%, NDF = 27.59%, and RFV = 244. Gary Schladweiler farm: CP = 28.18%, ADF = 20.59%, NDF = 27.22%, and RFV = 249.

The results of the scissors cutting will be made available to producers through a variety of methods. Producers can call the Washington County U.W. Extension Office at 335-4477, 644-5204, or 342-2929 each week on late Wednesday for the current information. The information will be included in my radio programs each Saturday morning on WBKV and WTKM. Producers that would like the results by mail can send \$2.00 to the Washington County U.W. Extension Office, 333 E. Washington St., Suite 1200, West Bend, WI 53095. The office will mail the information each week as soon as it is available.

The scissors cutting project is a cooperative project between Washington County U.W. Extension and Farmers Inc. Elevator, Allenton.

Seniors Pace KHS Girls' Effort at State Track Meet

LA CROSSE... It's always nice to see your seniors end their careers with a bang, so it's easy to understand why Kewaskum girls track coach Perry Koth was happy with what transpired here last weekend, at the WIAA State Track and Field Championships. KHS veterans Robyn Winninghoff and Christa Schmidt ended their high school careers with fine performances, leading the Indians to a 12th place showing in the Division II team standings. Winninghoff peaked at the right time, tossing the discus 119-11, good enough for third in Division II. The distance was just one inch away from second place, as well. Winninghoff duplicated her performance of a year ago, when she also took third in the event. Nekoosa's Holly Hyland won the event with a throw of 124-6. "She did real well," Koth said of Winninghoff, whose previous best throw was 113 feet. "It was nice to see her finish her career on a strong note. She was real happy with that." Schmidt, meanwhile, also had a good day. After qualifying for the finals in both the 100 and 300 hurdle finals on Friday, Schmidt took fifth in the 100's (16.07) and eighth in the 300's (48.35) on Saturday. "She dedicated herself to getting to state," Koth said of the team's MVP this season. "She made it through hard work and determination. She showed why she was the MVP. She accomplished her goal." "It was kind of ironic," Koth said, noting that Schmidt's stronger event was the 300 hurdles. "She shouldn't have even made it to the finals (in the 100's), because she was seeded 11th. So that was surprising." Junior Ginger Wiesner added another fifth in the 400. Her time

of 60.7 was a bit slower than last year at the State Meet, when she took fourth with her 60.4. Still, Wiesner has another year left to move up, and perhaps challenge for the 400 title. "She worked real hard," Koth said of Wiesner. "The competition was a little better this year." The lone disappointment for the Lady Indians occurred in the 1600 relay. After taking second at the Sectionals with a 4:08 clocking, the unit, comprised of Schmidt, Wiesner, Mary Yahr, and Missy Rohrer, failed to qualify for the finals. In the preliminaries on Friday, Yahr dropped the baton after apparently coming in contact with a runner from Waunakee. Despite the drop, the unit finished in a very respectable time of 4:16. Koth figures the time would have been closer to 4:06 without the drop, and thinks the team could have finished in the top six in the finals. "Those kinds of things happen," Koth said. "The kids were pretty disappointed. I was disappointed in the way it happened. But they had a great year. There's a lot of kids who never even get there, so just being there is super." With the unit losing only Schmidt to graduation, the relay may get another chance next year, as Koth says he plans to keep Yahr, Rohrer and Wiesner together. Koth had another reason to be pleased with his athletes as well. After Yahr dropped the baton and the foursome was eliminated from contention, the rest of the relay consoled the sophomore. "They helped her get through it, because she (Yahr) really felt terrible," Koth said. "I thought that was great to see."

Jacak Finishes Sixth in High Jump

LA CROSSE - It wasn't his best effort of the year, but considering the enormous pressure of the State Track and Field Championships, Kewaskum sophomore Travis Jacak was impressive. Jacak took sixth in the Division II high jump, clearing 6-4. He and two others came in at the 6-4 mark, but because of misses, Jacak dropped from fourth to sixth. Sturgeon Bay's Jon Walker ran away with the title, going 6-9, to miss the Division II record by a single inch. "Things went real well," KHS coach Jerry Gosa said of the meet. "We figured going into the meet that if he could jump at or near his personal best (6-5), he could probably place (in the top six)."

Jacak could have placed higher, but he had some problems in some of his early jumps. Jacak almost missed placing, though, clearing the 6-3 mark on his last attempt. "He had a few minor problems," Gosa admitted. "But I thought he handled it very well. There's a lot of pressure competing in a state meet. For a

sophomore to place in the high jump... that's just great." Gosa added that former KHS standout and high jump record-holder Jim Geldreich was at the meet, cheering on Jacak. Geldreich, who stands just 5-7, held the record in the early 1980's when he jumped 6-3. "That was nice to see him there," Gosa said, noting that Geldreich congratulated Jacak on breaking the mark of Mike Steinhardt (6-4), who surpassed

Geldreich.
