# Restaurants **To Open Here**

The community has, with patient anticipation, been awaiting the opening of the new Subway of Kewaskum, and their waiting ended when it opened it's doors for business Wednesday, July 6th.

Located at 919 Fond du Lac Ave., in the Kewaskum Mall, the Subway franchise offers a variety of cold and hot subs in six inch and foot long sizes, as well as a 4" round sandwich.

Owners Richard Kapinos of Boltonville and Tom Steffek of West Bend think the Kewaskum location and the popularity of Subway sandwiches makes for a successful endeavor.

Summer hours are weekdays 9 a.m. to 10 p.m., Friday and Saturday 9 to 11, and Sundays 9 to 10.

Another plus for the vil-

lage's appetite is the opening of the Hamburger Haus II (formerly A &W) on July 11th.

With a 72 person seating capacity, the restaurant will offer basically the same menu as their Hamburger Haus located in Dundee. Soft serve cones, ice cream specialties and burgers on a hard roll are just a few items.

The business is being leased by Don Piper, and will be managed by one of his employees from the Dundee location, Nancy Cribbs. Cribbs has been with the business eight years.

Future plans include the addition of breakfast in the fall, and a Friday Fish Fry. "We're taking things step by step for now," says Don.

The restaurant will be opening seven days a week, and will feature the drive-thru, as well as summer car-hops.

Gary knew what was wrong. Lying at the bottom of the cliff he'd just stepped off of, he was numb ... without pain. Gary had broken his neck, and spent the next nine hours trying desperately not to move, yelling for help.

Flight For Life transported him to UW-Madison Hospital where he spent three weeks and was then moved to Sacred Heart Rehabilitation Center in Milwaukee where he will probably remain until August.

Confined to a wheelchair,





### **Physicians and Employers Losing Confidence** In Clinton Health Care Reform Plan

Madison, WI -- Support among physicians and employers for key components of President Clinton's health care reform plan has declined dramatically over the past year, according to the second annual Health Care Reform survey just released by Meridian Resource Corporation of Madison.

The most significant finding of the Meridian survey is the change in attitudes toward the concept of health care purchasing alliances," according to Roger Formisano, president of Meridian Resource Corporation, a health care and employee benefits consulting firm.

In Meridian's 1992 survey, 93 percent of the physicians and 78 percent of the employers supported "local health insurance pools." This year, only 54 percent of the physicians and 57 percent of the employers supported "health alliances" -- a 39 percent and 21 percent decline, respectively.

"One finding that hasn't changed is the fact that while everyone wants health care reform to at least some extent, physicians and employers want the responsibility for reform to be placed on someone else," Formisano noted.

As in the 1992 survey, Meridian found that in 1993, physicians and employers oppose changes that would have direct impact on them. The respondents believe that changes in the health care system should be directed at insurance companies and Medicare .

The survey found disagreement about the role of employers in providing a standard benefit package to their workers. More than half of the physicians surveyed think employers should provide basic benefits. Only one-third of the employers surveyed supported employer mandates.

According to Formisano, there has been a dramatic decline in support for the President's basic benefits package. In just one year, support among physicians has fallen from 73 percent to 56 percent. Among employers, support for President Clinton's benefit package has also declined significantly, from 67 percent in 1992 to 57 percent in Meridian's 1993 survey. Employers targeted dental, vision, mental health, and substance abuse benefits for elimination from the basic package.

Consensus on many key issues

Several areas of agreement did emerge from the two surveys. Employers and physicians both hold strongly to the view that they would pay more for health insurance under the Clinton plan, 84 percent and 73 percent, respectively. The two groups oppose proposed changes to IRS regulations and tax laws, and both groups favored use of community ratings, elimination of pre-existing condition clauses, and expanded Medicare benefits to include prescription drugs. Opposition

to government limits on total health care expenditures for health care services is strong among both groups, and opposition has actually grown by approximately 10 percent since 1992.

#### **Physicians survey results**

Ninety-six percent of the physicians who responded to Meridian's survey favored malpractice reform that includes a cap on economic damages. Fewer than 40 percent supported development of programs to expand the role of nurses as providers of primary health care services. Incremental rather than immediate, comprehensive reform is preferable to 70 percent of the physicians.

Only half of the physicians responding believed that universal coverages is the key to resolving the nation's health care problems. Meridian received an unsolicited comment of "Eliminate the entire plan of government involvement/control" from 12 percent of the physician respondents. Employer survey results

In a set of questions directed only to employers, Meridian **Resource Corporation found** that the group had reversed their top two preferred health insurance plans:

Traditional indemnity 1992 - 39%, 1993 - 28%; PPO 26% -1992, 34% - 1993; HMO 24% -22%; Point of service '93 - 14%; Other '93 - 2%.

One of the surprises in the

survey was that 89 percent of the employers oppose changing Section 125 of the IRS code which allows a tax break to employers and employees when healthcare expenses are paid with pre-tax dollars -- of the opposing group, fewer than half currently offer Section 125 benefits. It was not surprising that 71 percent of the employers disagreed with capping the tax deductibility.

Employers oppose mandatory health benefits but are willing to accept some responsibility: 40 percent agreed that they should be responsible for contributing to the cost of dependent's health care insurance, up 10 percent from 1992.

**Other findings of interest** 

\*54 percent of respondents felt it likely that significant changes in compensation and/or company size would occur under employer mandates.

\*73 percent disagreed with the plan for the federal government to pay for early retiree health benefits.

#### **Survey parameters**

"This health care reform survey gives us a clearer picture of areas of least and most resistance to different aspects of reform" Formisano said. "The more we know, the better we can counsel our clients as they prepare for reform."


