On Friday, February 10, the Kewaskum Mall was sold to Tom and Debbie Timblin of Kewaskum. The Timblins purchased the property from Keventer Investments of Madison.

The 26,000 square foot mall presently includes six tenants: SENTRY Food Store, Kewaskum Pharmacy, Kettle Moraine Agency, Subway, Inc., Video Square and Howard Schneider Investments. The acquisition was financed by Bank Wisconsin of Kewaskum.

As a point of interest, when the mall was built in 1979, the 3.2 acre parcel was purchased from Henry and Carole Timblin, Tom's parents.

The Timblins plan on updating the deferred maintenance and possibly building an addition to the mall in the future.

Tom and Debbie have also purchased the old brick duplex on the corner of the street from the mall that was the original homestead for the farm located on that acreage.

They plan to renovate the 100-year-old house and convert it into their office and maintenance headquarters. However, they will be living there until their new home is constructed.

The Timblins also own the adjoining 127-unit Rustic

Timbers apartment and townhouse complex and the 32-unit Monterey apartments in Milwaukee.

Tom and Debbie, along with their five children, Shaun, Courtney, Josh, Bryanne and Caleb are looking forward to their new challenge in serving the Kewaskum community.

Eckl's Main Street Inn to Move

Greg and Karen Eckl are getting ready for a big move these days, as Eckl's Main Street Inn gets a new home.

The couple recently signed a lease with Luann and Russ Heberer and will be moving their popular restaurant into the old Hamburger Haus II on Fond du Lac Avenue.

"We're basically maxed out here," explains Greg. "Without a big enough kitchen to work in, and the need to bring in more equipment... there just isn't the space."

The future move will increase their capacity from 44 to 72, and will offer a large parking area for their customers. The interior will be totally remodeled, with knotty pine ceiling and walls, new carpeting, booths, and a counter with stools. The kitchen, which is

now exposed with windows, will be closed off from the restaurant.

"This is not another hamburger joint," Eckl stresses. "We will stay a family style restaurant, with the same quality menu. We're taking Eckl's Main Street Inn, which we think is successful, and moving it down the road." The drive-thru window and car hop stations will be removed, enlarging the parking area. Completion of the project is hoped for sometime in May.

Recreating the same Eckl's atmosphere is foremost on the couple's list of plans and Greg adds, "We really will miss this place. A lot of sweat went into its existence." But the dire need for space is evident as the business continues to draw a large crowd of local people and tourists.

Since their opening September 11, 1990, Karen and Greg have adapted their menu to the customers liking, specializing in authentic cuisine and a variety of homemade foods, to dine in or carry out. Thirty-two different sandwiches are available, from hot subs to Italian meatball or pepperoni, grilled chicken, steak, and open face chickens. Their diners include chicken, shrimp, ribs, lasagna, spaghetti and a Friday night fish fry, along with a touch of Mexican cuisine. And don't forget their homemade pizzas with lots of fresh toppings.

With access to Highway 45, the new location will boost exposure, and Greg has lots of ideas for the old A & W dome on the roof. "At first I thought of tearing it down, but it might be a great place for some neon signs saying 'pizza' or 'Mexican,' something that advertises our business. One of the drawbacks here is no one knew we were a restaurant, they think it's a bar because the sign just says, Eckl's Main Street Inn."

The new restaurant will be open seven days a week, serving breakfast, lunch and dinner. The expansion will include the need to hire additional employees, with future plans to try a Saturday night pizza delivery if it proves popular.

After 27 years and ten months of service to the Village of Kewaskum, Gregor Rohlinger retired as a member of the village crew.

He served in the army from 1953-1955, and was hired by Armin Oppermann on February 16, 1967, after leaving the Gehl Company in West Bend, where he suffered the loss of a finger. Gregor, known to many as "Crickets," enjoyed the outdoors, and when asked to give his job description, answers, "you name it, I did it!"

