Traditionally, Labor Day weekend has been the fund raising weekend for the renowned Jerry Lewis Muscular Dystrophy Telethon.

This year members of the Kewaskum Fire Department will be spearheading efforts in the community to help raise funds for the Muscular Dystrophy Association (MDA) with a "Fill The Boot" campaign.

The event will be held on Friday, September 2, from 2 to 8 p.m. in the Sentry parking lot. People will have the opportunity to view fire equipment, the telesquirt fire engine, the latest equipment in transporting the sick and injured, have your blood pressure taken by an Emergency Medical Technician and most importantly, to make your contribution to MDA.

Members will also be at the football game when Kewaskum hosts Horicon, hoping to "fill the boot."

The Kewaskum Fire Department decided to become involved when it was learned one of their member's son has recently been diagnosed with muscular dystrophy.

Jerry Zorn, son of Gene and Sandy Zorn of Kewaskum, appears to be your typical active eight-year-old boy who enjoys computers, fishing, climbing trees and bike riding.

In May, he experienced

numbness in his hands, neck and head pain. His parents sought immediate medical attention for him. After a series of tests, and a muscle biopsy at Children's Hospital in Milwaukee, they learned Jerry has muscular dystrophy. The severity and prognosis is yet to be determined with more tests.

As everyone knows, medical costs these days are staggering. While Zorn's insurance will partially cover these costs, the MDA clinic is there to help with some other medical costs not covered by their insurance.

Additionally, MDA offers therapy, counseling, camp programs, support groups for families, and continues research efforts and educates the public about this disease. Funding for these services is almost entirely by voluntary contributions of individuals and organizations.

As a member of the Kewaskum Fire Department, Gene has unselfishly given of his time and energy to the community as a firefighter and an Emergency Medical Technician. Now it is time to help Jerry Zorn through donations to the MDA.

The Muscular Dystrophy Association was founded in 1950 for the purpose of eradicating neuromuscular diseases. The search for cures and treatments for 40 related neuromuscular diseases has always been

Board Votes to Recommend 24% Sewer Rate Increase

The Kewaskum Village Board voted unanimously to recommend a 24% sewer rate hike at Monday evening's meeting.

The rate increase, suggested by Chris Abrahamson of the Ruckert and Mielkie Engineering Firm, is due in part, to the impact on the village when Kemp's Dairy ceases production operations in Kewaskum. However, the village was look-

ing at a rate increase before the Kemps announcement.

When broken down, this hike should average to be approximately \$36 per year, or around \$3.00 per month to village residents.

The recommendation will now be turned into the form of a resolution which the board will vote on in the near future. More details on the meeting will be published in next week's issue.

Dan Gerhartz Featured In National Magazine

An article on Wisconsin artist, Dan Gerhartz of Kewaskum, is featured in the Summer issue of *Persimmon Hill* magazine, a journal on the West published by the National Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City, OK.

