Board Discusses Issues

The second half of last Monday evening's Village Board agenda resolved some issues, but left most open for future discussion.

The first item addressed under Committee Reports was an electronic scoreboard, which possibly might be located near the southwest diamond at Kiwanis Park. Trustee Charles Waala, Chairman of the Parks and Recreation Committee, stated Ron Theusch of the Kewaskum Athletic Club had been in contact with a representative of the Coca Cola Company for sponsorship of the scoreboard.

Coca Cola would underwrite the cost of the electronic scoreboard under the condition they would be allowed to place two vending machines in the park that they would fill and monitor and the Village would receive 20% of the profits. They would also like Coke products sold at all the concession stands in the park.

During a Committee meeting prior to the regular meeting, Waala directed Ron Theusch to go back to Coke with a counter proposal indicating the Village would allow the two vending machines and Coke could be sold at the Athletic Club's concession stand. Coke would also be allowed to place their sign over the Pepsi sign on another diamond.

Pepsi's proposal would only allow for half of the cost of the scoreboard. Both proposals would be for five year terms. The Committee will now wait to hear what Coca Cola ultimately decides.

Also under Parks and Recreation, discussion was held regarding financial assistance on the proposed River Hill Park volleyball courts. Members of the Fire Department who are constructing the courts, asked if the Village would pick up the cost of the transportation of the sand. The sand for the courts has been donated. The board voted unanimously to pay \$1,000 towards the hauling of the sand so the volleyball courts could get underway

The board also voted unanimously on the hiring of the summer part-time employees for Kiwanis Park.

Beginning the New Busi-

ness segment of the agenda, the board voted to accept the audit report for the year ending December 31, 1994 and agreed on the renewal of the three year contract with Conley McDonald for accounting/auditing services.

The Board voted six to one, with David Goeden voting no, on the Resolution Discontinuing and Vacating a portion of Highland Avenue as heard earlier at a Public Hearing.

Review and discussion was held on the Certified Survey Map of the R.T.K.M. LLC. planned unit development reflecting a change plus the Conditional Use Permit and Developers Agreement of the same.

Attorney Roger McKenna. speaking on behalf of the developers, stated, "If you read this thing thoroughly, everything has to be done before an occupancy permit can be issued. This is not a 32 unit apartment building that's being built. It's three buildings in three phases. I think it's highly unreasonable that they have to do everything before they can get an occupancy permit. I would think that there could be some way you could work something out that if they complete the building of phase one, so they can get the occupancy permit. They may not build more than one building this year. We realize we have to have the sewer and water and the road and some of these things, but to have all the buffers in and all the stop signs in and things of that nature before they can get an occupancy permit, I think is highly unreasonable."

Trustee Robert Beisbier stated, "I don't think we were told that."

Village Administrator Daniel Schmidt added, "We were unaware that it was going to be phased, one building at a time." The rest of the board was in agreement that they were not aware that the development was being constructed in phases.

Schmidt said, "There is a possibility that we can work it out," with Village President Robert Wagner adding his agreement.

Discussion followed on the issues and changes that needed to be addressed, and it was then recommended sent back to the Plan Commission.

A number of activities are planned to inform all citizens of the dangers involved -- and safety precautions necessary -- in the event of a tornado.

On Thursday, April 27, a simulated tornado drill will be conducted statewide. Schools, office buildings, industries, nursing homes and hospitals are encouraged to take part.

Time after time, the biggest tragedies occur in

areas where tornados have never been reported and have no precedent in most people's memories. The fact is that every county in Wisconsin has experienced at least one tornado. Tornado awareness is everyone's business.

Martins Share Their Memories



Dorothy and Bill Martin

Bill and Dorothy Martin have been members of this community for a good many years, in fact, they met in Kewaskum where Bill was born and raised.

He was born in 1913, the son of William and Anna (Sukawaty), and remembers his grandfather had a farm in the Town of Wayne. His father was a carpenter, but also ran a coal-fired steam thrashing rig, traveling from farm to farm when the season called for it. He later sold the thrasher, and worked as a night man in Rosenheimer's Malt House, keeping the big boilers running.

The Malt House was seven stories high, with openings in the floor. The barley was stored in big drums and steeped in water. Later it was heated to the point where it would make the barley "grow," after which it was laid out upon the floors, and the rising heat would dry the barley. His father enjoyed working to keep the big boilers stoked with coal.