One of his main tasks was running the front end loader. Once, when he was excavating a large hole where Union Maid Cheese now stands, the loader hit a thick branch, knocking it down straight into the hole. The incident left him pretty shook up, but the big boss at the time, Augie Bilgo, made him get right back on and drive it out.

"Years ago, we did alot more helping people out than we were allowed to do today," he recalls, "like cleaning out backed-up sewers in people's basements."

The least favorite job as a village employee goes without saying -- water main breaks. Regardless of below freezing temperatures, Crickets was out there with the rest of the village crew, working down in the hole until it was fixed. "Toward

the end, I let the younger guys go down there, the sides of the hole can cave in in a hurry."

Rohlinger and his wife, Beverly, have five children - Carol, Tom, Kathy, Timmy and Kelly. Beverly has worked for Washington County for the past 25 years, and is still going strong. She is employed with the Comprehensive Community Services Agency Mental Health Center, through St. Joseph's Community Hospital.

On December 14, 1994, the Village of Kewaskum issued a proclamation honoring Gregor for his years of service. Now he plans on enjoying his retirement, getting in some golf, and bowling. The couple will be traveling to Reno in March to bowl in a national tournament.

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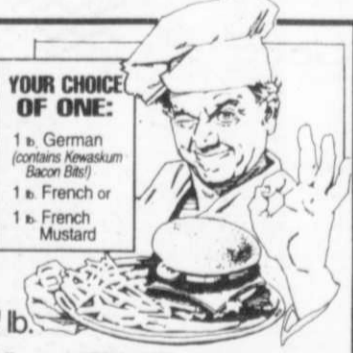
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DOUGHNUT DOLLAR DEAL

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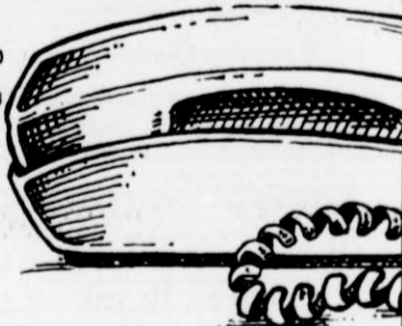
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25 Years Ago

Louis Bunkelman, an ardent fox hunter, shot two more foxes in this vicinity the past two weeks, making a total of three for the season.

Allen Tessar, 17, and David Bartelt, 18, have enlisted for service in the U.S. Navy and left for Great Lakes, IL to begin training.

In a letter to his parents, Pfc. Carl Mayer of the Infantry, wrote that he and a few other soldiers picked up a number of German prisoners in France on two occasions. Carl's knowledge of German aided in the capture of the Nazis just like it used to be done in the old "cops and robbers" days back home. Pfc. Mayer wrote that he gets to see S/Sgt. Wally Werner quite often. Carl adds that the French girls are a lot prettier than the English and they placed flowers around their necks when they passed through towns and gave them cognac and wine.

David Gosa Takes 3rd and 4th at Badger State Winter Games

David Gosa finished 3rd and 4th at the 7th Annual Badger State Winter Games held February 4th and 5th at Nine Mile Forest near Wausau, Wisconsin.

On Saturday, David, competed with 45 other 16-18 age group male skiers in the 6 K freestyle cross country ski race. 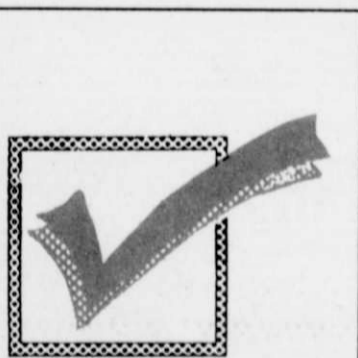
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KES Second Graders 'Digging for Dinosaurs'

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his or her name and address before being permitted to vote. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth or machine and cast his or her ballot except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

At the Spring primary election, where lever machines are used, depress the lever or button at the right of the candidate's name. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall write in the name of the candidate of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

Where a marksense system is used, the elector shall fill in the oval next to the candidate's name of his or her choice for each office for whom he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall write in the name of the candidate of his or her choice in the space provided and fill in the oval on the write-in line.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If an elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his or her ballot card may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After an official marksense ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the ballot sleeve provided so the marks do not show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the voting booth, insert the ballot into the voting device, and promptly leave the polling place.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.

