Primary Election Tuesday

On Tuesday, September 13, Kewaskum area residents will have the opportunity to exercise their right to vote in the Fall Primary Election. Polls will be open until 8 p.m. to accommodate all voters.

Voters will be deciding on the Kewaskum School District Referendum presented in the form of four questions (facsimile ballot notices on pages 16 and 17).

The areas addressed for the issuance of general obligation bonds are 1) for additions, remodeling and renovation at Kewaskum High School and Middle School and the acquisition of equipment and furnishings; 2) making improvements in the football field and track areas; 3) football field lights and, 4) constructing and equipping an auditorium at Kewaskum High School.

On the county level, two Republicans oppose each other

for the County Clerk Position. Marilyn Merten, of the Town of Richfield, who currently holds the office is being opposed by West Bend Alderman Thomas O'Meara III.

There are selections of candidates for some state and congressional offices that will be determined by this election.

In a primary election, voters are reminded to vote for candidates of only one political party. You may designate your party preference and then proceed to cast your vote for candidates in that party. You must vote for individual candidates in one party to have a valid ballot.

If you do not designate a party and you vote for candidates in more than one party, no votes will be counted for any candidates. Cross over voting is not allowed in a primary election.

Exercise your right to vote. Cast your ballot on September 13th.

Hazzard Named President Of Bank Wisconsin

MILWAUKEE -- John C. Schlosser, Chairman of the Board, President, and Chief Executive Officer of St. Francis Capital Corporation has announced the appointment of James C. Hazzard to the position of President and Chief Executive Officer of a new commercial bank subsidiary now being formed by the Company to be operated under the name of "Bank Wisconsin." Hazzard is a graduate of Carroll College in Waukesha, Wisconsin. In addition to his bank-related responsibilities, he also is the Chairman of Community Memorial Hospital Foundation and Director of the Vince Lombardi Memorial Classic Committee, Menomonee Falls Business and Improvement District, and Menomonee Falls Rotary Club. He also is a past President of Menomonee Falls Chamber of Commerce.

Bank Wisconsin, a subsidiary of St. Francis Capital Corporation, results from the recently announced bank charter being acquired from the Valley Bancorporation as a result of its merger into the Marshall and Illsley Corporation last May. Completion of the acquisition by the Company is subject to

US 41 Freeway Conversion Work Begun in Washington County

Construction of overpass bridges and cul de sacs along US 41 from the Richfield Interchange to WIS 144 was scheduled to begin the week of September 5. Traffic on US 41 will periodically be restricted to one lane in each direction during daylight hours for this work.

The work will consist of grading and overpass construction at Western Avenue, Sherman Road and County AA.

Cul de sacs will be constructed at Scenic Drive, Hillside Road and Lovers Lane in place of existing intersections with US 41.

Western Avenue, Sherman Road and County AA will be

closed at US 41 during the first stage of the project this fall. These roads will be re-opened to traffic upon completion of the overpasses and their approach roads in early summer, 1995. Scenic Drive, Hillside Road and Lovers Lane will then be permanently closed at US 41 for the construction of cul de sacs.

The project is expected to be completed by the end of July 1995.

Pheifer Bros. Construction Companies of Neenah was awarded the \$3.5 million contract. Federal funds will pay 80% and state funds 20% of the project's cost.

New Fields Store To Open Sept. 8 In West Bend

The new Fields Fine Furniture store at 150 Island Avenue, West Bend, (the former Outlet Mall) will be opened officially with a ribbon-cutting ceremony at 5 p.m. on Thursday, September 8. The West Bend Chamber of Commerce will host the brief event.

According to Steve Picus, who with his father owns and operates the store, "Our county is growing fast. If we retailers make the investment, I'm convinced we can turn downtown West Bend into a bustling marketplace once again."

for West Bend," Picus said. "We will be giving tours of our Broyhill, Cochrane, Stratolounger, and Serta galleries at our opening. I think the visiting public is going to be pleasantly surprised when they see the magnificent settings and tremendous choices."

Welch Campaigns for U.S. Senate Here

State Representative Glenn Grothman (R-West Bend), made a visit to the Kewaskum Statesman last week to introduce Representative Bob Welch (R-Red Granite) who is a candidate for the U.S. Senate in Tuesday's Primary Election.

Welch will be vying with three other Republican candidates for the U.S. Senate seat now occupied by Democrat Herb Kohl. If Welch wins in this primary, he will be opposing Kohl in the November 8th General Election.

Rep. Grothman, who wholeheartedly endorses Welch, stated, "Bob is easily the best assemblyman I work with in Madison. He does an excellent job of advancing the traditional family values that we want represented in this area."

