St. Francis Capital Corp. to Acquire Valley Bank

MILWAUKEE, May 9.... St. Francis Capital Corporation (NASDAQ:STFR), announced that it has reached a definitive agreement with Valley Bancorporation and Marshall & Ilsley Corporation to acquire the Kewaskum and Hartford offices of Valley Bancorporation.

The Company will acquire all of the stock of Valley Bank, East Central, a state banking association, which at the date of acquisition will hold only the assets and liabilities of the Kewaskum branch. In addition to the acquisition of the commercial banking charter, the Company will also acquire certain of the assets and assume certain of the liabilitis of the Hartford branch. The combined purchase price, based on the

aggregate book value of the assets to be purchased and a percentage of deposits which are to be transferred, is expected to be approximately \$8.0 million, plus an additional payment at book value for loans which are to be assumed.

The offices, with combined deposits of approximately \$80 million, are intended to be operated as a commercial bank under the bank charter to be acquired in the transaction.

It is anticipated that the acquisition will be consummated by October 1994. The transaction is subject to required state and federal regulatory approvals, as well as the satisfaction of certain other conditions.

The Kewaskum and Hartford

offices were offered for sale as part of an agreement to clear government antitrust concerns and facilitate the purchase of Valley Bancorporation by the Marshall & Ilsley Corporation.

John C. Schlosser, President and Chief Executive Officer noted that the new bank would operate as a separate subsidiary of St. Francis Capital Corporation. The Corporation is the parent of St. Francis Bank, F.S.B., a federal savings bank.

"We are delighted at this opportunity to enter the commercial banking business," Schlosser stated. "The opportunity is particularly attractive because the offices are located in rapidly growing Washington County," he added.

St. Francis Capital Corpora-

tion, with \$878 million in assets, is the holding company of St. Francis Bank, F.S.B. which is the third largest Milwaukeebased savings institution.

Founded in 1923, St. Francis Bank, F.S.B. operates 11 fullservice offices throughout Milwaukee, Waukesha and Ozaukee counties.

Town of Wayne Adult Bookstore May Reopen

A May 23rd public hearing has been set to give the Town of Wayne residents a chance to speak on the possible reopening of an adult bookstore that has been closed by court order since last October.

The owners of the bookstore, Special Souvenirs, have applied for a conditional use permit to allow them to reopen. The public hearing on the matter has been set for Monday, May 23, at 7 p.m. in the Wayne Town Hall at 6030 County Highway H.

The public hearing will give area residents a chance to express their thoughts on having an adult bookstore operating in the township. Feedback from the public will be used by the Town Board when it votes on whether to grant the conditional use permit or not.

The store was operating without a conditional use permit and an occupancy permit when Judge Leo Schlaeffer issued an injunction ordering the store closed. The store's attorney claimed the owners of the adult bookstore were exempt from town ordinances under First Amendment rights. Stan Riffel, the attorney representing the town in the matter, wants the injunction made permanent so the store cannot reopen.

Town of Wayne resident, Cam Kurer, who has spearheaded the citizens movement in opposition to the store

made it clear it was time that Wayne residents, the majority of whom signed a petition against the store, make their voices heard at the public hearing. "After all," he said, "it's a sad state of affairs when a business, or anyone else for that matter, can thumb their nose at the law and claim it's their constitutional right to do so."


An A's Victory in League Opener

President Robert Wagner presided. All Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present. It is noted that Trustees elect Robert Stoltzmann, John Borland and William Kulas were also pre-

On a motion by Trustee Robert Beisbier, seconded by Trustee Charles Waala and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the March 30, 1994 and April 4, 1994 meetings were approved as printed.

President Robert Wagner read and presented Mr. Peter Albers a PROCLAMATION on his retirement after serving 26 years with the Village. Mr. Albers thanked the Village for the opportunity to serve.

President Robert Wagner acknowledged by PROCLAMA-TION, Secretaries Week, which is April 25 to April 29, 1994.

Mr. Nicholas Quartaro and Mr. John Knepel of the accounting firm of Conley McDonald Certified Accountants Consultants, Brookfield, Wisconsin was present to review the audit for the year ending December 31, 1993, and to answer questions anyone may have regarding the Village of Kewaskum's financial status. Mr. Knepel explained the entire audit and financial statements regarding the General Fund and Utilities portion of the audit and associated financial statements. The audit revealed the Village is in a healthy financial position.