Bill attended school in Kewaskum, and by 1933, was employed as a Shell Oil wholesaler, delivering Petroleum products to service stations and farmers in the area for 17 years.

He recalls one of the funniest moments of his childhood happened at the old swimming hole. "As you go up the river behind McElhatton's house, the water winds around a big bend, and there's a deep hole. I used to swim there with a group of boys, and if you wore a bathing suit, you were considered a sissy. One hot day we were all cooling off in the river when suddenly a Sunday School teacher came by, parading a group of young girls behind her, on some kind of outing. We all dove into the river and ducked under the water, while the teacher hurried her class along, trying to shield their eyes."

Originally from Tomah, Dorothy's Uncle Roman Smith from Kewaskum came up and got her one day, declaring the Republican House was in need of a good waitress. He was employed as a bartender there. "He came up and got me and that was that," Dorothy remarks, pointing out that in 1939 a job was a job, and you didn't turn one down.

Although she was officially hired on as a waitress for the hotel, the job description included doing all the laundry, cleaning and cooking. People would travel all the way up from Chicago for their Sunday, family-style chicken dinner... all you could eat for one dollar.

She enjoyed helping with the wedding cakes, which were baked in the shape of hearts, sprinkled with coconut, and tinted to match the color of the bridesmaids' dresses. There was only one choice on the menu each day - whatever the cooks decided to serve. The hotel was kept busy with telephone and electric crews working in the village, and there were always three or four single men who had permanent rooms upstairs.

Food was stored in the ice house out back, and was kept cool within the 12 inch walls where the ice was packed in sawdust. They had a small refrigerator in the hotel, and one day Dorothy was asked to clean it out (meaning use up all the food so it wouldn't go to waste). "I threw together everything I could find: leftover vegetables, cut up beets, fried eggs, all topped with Mrs. Schulz's homemade sauce. Six ladies came in for lunch and loved the salad so much they asked for the recipe, but how could I give it to them!!"

At first, she couldn't bring herself to pick up the tips left on the tables. "I felt like it was stealing," she explains, and refused to take it. But living at the hotel she caught on fast, and soon learned that it was money

she'd earned. The rooms at the hotel shared a bath, yet each room contained a dry sink with a chamber pot inside for those middle of the night callings.

One of Dorothy's cousins was a good friend of Bills, and they met during a trip to the movie house, and have been together ever since. On February 1, 1951, the position of clerk/treasurer became a full-time, appointed position (previously it had been a part-time, elected office) and Bill, who was always a whiz at math and figures, applied for the job and was hired. It was a title he held in Kewaskum for 32 years, as he watched the town grow and change.

The old Village Hall (where the Toning Shoppe is now located) housed a library upstairs, and the fire station. An old shed to the east of the building was turned into a garage where the fire equipment was stored until they had room in the building. But when Bill started the job, the Village Hall hadn't been completed yet, so he received his training in Augie Koch's general store, who was the interim clerk until Bill was appointed. "I learned the job in-between customers," Martin recalls.

He kept records for the water and sewer department, issued licenses, tax and water bills, and maintained the general records, which was all done by hand in those days before computers. At that time, the population of the village was about 1,000 people.

"It was difficult at times, dealing with the public," Bill states, "and sometimes I had to tell off my best friends. But afterwards, we were both much better off." He seemed to collect a following of older women, who had created a "fan club" revolving around him. The ladies wanted him to take care of all their bills, and would stop by his house on weekends to do business. One of them, who was considered a bit of a crab, insisted Bill come over one day and collect her tax money. He told her that it wasn't possible since he didn't have the receipt book with him, but she was adamant, explaining how she'd saved \$20 a week for an entire year and didn't want the money laying around the house!

Telephone calls were common at all hours of the day and night, until he was allowed some help later on, and hired a part-time office girl, which turned into a fulltime position. "Back then the village was afraid to spend a penny," he declares. Gerry Burkhardt was his secretary for nine years, until he retired. She left with him, maintaining that she couldn't work for anyone else. Before that Norma Kluever served as secretary for the clerk.

Bill's office was a meet-

ing place of the minds, and often men would come in just to visit and pass the time. He used to arrive at his office by eight, and there'd be Joe Eberle (the famous beagle man) waiting at the door for him. Charlie Miller was the village president at that time.