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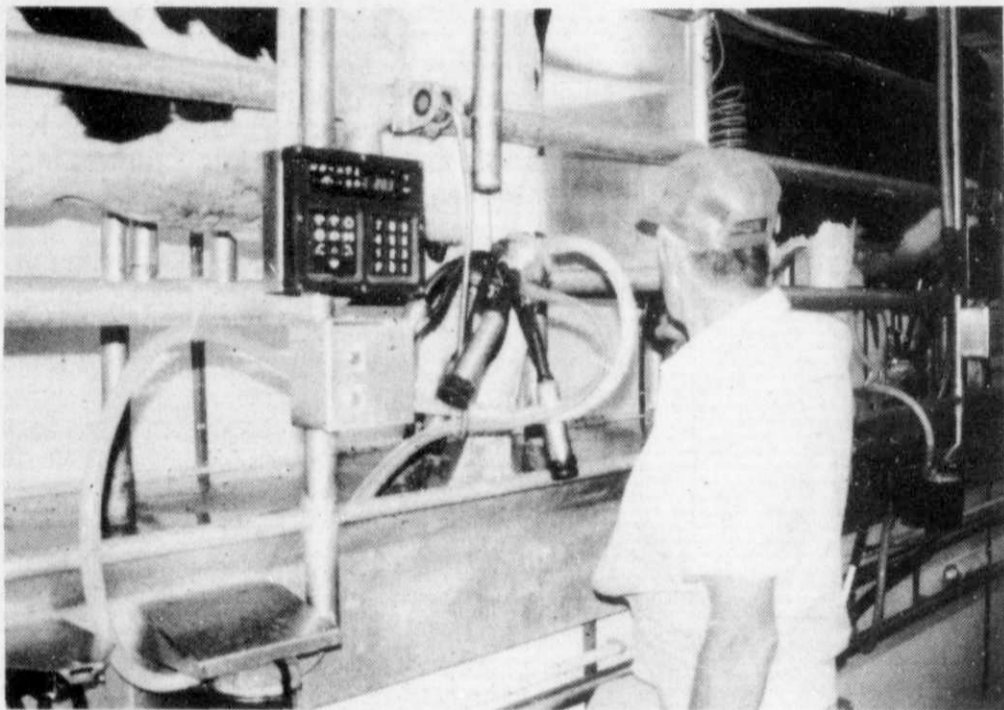
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Dairy Cows Enter Computer Age

These days milking time at Spruce Lane Farms isn't what it used to be. "It's almost fun," exclaims Charlie Garbisch, and the cause of all this commotion is his new computerized Alpha LaVal tandem milking parlor.

The Garbisch's, of N314 Boltonville Road in rural Kewaskum, are owners of the first system of this kind in the United States. "We went up to Canada to take a look at it," Garbisch explains. "It's big up there, and also in England."

With a herd of 105 dairy cows, the tandem parlor has been functioning for five weeks now, and saves Charlie and his sons over an hour of milking time each day, including the clean-up chores. The entire system was installed in a little over six weeks, and can routinely milk the entire herd in two hours and 15 minutes.

"I read about it in the January farm paper," Charlie recalls, "and that's when my interest in this kind of set-up began."

Each cow's number is punched into the computer, which keeps complete milking records of each individual such as daily milk production, yearly totals, drying out cycles, milking times, and breeding records... all at the touch of a button.

The cows are led out of the 20x64 foot holding area into the tandem parlor, with metal gates automatically opening and closing as each one completes its milking cycle. "The cows got the hang of it really easy," comments Garbisch, since their dinner awaits them at the end of the line.

Cows are lined up single file on each side of the parlor, with a sunken mid-section between, where Charlie and his sons work the computer and hook up the milking units to each animal, which eliminates the need for bending since the udders are now at arm's reach.

The sensor weighs the milk and indicates when milking is complete, then the unit automatically drops off, the teats are

washed with automatic hoses, the cow is released through the open gate and the next cow is moved forward into position. It's like a well-orchestrated slow dance, and the efficiency creates a calming effect for the herd, as well as the men working the parlor.