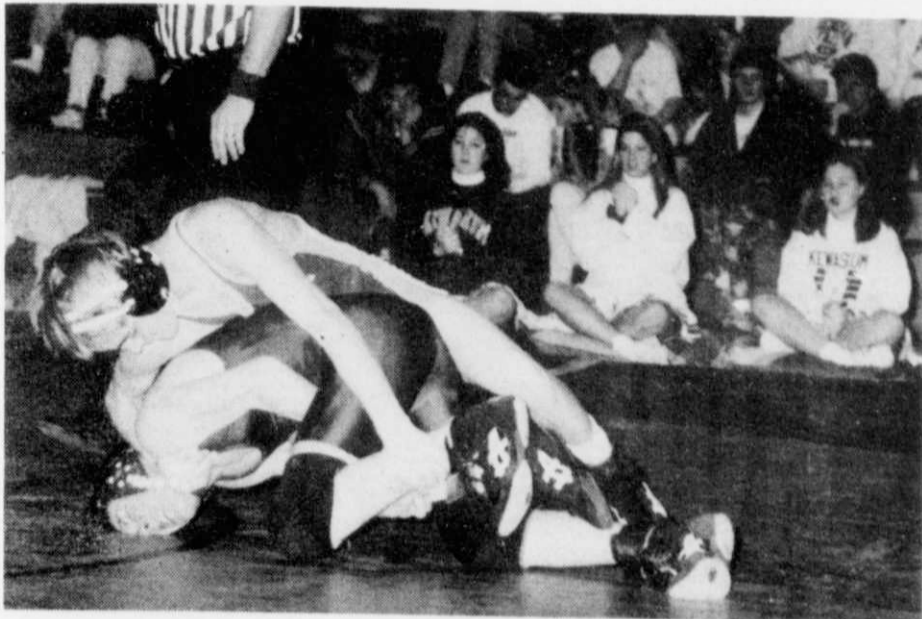

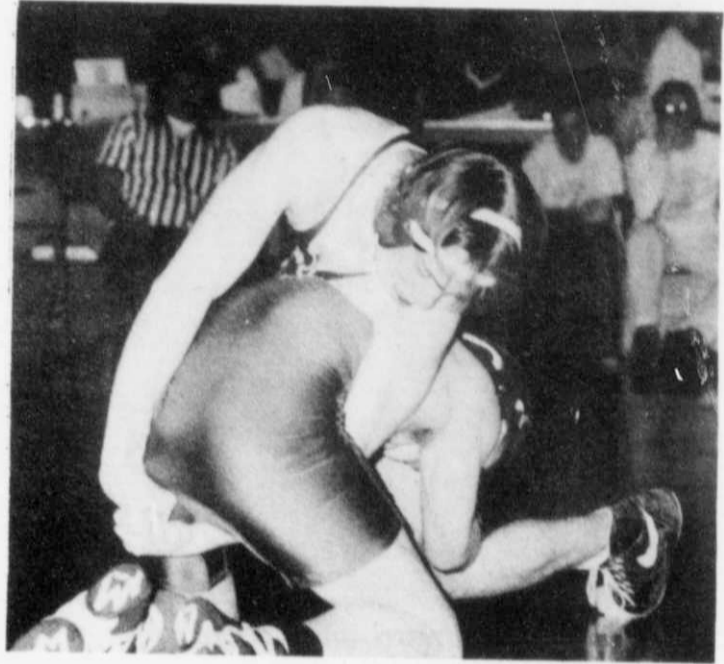
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THULL WINS CHAMPIONSHIP! Indians Place Second at Mat Regional

