

Washington County is the fastest growing county in the State of Wisconsin and the rural area surrounding Kewaskum is becoming a more attractive, inviting setting for those people wishing to escape urban growth.

Several town residents were in attendance at the Town of Kewaskum's August board meeting to voice their concerns and opposition to proposed rezoning of land currently zoned as Exclusive Agricultural or Agricultural Transition.

The town currently has a land use plan that was adopted in the

70's with the purpose of protecting the town farmland, the environment, soil, water, air and to preserve the quality of life. Until recently, requests for zoning changes were few.

Residents are concerned that the uniqueness, the openness, the rural setting of the Kettle Moraine will be disturbed if rural land development is per-

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
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



KEWASKUM - How do you replace a departed senior class of 15, which included one of the best running backs in school history?

"It's going to be very difficult," says Clark Pearson, Kewaskum's head football coach. It will be Pearson's task to fill the void left by those graduated players, and while it won't be easy, there are many bodies available for him to plug into the equation.

A total of 22 returning letterwinners will help make the transition from last year's 6-3 squad that finished second in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference. Only a 7-6 loss to Sheboygan Falls in the final game of the season prevented the Indians from making the playoffs for the first time since 1983.

Gone from last year's team is EW Player of the Year Beau Coulter, who rushed for over 1,000 yards and played a bone-jarring role in the defensive backfield. His lead blocker, fullback Mark Strobel, is also gone, as is all-EW center Jay Enright.

What remains, however, is a plethora of healthy bod-

"Depth is going to be one of our strengths," Pearson said. "We seem to have more people out this year. We also have decent size."

That should translate into some decent line play, both offensively and defensively. Back are starters Andy Mathias, Dane Dorn, Jared Pankonin, and Eric Beck. Add to the mix juniors Jason Schmidt, Nathan Scheel, Matt Wiedmeyer and the trenches should be as good or better than last season's group.

Quarterback Survis also returns to the fold this season, after a solid junior season last year. His experience is a key, according to Pearson, who says his team will need to rely on the passing game more this year.

"He did a good job for us last year," the KHS boss said of Survis. "He handles the ball very well... makes very few mistakes."

Joining Survis in the backfield will be seniors Tim Strigenz, Cory Rammer, and junior Aaron Kurth, who are all battling for the starting running back position. Senior Rich Farchione is the favorite for the starting fullback spot, while Peter Reis should occupy the wingback slot.

"There's a real battle for a lot of spots," Pearson said, noting that his set starting lineup has not been determined yet. challenge." "We're (the coaching staff) really torn at a couple of positions. A lot of kids are performing at the same levels."

Seniors Travis Jacak and Paul Reis are the top returning receivers on the squad, and should nail down starting spots.

Defensively, senior Shawn Erdmann looks to have a linebacking spot secure, as does junior Tim Gundrum. Seniors Ryan Theusch, Matt Towler, and junior Matt Heather are battling for the other linebacking

The defensive backfield should be another KHS strength, as all-EW selections Rammer and Strigenz will anchor that crew. Joining them will be juniors Joe Rettler and Ryan Herman, while senior Nathan Cartwright "is really pushing for a starting spot," according to Pearson.

"We're going to mix it up defensively," Pearson said, adding that the Indians will use a base 5-2 defense. Offensively, KHS will continue to run a wing-T formation, with some deep I-formation plays as well.

In the EW, Pearson points to defending champs to once again be among the league's elite.

"Falls always seems to produce one good team after another," he said, adding that Plymouth "should be right up there also."

As for his team, "we would like to be in the top two,"

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


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