Meanwhile, Dorothy was working for the Lay Lumber Company, where she remained as their bookkeeper for 20 years. She also worked for accountants in West Bend, and for Badger Packaging.

When she quit the numbers business, she decided to branch out on her own, starting a custom sewing service designing wedding and bridesmaid dresses. She loves to sew, and continues to make clothes for herself and Bill, including wool coats and matching London Fog raincoats and hats.

The couple remembers the village moving at a much more leisurely pace when they were young. The water came from wells, and it wasn't until 1924 that the water department was established, with the sewage treatment plant following in 1928. "The utilities departments continued to grow until they're what you see today," Martin observes. When he retired, Dan Schmidt took over the position Bill served in for over three decades.

Bill is also remembered for his 41 years of service with the Kewaskum Fire Department, at one time acting as assistant chief. He and John Stellflug were the first two members to have a second phone line installed in their homes for emergency calls. Accompanying the emergency phone, was a sort of dog bell hooked into the home, that would activate the fire alarm located in the fire house. "We always had to have a babysitter for the phone if we went away," Dorothy recalls.

Miller's Funeral Home, then operated by Pat Miller, ran an ambulance service, using a remodeled hearse. When he was ready to buy a new vehicle, he didn't want to remodel it into an emergency coach, so he approached the fire department and said he'd donate the old one to them, if they took over the job, which they did. Dorothy and Bill were both trained in First Aid and Civil Defense, learning knots and bandages when the classes were first offered in the village.

They enjoyed attending at least two conventions a year, with Bill serving on statewide committees, one of which he worked on to reform election laws. State Senator William Steiger came to Kewaskum to have lunch with the Martins years ago.

The Martins have a past deeply entwined in the development of the community, especially its governmental operations, and look forward to the celebration planned for

Kewaskum's Centennial.

Linus retired from Gehl Co. in 1986, after 36 years of service. Florence worked for St. Matthew's hot lunch program for 18 years, before retiring.




achievement. Christine will be attending the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire with dreams of majoring in nursing. She has applied for a Forensics Scholarship.

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Village Board Meeting Minutes

Regular Meeting April 3, 1995 8:00 p.m.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Robert Wagner presided. All Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present Trustee Charles Waala arrived a few minutes late due to the Library Board Meeting running longer than expected.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee David Goeden, seconded by Trustee John Borland and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the March 20, 1995 meetings were approved with one correction as noted by Trustee David Goeden regarding the payment of the KKCP bathhouse roof rehabilitation coming from the Open Space Fund.

A public hearing was held on the request of R.T.K.M. LLC. to allow for the development of a Planned Unit Development Overlay District. The development is for the two existing R-4 Multi-Family lots which shall become one after the affirmative action is taken on Resolution No. 95-5 discontinuing and vacating a portion of Highland Avenue. The proposed development has not changed in concept other than those suggested changes by the Plan Commission and Village Board. A couple of citizens were present and asked why the change was being proposed. It was indicated that conditions have changed since the original layout in 1980 and that it was felt that this would serve both the needs of the entire community as well as area property owners better. On a motion by Trustee Robert Beisbier, seconded by Trustee William Kulas and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board closed the public hearing. Roll call vote was 7 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 0 "Absent."

A public hearing was held on the request of R.T.K.M. LLC. to allow for the placement of a private driveway, sidewalk, parking lot and recreational area within a floodplain conservancy. The DNR requirements were reviewed as to restrictions. On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee John Borland and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board closed the public hearing. Roll call vote was 7 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 0 "Absent."

Assistant Fire Chief Mark Herriges was present and informed the Board that the Department was concerned over a comment made by Trustee David Goeden regarding spending. It was noted by President Robert Wagner that the comment was from one Board Member and did not represent his view. The majority of Board Members concurred and indicated they support the Fire Department and the entire Village Board appreciates their volunteer activities and support of the department. It was noted that the comment was not interpreted entirely correct and that the Village Board is the responsible body establishing taxes which everyone is concerned about. Trustee David Goeden indicated he acknowledges their concern, but wishes the department would have called him to discuss the matter. Trustee Robert Stoltzmann informed the Board that the Board, as well as those in attendance at the Village Board and Committee meetings, should weigh their comments for clarity and appropriateness.