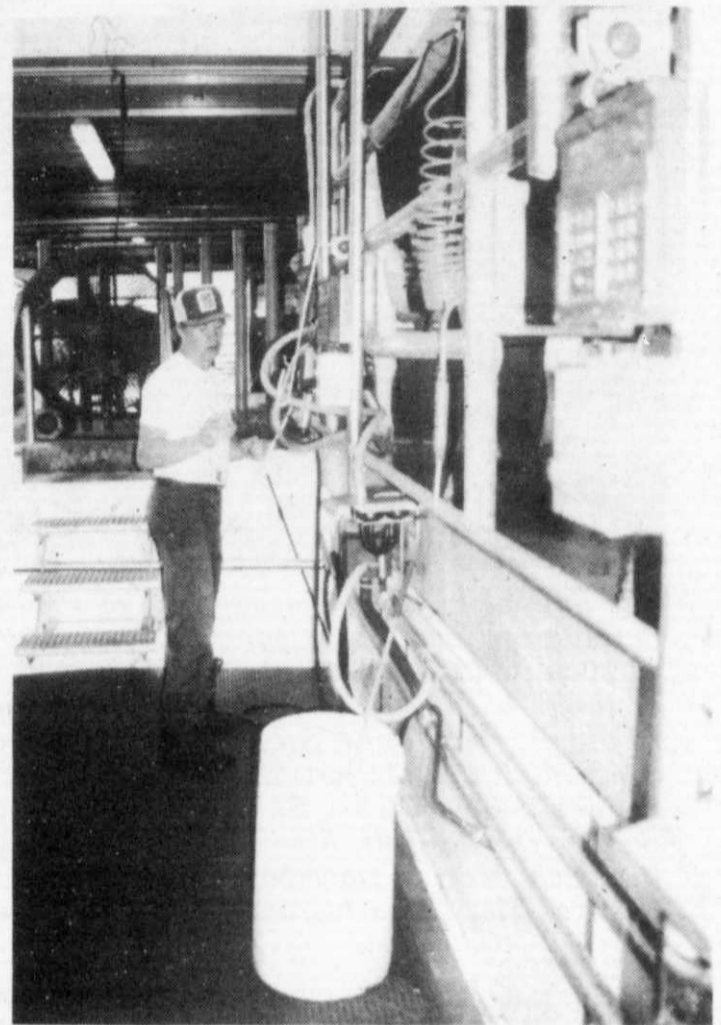
At the end of the session, the milking units are hooked up to automatic washing stations that work, "just like a washing machine," cutting clean-up time in half. The milk travels into a tank and is pumped through a cooler. The tank itself has a 10,000 gallon capacity. The Alpha LaVal system fit right on the original vacuum pump for the milker, which runs on water.

"We still have a little carpentry work left to do, but it's basi-

cally finished," adds Charlie. His sons, Todd and David (the calf man), help with the milking chores on the family farm, and Charlie and Beverly's eight grandchildren can often be found helping to lead the cows out of the holding area, or playing nearby.

Now, with all this leisure time on his hands, Charlie may be looking for a good card game, so call him if you need an extra hand. In the future, his herd of computer whiz cows may end up doing all the milking themselves.

One drawback to the ever improving means of transportation is that there is no longer such a thing as a distant relative.