During last week's interview, Rep. Welch addressed many of the issues currently prevalent in our nation's capitol.

On health care reform, Welch stated, "I'm in small business myself, so I face some of these problems of being able to get insurance and things like that. But I think the last thing we want to have happen is for government to take over health care. It just isn't going to work. What's going to happen is

they're going to come in and you're going to get less quality and it's going to cost more. That's the way government does things."

Welch continued, "What do you do? You don't pass the Clinton Plan... you don't pass the Mitchell Plan. On the positive side, there's some insurance reforms you can do. Provide entering a pre-existing condition, allowing portability, so when you go from job to job, you can take that insurance coverage with you. It's relatively simple. And then we need some tax code changes... full deductibility, so that the person buying their own insurance gets the same deduction as the person working at Ford Motor Company. Allow for medical savings accounts."

Welch further explained the medical savings account concept. "Normally an employer will buy first dollar coverage, \$100 deductible, or something like that. It's very, very expensive. Now if they would buy a \$3,000 and up policy, it's very cheap and if they save \$2,000, take that money and put it into the savings account of the employee."

"So now, the employee is taking the first \$3,000 worth of risk themselves, but they've just been given a check from their employer to help cover that. So instead of the insurance company processing a bottle of antibiotics through all their rigmarole and having to make the check out, which costs a lot of money, Joe and Jane Consumer make out their own check and pay their own medical bills, up to \$3,000, but they've been given this account. But what happens is a couple of really neat things."

"First of all," Welch stated, "now you have consumers interested in how much health care costs. Because if they don't spend the money, they get to keep it. Secondly, most people will build up an asset. So instead of all our assets for health care being in big insur-

ance buildings, you're going to have this asset being with real people. And if they keep the money in and use it for health care or if they roll it over in an IRA, and use it for retirement, they don't pay taxes on it."

Welch further stated, "what I'm proposing is nothing mandatory. This medical savings account is a neat idea, but I don't want to mandate it. I want to say, let's change the tax code, so now that makes sense."

In reference to the Crime Bill, Welch stated he is against it. "It's not an Anti-Crime Bill, it's almost a Pro-Crime Bill. There's something like 5,000 drug dealers on the streets because of this, when they chopped up the mandatory sentencing provision. The cops on the street is a joke. It's not going to happen. Most local governments are not going to take the deal. Because it pays for the cop in year one, you have to keep him forever and the funding all goes away. There's always strings attached and all of a sudden you get a federally controlled police force. So even the good stuff in the bill is extremely flawed and then there's all this pork stuff in there."

Welch emphatically stated, "If you want crime control, there's only one way to do it. You find the bad guys and lock them up for a very long time, so they don't do it again. And so the next guy thinks twice before he does it."

He also said, "Crime is not caused by poverty. What causes crime is bad people." Welch added this is a moral judgement. "If you walk in a liquor store with a gun and stick it in a guy's face and say, 'clean out your cash register,' you are doing something wrong and you should be held accountable for that."

Welch also presented his booklet on his Balanced Budget Plan and explained it as a revolutionary document. "It cuts taxes by over \$50 billion and still balances the budget in three years. We cut out all the pro-

grams that the federal government shouldn't be doing... the frills. It never was the intention that the federal government was going to do these things. They shouldn't be involved in education. They shouldn't be involved in doing research on energy. Let the people who do energy do that. They shouldn't be involved in all these goofy projects and grants we have in studying tsetse flies."

He also shared his "Welchfare" program on welfare reform. He explains his program saying, "Welfare is not going to give you a check anymore. We're going to give you a job. Make minimum wage, but we'll give you a little subsidy on top to help you make it. That we'll phase out as you get ahead and if you can't find any job at all, we'll give you a community service job. There's always an incentive there to move into the private sector. What we're doing then, instead of us as taxpayers providing all this money to keep people alive, they're going to work for the first \$8,000 a year of it themselves. Employers and our economy I think will grow as a result of that, and people will have some self-esteem back."

Welch, who steadfastly proclaims to be Pro-Life, is the endorsed candidate of Wisconsin Right to Life.

In conclusion, Welch said, "I will resign from the U.S. Senate before I'll vote for a tax increase of any kind. All my opponents in the Republican Primary, believe it or not, say that's unrealistic... you've got to be willing to raise some taxes. No, you don't. They've already got too much of our money."

Revaluation to Begin

The revaluation of all taxable real estate and personal property in the Village of Kewaskum will begin this week. The Village Board has retained Bowmar Appraisal Inc., the Village Assessor, to conduct the revaluation.