It was further noted that the General Fund ended with a positive balance. The water utility reflected a rate of return equal to 3.4% and that the Public Service Commission had authorized a 6% rate of return. The sewer utility reflected a rate of return equal to 4.0%, 2.0% less than last year. It was noted that the TIF District and Debt, if all goes as currently projected will be paid off approximately four years early. The Village's overall debt is at 39% of what the law provides.

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

WEST BEND, April 26 -The year-long reign of the
Kewaskum girls track team
came to an end here, last
Tuesday afternoon. Beware,
however, because the Lady
Indians and Coach Perry Koth
aren't exactly despondent over
the fact, and plan on starting a
new streak soon.

The Lady Indians broke a string of first-place finishes by taking fourth at the Washington County Outdoor meet. The Indians finished with 79 points. West Bend East won the girls meet with 148 points, easily beating West Bend West (108), Hartford (97), the Lady Indians, Slinger (51), Germantown (38) and Kettle Moraine Lutheran (5).

Dating back to the County Outdoor last year, the Indians had finished first in five Invitationals, not including the Concordia Invite, in which separate girls scores are not kept. A grueling schedule may have finally taken its toll, however.

"I think we were drained, both physically and mentally," Koth said of the showing. "Four meets in nine days is going to take its toll. I expected a letdown. This was the low point of the season for them."

After bettering the same teams in the County Indoor earlier this season, the Lady Indians were able to win only one individual first place at the Outdoor. That came from freshman Marni Lynn who bettered the field in the 3200 run (12:45.7).

"She's had a little bit of a hip problem," Koth said of the distance ace. "It's nothing serious, but she backed off a little in the race. She had it won pretty handily."

KHS did record four second-places, a pair of thirds, and four fourths in the meet. Senior Ginger Wiesner had one of each, and was also a part of the third-place 1600 relay (4:29.4).

Wiesner was second in the long jump with her leap of 16-7.5, and added a third in the 200 (29.0), and a fourth in the 400 (65.2).

"That (Wiesner's long jump effort) is a really good jump," Koth noted. "That would probably get her to the state meet."

Greta Kuphal also had a fine day, taking second in the 200 (28.5), and fifth in the 100 (13.8). The junior sprinter also had a hand in the 1600 relay's third. "She was just plain tired," Koth said of Kuphal.

The 800 relay unit also captured a second, finishing in 1:55.9. "That was a little surprise," Koth said of the team, made up of Julie Froemming, Erin Stockhausen, Jenny Jagielski and Kelly Schreffler.

Mary Yahr helped make up for the absence of freshman Heather Downs in the hurdle events. Yahr was barely edged at the wire in the 100's (17.6+), and finished fourth (54.1) in the 300's.

The Indians' other two relay teams, the 3200 (11:03.3) and 400 (54.6), each finished fourth in their respective races.

Koth added that "it was by design" that the Lady Indians would be tiring at this point of the season. "We wear them down and then back off a little after that," he said. "Even if they are tired, we know that they are going to give it their best effort."

He added that with the conference meet coming up next Thursday at Sheboygan Falls, he didn't want the girls to be peaking this early in the season.

"They gave it the best effort that they could," Koth said, adding that with just one meet this week (Friday at the VanderPan Invitational), the Lady Indians should be rested. "We'll be looking for some good times on Friday (at the VanderPan)."

Wiesner, Yahr, Kuphal, Lynn, Yogerst Winners Lady Indians First at Pewaukee

PEWAUKEE, April 29 - It didn't take long for the Kewaskum girls track team to get back on the winning track. In fact, it took all of about 72 hours.

The Lady Indians, after finishing fourth at the County Outdoor earlier in the week, captured first place in the Pewaukee Altheimer Invitational here, last Friday afternoon

Kewaskum rolled up 140 points on the strength of nine firsts to easily outdistance runner-up Thomas More (81). Host Pewaukee was third (58), with St. Francis and Union Grove tied for fourth, each with 36 points.

"I think we were still feeling the effects left over from the other meets," KHS coach Perry Koth said, noting some of the girls were still tired. "We did pretty well overall, though."

Despite less than stellar times and distances, the Lady Indians were able to win more than half of the meet's 17 events, including three of the four relays.

Mary Yahr led the way for the Lady Indians, winning both hurdle events. Yahr won the 100's with a time of 16.5, and then came back to win the 300's in 51.0. Yahr also had a hand, along with Jamie Gaffke, Greta Kuphal and Missy Rohrer, in winning the 1600 relay in

4:28.8.

"Mary (Yahr) is really running well at this point," Koth said. While she's new to the 300 race and doesn't have her steps