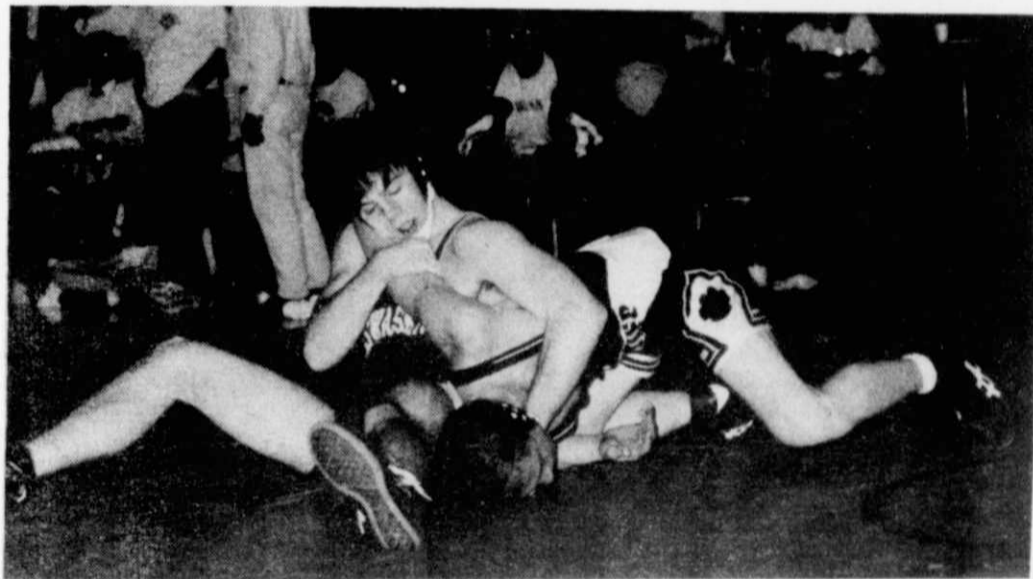

CAMPBELLSPORT - There were several disappointments for Kewaskum wrestling coach John Nell at the WIAA Regional held here, last Saturday. There was a major highlight, however.

That came at 125 pounds, where Indian senior Jake Thull survived one of the tougher weight classes, and took home the championship. In addition, four other KHS wrestlers finished second in the meet, allowing them to qualify for the Sectional competition on Saturday in Slinger.

As a team, however, the Indians were unable to duplicate their performance of a year ago, when they won the Slinger Regional, and advanced to the WIAA Team Tournament for the first time.

This year, the Indians couldn't overtake host Campbellsport, which accumulated 181.5 points on its way to the Regional title. The Indians were a distant second with 144 points.

The Indians' inability to get all of their wrestlers

through the first round was a major reason for the second-place finish. Still, Nell was pleased with the team's performance.

"Overall, we did pretty well," Nell said. "I thought we could have snuck out a few more victories, and that would have helped our team score a little more."

Thull didn't need much help during the meet. He rolled over a foe from Chilton in the semifinals, and then outscored Campbellsport's Chris Sabish, 19-10 in the finals.

"It was a real tough weight class," Nell said of Thull's draw. "He came out of it very nicely."

Not faring quite as well was 112-pounder Joel Dziedzic. A state qualifier from a year ago, Dziedzic lost in the finals to his nemesis from Campbellsport, Clint Dexter. Dziedzic was penalized for stalling during the bout, and eventually lost a 6-2 decision.

It wasn't the first time that Dziedzic has met Dexter. In the season-opening meet, Dziedzic was injured in his

match against the Cougar, and missed several weeks due to that injury. Dziedzic enacted some revenge on Dexter, beating him in the Oshkosh Tournament final, but he couldn't outlast Dexter on his home mat Saturday.

"There were a couple of bad points," Nell said, noting that he didn't agree with the stalling penalties. "But Joel could have helped himself out a little more. I figure he's going to see him again next week at Sectionals."

Dziedzic was forced into a wrestleback, with the winner of that match with Chilton's Keenan Anhalt advancing to the Sectionals. Dziedzic easily beat Anhalt, 5-0.