This revaluation is being done, not only to achieve equity in property assessments but also to comply with Wisconsin State Law which mandates that a municipality's assessment records and procedures must meet established standards.

All property owners and tenants are urged to cooperate with the authorized appraisers by allowing them, upon presentation of proper identification, to enter upon their land and buildings to make the required inspection.

It is advisable to secure all pets while the appraiser is on your premises. Absentee owners are requested to please inform their tenants of the impending visit and inspection.

The appraiser will make two attempts to inspect the property

and if the owner or tenant is unavailable he will then leave a callback notice at the house requesting the owner or tenant to call the Village Hall to set up an appointment for inspection.

If a property owner refuses an appraiser entry after an official notice, the taxpayer will lose his right to appeal his or her new assessed value before the Village's Board of Review.

For each property, the revaluation will consist of interior and exterior inspections and a listing of construction data, land and depreciation factors. All pertinent information gathered will be entered into our new computerized system so that new assessed values can be calculated.

In the Spring of 1995, when all new assessments are completed, a change of value notice will be sent to all property owners informing them of their new assessed values. Informal meetings with the appraisers will be held with any property owner who has questions concerning his or her new assessed value.

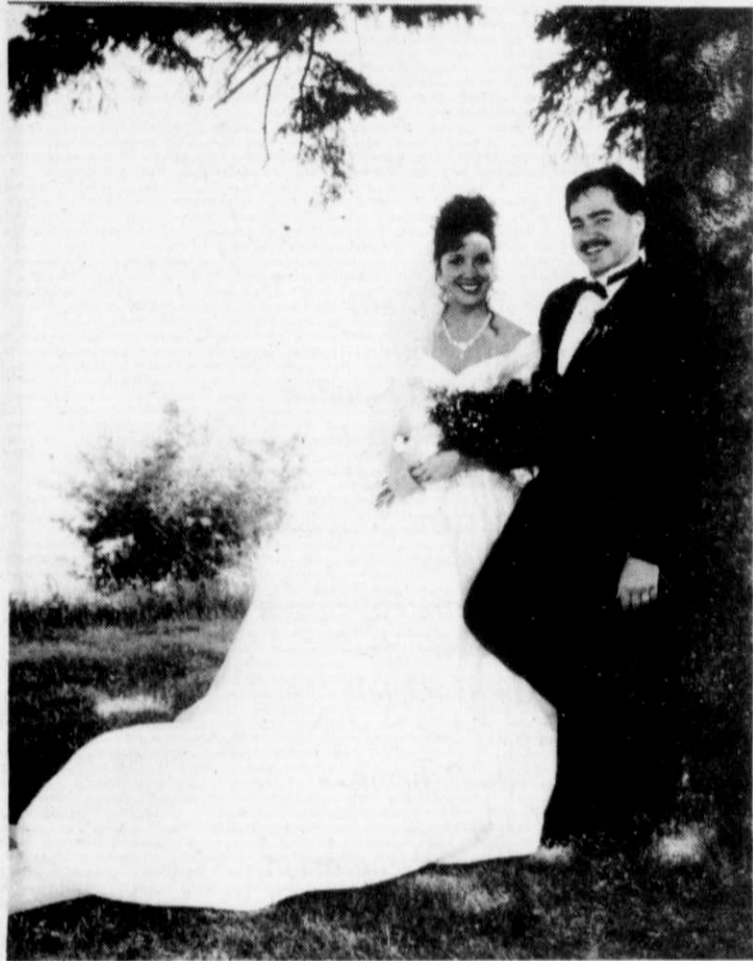

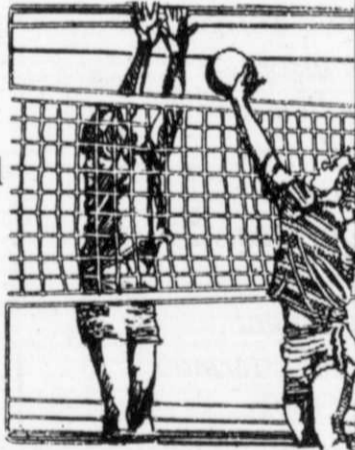



We have been asked what the purpose of a rubberized surface on the track would be. The rubberized surface would definitely help prevent some of the training and competing injuries which occur from running on a hard asphalt surface.

These injuries include such things as stress fractures, shin splints, ankle, knee and hip problems. The medical people who examine and treat these injuries have identified training and competing on the hard surface as the primary cause of these types of injuries.

This surface also allows athletes to wear spikes which prevents slipping in such events as high jump, long jump, triple jump, and pole vaulting.

