## KEA Voices Displeasure Over Negotiations

KEWASKUM - Reading a letter on behalf of the Kewaskum teachers union, Kewaskum Education Association President John Breese told the Board of Education Monday night that members are displeased regarding the progress of teacher contract negotiations.

Breese said that the salary increases offered to the teachers pale in comparison to those recently awarded to the district's administration.

The teachers have been without a contract since the start of the school year in September.

"We feel that over half of the district's teachers - those who have been involved in the education of its children the longest - end up being treated poorly and with a great deal of disrespect by this offer," Breese read from the letter.

The offer to which Breese referred is the Board's Minimum

Qualified Economic Offer (QEO), which amounts to a 2.1% increase in salary, and a 1.7% increase in benefits. He said that after all is said and done, 52% of the teaching staff will receive a 2.58% salary increase this year, and more

teachers will receive the same increase, or even less, next year.

Breese said the KEA agrees that incremental increases are necessary for the district to continue attracting qualified teaching candidates. But he said the

## Police Alert Village To Recent Burglaries

The Kewaskum Police Department is warning residents of the community to be aware of two burglaries that occurred this month involving the theft of Hummel collectible figurines.

According to police reports, the first incident occurred Saturday, April 2, sometime between 6:45 and 10:45 p.m. at the residence of Dorothy Kral, 215 North Street in Kewaskum.

Officer Gregory P. Zager reported that a perpetrator had forced entry into the home through a back door when no one was home, ransacked the house and removed nine valuable Hummel figurines worth approximately \$450, plus a small, antique vase.

Kral told the police she remembers a couple of months ago a male, approximately 25 to 30 years old, came to her residence and inquired about having any antiques.

Police are continuing to investigate the case, and note there were other burglaries around the Kewaskum area during the period of time right before Christmas, 1993.

The second burglary took place exactly one week later, on April 10th, between 6:45 p.m. and 12:45 a.m. at 1318 Roseland Drive, Kewaskum, the home of Timothy McDonald.

McDonald and his wife returned home around 12:45 and discovered the break-in when McDonald tried to open the inside door to his home and the glass was broken. Officer John Thorn reported to the scene and discovered that eleven Hummels of various sizes and colors were missing, along with a crystal vase.

Police Chief Richard L. Knoebel also responded to the call, and the residence was dusted for fingerprints. Nothing else was reported missing.

The Kewaskum Police Department requests members of the community to report anything suspicious immediately to the police, including strange cars, salesmen calling in person or on the phone, especially those asking about antiques. Chief Knoebel adds, "Everyone should take an inventory of all their valuable items." Upon request, the Kewaskum Police Department also does security checks for residents of the village.

The highlight of the Kewaskum Fire Department's recent annual appreciation banquet was the announcement of twelve year member Jim Schaub as the 1993 Firefighter of the Year.

Assistant Chief Mark Herriges shared a synopsis of Schaub's accomplishments and department contributions prior to the announcement and plaque presentation.

Since joining the department

in 1981, Schaub has served on numerous committees, attends meetings and training nights regularly, has attended many schools to improve his firefighter abilities and serves as driver on the Rescue Squad.

From 1986 to 1990, Schaub served as the Department Lieutenant. With his expertise and innovative ideas, Schaub has helped in many department major and minor projects.

According to Herriges, "Jim

has sacrificed many hours away from his family and own business to fulfill his duties as a firefighter." Schaub accepted the plaque amid a standing ovation from fellow firefighters.

The Kewaskum Fire Department and Rescue Squad serves the Village of Kewaskum and surrounding area and is completely staffed by 47 volunteer men and women. In 1993 the department responded to 33 fire calls, 201 ambulance calls and 35 Jaws of Life calls.

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# Work to Begin on New Field, Track Afternoon Football Likely This Fall

KEWASKUM - Due to safety concerns regarding the poles and lights at the Elementary School facilities, there is a possibility that the 1994 Kewaskum football team will be playing its home games in the afternoon.