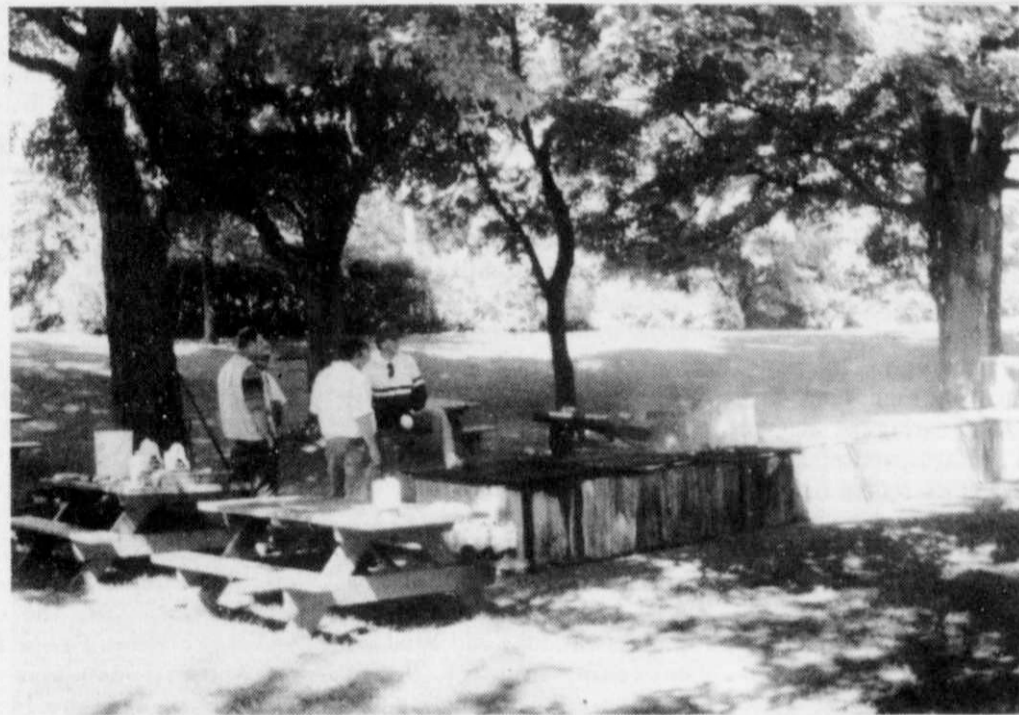

The Annual Midwest Livestock Producers of Lomira Fed Cattle Show and Sale was held on Thursday, July 14.

Start of School Limits Student Work Hours

School starts soon. For Wisconsin's young scholars, that means their studies come first and their part-time jobs second.

Wisconsin's child labor law allows students, 12 through 17 years of age, to work four hours a day during school days from Monday through Thursday. They can work eight-hour days as they could during the summer only on Fridays, weekends and other days when school is not in session. Students who are 16 or 17 years old can work more than eight hours a day, but only during a non-school week.

Also, students may work:

- *no more than six days during a school week (unless delivering newspapers or doing farm work);

- *a total of 18 hours a week if they are 12 to 15 years old, 26 hours if 16 or 17;

- *no later than 8 p.m. if there is school the next day (11 p.m. if 16 or 17 years old);

- *on a Friday or Saturday (or other day that is followed by a non-school day): no later than 9:30 p.m. if 12 or 13 years old; no later than 11 p.m. if 14 or 15; no later than 12:30 a.m. if 16 or 17.

- *each work day must be separated by at least eight hours.

Twelve and thirteen-year-olds may work only as caddies, in agriculture, domestic service, door-to-door sales, school lunch programs, or for their parents' business.

The \$5 work child labor permit, which must be reimbursed by the employer, is available at many high schools and at other outlets throughout the state.

"Early work experiences are important. But these rules assure that our young people get the academic foundation they will need for lifelong careers in our increasingly demanding workplaces," said Carol Skornicka, Secretary of the Wisconsin Department of Industry, Labor and Human Relations.