We hope we have answered any questions you may have.

Letter to the Editor:

It has come to my attention that a number of Kewaskum School District residents believe that the school district can borrow up to \$1,000,000 whenever

they want to. I would like to take this time and set the record straight.

Under Wisconsin Act 16, effective 8-12-93, school districts can NO LONGER BORROW up to \$1,000,000 for capital expenditures and tax the district residents to pay back under Fund 30 (Debt Service) without a referendum.

School districts can still borrow up to \$1,000,000 for operation, capital expenditures, etc. without a referendum and pay it back from Fund 10 (Operations) as long as they stay within the revenue cap. To exceed the revenue cap requires a voter referendum on the issue.

Prior to Act 16 (8-12-93) school districts could borrow up to \$1,000,000 without voter approval or referendum and establish a tax levy and pay back schedule under the debt service fund.

Because School Districts no longer have the ability to borrow up to \$1,000,000 dollars, residents throughout the state will continue to see more and more referendums.

KHS Girls Second at Tennis Invite

MANITOWOC - Not wanting to have an extended layoff during the Labor Day holiday, Kewaskum tennis coach Glenn Eichstedt thought it would be a good idea to take part in a tournament, getting a preview of an Eastern Wisconsin Conference foe in the process.

The plan turned out favorable in more than one respect, as the Lady Indians fought their way to a second-place finish in the Manitowoc Roncolli Invitational here, last Saturday.

Kewaskum finished with 13 points, behind only the host Roncolli squad, which tallied 19 points. Manitowoc Lincoln, a perennial Division 1 power, finished third with 12 points, while EW power Two Rivers was fourth (5).

Eichstedt was just as excited

with what he didn't see from Two Rivers as he was with what he did see from his squad.

"We got a chance to see Two Rivers in a non-conference situation, and it turns out that we won five of the six matches we played against them," Eichstedt said. "I couldn't have been more pleased."

Two KHS standouts, Missy Rohrer at No. 1 singles, and Margaret Feind at No. 3, each won their respective brackets. Rohrer dropped her first set against Roncolli's Samantha Vraney, the third-place finisher in WISAA's tournament last year. But the KHS senior battled back for a 3-6, 6-3, 6-3 win, vaulting her into the finals.

"She just took control," Eichstedt said of Rohrer's opening match. He went on to report that Rohrer had no trouble in the

final against her foe from Two Rivers, losing just three games total.

Sewer Rate Hikes Explained to Board

A presentation by Chris Abrahamson of Ruekert and Mielkie, Village Engineers, topped the agenda at the August 15th meeting of the Kewaskum Village Board.

Abrahamson attended the meeting to discuss alternatives regarding the Water Pollution Control Department's rate adjustments.

Abrahamson stated this process had started in the early part of the year and he had prepared several alternative plans.

In the first part of March, Village Administrator Dan Schmidt and Abrahamson discussed the possibility that Kemps Dairy could be cutting back production approximately 30%. Abrahamson said, "They are the largest customer in the village, and we wanted to see what impact that would be on the rates if Kemps did indeed cut back by 30%." This was studied in Alternative Three.

Abrahamson said he was informed in June that Kemps had made the decision to cease production here and that was studied in Alternative Five.

He said, "under Alternative Five, we have a budget of about \$505,000 and I said, what would the impact be on the average home if they would close their doors tomorrow and completely turn off production? Under that type of scenario you can see that the average home would experience about a 40% increase in rates, just from the loss of that one customer."

Trustee Bob Beisbier asked what determines the

49% figure.

Abrahamson explained, "you have your same costs (salaries, chemicals, insurance, administrative, etc.), but now because of the fact you've lost his customer who was giving you up to 50% of your flow, 60% to 70%, you have lower units that are going into your budget. With less units, you're going to end up with higher unit costs which drives up your rates."

Beisbier asked, "wouldn't the cost of the plant be so much less without their sludge?"

Abrahamson continued, "what I'll be getting into with the recommended Alternative is the fact that we have a number of things that are going to essentially be somewhat saving us from this real rapid rate shock increase. The fact is No. 1 - they're not going to be shutting their doors tomorrow and from what Dan has told me it might take about a year for them to wind down operations. During the course of this next year, treatment plant personnel can start watching their costs and see where there's going to be cost savings... At the moment, it's really hard to quantify what those cost savings are going to be."

He continued, "I assume as they wind down operations, we can start getting a better handle on what their costs are going to be and we're going to end up with a lower budget next year because of those cost savings. The other thing is that Farmers Union Co-Op is going to be coming on line starting up this year, so their flow will help negate some of

the impact of losing this customer."

