# **Governor Approves US 45 Improvements in Kewaskum**

Gov. Tommy Thompson has approved a \$906,121 contract to improve 1.3 miles of US 45 between Washington County H and WIS 28 in Kewaskum.

Musson Bros., Inc., Rhinelander is to begin the project next spring. It will take three to four months to complete, weather permitting, said Ron Cech, design supervisor for the Wisconsin Department of Transportation.

One lane in both directions will be open to traffic throughout the project, Cech said.

Existing pavement has deteriorated since the last rehabilitation in 1978. The project will provide smoother driving, improve safety, widen part of the roadway and improve traffic flow through and on both sides of the intersection of US 45 and WIS 28 with new pavement markings included. The wider roadway will accommodate distress lanes, intersection capacity, and make the width consistent with that of the urban portion.

Traffic frequently is congested in the area and the accident rate is slightly higher than the statewide rate for comparable roadways. Cech noted that 73 accidents occurred in the area between 1990-92, including 15 at the US 45 intersection with County H at the south end of the project.

The urban portion of the roadway will be repaved with asphalt. The rural portion will be reconstructed and widened from the existing 30 feet to between 48 and 52 feet, consistent with the width of the urban portion. Curb and gutter and sidewalks will be added.

New curb and gutter with sidewalks also will be

installed, along with traffic signals, on the east side of the road at the H-45 intersection

The box culvert bridge over North Creek will be widened, consistent with width of the improved roadway. The bridge over Kewaskum Creek will not be improved.

The area carries an average daily volume of up to 13,600 vehicles, a number projected to reach up to 18,250 in 20 years. Volume includes about 9% truck traffic.

Federal funds are to pay 80% and Village of Kewaskum funds 20% of the pro-

# **School Board Approves Hiring Assistant Cook, Discontinues KES Breakfast Program**

Congestion in the high school lunch room, approval of preliminary plans for the middle school addition, and the problems with the Write To Read program were just some of the topics discussed at this month's school board meeting.

Food Service Supervisor Kathleen Robinson appeared before the board requesting additional aid in the high school cafeteria due to long lunch lines between the hours of 10:30 and 12:30. Lunch service has increased from 787 students in 1987 to 1,127 in 1994. She cited a student survey conducted asking, "if you don't buy hot lunch, what is your reason?" The overwhelming response was, "the line is too long. By the time I get my food, there's no time to eat.

Robinson stated that the students are "packed and congested like cattle," creating disciplinary problems. An assistant cook was approved by the board to speed up the serving line, control waste, and allow Robinson more time to devote to food purchasing, and to implement new computerized programs.

A discontinuation of the KES breakfast program was also approved due to lack of student involvement. Robinson stated that only twenty children participate in the program and the district is losing \$50 per week. The problem lies in the time factor, with students starting school at 9:05, and needing to eat before this.

Nomination papers for individuals running for school board seats will be available from December 1st through January 3rd, with the terms of Mr. Engelking, Mr. Schulte and Mrs. Sparks expiring.

Several parents voiced strong concern over the Write to Read Program, with board members Jeanne Goeden and Neal Weare also questioning the legitimacy of a computer program which uses nine misspelled words to teach children to read. These words, such as snake, smoke, and house, eliminate the silent "e." Weare pointed out that he was led to believe the new 2000 program would eliminate the problem, yet it still exists. "I think it's counterproductive," stated Richard Zarling, Administrative Representative for the SEC Steering Committee, and Gayle Van Ess questioned why she had to be there again, when the same nine words were the topic of a previous board meeting held last year.

lessons that used the misspelled words until IBM came and eliminated the problem. The request was approved by a 4-1 vote, with Beimborn and Sparks abstaining. President Schmitt's no vote reflected her opinion that the matter should be decided in the classroom by the teachers, not voted upon. A representative from

the architectural firm of Eppstein, Keller and Uhen of Milwaukee discussed preliminary plans for the proposed classroom addition at the Kewaskum Middle School, and presented concept drawings that define the scope of the project.

Jeanne Goeden asked if this will stay within the allocated budget amounts for the KMS addition, and was told they have remained within cost limits. Board member Engelking questioned the sturdiness of some of the moveable classroom partitions, and the architect indicated the sound barrier to be better than a regular classroom. The preliminary designs were approved, along with the contracts for architectural services as well as with Hunzinger Construction Company for the building project.

Mrs. Goeden reported on the elementary school curriculum, indicating the need to give parents directives on goals for each level of education, and review and update some of the books and materials used. The core subjects will receive a general review by the teachers, using small groups with the SEC process. There are still a few positions to be filled on this committee, and anyone interested should contact Connie Strand.

In other business, President Ruth Schmitt complimented Student Representative Andrea Bonlender on the success of the recent KHS musical, "Bye, Bye Birdie," and the payroll was approved in the amount of \$2,639,346.83.





# United Way: Kewaskum at 100%; County Close Behind

The Kewaskum portion of the United Way of Washington County drive has surpassed the 100% mark of its \$33,700 goal for 1994. As of November 17, \$33,707 has been collected in gifts and pledges.