District Administrator David Heather told school board members Monday that more lights fell off of the poles last Friday afternoon. Fortunately, no one was in the area, and no one suffered any injuries. Still, the concern over possible danger prompted Heather to recommend that the poles, and lights, should be removed.

"I can't determine just how long we are going to be that lucky," Heather said, noting that it was not the first time lights have fallen off of the aged poles.

Heather will make his recommendation to the district's Building and Grounds sub-committee at its meeting on May 23. If the sub-committee agrees with Heather, the issue will go before the full School Board at their June meeting. At that time, the full Board will have the final say in the matter.

If the Board agrees that the poles are a safety risk, the lights would come down as soon as possible. That would mean no night football games at home this fall for KHS.

In a related matter, the Board approved a measure to begin work on the new football facilities, which will be located just west of the high school on the current practice field. The Board approved a bid by Wondra Excavating for \$170,968, which will include regrading the field, drainage and electrical hook-ups under the field, seeding, and an eight-lane asphalt track with

other related track and field facilities.

The track will not, for the meantime, include a rubberized surface. Initially included in the plans, the 5/8 inch surface made from shredded automobile tires was put off for now because of costs. The surface, and accompanying fencing needed to protect it from bicycles, would cost approximately \$65,000 more.

Both Jerry Gosa, KHS boys track coach, and Perry Koth, KHS girls track coach, voiced their concern regarding the exclusion, although they acknowledged the financial problems with which the district is faced.

"I am very disappointed the plan won't proceed (with the rubberized surface)," Gosa said. "I realize the problems with the budget, but I would like to see this thing built right. I think it would be in the best interest of the kids and the community to do this project to the best of our

ability."

Koth agreed, adding that the current track has cracks that are as big as two inches wide. He added that the current facilities are a safety risk, and the weakest part of the KHS program.

"It just doesn't meet the standards of other schools," he said, adding that, "improving the facilities gives pride. It is money well-spent."

Gosa went so far as to say he would donate \$1,000 out of his own pocket to help finance the rubberized surface. Board member Ray Engelking said he would do the same, prompting the idea of a fund-raising effort to help pay for the surface.



## Crime Down in Village

KEWASKUM - There was good news and bad news in Kewaskum Police Chief Richard Knoebel's annual crime report presented to the Kewaskum Village Board last week.

The good news was that total crimes and arrests were down in the village last year, a statistic most communities the size of Kewaskum can't claim.

The bad news was that traffic citations and warnings increased last year. A total of 554 traffic citations were issued in 1993, compared to 476 in 1992. There were also 1,906 warnings given out, compared to 1,776 the previous year.

Those increases were made less significant by the decreases in crimes, however. Knoebel

reported that total index crimes - property crimes and violent crimes - were down more than 38 percent in 1993, from 113 in 1992 to 70 last year.

The decrease in thefts was the primary cause of the decrease. Only 59 thefts were reported in 1993, compared to 99 in 1992, a decrease of almost 41 percent.

Total arrests, both adult and juvenile, also decreased in 1993. Adult arrests were down almost 23 percent, from 272 to 210, while juvenile arrests were down nearly 29 percent, from 156 to 11.

Knoebel said that his department's enforcement and presence is a key to the decline in crime. He also noted that the village's slow growth is a factor.

increases given to administrators and teachers should be similar.

"We feel that it is essential for the Board to treat all of its employees with dignity and respect," Breese said. He added that the current negotiation process is "creating an atmosphere that is breeding disillusionment among its employees."

Board President Neal Weare said that while the figures cited by Breese were "accurate," the Board should not be held fully to blame for the situation.

Weare noted that last April the two sides had come to a tentative agreement on a contract. The KEA later voted against the deal, citing concerns about the insurance package it contained.

"I don't want the Board to be viewed as the scapegoat in this," Weare told Breese, adding that he thought the agreement was going to be ratified.

"Our reasons for that (voting it down) have been documented," Breese countered. The two then agreed that they did not want to enter into a debate regarding the issue at that time.