Abrahamson further stated, "because of these different factors... that's why I made this recommendation listed underneath Alternative Five, as to what the user charges would be and it would be about a 24% increase for an average home. Currently that's about \$36 a year, which would work out to about \$3 a month."

Following further discussion Trustee William Kulas asked, "Can we get by with less than 24%?"

Abrahamson said, "you're adding \$38,000 to the budget because of debt service, but the big thing is just the loss of this customer."

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt added, "Looking at 49% to break even for a year, and then if they're proposing to leave halfway through 1995, that's half of the revenue. We're looking at 24% to make the budget balance for 1995."

Trustee Beisbier asked, "If Kemps would have stayed, would we still be looking at an increase?"

Schmidt replied, "Yes, we'd be looking at probably 10% versus 24%. And that also doesn't address the fact that the board as a group has to check into getting money ahead to help pay for future planning. That 10% increase which was Alternative Four, did not include any extra money to be set aside for

future planning."

Schmidt added, "Our rates are extremely cheap. We had our last rate increase in 1991."

A member of the audience, Gary Gavin, commented, "I think the board in the past has done an excellent job of being able to put money aside to be able to pay for half of this sewer sludge tank. And we haven't had any big increases. I think you have to look at 24%. It sounds like a big number but it's only \$35. I'd rather see the village put money in the bank to pay for future expansion or paying off debt... maybe 24% is too high, maybe it's too low, but at least it's in the ballpark and we can start to put money in the bank again because right now, there's no money left in the pocket."

The board was asked to think about the alternatives and details on the resolution would be worked out at a later date.

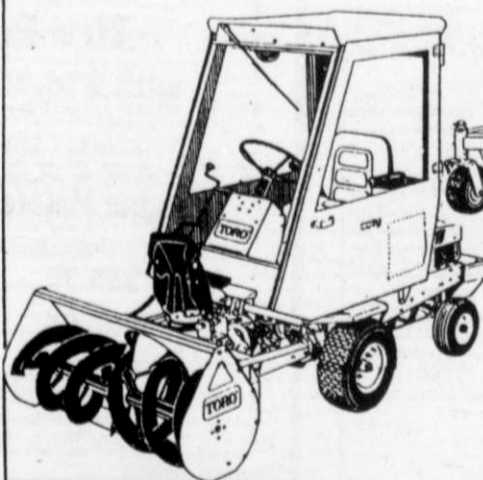

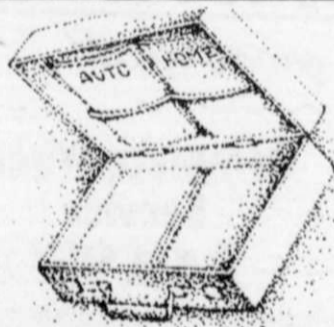

Lady Indians Roll Past Panthers

PLYMOUTH - Dave Rizzardi didn't know if his Kewaskum volleyball squad played that much better, or if the competition was that much weaker here, last Thursday night.

Two days after losing their Eastern Wisconsin Conference opener against Two Rivers, the Indians bounced back in fine fashion against Plymouth. KHS had no problem with the Panthers, winning 15-4, 15-12 and 12-15, to even its EW mark at 1-1 on the season.

Despite the easy win, Rizzardi said that he really couldn't gauge his team's performance compared to the loss against the Raiders.

"It just wasn't the same competition," he said, noting that his

team has had Plymouth's number the past few seasons. "It's really hard to say if we played better or what."

One thing the Indians did do was take advantage of the Panthers' sluggish play in the opening game. Plymouth struggled early and often, as the Indians rolled to the easy 15-4 win.

"They really didn't have much to offer us in that first game," Rizzardi said of the Panthers' woes. "They just couldn't hit the ball in play."

The second game was a bit different, however. The Panthers woke up in time to jump out to a 11-7 lead in game two, prompting some nervousness on Rizzardi's part.

"We found ourselves in some trouble there for a bit," he said.

"Then it was like we decided that we should just beat this team, and we went out and did it. Otherwise it could have been a very interesting night."

KHS went on an 8-1 run to close out the second game, and thus secured its first win of the EW campaign.

Junior Kelly Schreffler continued to shine for the Indians, once again leading the team in spike kills. "I think she's going to continue to be one of our best spikers this season," Rizzardi said, adding that Shelly Williams once again led the team in assists.

"Everybody has been doing what I expected of them," the KHS continued, although adding, "they still have to come together as a team."