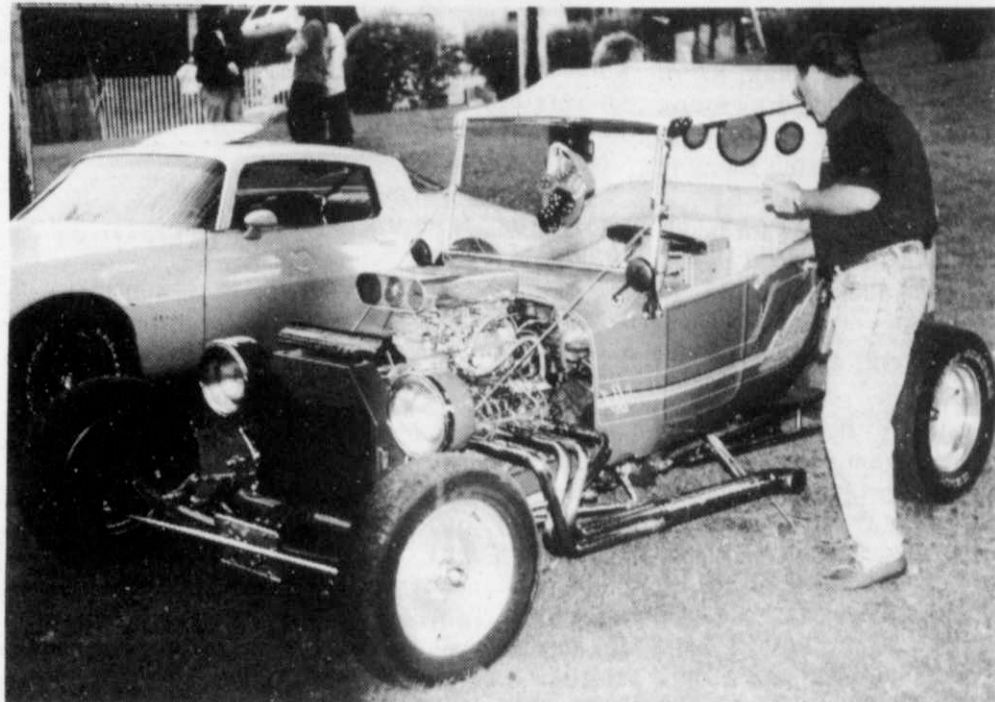

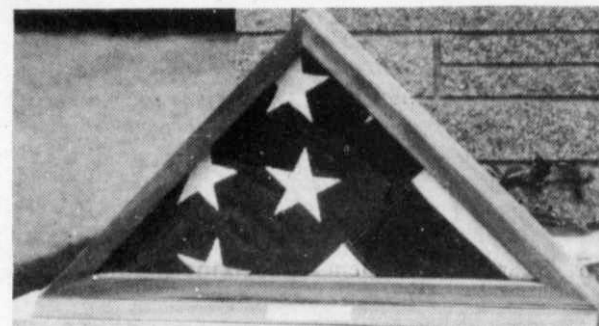

The following policies were presented for the second reading: #347.1-Parent Letter Regarding Directory Data; #347-Student Records; #447.1-Corporal Punishment; #377.2-Academic Eligibility for Interscholastic Competitive Activities and Rules for Interscholastic Participation and Cheerleaders. Discussion ensued. Two members from the audience voiced their objection to portions of policy #377.2. Mr. Weare assured them that their suggestions would be taken into consideration and that the policy would be presented to the Policy Committee for review/revision. Schulte/Weare motion to approve the policies as presented. Motion passed 6-0.

school building bonds in an amount not to exceed \$5,450,000 for the public purpose of constructing additions to and remodeling and renovation of the Kewaskum High School and Middle School and acquiring equipment and furnishings. Motion passed 6-0.

Sparks/Schmitt motion to approve initial resolution Number II authorizing general obligation school building bonds in an amount not to exceed \$280,000.00. After discussion the motion was dropped.

Sparks/Schulte motion to approve initial resolution Number II authorizing general obligation school building bonds in an amount not to exceed \$200,000 for the public purpose of paying the cost of football field/track improvements at Kewaskum High School consisting of a rubberized track surface, bleachers, fencing, pressbox and acquiring equipment. Motion passed 6-0.

Beimborn/Sparks motion to approve initial resolution Number III authorizing general obligation school building bonds in an amount not to exceed \$80,000 for the public purpose of paying the cost of football field/track improvements at Kewaskum High School consisting of adding lights at the football field. Many different local groups will have tables or booths along the tail race. So be sure to stop in and check them out. The local

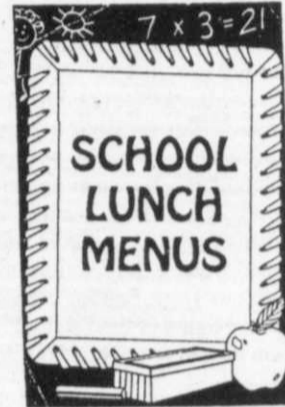
Lions Club will be selling baked goods.

