# **Raises Approved for School Administrators**

KEWASKUM - The Kewaskum Board of Education gave its final approval for salary increases to be given to district administrators at its monthly meeting Monday night.

The Board approved an average 3.84% pay hike in salary and fringe benefits for its 11-person administrative team.

Salary increases are limited to 2.1% of the previous year's salary, as mandated by legislation passed last August. Fringe benefits allow the total packages to increase to the 3.84% total.

The increases range from a 4.62% increase for KHS assistant principal David Dillman (from \$46,225 to \$48,361) to a 2.25% increase for Superintendent David Heather (from \$66,621 to \$68,121). Dillman will receive a raise of \$2,136 while four other administrators will earn raises of \$1,500.

Two other administrators, Kewaskum Middle School principal Katherine Crowley

(\$55,500) and Farmington/Wayne Elementary principal Kevin Steinhilber (\$52,000) will begin their first year with the district, replacing the retiring David Jones and Tom Larsen.

In another matter, the Board also approved the appointment of Jim Westphal as the KHS Athletic Director. Westphal replaces David Rizzardi, who resigned the post after taking the school's head girls basketball coaching job. Rizzardi, who also coaches the girls volleyball team, gave up the AD post because he felt it would be too much of a burden with the added coaching duty.

Westphal has employed by the district as a teacher and coach for the past 25 years. He teaches in the English department, and currently serves as the school's head boys basketball coach.

In taking the AD position, Westphal's teaching load will decrease from five periods per day to four.

# School Board Will Present Four Separate Resolutions

KEWASKUM - The Kewaskum Board of Education continued in its quest to present the district with options for a building and expansion project at the Kewaskum High and Middle Schools.

The Board voted to give the public four options on which to choose from, with no one option binding on the others. The referendum is scheduled for some time in September.

The action is in response to voters turning down two previous resolutions for multi-million dollar packages to renovate the two schools, and also add an auditorium to the high school.

Informal questioning of voters indicated that the public did not approve spending the \$2.2 million needed for the auditorium. Many in the community thought that the 750-seat item was a luxury and not a necessity.

In response, the Board will give four separate resolutions on which to vote, ranging in price from \$5.4 million to \$80,000.

The first resolution will be the same \$5,450,000 question posed to voters in April. The package, which includes all of the renovations and additions with the exception of the auditorium, was turned down by voters by a slim margin.

The second resolution is for \$200,000, which will be used to complete the football field and track complex located just to the west of the high school. The amount will include money for a rubberized track surface, bleachers, fencing, and a press box.

The third resolution is for \$80,000 and would be for installing lights at the football field and track complex.

The fourth and final resolution is in the amount of \$2,275,000 and would be for the auditorium to be included in the renovation and expansion pack-

If the voters in the district passed all four resolutions, the total amount that the district could spend on the projects, would be \$8,005,000.

The Board also decided not to push a resolution concerning allocating money for new roofing at the two schools before the voters at this time.



For some people a trip to Australia and New Zealand is a dream realized in their retirement years. For others it remains a fragment of one's imagination but for two Kewaskum youths an incredible 20 day South Pacific adventure was realized this summer.

On June 10th, following several months of preparation and orientation meetings, Tim Breitag and Luke Martin, both of Kewaskum, along with 14 other junior high students from the Washington/Ozaukee county area boarded American Airlines

Tim is the son of Barb and Bob Breitag and will be a freshman at Kewaskum High School in fall. Luke will be an eighth grade student at Holy Trinity and is the son of Louise and Larry Martin.

Luke and Tim were student ambassador representatives for the People to People Youth Science Exchange program. They were selected on the basis of academic achievement, letters of recommendation and personal interviews with a screening committee. People to People International is a private, nonprofit, nonpolitical organization which encourages communications among citizens worldwide.

Upon their arrival at Los Angeles International Airport, the Wisconsin representatives were joined by 17 junior high student ambassadors from Galveston, Texas, which resulted in an interesting north/south mixture. Yes sir, no ma'am, ya' all and Yankees were common words our Wisconsin students became accustomed to hearing, all in fun, from their Texas

Before they would return home, the students would tally 16,180 air miles, approximately 52 hours in flight time, almost 15 hours in airport layover time and would bring back memories of unforgettable sights and experiences.

The Southern Hemisphere is now in their winter season very much different from our Wisconsin winters. Daily temperatures in New Zealand and

Sydney were in the high 50's to low 60's with night temperatures just a bit cooler. While in Cairns in northern Australia, the students enjoyed more summerlike conditions with temperatures in the 80's which was cool according to the residents. In Cairns the students were advised to use sunscreen and to apply it frequently because of the intense sun.