Tyler Dieringer also had to win a wrestleback in order to advance. After falling to Chilton's Nick Daul, 12-6 in the finals, Dieringer had to face Kiel's Clint Henschel, with the loser facing the end of his season. Dieringer prevailed, however, pinning Henschel in 1:00.

Nell praised Dieringer's determination, noting that the

senior 130-pounder suffered a separated shoulder in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference meet. "It was difficult for him," Nell said, noting that he actually led Daul 3-0 heading into the third period of their match. "There were points flying all over the place" in that period.

Peter Reis advanced in the 152-pound bracket, as he took second. Reis beat Random Lake's Paul Sargent in 2:54 to reach the finals where he was pitted against New Holstein's Jesse Buechel. Buechel pinned Reis in 5:20, but the second place finish earned Reis another week of work. "He had a good tournament," Nell said.

The other lone KHS wrestler to qualify, was 189-pound Richard Wulff, who also finished second. Wulff pinned Random Lake's Chad Keller in 3:59 in the semifinals sending him against Campbellsport's Chad Summerfel in the finals. Wulff dropped a 12-3 decision, but Nell said that Wulff still did

well.

"That bracket was packed with some really good kids," Nell said, noting Wulff held his own.

Two KHS grapplers lost wrestleback matches that would have advanced them to Sectionals had they won them. Matt Heather, at 160 pounds, lost to Sheboygan Falls' Mark Zimbal, 10-8, in his match, while 275-pounder Tim Gundrum was pinned by Falls' Chris Kastrell in 5:19 in his match.

Gundrum's loss was made more difficult by the fact that he was leading New Holstein's Randy Lefebre 7-2 in their title match, before Lefebre came back to pin Gundrum in 3:34.

Still, Nell put an optimistic spin on the tournament.

"Finishing second in this regional was pretty good, because it was a tough regional," he said. "I'd say that over half of the kids going to state (in the Slinger Sectional) will be from this Regional."

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Snowboarding at Sunburst

It's not as easy as it looks, but participants in this year's snowboard competition at Sunburst Ski Hill proved that even the cold couldn't keep them from demonstrating their hard earned talents.

Girls and boys from West Bend, Kewaskum, Mayville and the surrounding communities braved the slopes on Sunday for a chance to win a new snowboard, donated by Confusion in West Bend, a shop owned and operated by 18 year old Dominick Gehring. Gehring opened the skateboard/snowboard supply business when he was only 17, and it's been going strong ever since.

Snowboarding has gained in popularity over the past several years, becoming the most popular snow sport among young people. "By the year 2010, snowboarding is predicted to surpass skiing," comments Kim Engel, owner of the skill hill along with her husband Jim.

"The perception of the sport is that it looks easy," she explains, "but imagine your two feet locked onto a single board. Just try maneuvering it. It is initially more difficult to get the hang of at first, if you compare it to skiing. It usually takes about four days of intensive training to learn how to use the board, but once you catch on it is easier than skiing in the long run.

Costs are also much more affordable for kids or adults interested in a winter sport - the boards lock onto any kind of boot or shoes, and casual attire is the fashion on the snowboard slopes, nix on sporty racing pants and expensive ski ensembles. No one's trying to impress anyone here, except with their snowboard tricks. Kim works with many of these teenagers on a daily basis, and comments on their "giant" pants and St. Vinney outfits. "These are great kids. They're polite and easy to get along with. Contrary to what a lot of people believe, most of

them are the straight A students, a lot of them are vegetarians...they care about saving the environment. They enjoy the novelty of looking and dressing different."

The snowboarders competed in three separate events throughout the day. The first, slope style, offered a course through the snowboard park to do whatever freestyle moves the person chose to exhibit. The slalom competition was a timed, straight shot down the course, and the last category - the half pipe - involved maneuvering up and down the sides of a valley formed in the snow, with a chance to show off some fancy flips and turns.

try, and also show the kids a great way to get some exercise during the winter season. Come out and give it a try!

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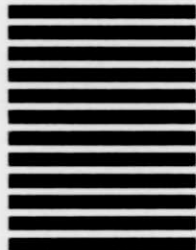


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
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
