Village of Kewaskum NEWS NOTES

The Village of Kewaskum recently had the water rates reviewed by the Public Service Commission. The rates were adjusted as well as some of the rules governing the operation of the utility. One of those rule changes is addressed in schedule B-1 which refers to the Bulk Sale of Water. This provision allows the Village to sell bulk water and to fill swimming pools and establishes the appropriate charges.

The utility personnel shall supervise the delivery of water and the customer shall be charged as follows:

Service charge -- \$12.00
Plus volume charge -- \$2.00 per 1,000 gallons
If a pool is filled the contemporary method the customer pays
\$1.03 or \$.81 per 1,000 gallons for the water and \$1.718 per 1,000
gallons for sewage.

Example: To fill a 15,000 gallon swimming pool using the new method the cost would equal:

\$12.00 plus \$2.00 times 15 equalling \$30.00 for a TOTAL of \$42.00.

To fill a 15,000 gallon swimming pool using the contemporary method the cost would equal: \$1.03 times 15 equalling \$15.43 plus \$1.718 times 15 equalling \$25.77 for a TOTAL of \$41.22.





'Rock 'N' Read' at the **Library This Summer**



The Kewaskum Public Library will again sponsor its annual Summer Library Pro-

This year's theme is "ROCK'N' READ." It will be a celebration of music of all kinds, and the library will offer a variety of special activities. Summer library programs help children keep up their reading skills and stimulate their interest in the excellent books and other materials at the Public Library.

Research carried out by the U.S. Department of Education shows that the more reading students do outside of school, the higher their reading achievement levels are. Support at home for reading also has a very positive impact on their achievement. The Summer Library Program is sponsored each year by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, Division for Library Services.

Registration for "Rock 'N' Read" will begin on Monday, June 6, and continue through Friday, June 17, for children ages two and older. Children should have a valid library card, and any fines should be cleared BEFORE registering. Children will receive a reading folder in which they will keep track of the time they spend reading. Younger children can keep track of the time someone reads to them. Children may begin keeping track of their reading as soon as they register and receive a folder.

Small prizes will be awarded after reading specified lengths of time, and prizes may be collected throughout the summer BEGINNING JUNE 20, when the program officially starts. Parents will need to sign the folder before presenting it at the library for prizes.

Children are encouraged to read as much as they want, and receive as many prizes as they wish to earn. Books read should be from the Kewaskum Public Library, and should reflect the child's individual reading level. Since the library will measure TIME spent reading, the number of books read does not matter. You don't even have to keep track of titles and authors! All reading folders must be presented no later than July 29 in order to receive prizes.

There will be stories about making music of many kinds among the tales told at weekly storytimes on Friday mornings from 10 to 10:45. Although these storytimes will be geared to the younger (pre-school) children, ALL AGES are welcome to attend. Children should be registered as a "ROCK 'N' READ" participant, but do not need to sign up for storytimes...

just come!

Crafts, stories, and other activities will be shared in weekly library hours with children who have completed kindergarten, first or second grade. Younger children will NOT be admitted. These sessions will be held on Wednesdays afternoons from 1 to 1:45 for registered "ROCK 'N' READ" participants... no need to sign up... just come!

For those who have completed third, fourth or fifth grade there will be sessions on Wednesday afternoons from 2 to 2:45 for registered "ROCK 'N' READ" participants... no need to sign up, just come! There will be a variety of crafts, games, and other activities geared to this older age group. Younger children will NOT be admitted.

Three special entertainment programs will be held (for ALL AGES). On June 20 there will be a visit from Ms. Frizzle and the Magic School Bus at 11 a.m. at the library. There will be stories and treats for all!

Plan to also attend a special performance by Reid Miller on July 13 at 6 p.m. in the Community Room. Enjoy music, song and humor with plenty of audience participation.



Memoirs of a Korean U.S. Air Force Veteran

During one very special 36 hour period during a combat tour of duty as a B-29 crewman in 1952 during the Korean War flight engineer Wally Daggett, now of Kewaskum, recalls the happenings for posterity.

Recently, during the winter of 1994, the world famous Ted Williams of baseball fame was honored by being named to the National Hall of Fame to join such greats as Babe Ruth, etc.