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

## Researchers Now Link Hypertension To Sleep-Related Breathing Problems

MADISON... Many factors may contribute to an individual's risk for high blood pressure... weight, family history, smoking habits, age, stress levels, gender. Now researchers at the University of Wisconsin Medical School have found yet another risk factor for hypertension: sleep apnea, or episodes of breathing pauses during sleep.

Reporting their findings in the March 1 *Annals of Internal Medicine*, the researchers observed that even mild sleep apnea that may have gone unnoticed caused a rise in blood pressure. They also found that the graver the sleep apnea, the greater the likelihood of developing hypertension.

Earlier studies hinted at a relationship between hypertension and sleep apnea, but they often were difficult to interpret or inconsistent, according to Dr. Khin Mae Hla, UW Medical School associate professor of medicine and preventive medicine, and Dr. Terry Young, UW Medical School associate professor of preventive medicine, who directed the Wisconsin study.

The previous studies measured blood pressure at night or once daily; did not consider the effects of weight, gender or age; or included only patients with severe sleep apnea.

Hla's study was based on blood pressures taken with a portable monitor over a 24-hour period. Subjects were participants in the Wisconsin Sleep Cohort Study, a long-range investigation of sleep-related breathing disorders in 969 state employees. As reported by Young in the *New England Journal of Medicine*, overnight monitoring of sleep cohort volunteers revealed that asymptomatic, moderate sleep apnea was much more common among healthy working adults than previously suspected. But until now, no clear link had been established between mild or

moderate sleep apnea and a significant health problem.

"Our hypertension study was unique in that blood pressures were recorded at least every half hour for 24 hours in a group of people that is representative of the general population," said Hla. "We also took into consideration other factors that can influence blood pressure, such as sex, weight, age and snoring."

Blood pressure measurements showed that volunteers with sleep apnea had consistently higher readings both while they were sleeping and awake.

As with earlier studies, the UW investigation demonstrated that people with sleep apnea who were obese, older than age 45 and male were more likely to be hypertensive. But when the researchers statistically accounted for these factors, they still found that sleep apnea played an independent role in risk for high blood pressure.

"Contrary to some earlier studies, we did not find that snoring by itself contributed significantly to high blood pressure," said Hla. "However, our data did show that among people without sleep apnea, snorers had higher blood pressure and

greater fluctuations in blood pressure than non-snorers."

The study should alert physicians that even mild or moderate sleep apnea, now recognized as more common than previously thought, can be associated with health problems, said Hla. "Primary care physicians should begin asking their patients about problems related to sleep in order to identify sleep apnea, which may be an important contributor to hypertension."

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## Spring Turkey Season Open

MADISON... Wisconsin's 1994 spring turkey season opened one-half hour before sunrise on April 13, and Department of Natural Resources wildlife managers are anticipating the season will produce another record turkey harvest.

"Assuming that the hunter success rate remains between 17 and 20 percent, which is typical for the spring season, we expect hunters will harvest between 13,000 and 14,000 turkeys," says Bill VanderZouwen, DNR wildlife ecology section chief. The spring turkey harvest last year was 12,343.

As in the past, hunters who received a permit are restricted to one of six hunting periods. The first five-day hunting period began on April 13 and the last ends May 22.

Almost 68,000 hunters applied for the 71,198 spring turkey hunting permits. "Although 11,000 applicants received second tags, there were 8,329 applicants who did not receive a permit because they either applied for a zone that was over-subscribed or restricted their period choices to the first four or five periods for which there were more applicants than permits," VanderZouwen said, adding that hunters who did not receive a permit this year will have preference for next year's permits.

Six new zones are open to turkey hunting for the first time this year. These are zones 20, 21, 24, 34, 35 and 36. The last two zones, 37 and 38, will be opened in 1995.

North-central Wisconsin will not be opened to turkey hunting because that part of the state has not proven to be suitable for turkeys. "Poor food supplies and deep snows have prevented turkeys from becoming established in this region,"

VanderZouwen said.

Turkey hunters should note that they must attach a 1994 turkey stamp to a 1994 spring turkey hunting license, even though permits state hunters are to attach the stamp to the permit. "The permits were printed assuming that licensing and stamp requirements would change, which they did not," he said.