Spikers Lose EW Opener

KEWASKUM - Kewaskum girls volleyball coach Dave Rizzardi had stressed how much he wanted his team to get off on the right foot in Eastern Wisconsin Conference action this fall. Unfortunately, his words couldn't translate into success on the court here, last Tuesday night.

The Indians played neck and neck with Two Rivers in each team's EW opener, but it was the Purple Raiders who got their season rolling, stealing a 15-13, 16-14, 15-13 victory from KHS.

Rizzardi admitted afterward that he might have underestimated just how strong Two Rivers would be this season.

"They played very well," Rizzardi said of the Raiders. "I think they'll be a top three (in the EW). They play a lot better defense than I thought."

After dropping the close first game of the match, the Indians seemed to lose their focus in the second game. Two Rivers jumped out to a 9-2 lead in the second game, before the Lady Indians finally answered the

challenge.

"We made a nice run to come back on them," Rizzardi said, noting that his squad rallied to take a 14-13 lead. The Raiders scored the next three points, however, thus winning the match. "We just couldn't finish it off in that second game."

Rizzardi praised senior Mary Yahr, as well as juniors Kelly Schreffler and Shelly Williams. Schreffler led the Indians with 11 kills, while Williams connected on all 15 of her serves.

The veteran KHS coach had nothing but praise for both squads, who may end up battling for the top spot in the EW by the end of the season.

"It was a good match, very evenly-matched," he said. "We just couldn't get over the hump. They were just outstanding on defense. They didn't let any balls hit the floor it seemed."

The high-scoring, close affair took nearly two hours to complete.

"It got to be a long night," Rizzardi said. "It was a tough loss, but I've been on the opposite end of those type of matches, too. They all even themselves out, I guess."

The Indians will try and even things this week, with EW matches at Chilton (Tuesday), and at home against Kiel. KHS will then take part in the Campbellsport Invitational this Saturday.

Beginning Farmers Eligible for Loans

MADISON -- An area legislator hopes young local farmers will take advantage of a new \$10 million low-interest loan program for those starting farming careers in Wisconsin.

The Beginning Farmer Program has grown out of Governor Thompson's Dairy 2020 program, a central feature of which is intended to encourage more young adults to stay in farming.

"The family farm needs to be preserved. It's vital to our economy, and our Wisconsin

heritage," said State Representative Carol Owens (R-Oshkosh). "This is another tool to help do that."

The low-interest loans to young farmers will be made possible through tax exempt bonds that will be purchased by banks. The program will be administered by the Wisconsin Housing and Economic Development Authority, which has been authorized to issue \$10 million worth of bonds.

Individual farmers would be eligible for a maximum loan

of \$250,000 toward the purchase of land, equipment and livestock. The average loan is expected to be about \$160,000, according to WHEDA.

The program is expected to be very popular, based on the success of preliminary focus groups conducted by WHEDA and the State Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection.

Governor Thompson explains that the program can be used in addition to the Farmers Home Administration Down

Payment Assistance Program to help young farmers start their own farm. The Governor said he would unveil more changes to strengthen the family farming industry in the next couple of weeks.

Black Bear Season Opens Sept. 10

MADISON -- As Wisconsin's population of black bears continues to grow, state wildlife officials say bear sightings and nuisance complaints have become more common this year.

"Bear are abundant throughout the north," says Bill Mytton, deer and bear ecologist for the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. "Food supplies for bears were excellent in 1993 and bears went into dens in great condition last fall. They appear to be producing strong, large litters of cubs this year."

The increasing population will have two major influences on the black bear hunting season that opens September 10, Mytton says. The first is that bears are gradually expanding into new areas south of what has been considered the primary bear range.

"This will likely mean increased opportunities for hunters in areas outside of our traditional prime bear range of northwestern Wisconsin," he says. A new "unofficial" state record was harvested in Clark County in 1993, which Mytton says, indicates that Wisconsin's non-traditional bear range has potential to produce healthy bears and even some trophy-sized animals.

The second is that the department has created a subzone within zone A in an effort to harvest more bear in the far northwest where damage and

nuisance complaints have been highest.

Hunters who applied for and received a permit for the A1 subzone will only be allowed to hunt within that zone. Hunters with a permit for Zone A or subzone A1. "We hope the increase hunting pressure in the subzone will help reduce the population and the number of nuisance complaints in that area," Mytton says.

Wisconsin's bear season, Mytton says, staggers the opening date for the two most common types of hunting: hunting with dogs and hunting without dogs. The season framework is set up so that hunters using dogs begin earlier in odd-numbered years, while those who hunt without dogs begin earlier in even numbered years. This year, hunting without dogs opens September 10 and runs through September 30. The season for hunting with dogs opens September 17 and runs through October 7.