In the 36 hour period mentioned above I had the great honor of meeting then-Captain Ted Williams, U.S. Marine Corp Panther Jet Fighter Pilot, but... I am getting ahead of my story

This particular late night mission was scheduled for takeoff at midnight. By this mission we were veterans having more than 15 missions under our belts. This particular mission was one of maximum effort. It meant that both bomb bays would be fully lloaded and would involve three squadrons of B-29s. Our point of destruction was the hydro-electric power plant dams on the Yalu River. To make our bombing run we were forced to fly over so-called neutral territory Manchuria.

We knew if we were shot down or became lost over Manchuria, our government would lay no claim to us. In other words we were written off, as we were not supposed to be in Manchuria. We had no choice. We were a lead crew and as the flight engineer, the operation of the plane was entirely in my hands.

Over the target I lost number four engine because of flak. We dropped our bombs and after leaving the target area, number three engine on the same side of the plane started acting up. We nursed number three along at half power. We were in deep trouble and a decision had to be made as to whether we bail out over South Korea or attempt to land our B-29 at a fighter strip near the 38th Parallel. We opted to land our plane if possible.

There were no air strips for bombers in Korea. Opting to land on a fighter strip would pose a serious hazard for us as a fighter strip is much, much shorter in length and the strip isn't built as strong because fighters are much lighter in weight. This fighter air strip was built on a plateau surrounded by very rough terrain and at the end of the runway was quite a drop-off.

It was a difficult landing. The sun was coming up and we had made it. We all survived to fly again but the same could not be said for our plane. The B-29 never left the fighter strip and was scrapped out not far from where we set her down.

As the crew and myself were thanking our Heavenly Father for a safe landing, a Mayday came over the VHF (very high frequency) radio. A Marine panther jet fighter pilot could not get his landing gear down nor could he get his

canopy to jetson (fly off) so he could bail out.

The runway we had just landed on a few moments earlier was foamed in preparation for a gear up landing to enable the jet to slide to a stop on the runway without hopefully causing too much damage to it. It is also helpful in the event of a fire. The pilot was advised to land gear up.

As the jet hit the air strip, the canopy released. This may have occurred due to impact. As the panther jet skidded to a stop to the side of the runway not far from our B-29, a long, langy pilot jumped out and ran so fast his nose looked from where we stood to be only several inches from the ground, but the adrenalin enabled him to keep his balance until he reached a safe distance in the event his panther jet exploded.

It did not explode, as the ground crew immediately extinguished any sparks and it stopped smoking.

The panther jet fighter pilot was none other than the already famous ball player Ted Williams. Captain Williams was what we call a retread. In other words, he was a reservist called back to active duty. I dare say, even Ted Williams never ran as fast as he did that day from his jet.

During debriefing, I overheard him say, "I just got started on this tour of duty, and at this rate I'll never finish it." I believe he was returned stateside after forty missions. At this chance meeting Ted Williams was about 34 years old, which is pretty old for a jet pilot.


He, as members of my crew, were active reservists who answered the call to serve their Country without a moment's hesitation or complaint. Each of us was unique and presented a cross-section of the United States.

Here was Ted Williams, a famous baseball player, my aircraft commander was a commercial airline pilot, the co-pilot an electrical power plant operator from Seattle, Washington, the navigator, a rural mail carrier from Kansas, the radar operator had just graduated from college with a C.P.A. who had flown tours in Europe and the Pacific during World War II, the bombadier was a cotton and wheat farmer from Tennessee, two gunners were cowboys from Montana, the tail gunner and the central fire control gunner were from the Eastern part of the United States and then there was me from Washington County, Village of Jackson, in the State of Wisconsin. I believe the radio operator was from Missouri.

After debriefing, I headed to the mess hall, as I was hungry. To my total surprise, a West Bend High School classmate and football player buddy of mine was walking towards me and gave me a bear hug... all 240 pounds, 6'2" Bob Gonring.

Bob was assigned as a maintenance supply sergeant at this fighter air base located near Seoul, and the 38th parallel. We were allowed to have a shot of "Old Stag" after each mission, but Bob had something far better he shared with me instead, and we talked whenever the opportunity presented itself, and that evening.

That night our crew slept near the main air strip in tents on the ground with folding cots. The main airfield was guarded heavily but we were situated

along the perimeter with minimal security. All my flying gear including a parachute and my 45 handgun, shoulder holster and ammo was all stowed under my cot.

The next morning a two engine cooney bird (C-47) was to fly us back to our base at Yokata Air Base, Fusa, Japan. When I awoke my 45 and ammo was missing. I reported it missing before leaving K13 or K15 (I can't remember which) for Japan. All fighter strips were Ks with a number.