# **Kewaskum School District Announces Policy for Emergency School Closings**


District Administrator Dr. David Heather has released for publication the current policy to be utilized when school is to be called off.


As in past years, radio stations WBKV (1470 AM and 92.5 FM West Bend), KFIZ (107 FM and 1450 AM Fond du Lac), WHBL (1330 AM and 97.7 FM Sheboygan), and WTMJ 620 AM Milwaukee) will be used to announce school closings because of bad weather or other emergency situations.

When school is being called off in the morning, the announcement will be on the air as early as possible. When school has begun, but weather is bad, or turns bad, it is advised that parents, guardians, and other responsible parties listen to one of the radio stations during the day for possible school closing announcements.

The district is VERY hesitant about closing school during the day because we are convinced that parents or others may not be home when children arrive. Sometimes, however, this becomes necessary to avoid excessive problems with getting students home on busses at a later time of the day. Every effort will be made to announce school closings during the day at least an hour before we dismiss the students.

It is important to remember that if school has been cancelled it means that all activities for that day and evening will be cancelled and rescheduled as necessary.

The total count includes 6,288 women and 3,988 men. Local students enrolled





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

The Kewaskum Community pool moved close to becoming a reality when the school board decided on final plans at the Nov. 10 meeting. The board members decided on the lowest cost plan. The \$325,000 olympic size pool will be 42 feet by 75 feet with 3,150 square feet of swimming and diving area. Included in the \$250,000 of funds that presently exist for building the pool, is \$75,000 raised by the Kiwanis Club and community donations. This leaves a balance of \$75,000 required to build the pool,

which the school board has decided to borrow. Electors will have 15 days to request a referendum on borrowing the \$75,000. A petition containing the signatures of 500 electors in the school district would be necessary to secure a referendum. The school board cannot legally call for a referendum for this type of funding.

### WINTER PARKING \*

The Winter Parking Restrictions and Snow Emergency Parking Restrictions go into effect on December 1, 1994.

Municipal Code Section 7.04(3) NIGHT PARKING RESTRIC-TIONS, reads as follows: Signs have been erected at or reasonably near the corporate limits as provided in Section 349.13, Wisconsin Statutes, no person excepting physicians or licensed emergency vehicles on emergency calls, shall park or stop any vehicle on any public street or highway within the village between the hours of 2:00 A.M. and 6:00 A.M. from December 1, to April 1, of each year; provided that, notwithstanding such restrictions vehicles may be parked a period of time not longer than three minutes for actually loading or unloading of passengers, and provided further that no other regulation restricting parking as to place, time, or manner violated thereby.

The fine for violating the ordinance is:

\$5.00 if paid within three (3) days of the issuance of the parking citation.

\$10.00 if paid after ten (10) days but before 28 days.

After 28 days, the amount is \$25.00 and a notice will be sent to the Motor Vehicle Department to suspend your vehicle registrations and refuse renewals until the citation is satisfied.

An important fact is the owner of the vehicle is responsible for the payment of the citation whether or not he was the operator.

Municipal Code Section 7.04 (4) REMOVAL OF ILLE-GALLY PARKED VEHICLES. This section covers the issuance of citations to and possible removal of such vehicles in violation of this ordinance. In addition to other penalties provided by Section 7.04 (6) of this code, the owner or operator of a vehicle so removed shall pay the cost of the towing and storage.

# **Tips for Selecting a Wild Game Processor**

MADISON -- Now that you've bagged your trophy buck, where do you go to process the venison? "Many hunters process their harvests themselves," says Neal Sanders, food bureau chief of compliance at the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection. "Other hunters have someone else process the venison and they have two choices."

One is to go to a licensed meat or retail food establishment that handles venison. Another option is to choose an unlicensed processor," Sanders says.

Sanders says licensed facilities must observe the following requirements:

\*Store venison separate from all other meat, poultry and food products.

\*Process venison at times different than other meat and poultry.

\*Identify and tag all venison products as "NOT FOR SALE."

\*Accept only skinned, wholesome, fresh-appearing venison in food-quality containers, such as clean food bags or plastic ice cream buckets. Dark-colored garbage bags may contain toxic resins and are not suitable for storing edible foods.

Because venison is a very lean meat, Sanders says venison sausage usually contains pork or beef meat and suet. Only licensed meat and retail food establishments may add these regulated products to venison. Unlicensed processors may only skin and cut venison. They may not add regulated meat products to venison.

To select a good unlicensed processor, Sanders suggests:

\* Know your processor. If you or your friends have had good experience with an unlicensed processor in the past, you may wish to continue doing business there.

\*Pay attention to how the carcass is handled when it is stored and later taken inside the processing area. Is pork, processed here?

\*What is the physical appearance of the staff? How is the staff dressed? A bloody apron goes with the meat processing business. However, do staff members smoke or chew tobacco in the processing area? Would you want this person handling other food you eat?

\*Notice the overall appearance of the processing area. Is it reasonably clean? Although meat processing areas can get quite messy, you should not see insects, rodents, birds, dogs, cats, or other animals. Are doors and windows closed and not blocked open? Is the air free of off-odors which might indicate poor storage or decay?

