Charges Filed Against Former Middle School Teacher, Principal

A former Kewaskum teacher appeared before Circuit Judge Lawrence Waddick in Washington County Court last Thursday under felony charges alleging that while exercising temporary control of a child, the teacher caused mental harm to that child by conduct which demonstrated substantial disregard for the mental well being of the child.

The teacher, George Allmann, 49, of rural Kewaskum, has been working in the Kewaskum school system for the past 25 years, with the alleged incidents occuring in his classes between 1992 and 1994, according to an eight page criminal complaint.

Also present in court was David Jones, 68, of Arkansas, former Kewaskum Middle School principal, charged with being a person responsible for a child's welfare and while having knowledge that another person has caused mental harm to a child, failed to take action, and the failure to act facilitates the mental harm to the child.

The mental harm offense carries a maximum fine of \$10,000, or imprisonment, not to exceed ten years, or both. Jones and Allmann were also charged with being employed as a public employee and doing acts which they knew were forbidden by law to do in their official capacity. This offense carries a maximum penalty of \$10,000, or imprisonment not to exceed two years, or both.

According to the amended criminal complaint, Allmann, acting in the capacity of a Kewaskum Middle School teacher, had students look up the meaning of words in the dictionary and read them out loud that had a clearly sexual meaning, and that some female students received numerous handwritten notes, usually of a personal nature,

often embarrassing. Other incidents reported include the acting out of a game of charades that took place in his classroom, in which a student was instructed to act like a "tramp," and hike up her shorts, after which the students in the class laughed, whistled, and made other comments that caused the student extreme embarrassment.

Further statements allege that within the mentioned school year, Allmann regularly relayed jokes with clear sexual connotations to the seventh and eighth grade students, spoke of his sex life with his wife, and used derogatory statements about students in his class on vocabulary tests.

After speaking with her parents, one of the students, who was feeling extremely depressed, contacted Principal David Jones, along with her parents, not once, but on two or three occasions, and reportedly, nothing was done.

Further on in the complaint, it states that another student reported Allmann's activities to a female teacher, who in turn reported it to

The Kewaskum Village Board opened business for the New Year at Monday evening's meeting, taking up where the old year left off.

Jones. Jones allegedly approached the girl, and accused her, as well as other students of lying, and collaborating in their reports on Allmann's activities.

There were four female students named in the complaint, one of which has been hospitalized twice, caused by physical illnesses due to stress, as well as substantial weight loss. It was in July of 1994, when her parents approached by law enforcement officials regarding the defendant Allmann's alleged behavior.

Allmann was suspended from his teaching position on December 13, 1993, and his contract was not renewed. In turn, he challenged the Kewaskum School Board with violations of the state's Open Meeting Law, but the charges were dismissed, by Judge James Schwalbach just last week.

Attorney for the defendant, Robert Friebert, called the charges in court Thursday, exotic, and did not know of any other case in the state based on these charges. He asked that the matter be adjourned until motions could be heard and decided.

He further stated that the court doesn't have to find probable cause since the charges do not name a victim. Jones attorney also stated that it wasn't necessary to find probable cause at this time, since they aren't in custody.

The judge left the courtroom to review Frieberts' twelve motions, and the request that the charges be dropped, but the judge took no action on the motions.

Both men were released on \$5,000 personal recognizance bonds, and a January 20th hearing was set for 3 p.m. to hear further motions, documents, or arguments. Booking will be required for both defendants.

New Mandatory Recycling Laws Affect Village Residents

Questions have been raised regarding the new mandatory recycling laws that have taken affect throughout the state since January 1st. Procedures for preparing the recycling for

In the Village of Kewaskum, glass, plastics, newspapers, office papers, metal, magazines, and corrugated cardboard must be recycled and placed at the curb by 7 a.m. on Wednesdays.

GLASS - Remove lids, rings and rinse clean. Bottles and jars that are clear or colored will be accepted, not acceptable are windows, ceramics, mirrors, light bulbs and tubes, Pyrex dishes, drinking glasses, chemical bottles, laboratory glass and medical containers. Attempt to remove all labels and place in green recycling bin. bottles marked with #1 or #2 on the bottom of the container. These must also be rinsed. Remove and discard lids, labels and any metal handles and crush the bottles flat. Not be be included are plastic oil bottles, styrofoam and plastic cups, film, hard plastic (toys, pails, etc.), medicine bottles or syringes. Place recyclable plastic in green recycling bin. Effective January 1, 1996, containers labeled #3, #4, #5, #6 and #& and foam polystyrene packaging will be collected.

ALUMINUM, TIN AND STEEL CANS - Rinse cans and remove labels. Flattening is optional. These are generally soda and food cans. No foil or bottle caps, cardboard sided juice cans, aerosol or paint cans. Place ALL the above mentioned items (cans, plastic and glass) in the same green recycling bin. The recycled materials are taken to an MRF (materials recovery facility) where they will be separated on conveyor belts.

NEWSPAPERS AND MAGAZINES - Newspapers and magazines must be secured in separate bundles, tied with twine in both directions, no higher than eight inches. There is no longer the need to separate glossy sections from the newspaper. There is no objection to securing the papers with masking tape or rubber bands as long as the stacks are very

secure.