I was told that more than likely it was a North Korean posing as a South Korean. Civilians often begged for food and odd jobs at this forward air strip. Lucky for me, and probably because I was so tired that when my head hit that cot, I was out, or I might have been stabbed, which had happened on other occasions to G.I's there.

When our crew returned to Japan I reported that my 45 handgun, holster, and ammo had been stolen. The supply sergeant told me I had to pay for it before another one would be issued. At an inspection prior to another mission we were about to fly, my squadron commander questioned where my gun was. I told him if I was expected to pay for one, I would go without it.

I flew that mission without a gun. While on our mission, the

squadron commander went to see the wing commander who in turn ordered the supply sergeant to outfit me with another 45 handgun, shoulder holster and ammo at no charge to me.

Upon my return to base I was ordered to again see the supply sergeant and that I would get what I needed. The wing commander was very irate with this incident when something was lost in combat. Needless to say, from that point on no combat flight crews of the 344th Bomb Squadron, the 98th Bomb Wing, had anymore problems with supply.

About two weeks later, a flight from Korea returned my gear to me. I was informed that when the MPs (Military Police) were searching through clothing of some Koreans, my gear was recovered. I returned that gear back to supply.

After I finished my combat duty tour, I never again saw members of my crew from the 98th Bomb Wing. The same can be said for Ted Williams and my high school buddy Bob Gonring.

I remained in the Air Force for another two years flying KC-97 tankers anywhere in the world as a flight engineer fueling fighter planes in midair. After leaving the military on active duty, I spent many years

as a reservist ready to answer the call, like so many before me, if my Country needed me without hesitation or complaint.

It does anger me when I hear the Korean War referred to as "The Forgotten War" when 54,246 American men and women gave their lives in three years (July, 1950 - July, 1953), whereas about 58,000 American men and women gave their lives during the years 1965 to 1975 in the Vietnam War.

When we first entered the Korean War, Allied bombers and fighter planes supported Allied troops, killed enemy troops and damaged Communist bases. General MacArthur wanted to bomb bases in Manchuria and use other "all-out measures."

President Truman and his military advisors in Washington believed such actions might lead to a third World War, so on April 11, 1951, President Truman removed General MacArthur from command. MacArthur believed there was no substitute for total victory. Will history in the long run bear him right?

Russia supplied North Korea with MIG-15 jets. Russia did more than supply them with jets --- Russian pilots flew them along with Chinese pilots. VHF radios during MIG fighter attacks in MIG Alley picked up their voices.

In November of 1950 China sent a huge force against the Allies. Now, in 1994, the "Forgotten War" comes back to haunt us. Same players but now with an added menace --- North Korea's nuclear capability. Just as we were fighting Chinese during the Korean War, we will be fighting Chinese again, because they have control over North Korea, as much today as during the Korean War. History will prove who was right, but I hadn't anticipated it so soon.

FOOTNOTE: I have the original snapshots of Ted Williams' panther jet after it landed at a Forward Air Strip in South Korea. Could someone please forward his address so I could send them to him?


Barbara Mileager, Brazelton Drive, has been hired to fill the vacant position of recycling attendant. She was the only applicant.

Backtrolling Not Allowed

With the fishing season barely three weeks old, there is one major rule change that I thought I would bring to your attention.

Backtrolling is no longer allowed. A few years ago the law was changed to allow for back trolling. This caused some trouble in Northern Wisconsin with the fishing of muskellunge and fishermen pushed to have the law changed back to how it was. Position fishing now replaces backtrolling.

Position fishing means the style of fishing where the fishing line is maintained vertically into the water while the boat is maneuvered using a motor. Position fishing is allowed statewide. Forward and backtrolling are still allowed on waters identified as, motor trolling permitted, in the 1994 fishing regulations.

How is position fishing different from trolling? Under the new rule, you may not play out and trail lines from the boat while moving across the lake in a consistent and uninterrupted fashion. Use downriggers or planer boards to trail live baits or artificial lures while operating electric or outboard motors. Trail a minnow behind the boat while casting an artificial lure with the uninterrupted use of a motor, gas or electric.

One other change of local interest is, electric motors are now allowed on Mauthe Lake, Lake Seven, and Butler Lake. In the past no motors of any kind were allowed on these lakes. You can also use a boat that has a gas powered motor attached to it as long as you do not use the gas motor and use only the elec-






