

Plan Commission Approves Planned Unit Development Duplex Condos Proposed for Sunset Estates Phase III

Gary and Linda Gavin, developers of Sunset Estates, appeared before the Kewaskum Plan Commission Tuesday evening to request the rezoning of a parcel of land on the west end of the Village.

The land, which will become Two Family Residence District Phase III of the Gavin's Sunset Estates subdivision is located to the west of Forest Avenue and Edgewood.

The Gavins were requesting to have the land rezoned to R-3

to be laid out as a Planned Unit Development for that area of land. They are planning on constructing duplex condominiums on the approximately eight acre parcel.

However, in coordination with the other phases of construction, the front three lots of Phase III, immediately adjacent to Edgewood Road, will remain as single family housing.

The proposed Planned Unit Development will also utilize some of the large rustic oak trees situated on the parcel and a pond will also be constructed to add to the scenic beauty of the layout of the development.

The land should be able to easily accommodate possibly 20 to 24 duplex condos which figures into 40 to 48 individual units. Each unit will be individ-

ually owned and regulated by a condominium owners covenant.

It is expected that each condo will have a minimum of between 1200 and 1600 square feet of living space depending on the construction. There will be an option of two story or ranch style condos.

After much discussion and extensive questions, the Plan Commission unanimously approved to recommend the rezoning to the Village Board for Public Hearing, which has been tentatively set for September 12.

Warden Urges Caution **During Summer Recreating**

Summer is in full swing, and the heat of July makes the area lakes seem more attractive than ever. With the increase of people using the water, area boaters and recreators need to be even more cautious and courteous to others out there.

One item that boaters may bring with them, however, could make them less cautious and courteous. This item is alcohol. We all know that alcohol can severely impair your operation of a car, but did you know that its effect on you when operating a boat can be just as dangerous. Alcohol will slow down your reaction time and impair your judgement. Combine this with the effects of the rocking of the boat, the glare of the sun, the heat, and the wind, and you could have a recipe for disaster.

Unlike other motor vehicles, boats do not have brakes, and the response time is greater for turning and stopping than it is with other vehicles.

Let's suppose that you, as an operator, consume enough alcohol to impair you an you have to make a split decision about changing the direction of your boat because you just noticed an obstruction in the water or the person leaving shore did not see you and has pulled out in front of you, you may not be able to react fast enough to avoid an accident.

If the thought of an accident isn't enough to deter drinking and boating, Wisconsin has an "operating while intoxicated" law similar to the state's law on operating a motor vehicle while under the influence.

You cannot legally operate a motorboat if you are under the influence of an intoxicant. It is also against the law to have a blood alcohol concentration above 0.1% while operating a boat. Both of these violations can carry a maximum forfeiture of \$419.00. Also, if you happen

to get arrested twice in a five year period, the violation is a crime which can carry a maximum fine of \$1,000.00 and up to six months in jail. For three or more offenses, the fine is a maximum of \$2,000.00 and a possible jail sentence of up to one year.

Unlike other motor vehicles, Wisconsin has an "implied consent" law regarding boats, snowmobiles and ATV's. This means that if you are operating any of these vehicles, it is against the law to refuse to take a preliminary breath test to determine the amount of alcohol present in your blood.

Summer is a time to relax and enjoy the great outdoors. Wisconsin Conservation Wardens want everyone to have a fun but safe season on the water. So, if your going to enjoy our great water resources, please use good judgement and consume in moderation if you choose to consume alcohol while recreating.

If you have questions regarding these or any other boating laws, you can find answers in the boating regulations pamphlet, or feel free to contact your local conservation warden.