It was noted that the request of the Fire Department for financial assistance regarding the installation of the volleyball court at RHP (estimated cost to be \$1,000) would be discussed at the Park and Recreation meeting scheduled for April 17, 1995 at 7:00 p.m. It was also discussed that the department should proceed with putting together cost and alternatives regarding the replacement of the one tank truck. Trustee Charles Waala asked the Fire Department if any consideration has been given or will be given to purchasing a used vehicle. It was noted that if one department disposes of a truck it has problems and may not be the best way to address our situation.

Chief of Police Richard L. Knoebel informed the Board that the new squad car would be arriving this week and that a news note will appear in the paper pertaining to vehicles and trailers, etc., parked on public streets. It was further noted that the New Fane Sportsman Club donated \$500 to the DARE program. The Board extended their appreciation for the generous donation.

Trustee David Goeden asked the Chief if any further thought was given to a smaller squad car. The Chief indicated this was discussed earlier during the budget process in a prior year. The larger car is needed for transports and in 1994, 143 transports took place.

On a motion by Trustee William Kulas, seconded by Trustee Charles Waala and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized the advertising for sale of the 1993 squad car.

Director of Public Works, Jerry Gilles informed the Board that the Fond du Lac Avenue (USH 45) project is scheduled to begin on April 17, 1995 and that the estimated completion date is 55 working days later.

On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee William Kulas and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized the advertising for bids to remove the Village's 3 underground storage tanks. The work is in the 1995 budget.

Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt reviewed the following: 1) League and Taxpayer

bulletins.

2) Reviewed a letter from the Wisconsin Central Railroad regarding the signal request from the Village for Old Fond du Lac Road at Wildlife Drive. It was noted a petition needs to be filed with the Office of the Commissioner of Railroads. The work has already begun so such a petition may be filed and public hearing set.

3) It was noted that Bank Wisconsin has graciously agreed to donate \$1,500 for the Centennial Fireworks. Also it was noted that Regal Ware, Inc. has donated \$1,500 for the Indian Ceremony and \$210 for a

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
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600 Trout Planted Here

New PFD Requirements

Effective May 1, 1995, the United States Coast Guard has changed the law for personal flotation device (PFD's) requirements on boats under 16 feet and non-motorized boats. In the past, boats under 16 feet were required to have a PFD of any type for each person on board the boat.

Many boaters carried the

meeting is open to the public.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

type IV, or the boat cushion, to meet this requirement. Beginning May 1, all boats will be required to have one wearable PFD for each person on board the boat. The type IV will no longer meet the requirement. One type IV will be required for boats 16 feet and over which has always been the case.

The new law does not require that the PFD be worn but there is to be one provided for each person on the boat and is to be of the proper size for the person using the PFD. As a general rule, PFD's come in four sizes: under 30 pounds; 30 to 60 pounds; 60 to 90 pounds, and 90 pounds and above.

Boat rentals will be given a one year grace period to switch over to the wearable type PFD's, but only in nonmotorized boats. If a motor is put on the boat, the new requirements will apply.

Again, the new law does not require that the PFD be worn, but it is always recommended especially when the water is cold, during high speed operation, and when a passenger is unable to swim.

The type IV cushions can be used as seat cushions in a boat, but will no longer meet

540 Wild Iowa Pheasants Released North of Kewaskum

Participants in this year's wild Iowa pheasant release included Kettle Moraine Chapter of Wings Over Wisconsin members Bob Manthei, Bernie Sarauer, Danny Sarauer, Wally Ferber, Bob Gatzke, and Wisconsin DNR representatives Tom Issaks and Missy Sparrow.

This spring marks the second year of a three year pheasant release program sponsored by the Kettle Moraine Chapter of Wings Over Wisconsin.

Last week, 540 wild Iowa pheasants were released in rural Kewaskum within the Chapter's pheasant habitat restoration project north of the village. The release of these birds helps supplement the existing wild pheasant population in the area, and since it's inception in 1994. populations in the project area have increased by 150%. Another 500 wild pheasants will be released in 1996 to complete the restoration project.

The Kettle Moraine Chapter, Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, and local landowners have been working together to improve the countryside for all wildlife species. Over 200 additional acres of wildlife habitat has been added to the project area, thanks to the many helpful and cooperative landowners in the area. Many food plots and acres of nest cover are being planted in

order to improve the pheasants likelihood of survival and for everyone to enjoy.