Sanders says, "Your answers to these questions will let you know if an unlicensed processor meets your standards or if you need to look for a processor who will provide the service you want. To have the finest quality venison products, you must start with a wholesome animal, add superior ingredients, and use processors who meet your personal quality standards. These are the things that help provide good eating for months to come.



# Muensterlaender Pointer 'One of His Kind'

#### By Sharon Callaway Roznik

When you ask Ned Sengpiel of Kewaskum about the best dog he's ever had, he'll answer emphaticatly, "my Muensterlaenders," a German breed that has won the hearts of hunting enthusiasts across the country.

Ned and his wife, June Knowlton, have a right to boast about their breed, since Fritz, their Small Muensterlaender Pointer, was the only one of his kind in the nation to qualify for a Prize 1 in the Utility Test under NAVHDA (The North American Versatile Hunting Dog Association).

His interest in the dog world began with Great Danes - raising and showing them for thirty years, and at one point, owring the top brindle bitch in the country. From there he moved to Rottweilers, then Bloodhounds. "They all became too popular," Ned explains. "The show ring was crowded and political... it was a matter of who you knew."

After his first wife passed away, he was out of dogs when a friend sent him a Chesapeake Bay Retriever, resparking his interest in the dog world. He also acquired an English Field Cocker which Sengpiel calls, "a marvelous dog, but not quite strong enough."

One day, while reading Gun Dog Magazine, he came across a little known breed that seemed to fit his description of the perfect hunting companion, the Small Muensterlaender Pointer. Rare in this country, Ned's search began to find a pair he could import to the states, which was difficult due to strict regulations and control of the breed in Germany.

A judge who happened to be the technical director for Stars and Stripes Magazine, was a friend of Neds, and was over in Germany at the time Ned was looking for the dogs. He agreed to pick out a pair with good quality and breeding potential for Sengpiel and ship them back to the states.

desire, and fidelity, the breed is quickly adaptable to varied terrain or quarry and his master's preferred methods. As one of the smallest gun dogs, the Muensterlaender is known to be tough, strongly built, and full of nobility. He also possesses a great love for water work along with a solid pointing capacity, meticulous tracking ability and great endurance - even under difficult climate conditions.

According to the Muensterlaender Club of North America, the breed descended from the German hunting dogs of the 13th and 14th centuries and became widespread in hunting circles around the 1860's, described as a "pointing spaniel." The breed neared extinction in the years that followed, with serious breeding starting up again in the 1890's. A standard was established in 1912.

An early breeder wrote that, "farmers kept their dogs around them in the house, which was not usual at that time. It may well have been because the farmers realized mands. "They're bilingual!", he declares. June points out that she has found them to have certain cat-like qualities, which seem to be confirmed as one of their younger dogs, Barney, races full speed toward her, stops short, stands and embraces her around the waist in a giant bear hug.

NAVHDA member Dennis Brath of Caden Kennels in Campbellsport handles Fritz at the trials and also owns one of his female pups. An intense training session took place in Texas last February, when the dog was shipped down there for two months of daily workouts.

There are strict requirements for breeding and registering these dogs. Hips must be certified, and both the sire and dam should have qualified in a NAVHDA Natural Ability Field Test or it's equivalent. A breed warden

is assigned in this country to oversee all potential matings.

True versatile tests cover every aspect of the dog's ability. The Natural Ability Field Test is a measure of the young dog's versatile instincts and the Utility Field Test measures a gun dog's usefulness to the on-foot hunter. The final step, the Invitational, measures the advanced skills of a fully trained versatile champion, in which the dog has to be invited to participate. Fritz received such an invitation, but was unable to attend at the time.

All dogs are rated against a standard, not other dogs. Some of the more common versatile breeds are the Brittany, German Shorthaired Pointer, German Wirehaired Pointer, Vizsla, Weimeraner, and Wirehaired Pointing Griffon.

To earn a Prize 1 in Utility

Testing, Fritz was required to search for, find and point game and retrieve shot birds to hand, remaining steady to wing, shot and fall; to track and retrieve a 100-200 yard drag; and perform a water sequence demonstrating obedience by heeling through a zig-zag course to the blind and then remaining by the blind while the handler leaves, goes out of sight, and fires his gun twice.

After the handler returns to the blind, the dog retrieves a thrown duck after remaining steady through a sequence of shots. The final test involves a blind search for a live duck across water with emerging vegetation. During the entire test the dog is scored on use of nose, desire to work, stamina, cooperation and general usefulness to the foot hunter.

Spaniel-like in appearance, the dog is chestnut or roan and white in color with areas of brown flecking, medium in size, well-proportioned, and is an elegant, strong animal with much self-confidence.

In Germany today, the Muensterlaender is ranked third in popularity, and their breed club has over 3,800 members. "There's about 150 of this type here in America," Ned adds. "Since 1969, only 15 have qualified in utility tests, two of which were from my kennels. In Germany, the tests are much, much harder using them for tracking deer and boar hunting. At one time, they were required to kill a fox to qualify."

Sengpiel's dogs were trained in the German language, so he had to retrain them to respond to his com-