The 1994 turkey stamp is valid for both the spring and fall seasons. Hunters must show their permit to license vendors in order to purchase a license.

VanderZouwen notes that because many turkey hunters

pursue their quarry on private lands, hunter-landowner relationships are critical to the future of turkey hunting.

"We encourage hunters to find some way to show their appreciation to landowners on whose lands they hunt. One possible way to show this appreciation is inviting landowners and their families to a Landowner Appreciation Days picnic," he said. Details of these special events sponsored by the National Wild Turkey Federation can be found on the pink envelopes that accompanied hunters' permits.

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# Village Board Meeting Minutes

Mid-Monthly Meeting  
March 21, 1994  
8:00 p.m.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Mid-Monthly Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Robert Wagner presided. All Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee Thomas McElhatton, seconded by Trustee Harry Roecker and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the March 7, 1994 meeting were approved as printed.

A public hearing on the request of Gary and Linda Gavin for the rezoning of the parcel of property located adjacent to Edgewood Road across from Braatz and North, known by tax key Nol. V4-0032, from AG-2 Agricultural Land District to R-1 Single Family Residence District. The definition and use of the land within the conservancy was discussed. A number of residents from the area were present with questions on the status of Columbus Drive to the south. It was explained that the Village Engineer and SEWRPC both recommended not installing Columbus Drive for a number of reasons gone over as follows: cost for the village, infrastructure usage, benefit, ultimate water looping for protection, and other general features. On a motion by Trustee Charles Waala, seconded by Trustee David Goeden, and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board adjourned the public hearing. Roll call vote was 6 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 0 "Absent" 1 "Abstention" (Trustee Gary Gavin). It should be noted that Trustee Gary Gavin vacated his seat during discussion and did abstain from voting.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel, February 1994 monthly report: Fire calls - 2, Year to date - 3; Jaws of Life (used) - 1, Year to date - 2 (not used -); Year to date -; Rescue calls - 9, Year to date - 29; Training 267.5, Year to date 443.5; Extra training - 36.5; Year to date - 82.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel informed the Board that a problem exists with the floor sealing, but that it was being corrected by the company doing the work. Also the Department asked to have the remaining 10% of the equipment truck chassis bill paid. It was noted that when a letter from Excellence, Inc. is received indicating they will be completing the installation of those items from Cooleys, a check could be processed.

Chief of Police Richard L. Knoebel, February 1994 monthly report: Criminal arrest - 30, Criminal investigations - 51; Traffic warnings - 78, Traffic citations - 31; Adult arrest - 26, Juvenile arrest - 21; Property stolen - \$2,172, Property recovered - \$81; Parking warnings - 9, Parking tags - 66.

On a motion by Trustee Gary Gavin, seconded by Trustee Robert Beisbier and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized the advertising for sale of the 1992 Chevrolet squad car.

Director of Public Works, Jerry Gilles informed the Board of all satisfactory results being received regarding the lead and copper round two testing. The Board was also told that the manhole repairs for Fond du Lac Avenue were being scheduled.

On a motion by Trustee Charles Waala, seconded by Trustee Thomas McElhatton and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board lifted winter parking restrictions effective immediately for the

93/94 season. It was again noted that the Village President and Village Administrator may impose a snow emergency if the weather warrants.

On a motion by Trustee Robert Beisbier, and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the placement of a cluster mail box within the greenway adjacent to the north lot line of 1710 Wildlife Drive.

Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt reviewed the following:

- 1) Dates for the Open Book and Board of Review.
- 2) Date and time for public election test.
- 3) Taxpayer and league bulletin review.

On a motion by Trustee Thomas McElhatton, seconded by Trustee Gary Gavin and carried by the majority voice vote (Trustee Robert Beisbier voting nay), the Board authorized the Administrator to proceed with the scheduling and promotion of the Spring clean-up. This would be scheduled for April 23, 1994 from 9 a.m. to noon. The cost of the clean up is estimated at \$1,200.