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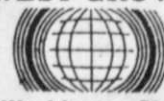

75 Years Ago

August 16, 1919

An accident, which might have resulted in serious injury and probable death to some of the occupants, occurred here last Sunday evening, when passenger train No. 218, due here at 7:02 p.m., southbound Sundays only, had the rear coach derailed when pulling into the north end switch to meet the northbound passenger train due here at 6:27, which happened to be late. As soon as the train had pulled into the siding, the rear brakeman threw the switch too soon, causing a derail thrown under the last coach, the rear trucks jumped the track and swerved to one side, sliding down a three foot embankment, and was pulled along in this manner for about two rods. When the train came to a stop the rear coach was leaning over to one side, and only for the fact that the front wheels stayed on the track the car would have tipped over. Although a great deal of excitement prevailed among the passengers for a short time, none of them fared any the worse, and were loaded into another coach, and soon were on their way toward Milwaukee. The coach was detached from the rest of the train and left here until Monday, when a wrecking crew

from Milwaukee placed it back on the track again. No damage was done to the track except that a few ties were badly smashed and had to be replaced by new ones.

Everything is now in readiness for the big Victory Picnic, which will be held at the North Side Park, tomorrow (Sunday) August 17th. Great preparations have been made to make this one of the largest and best picnics held in this village for a number of years. A large assortment of amusements has been provided for which will help make the day an enjoyable one, for all who may attend, both young and old. One of the main attractions will be a six round sparring exhibition between "Kid" Schroeder and Young Welk of Milwaukee. A number of concession stands will also be in the park to help bring the occasion to a successful conclusion.

Plans have been made by the Washington County Agricultural Society to erect a large exhibition barn on the fairgrounds. The new building will be two hundred feet long, fifty-six feet wide and about twenty feet high. The roof will have a superstructure for lighting and ventilation. There will be five entrances to the building, two at the front, two at the rear and one at the side. The interior will be divided into stalls of which a

number will be removable. The number of rows of stalls will be four, one running along each wall the full length of the building and two in the middle, with ample walls between the stalls to provide for the visitors. It is estimated that the new barn will house about two hundred head of cattle. This addition to the fairgrounds ought to prove a valuable asset toward the success of Washington County's fairs, as heretofore, the exhibition of stock was very small on account of the poor protection offered to the stock by the old stalls.

Eligibility Requirements for Free, Reduced Price Meals Announced by St. Lucas School

St. Lucas Lutheran School of Kewaskum has announced its policy for the children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch Program. The school office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed

by any interested party.

The following household size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility. Children from families whose annual income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Application forms were given to each family. To apply for free or reduced price meals households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To obtain free or reduced price meals for children for whom households receive Food Stamps or Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), an adult member needs only to list the names of the school children, give Food Stamp or AFDC case number for each child, sign his/her name and return the application to the school office. Households must inform the school authorities when they no longer receive Food Stamps or AFDC.

For the school officials to determine eligibility for free or

reduced price meals of households not receiving Food Stamps or AFDC, the household must provide the following information requested on the application: names of all household members, and the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. In lieu of a social security number, the household may indicate that the signer does not possess a social security number. Also, the income received by each household member must be provided by amount and source (wages, welfare, child support, etc.). Households are required to report increases in income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal policy, the school official will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he/she may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If the

parent/guardian wishes to make a formal appeal, he/she may make a request either orally, or in writing to: Mr. Erv Uhlman, School Board Chairman, 339 Knights Avenue, Kewaskum, WI 53040, phone: 626-4497. If a hearing is needed to appeal the decision, the policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a household member becomes unemployed, or if the household size changes, the family should contact the school. Such changes may make the household eligible for reduced price meals or free meals if the household income falls at or below the levels shown above, and they may reapply at that time.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for free or reduced price meals, the household should complete an application for a family of one or contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household on the application is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington D.C. 20250.

Any questions regarding the application should be directed to the determining official.

Refugees could now clean themselves while in camps, waiting for some new light to their dark crisis.

The youth were amazed and overwhelmed by the gracious attitude of others a whole world away. "It was a great goodwill gesture, and we are so thankful to all who made this huge project work for us," stated Oelhafen. "It involved many hands and heads to meet all the deadlines and get all the necessities, but it was definitely worth it."