OFFICE PAPER - The new law requires all office papers and junk mail be recycled. This can be done through shredding, and placing in a clear or blue transparent plastic bag and bundled, or placed in a brown grocery type bag, and secured with twine or tape. No meat wrappers, or any waxed paper (example inside liner of cereal boxes). The paper can be an assortment of different sizes.

CORRUGATED CARD-**BOARD** - Cardboard, such as boxes, should be flattened, cut into pieces no larger than 24 x 24 inches, and bundled securely. This does not include "mush" cardboard such as that used to make cereal and Kleenex boxes.

All the recycled items join a list of banned materials that now includes major appliances, used motor oil, vehicle batteries and yard waste. Local governments with effective programs are eligible for state recycling grants to help offset some recycling program costs and may dispose of garbage in Wisconsin landfills and incinerators.

ing for the light. The light was requested to provide a lighted area for snowmobilers to park while visiting Kewaskum restaurants and businesses during the evening hours.

The Administrator reported on the total building permits for 1994 as 16 single family homes, three duplexes, one eight-unit multi-family and one commercial (Dairy Queen), totaling 30 units.

Ballot positions were drawn for the upcoming Spring Election with candidates Gary Gavin drawing first position, Harry Roecker drawing second and David Goeden drawing third. President Robert Wagner, running unopposed, will be at the top of the ballot.

Under Committee Reports, Chairman of Parks and Recreation Trustee Charles Waala, asked Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles if the ice skating rink in River Hill Park was or would be flooded again for ice skating this year.

Gilles replied that with the unusually warm weather we have had thus far this winter, it was not feasible to use up the man hours to flood the rink anymore this year.

It was generally agreed that most ice skating is prevalent before the holidays and now with even more warm weather forecast, it was probably too late for this year. It was noted however, that the river was available for ice skating, providing the proper cold weather comes about, and there was a light on there for evening skating.

Chairman of the Library Board Trustee Charles Waala reported that 1994 showed "this is the most the library has ever had in circulation." Waala also stated 1994 figures show the Kewaskum Library has 5% of all Washington County circulation.

Under Public Safety, Trustee John Borland asked Trustee Robert Beisbier if the given by the board for the engineers to proceed with this future project.

It was also noted the stop and go lights at Highway 45 and H are scheduled to go in early this spring.

The public is invited and Sensenbrenner encourages area residents to attend. No appointments are necessary, and everyone will be seen on a first come, first served basis as time permits.

Applications for Bear Hunting Due January 13

MADISON -- The deadline to apply for a permit for Wisconsin's 1995 black bear hunting season is Friday, January 13.

Last year, more than 25,000 people applied for 2,175 harvest permits. There are 2,710 harvest permits available for the 1995 season through a continuous preference system meaning each year a person applies for a permit and does not receive one, that person has a greater preference for receiving a permit for the next season.

Interest in bear hunting has grown dramatically in recent years, according to Kevin Wallenfang, Department of Natural Resources wildlife biologist. As a result, "hunters can expect to wait up to eight or more years before receiving a harvest permit," Wallenfang said.

Preliminary numbers indicate that Wisconsin hunters harvested more than 1,275 bears during the 1994 season. "Wisconsin's bear population is doing very well," says Wallenfang. "Populations in the north are stable or increasing, and we are seeing an increase in bear numbers in central Wisconsin as well."

Bears are found primarily in the northern one-third of the state, with an estimated population of about 7,200 animals. This northern bear range is broken into three bear management zones which include Subzone A1, and zones A and B. The remainder of the state is designated as Zone C.

Last year, Zone A, which lies in the northwest, was split to include new Subzone A1 for the 1994 season because bear hunting pressure in the Park Falls area was high. Hunting pressure in the far northwest (Subzone A1) was low and bear in that area were causing problems with homeowners and agricultural crops.

In an effort to deal with both situations, the DNR worked with several local governments and bear hunting organizations throughout the northwest to agree on a temporary management subzone in an effort to shift hunting pressure to lightly hunted areas to help alleviate nuisance and damage complaints. Wallenfang says this zone split has worked considerably well, as the bear harvest in Subzone A1 increased by as much as 30% in some counties.

Bear hunting rules remain unchanged in 1995, so hunters who are successful in receiving a harvest permit for Subzone A1 will be required to hunt only in A1 while those who receive a permit to hunt in Zone A may hunt in both A and A1. Those who applied for a harvest permit last year were mailed a renewal application in mid-December. New applicants can receive the proper application forms at any DNR area or District office.

Northern Pike Size, Bag Limit Changes

Beginning January 1, 1995, the minimum length limit for northern pike is now 26 inches and the daily bag limit is now two in 31 counties in southern Wisconsin. This size and bag limit applies to waters in Fond du Lac County, except for Lake Winnebago, where there is no size limit and the daily bag is five northern pike.

As you move around the state several other waters statewide now have new size and bag limits, so be sure to check the special regulations listed by county, for more details. The 1995 fishing regulation pamphlet is now available at DNR offices and should be available at all licensed vendors shortly.

The use of the Swedish hook for fishing is still allowed, at this time, but consider using a different hook to minimize harm to fish that will have to be released because of the new size limits