Chairman of the Protection and Public Safety Committee, Robert Beisbier indicated a problem exists with trailers being parked on the street for unspecified time periods creating a hazard and detracting from the appearance of the Village. The Board directed the Police Chief to check into the possibility of revising the ordinance to improve this situation.

Chairman of the Public Services Committee, Trustee David Goeden reported to the Board on the status of the recycling program indicating it is going better than anticipated as to volumes and dollars saved as well as being received in DNR funding.

Chairman of the Park and

Recreation Committee, Gary Gavin reported that the Committee held a meeting to discuss the needed improvements for the Land O Lakes ball team and indicated quotes were being requested on fencing. Also quotes are being requested in reference to the placement of a ramp on the west side of the dam. The Board was told no one has come forward to run the adult softball and a notice would be in the paper to that affect.

Board Representative for the Plan Commission, Trustee Thomas McElhatton informed the Board of a Commission meeting scheduled for March 22, 1994 at 7:00 p.m.

Board Representative for the Library Board, Trustee Charles Waala reviewed the annual library report reflecting what has happened over the last five years. The hours of operation have increased from 22 hours to 34 hours, the number of books added in 1993 were 1,886 (note the increased amount due to the library grant), total number of books owned 14,308, number of videos at 370, circulation for 1993 at 36,210 and the number of library cards held 2,003.

Board Representative for the Mid-Moraine Municipal Association, Legislative Committee, Trustee David Goeden reported that he attended a meeting where land use and county wide mapping were discussed and he reminded the Board of the Wednesday, March 23, 1994, Mid-Moraine Municipal Association meeting.

Regarding the capital improvement project of the sludge storage facility, the engineering agreement was discussed as well as the proposed financing of it. On a motion by Trustee Gary Gavin, seconded by Trustee Harry Roecker and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board directed the Administrator to proceed with working with

the State Trust Fund for the financing of the project because the interest rate is the lowest and funds are available.

The Board had requested the engineers to prepare an analysis of the sewer rates and come back to the board with suggestions. This work has been completed and distributed for the Board to review. This will be placed on a future agenda of the Board.

# Village of Kewaskum NEWS NOTES Disposing of Latex And Oil-Based Paint

### GENERAL INFORMATION

Paint stays in good condition for a long time; oil-based paint for up to 15 years and latex paint for 10 years. As a general rule, paint that mixes smoothly when stirred can still be used. If latex paint has been frozen, brush it on a newspaper. If there are no lumps, it hasn't been damaged and can be used.

Disposal of leftover paint through a household hazardous waste program is expensive.

The best thing to do with usable paint is to use it up! If you can't use your leftover paint, give it to someone who can. Give your paint to:

- \* friends and neighbors
- \* recreation departments
- \* park departments
- \* theater groups
- \* housing assistance organizations

### LATEX PAINT & MERCURY

Some latex paint contains mercury, a toxic metal. New federal regulations prohibit the use of mercury in interior latex paint manufactured after August 20, 1990. Be sure to use proper ventilation when applying paint indoors. Use outdoor paints for outdoor uses only!

### DISPOSAL: WHEN YOU CAN'T USE IT UP

Proper disposal depends on whether the paint is latex or oil-based. Oil-based paint contains solvents, container labels state "combustible," and the instructions on the can recommend cleanup with mineral or other solvents. Latex paint contains water, and the instructions recommend cleanup with water.

### DISPOSAL:

#### OIL-BASED PAINT

The fumes from oil-based paint are a health and fire hazard. Large amounts of oil-based paint should not be disposed of at home.

### DISPOSAL: LATEX AND SMALL AMOUNTS OF OIL-BASED PAINT

Dry out latex paint and small quantities of oil-based paint according to the following directions:

Step 1 - Find an outside work area away from children, pets and rain. Locked screen porches and storage sheds work well. Because oil-based paint contains solvents and some latex paint contains mercury, it's important to dry out paint outdoors in a safe place.

Step 2 - Dry it out. Choose one of the drying methods described later. Paint will take between several days and several months to dry - it depends on the type and quantity of paint that you have.