The grass and trees were green. New Zealand was hilly and Australia more flat. Cars driven on the left side of the road included Mitsubishi, Rolls Royce, Mercedes, Fords, GM and Holden.

The people encountered in both countries were very polite and accommodating. The housing was similar to our homes in the states. Water in sinks drained and toilets flushed in the opposite direction as ours.

Accommodations for the students were at the Hyatt Hotels, local resorts and lodges. In addition, while in New Zealand, the students experienced an overnight homestay enjoying the hospitality and activities planned by host families. Tim and Luke stayed with families who raised hundreds of sheep and beef cattle on their

anches.

For Tim and Luke, their favorite activity was snorkeling in the Great Barrier Reef. Other activities included horseback riding in the bush, sea kayaking, absailing, fishing, boomerang throwing, riding on a luge, shopping, sea cruises, visits to mountains, beaches, zoos, the Sydney Opera House, wildlife parks, aquariums and harbors. The students also had the opportunity to learn about the history, customs and culture of both countries.

What a terrific learning experience this was for the students and their families. Luke and Tim returned very tired and with a new appreciation for mom's cooking! It was indeed an experience of a lifetime. G'day mate!










# New Storage Tank for **Wastewater Treatment Plant**





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

# **BABES** Recognized as **Program of the Year**

The Wisconsin Association on Alcohol and Other Drug abuse (WAAODA) awarded BABES-Wisconsin with the Program of the Year award. This award, given annually to an exemplary alcohol and drug abuse prevention program in the state, was presented at the WAAODA Conference held in Oshkosh on May 3, 1994.

BABES (Beginning Alcohol and Addictions Basic Education Studies) is a primary alcohol and drug abuse prevention program designed to assist children ages three through eight in developing necessary life skills which will allow them to live healthy, happy lives.

Accepting the award on behalf of BABES-Wisconsin were Carol Brenner, Milwaukee Council on Alcoholism; Mary Meinzer, Racine Council; and Mary Ison-Kocos, Council on AODA of Washington County.

More than 600 individuals have been trained as BABES presenters in Wisconsin. These individuals include teachers, counselors, and other interested adults. The presenters have taken the core of the curriculum, which consists of seven puppets and seven stories, and incorporated it into many of their daily activities with the children.

In Wisconsin the program has been uniquely expanded to include the Big BABES component which enhances parents' abilities to be primary role modes, BABES Clubs for the

children who have graduated from the program; a combination of the teachings of other successful prevention program, and the BABES curriculum to reinforce the prevention message; and, performances where the puppets "come alive" for the children through the use of human-sized costumes.

BABES was developed in the late 1970's by the National Council on Alcoholism of Greater Detroit. The Council on AODA of Washington County has sponsored the program locally since 1988. Currently more than 90% of all public and parochial schools in Washington County provide BABES for their students.

tillage involves mounting multi-Topics to be discussed ple coulters on the front of the planter to till a six to eight inch wide by three inch deep zone of loose soil in which to plant.

This system has produced better seedling populations. when compared to no till planting systems and nearly as effective at controlling soil erosion.

Producers have been evaluating various ways to plant crops with leaving adequate residue on the surface. Reduced tillage using chisel plows and no till planting are two of the most common methods. With chisel plow systems it may be difficult to leave adequate residue. When producers have used no till there may be problems with slow ger-

mination and emergence, especially when soils are wet or heavy soil types.

The zone tillage system provides an opportunity to remove residue from the row area and helps eliminate some of the concerns of no till, while allowing adequate residue to be left on the field.



The result was "just one of those games" for KHS, which was spanked by Two Rivers 17-8 on its home field.

The loss, the third straight for the Indians in the conference, dropped KHS to 5-7 and to 8-11 overall. Two Rivers, meanwhile, improved to 3-9 in

The Raiders banged out 16 hits in the contest, also taking advantage of five Indian defensive miscues. Seven of the Raider base hits came in the fourth inning, when they scored eight runs by sending 14 hitters to the plate.

Kevin Klahn started on the hill for the Indians, and did a respectable job. He left after just three innings, and the Indians were still in the game, 4-3.

But his replacement, Tim Strigenz, didn't fare quite so well. He was responsible for all eight Raider runs in the inning, although several were unearned due to errors.


The Regional final is slated