Hunting with dogs is only allowed in the northern portions of Wisconsin. In the zone that hunting with dogs is not allowed, the season runs from September 10 through October 7.

More than 25,000 hunters applied for the 2,175 black bear permits that were available for the 1994 season. The hunter success rate for 1993 was about 50 percent, which included several 600-pound bears. Mytton

anticipates a similar success rate again this year.

The black bear is the largest common resident mammal in Wisconsin. Bears regularly reach weights of 250 to 350 pounds. They are omnivorous, eating both plants and animals; but in the summer and fall they live primarily on wild berries, fruits and nuts.

State Sets 40-Day Duck Season

MADISON -- Duck hunters in Wisconsin will have a 40-day season for the first time since 1987 under waterfowl hunting rules approved recently by the state Natural Resources Board.

The board approved a 40-day season after the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service amended a preliminary decision that would have limited states in the Mississippi Flyway to a 30-day season with a daily bag limit of four birds. As part of the arrangement, states that choose 40-day seasons must restrict daily bag limits to three birds.

"This change allowed the Natural Resources Board to approve a season framework for Wisconsin that was much more in line with what hunters here wanted," said Jon Bergquist, wetland waterfowl ecologist for the Department of Natural Resources.

The board approved the following waterfowl seasons:

Northern Duck Zone - A straight 40-day season starting October 1 and running through November 9. Canvasbacks will be open throughout the season. The daily bag will be three birds to include not more than two mallards -- of which only one may be a hen -- one pintail, one black duck, one canvasback, and one redhead. The bag limit for wood ducks is two for the entire season.

Southern Duck Zone - A split season will open October 1

and run through October 9; it will then close for seven days and reopen on October 17 and run through November 16. The daily bag in the south zone will be three birds, to include not more than two mallards -- of which only one may be a hen -- one redhead, one pintail, one black duck and two wood ducks. The canvasback season in the south zone will begin on October 22 and continue through November 16, during which the daily bag may include one canvasback.

Shooting hours will remain the same as last year with a noon opening on the first day and half-hour before sunrise for the rest of the season.

Geese - The exterior zone goose seasons will open concurrent with the duck season on October 1 and last 70 days. If the quota is reached prior to the 70 days, the season will be closed by emergency order.

Canada goose seasons in the Horicon Zone will be divided into four periods beginning September 24 through September 30, and from noon October 1 through October 21; October 3 through November 4; October 17 through November 18; and November 5 through December 12. The Collins Zone time periods are: September 24 through October 4 (October 1 will be a noon opening); October 5 through October 16; October 17 through October 30; and

October 31 through November 18 and November 28 through December 2.

The deadline to apply for Canada goose permits in the Horicon and Collins zones was August 26. Exterior applications can be purchased anytime during the season. All applications are \$3.00.

A "Yes" vote on Initial Resolution Number III is in favor of Initial Resolution Number III and is a vote to approve the borrowing of \$80,000 by the School District of Kewaskum through the issuance of general obligation school building bonds for the purpose of paying the cost of football field/track improvements at Kewaskum High School consisting of adding lights at the football field.

A "No" vote on Initial Resolution Number III is opposed to Initial Resolution Number III set forth above and is a vote to deny the School District of Kewaskum the authority to borrow \$80,000 through the issuance of general obligation school building bonds for the purpose of paying the cost of football field/track improvements at Kewaskum High School consisting of adding lights at the football field.

POLLING PLACES AND HOURS

District electors must vote at the times and in the places at which they cast their ballots at regularly scheduled elections.

(c) The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by 2 inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking or punching his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

(d) (i) After an official paper ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed endorsements and inspectors' initials on the outside do show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the voting machine or booth and, where paper ballots are distributed to the electors, deposit his or her folded ballot in the ballot box or deliver it to an inspector for deposit in the box, and shall leave the polling place promptly.

(ii) If a punch card voting system is used, then after an official ballot is punched, it shall be inserted in the envelope provided so the punches do not show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the booth, deposit the envelope containing his or her ballot in the ballot box, or deliver the envelope to an inspector for deposit, and shall leave the polling place promptly.


(iii) If a mark sense voting system is used, then after an official ballot is marked it shall be inserted in the envelope provided so the marks do not show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the booth, insert the ballot in the voting device, discard the envelope, and shall leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty in reading, writing or understanding English, or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her vote. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.

NOTE: Electors residing in municipalities which require voter registration must be registered to vote in this referendum. You can register by contacting your municipal clerk.