Step 3 - Throw the dried paint, cans and other materials in the trash. Leave the lids off paint cans so trash collectors will see the paint is dry and

accept them.

### PAINT DRYING TECHNIQUES

For small amounts (oil-based and latex): Remove the lid and let the paint dry in the can. Stir the paint occasionally to speed drying. Or, brush paint in layers on newspaper or cardboard.

For larger amounts of latex: Pour one-inch layers of paint into a cardboard box lined with plastic. Allow paint to dry one

layer at a time - thin layers will speed up the drying process. Or, mix paint with cat litter, sawdust or sand in a cardboard box lined with plastic and let it dry.

For latex: paint that has separated: Pour the clear liquid on top into a cardboard box lined with plastic. Mix the liquid with an equal amount of cat litter or other absorbent and let it dry. Let the leftover paint in the bottom of the can dry out, using one of the above techniques.

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
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

# New Conditioning Helping KHS Girls

KEWASKUM - The past few years, the indoor portion of the track season has taken its toll on the Kewaskum girls team.

With a smaller indoor facility than normal, KHS runners have had to cut the corners of the track harder than other teams that run on bigger indoor tracks. That can produce nagging injuries, such as shin splints and ankle problems.

So this season, KHS girls coach Perry Koth decided to hold off on running indoors during practice. Instead, Koth developed a strength and conditioning program that included weight-lifting and aerobic exercise. The results have been encouraging.

The Lady Indians shocked their coach by winning the Washington County Indoor, and then topped that performance last week by capturing the Oshkosh Invitational team title.

"The County meet, that one surprised me," Koth said of the early successes. "I really didn't think we were ready for that one."

And while he was concerned that some of the times posted by the KHS runners were slower than in the past, he was more concerned with keeping the team injury-free.

"Our number one goal was to get to the outdoor season healthy," Koth noted. "Last year, almost half of the team had shin splints after the indoor season. This year, nobody really has them."

Staying healthy will be vital this season, as Kewaskum will have to endure a very competitive outdoor schedule. The Lady Indians found out just how com-

petitive it will be at Oshkosh, when three of the top four finishers in the team race were from the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

Two Rivers was second to the Indians (40 points), while New Holstein tied for third (39).

"We will need to improve, because it looks like our conference is going to be very strong again this year," Koth said. "We're not good enough yet. We have to get better."

But he is confident that his team will work hard to get better.

"They are so confident, and have such a great attitude," Koth said of his group. "They are relaxed and have fun, but are willing to do the work that we ask them to do."

# Patron License Issuance Delay

# Mascot Issue to Be Addressed

KEWASKUM - Following a trend towards being sensitive to ethnic and minority-based team mascots, Kewaskum may be looking for a new school nickname in the coming months.

The familiar "Indian" logo may be forced out, after the district was one of 69 in the state to receive a letter from John Benson, the State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

In the letter, Benson urged school administrators to change nicknames that may offend "religious, ethnic or other protected groups." Cited most often were mascots related to Native Americans, such as "Indians," "Warriors," "Blackhawks," and "Raiders."

Kewaskum District Administrator David Heather acknowledged receiving a copy of the letter, which he made copies of and sent to School Board members. He noted that while he or the district has not received any complaints or protests regarding the current nickname, the issue is still a sticky one.

"It's going to be an emotional issue," Heather said, noting that board members would be ultimately responsible for a change. "If the Board thinks that something should be done to change it, they'll do so. They are the ones who have a pulse on what the community wants."

In his letter, Benson reminded administrators that Wisconsin Attorney General James E. Doyle previously ruled that schools' use of Indian nicknames may violate anti-discrimination laws.

Still, Heather was unsure whether the Department of Public Instruction could actually

legally force schools to change their mascots.

"That's a good question," Heather said of the legal ramifications. "It looks to me as if they (the DPI) want schools to change them on a voluntary basis (for now)."

Heather added that any change would also be put before the KHS students, who will also receive a copy of the letter. He said that the students should also have a say in whether a change should be made.

