



Town of Wayne Officials Face a Difficult Decision

Town of Wayne Plan Commission members are facing probably the most difficult decision of their political careers. It will be their recommendation they make to the Town Board whether or not to is sue a conditional use permit to an adult oriented establishment.

It will be a decision that will weigh heavily upon each of them as a decision to issue the permit will be very unpopular Stan Riffel, the attorney representing the town in this matter.

A public hearing was held at the town hall on Monday, May 23rd to allow both the applicant, Special Souvenirs, Inc. and the public to present information that would aid the Plan Commission in making a recommendation to the town board regarding whether or not and under what conditions a conditional use grant might be issued to Special Souvenirs. The Plan Commission will use infor-

ing process.

The store manager, Mark Phillips, and Jeff Olson, a civil rights attorney from Madison, were present requesting the permit primarily for the retail sale of goods and services for entertainment purposes specifically for the sale and rental of adult oriented video tapes, magazines, books and novelty gift items.

The store opened in the summer of 1993 without securing proper permits and was forced to close by court order last fall. To date, this lengthy legal process has cost Town of Wayne taxpayers approximately \$17,000; some of which could possibly be recovered this fall (Continued on Page 3)

New Policeman Hired to Replace Resigning Officer Village OK's Duplex Rezoning Request

Developer Gary Gavin of Kewaskum appeared before the Village Board at their last meeting to request the rezoning of two lots, No. 13 and 14, in the Sunset Estates subdivision for duplex housing.

Gavin stated the people interested in purchasing the two lots have plans on paper to construct a side-by-side unit on each lot.

When asked about how the Plan Commission voted at its last meeting, former Trustee Tom McElhatton reported they agreed to recommend the rezoning request to the Village Board. Trustee Dave Goeden, read-

ing from the Plan Commission's recommendation, stated, "Members of the Commission also noted that it has been ten years since housing of this type has been built in the village and the need for it."

The Board opened the discussion on the rezoning request and the only landowner/private citizen in attendance at the meeting, Realtor Robert Kirst, stated: "Being in business, I get a lot of calls looking for duplex lots in town. There aren't any. I've been getting calls for years for duplex lots. I think we should look at that problem.... and somehow encourage developers to get duplex lots. There's just a need for it. We're doing a survey down in West Bend on multi-family housing and alot of older people are looking for duplexes. Farmers, in particular, that come from Campbellsport and Kewaskum, are going down there. They like the duplex."

Gavin added the developers are reputable builders from West Bend.

after a trial to determine fines and forfeitures for Special Souvenir's opening without proper permits.

Of the nearly 50 residents in attendance, several township residents spoke out against issuing the permit sighting several areas of concern with the primary concern directed as area children.

Resident Orville Kern stated, "The children deserve a wholesome environment in which to be raised." Cam Kurer shared, "This establishment is based on a bunch of lies, lies that it doesn't hurt our community. It does and it hurts it drastically! We want our children protected from this."

Other areas of concern were health issues, area road litter increase, traffic concerns, road maintenance, increased police protection and sheriff patrols, possible crime increase and morality deterioration.

Washington County Sheriff and town resident Robert Schulteis explained that other counties within the state see an increase of activity within miles of where these types of stores are located.

Attorney Olson explained Special Souvenirs is willing to work with town officials, neighbors and law enforcement authorities to minimize any inconvenience or discomfort that the presence of this business might cause.

Mr. Phillips and his employees want only the right to run their business they believe is protected by the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution subject to reasonable regulation by the town and other government bodies.

A resident responded, "Our forefathers had nothing like this in mind when they provided freedom of speech and press. They would be shocked by this."

Olson stated in his eighteen years as a civil rights attorney, there is not enough scientific evidence that would cause a link between viewing of explicit sexual materials and sexual crimes. Olson further stated that one just is not realistic to think that they can completely avoid exposure to any sexually explicit material these days, particularly with the way media is.

Town residents were not convinced. "If you think we are a bunch of country bumpkins, who don't have anything to say or have any opinion or know much about the law, you're sadly mistaken!" "You're not wanted in our neighborhood!" Pastor Dennis Strong of Zion Lutheran Church stated the "Town of Wayne is a Christian community that needs to stand by Christian principles. The Lord will prevail."

When asked if anyone wanted to speak in favor of the business, the question was met with laughter.

Plan Commission members will meet again at the town hall on June 15th, prior to the Town Board meeting to determine what recommendation they will make to the Board.

If the recommendation is made in favor of Special Souvenirs, the Board will have the capability to set some limitations and conditions covering many of the concerns raised. In addition, the town licensing ordinance recently adopted has provisions that would apply to this type of business.




Monthly reports were given by Assistant Fire Chief Mark Herriges and Police Chief Richard Knoebel.



For the past seven years, Bill and Valera McDonald have been directing their efforts into fashioning McDonald's Tavern after the famous Cottage Inn they once owned in Minocqua.

McDonald built the Inn himself, which could serve 300 people, and the rustic restaurant made quite a name for itself throughout the area.

In July, 1987, the couple sold the Cottage Inn and moved to Kewaskum, where they established McDonald's Tavern, at 215 Main Street. But the name is misleading as the business serves a complete menu for family dining, including a Friday night fish fry.

The atmosphere is reminiscent of the kind of country dining you'd find traveling the backroads of Wisconsin; lots of knotty pine wood paneling and a beautiful handcrafted bar custom built by Bill. There's room to seat 32 with the addition the couple recently finished.