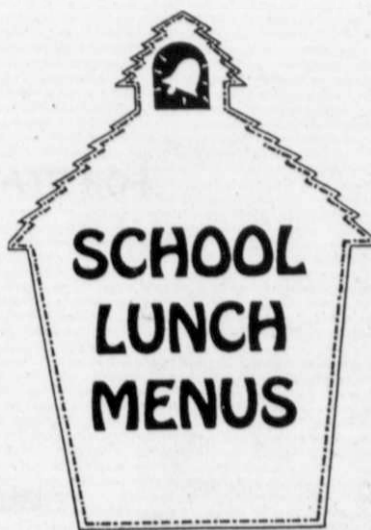

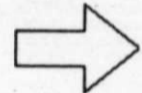

KHS Offense Not So Bright In 14-7 Loss to Horicon

KEWASKUM - Day football made its official debut here last Friday afternoon, and just like the old deteriorating lights that had to be taken down, Kewaskum's offense didn't sparkle too brightly.

Despite rolling up large chunks of yardage, the Indians couldn't convert when it needed to against Horicon in a non-conference affair. In addition, a pair of miscues by the KHS offense led to eight Marshmen points, giving the visitors a 14-7 victory.

The loss evened Kewaskum's record at 1-1 on the season.

KHS coach Clark Pearson was disappointed with the effort on the offensive side of the ball. Having prepared for Horicon's blitzing defense the entire week, the Indians didn't react quite as well as they did to Campbellsport's stunts the previous week.

"I think they rattled us, even though we had prepared for them," Pearson said of the different blitzes used by the Marshmen. "They did a lot of stunting, just like we expected. We just didn't have the patience that we should have."

Pearson stressed during the week that the Marshmen would make their share of big plays with their blitzing, and that the Indians would have to be patient in order to answer with big plays of their own.

As it turned out, Horicon made two big plays to the Indians' one.

Kewaskum's big play came in the second quarter, when wingback Peter Reis found open room on a sweep play, and rambled 36 yards to set up the Indians' only score of the game.

That came a couple of plays later, when Rich Farchione barreled into the end zone from three yards out. KHS then converted a rare point after, as Luke Chesak's boot went through the uprights, giving the Indians a 7-0 advantage.

"He kicks the ball pretty well," Pearson said of Chesak, who gives KHS their first legitimate kicking threat in the last four or five years. "We hope to be able to do that (kick PAT's) more this season."

Field goals may be a different story, though, as Pearson bypassed an early FG try in order to go for the first down in the opening quarter.

After driving to the Horicon seven yard-line, the Indians faced a fourth and four situation. Pearson called for an option play, but runningback Aaron Kurth stumbled briefly after getting the ball, and was stopped short of the first down.

"If he doesn't stumble there, he probably gets the first down," Pearson said of the play. "I guess it was just going to be one of those games."

Horicon finally got on the board in the third quarter, with

QB Pat Miller hitting paydirt after a six-yard scramble. The point after was unsuccessful, so the Indians still held a 7-6 lead heading into the fourth quarter.

But on the next possession, Indian QB Dan Survis was hit as he scrambled out of the pocket, causing him to fumble. Horicon tackle Jeremy Wald picked up the loose ball and rambled 15 yards into the end zone, putting the Marshmen in front for the first time, 12-7.

"He had a tough game," Pearson said of his senior signal-caller. "He made a couple of mistakes. He probably should have thrown that ball away."

After neither team was able to move the ball on the next few possessions, the Marshmen put KHS in a tough position, deep in their own territory, after a punt.

Two plays netted just a couple of yards, and left KHS with a third-and-long inside their own five. On the next play, Survis, attempting a rollout bootleg pass, was tackled in the end zone for a safety, making it 14-7 in favor of the Marshmen.

KHS did get one last try after holding Horicon on its next possession. The Indians got to mid-field after an interference penalty and a short pass play, but

time ran out, sending KHS to its first defeat of the year.

"They did a nice job defensively," Pearson said of the Marshmen, who "stuffed the middle well on us."

KHS' defense, meanwhile, "played a solid game," according to Pearson. "I thought our defense played well enough to win... allowed only the one score. We just can't give touchdowns away by fumbling the ball like that."

The Indians will try to get back on track this Friday at Chilton. The Tigers lost to Elkhart Lake 19-18 in overtime last week, a game that Pearson attended.

"They looked pretty decent," he said of the Tigers. "They like to throw the ball quite a bit, and they do it well. Their running game isn't as strong (as Campbellsport's and Horicon's)."

"Hopefully, we will be able to move the ball against them better than we did (against Horicon)," Pearson continued. "They should give us a pretty good test."