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
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## Two School Records Set KHS Girls Win 40-Team Invitational

OSHKOSH - The Kewaskum girls track team has had a history of performing well in the highly-competitive Oshkosh Invitational meet. The Lady Indians continued to uphold that tradition here, last Tuesday at UW-Oshkosh's Kolf Fieldhouse.

The Lady Indians accumulated four first places and a pair of school records, en route to winning the 40-team Invitational. KHS chalked up 47 points, outdistancing second-place Two Rivers (40).

Last year's champion, North Fond du Lac finished tied for third place with New Holstein, each with 39 points.

It was the second title for the Lady Indians this season, after winning the Washington County Indoor on March 24. It was also the second time KHS had won the Oshkosh Invite, having also done so in 1991. The Indians were second in 1992, and finished ninth last year.

"Deep down, I knew we had a chance to win," KHS coach Perry Koth said of his expectations coming into the meet. "I had a gut feeling that we could do it, but you can't expect something like that. A lot of things can happen."

A lot of things did happen, but fortunately for the Lady Indians, most of them were good. At the top of the list were the record-setting performances of Greta Kuphal and Ginger Wiesner.

Kuphal set a new school record in the 200 dash, winning the event with a fine time of 27.48. That was almost one second faster than the previous mark (28.3), set by Melissa Braun in 1991.

"That's a lot of time in the 200," Koth said of the one-second improvement. After missing most of last season with a leg injury, Kuphal's return gives Koth reason for optimism. "Just having her back is going to make a big difference. Our sprints are strong once again."

That showed Tuesday, as Kuphal doubled her pleasure with a win in the 100 dash as well. Her time of 7.64 was .01 ahead of North Fond du Lac's Julie Gierach.

Kuphal had a helping hand in another KHS victory, anchoring the winning unit in the 1600 relay. Kuphal, Wiesner, Mary Yahr and Missy Rohrer combined for a 4:24.22 clocking, just .03 ahead of runner-up New Holstein.

Wiesner's record came in the long jump, where the senior leaped 17-1. That broke the previous mark of Debbie Felix, who traveled 16-9 in the Oshkosh meet in 1988.

"Every jump she got better," Koth said of Wiesner, whose fourth jump of 16-8.5 would have been good enough for first. "She's a little healthier this year, and has been real consistent."

Wiesner added a fourth in

her specialty, the 400 dash (63.57). She also had a hand in the 800 relay's sixth-place finish. Wiesner teamed with Jenny Jagielski, Yahr, and Kelly Schreffler to run a 1:56.81, just two seconds off the school record.

"We hadn't worked a lot on that," Koth said of the 800 unit. Despite the strong showing, Koth says he will probably shuffle the 800 relay for the outdoor season.

Freshman Heather Downs accounted for the only other KHS place, as she took fifth in the 55 hurdles (9.3).

"She's shown a great deal of

potential," Koth said of Downs. "She has good quickness, and her technique is decent. With her and Mary (Yahr), our hurdles look real sound at this point."

Yahr should have scored at least a second place finish in the hurdles, but hit the first hurdles coming off the blocks. She finished with a time of 9.3.

"If you do that (hit a hurdle), there's really no chance to catch up," Koth said of Yahr's misfortune. "She was worried about the other runners, and you just can't do that."

Rohrer's 2:39.9 in the 800 was just .03 off the time needed for the finals. Katie Yogerst's 32.2.5 was just three inches short of qualifying for the finals, and Marni Lynn, who knocked 31 seconds off her previous best in the 3200 (12:41.52), finished seventh in that race.

"They were all right up there," Koth said. "We have got such a great attitude on this team, and the girls really deserve a lot of credit for their efforts."

Despite the fine showing, Koth says there is a lot of room for improvement.

"This meet shows us that we have very good potential," he said. "But we're not good enough. We have to get better."

The Lady Indians will have that chance to improve with a meet at Campbellsport this Tuesday. KHS will then host their lone home meet of the season next Tuesday, when Chilton

and Sheboygan Falls visit for a triangular.