For the past three summers, an enclosed porch was added, and they decided to turn it into an extra dining area. The porch includes a fireplace, two tables, an entire wall of windows and a ken, sold by the bucket.

Mixing drinks is an art form to Bill, who says everyone should try his two most-requested drinks, old-fashions and Bloody Marys. The steps in making them are essential, especially the measuring. "I make them like you make a cake," he adds.

A topic "Mac" loves to talk about is his selection of antique replica iron toys that are displayed behind the bar. Horse drawn wagons and firetrucks are among some of the pieces, all brightly painted. The collectible toys are also for sale to the public.

McDonalds is open for lunch and dinner on Friday, Saturday and Sunday from 11 a.m., and Wednesday and Thursday from 5 p.m. They are closed off Mondays and Tuesdays.



The need for storage and drying led to the invention of a solar collector attached to a semi-trailer. Stoffel had read up on the idea, and custom built the new drying "kiln" to fit his needs.

The semi-trailer is 48 feet long by eight feet wide, with





The Village Board would like to remind the residents of the Village of two (2) topics covered in the Villages Municipal Code. The first topic is covered in Chapter 10, Public Nuisances, we shall refer to this problem as a health hazard. The Village has undertaken several steps to improve the clearwater (storm water) discharge in the entire community, but yet people are not cooperating. We find that people cut their grass and catch it, just to dump it in a designated clearwater collection point to help plug up and eventually cause water to back up during certain times of the year. The Village would ask that all residents keep their grass clipping and leaves away from the catch basins in the curb area. Also to refrain from dumping their grass clippings and leaves in ditched areas.

The second topic, would be covered under Chapter 12, Licenses and Permits, specifically under dogs, cats and domestic pets. All residents are to have their dogs and cats licensed when they are five (5) months or older. These animals are not to run at large, pursue vehicles, assault or attack any person or persons, cause annoyance of any person or persons, kill, wound or worry any domestic animal and be infected with rabies. This means dogs and cats are to be vaccinated yearly for rabies, also dogs and cats are not allowed to litter on any public or private property. Thank you.







Jacak, Jackson Win EW Titles

SHEBOYGAN FALLS, May 12 -While he didn't expect his team to be a contender for the Eastern Wisconsin Conference overall title, Kewaskum boys track coach Jerry Gosa knew that several of his troops could possibly bring home individual victories.

And that is exactly what happened here. Both Travis Jacak and Brad Jackson won their respective specialties, pacing the Indians to a fifth-place showing in the annual conference showdown.

Two Rivers used its depth to win the conference crown, amassing 148 points. New Holstein was second (131), followed by Sheboygan Falls (106), Chilton (87), Kewaskum (61), Plymouth (58), and Kiel (56).

"I thought it was a very good effort on our part," said Gosa, whose team has been depleted during the course of the year. "It turned out to be a fairly nice night."

It was especially nice for Jacak, who won his third straight EW title in the high jump. This time he outlasted Two Rivers' Reggie Rasmus in a jump-off, clearing the 6-3 to win.

"They both missed at 6-4, and Travis made 6-3," Gosa pointed out, noting that Rasmus recently transferred to Two Rivers, and is only a freshman. "Travis really didn't have an especially good jumping day." -

Jackson, on the other hand, had his best. The senior veteran set a new KHS outdoor record , by clearing 13-6 in winning the pole vault. Jackson broke the previous mark that he set last year (13-5).

"The last couple of weeks

he has really been coming on," Gosa said. "He's getting his confidence back, and is now jumping like the way he's capable of."

Gosa said that Jackson has been working with Rick Robinsin, who has donated a lot of time with the pole vaulters the past few seasons. Robinson's son, Jim, was a star pole vaulter at West Bend West, and the elder Robinson has lent his expertise in the event to Jackson's benefit.

"He's really done a great job with Brad," Gosa said of Robinson. "He's done a lot of extra work, and it's really paid off."

The Indians also added several third-place finishes. Matt Tonn turned in his best 400 clocking (52.97) for a third, while Wade Kreis (20-3 in the long jump) and the 1600 relay team (3:38.1) also earned medals by finishing third.

"They really ran well," Gosa said of the 1600 unit, made up of Andy Rix, Tonn, Jackson, and Aaron Kurth. "That's about the best they've done all season."

One disappointment for Gosa was that the 3200 relay, made up of Andy Rix, Tony Rix, Randy Thull and David Gosa, was unable to crack the top three. The unit had to settle for fourth (8:46.6), despite knocking nearly ten seconds off their previous best time.

We put all our eggs into one basket with that," Gosa said, referring to the fact that the effort probably cost KHS in other events, because of fatigue. "That race took a lot of energy for those guys. That's where our lack of depth really hurts us."

Kreis added a fourth in the pole vault (11-6), accounting for the lone double-place by the

Indians.

Andy Mathias took fourth in the shot put (43-7), and had a personal best in the discus (122-0). Others recording personal bests during the meet were Peter Reis in the 300 hurdles (44.9), and Damien Doherty in the 3200 (11:02).

Gosa will now get his troops ready for this Thursday's EW Relays at Two Rivers. The meet will serve as a tuneup for next Monday's WIAA Regional at New Holstein.

"We really don't have the depth to do much at the (EW) relays," Gosa noted. As for the Regionals, "it's going to be tough. I know Two Rivers is there, so we'll have our work cut out for us," trying to advance individuals to Sectional, which will be in Elkhorn.


