Kewaskum Man Fatally Shot

A Kewaskum man was accidentally killed last week when a gun he was carrying fired, shooting him in the head.

Harold Krueger, 70, of 9512 Hwy. V, was found at the bottom of the basement stairs in his home on Thursday, February 24.

According to the Washington County Sheriff's Department, Krueger's body was discovered by a relative who was bringing him a meal around 5 p.m. He had reportedly been dead between two and four hours before he was found.

Investigators from the Sheriff's Department maintain the gun was in its' case when it went off, and equipment to clean the gun was found near Krueger's body. Lt. Jack Peters reported that a turkey hunting permit and a hunting catalog were found on the kitchen table. It is believed Krueger was shot accidentally as he was preparing to clean his gun to go turkey hunting.

Relatives commented to officers that he had been forgetful recently, and had been found three or four times with a gun not completely unloaded after a hunting expedition.

The Washington County Humane Society will hold it's annual Rabies Clinic on March 6th, 1994, from 10 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 to 3 p.m. Dr. Marthina Greer of Brownsville-Lomira Small Animal Clinic will be the attending Veterinarian. The cost per shot is \$10.00 per animal.

Wisconsin State Law states that you must have your dog licensed by April 1st of each year. In order to buy a license, you must have proof of a current rabies vaccination. Assembly Bill No. 751, which was signed into law by the Governor of Wisconsin on May 17, 1980, requires that all dogs in the State of Wisconsin be vaccinated against rabies. The Bill states that all dogs over five months of age have a current rabies vaccination. Cats should also be given the rabies serum. The vaccination is good for three years on cats and dogs. Animals under one year must be revaccinated within one year.

There is no appointment necessary. Animals will be given their shots on a "firstcome, first-served" basis. 

Late Baskets Not **Enough for KHS**

KEWASKUM - A fast start and a furious finish just didn't cut it for the Kewaskum boys basketball team in its game with Campbellsport here, last Tuesday night ...

Instead, it was a poor second quarter that cost the Indians in a 60-59 loss against the Cougars in their annual non-conference matchup.

The loss left the Indians with a 4-15 record, while Campbellsport improved to 5-14 on the year.

"I thought we played pretty well," KHS coach Jim Westphal said. "It was an evenly matched game. We just made mistakes at the wrong times.'

Tony Rix helped get things started for the Indians in the opening quarter. Rix scored six of his 10 points in the first two minutes, helping Kewaskum stake claim to a 12-0 lead.



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

MADISON - Chalk up another first for coach John Nell and his Kewaskum wrestling program.

Senior Chad Muckerheide finished fourth, and freshman Joel Dziedzic ended up fifth, as the Indian duo became the firstever double placewinners for KHS in the WIAA State Wrestling meet held here, last weekend.

It was a fine finish to an excellent year for Nell and his team, which qualified for the WIAA Team Tournament for the first time, as well.

"We're all very happy right now," Nell said. "They both did really well down there. It was a fun tournament, and we had a good time."

Muckerheide capped off his KHS career in fine fashion. Competing in the 152-pound division, the four-year starter on varsity drew Auburndale's Nate Weiler in the opening round, after Nell had thought Muckerheide would open against the top seed, John Bowman of Nekoosa.

"I was very happy to be wrong in this case," Nell said, pointing to Muckerheide's 3-2 victory over Weiler. "Chad wrestled a very good match."

The win moved Muckerheide to the semifinals, where he was pitted against Edgerton's Nate Wilke. The Indian senior looked to gain the upper hand in the opening period, as he shot in for a singleleg takedown.

But Wilke didn't let Muckerheide finish the move, and instead scored the takedown. That sequence proved vital, as Muckerheide went on to fall by a 3-1 score.

Dziedzic's nerves showed, as he dropped a tough 3-2 loss to Voelker. "He really didn't shoot in for any takedowns," Nell said of Dziedzic. "It seemed like he was more afraid of losing, than he was trying to win."

The loss sent Dziedzic into the consolation bracket, where he met Weyawega-Fairmont's Cory Baehman. Dziedzic had to go to overtime, but was able to
