Berger Rezoning Request Approved **Restricted Parking Issue to Committee**

The main topic of discussion at Monday evening's Village Board meeting centered around the issue of restricted parking on Third Street and Bilgo Lane in Kewaskum

The issue came up towards the end of the school year following the huge bottleneck of traffic along these streets that are located in close proximity to the Kewaskum High School and Elementary School.

It is realized that some of the traffic congestion was caused by the construction area surrounding the high school and the fact that one parking lot was located in the construction zone and had to be shut down.

But it is also common knowledge, as enrollment grows and more and more young people acquire vehicles and jobs after school, parking space at the high school could be at a premium

Police Chief Richard Knoebel brought the issue before the board requesting some type of direction to take to alleviate the growing problem before school resumes in August.

Knoebel stated, "The one day I counted 60 cars out on the streets and there were 110 spots in the lot, so there was enough room on the lot, even with the construction. And I'm hearing from some of the people in the neighborhood if they get people visiting during the day, they can't even park in front of their house; they have to park a block and a half away." Knoebel added, "Another problem with having cars parked there all day like that in a school area, with the problems we're having with the gangs and everything else, we'd like to have all their school cars on school property. That way we know if there's strange cars around. All of a sudden we're going to have a bunch of extra people coming in on the school property that we don't need." President Wagner asked, "Couldn't we get the school

do have parking permits for their lot. They cost \$5 a year and some of the kids don't want to spend the \$5 and they're finding that they get out alot faster and if they want to skip out it's easier for them to run out to their car if it's off the lot."

Wagner added, "When I was going to school it was a privilege, it wasn't a right. You had to earn the privilege to take your car to school.'

Knoebel reiterated, "Things have changed though... but when there's 110 spots left in their lot, there's no reason for 60 cars to be out along the street."

Knoebel sent letters to all residents in the neighborhood and was awaiting feedback from them. He had received complaints from residents who had come home for lunch and couldn't get into their driveways, because cars were hanging over them.

When asked if these cars had been ticketed, Knoebel replied, "Yes, but that doesn't help the guy trying to get into the driveway at that time."

A representative of the residents of Bilgo Lane, Dick Schlice, was in attendance, and commented that he had been in contact with all residents along Bilgo Lane. Each resident was grateful for the letter Chief Knoebel had sent in regards to the parking problem. Schlice had also been in contact with the school administrators who stated the parking issue

The CoMission is a cooperative venture of over 70 christian organizations. At the request of school officials in several republics of the former Soviet Union, the CoMission has been invited to train their educators to teach Christian morals and ethics as a foundation for society. "We closed God out of our country and it caused so many problems in our society we can not count them. We must put God back in our country and we must begin with our children," says Evgeniy Kurkin a deputy minister for the Ministry Russian of Education. The goal of the program is to send CoMission teams into every school district in the CIS by December 31, 1997, the date which concludes the five year agreement.



into the bids further, which also included Compaqs, and Centrum, and purchase the "most for their money." Furniture and equipment for the high school was approved in the amount of \$91,808.46, and for the middle school at a cost of \$38,328.79. Along the same lines, the board approved a list of suggested "electronic technology purchases," that included all schools within the district, for a total combined cost of \$61,810.00, with Andera voting no.

The 1995-96 negotiated agreement between the Board and the Kewaskum Education Association was approved, calling for a 3.8% settlement, which includes salary and fringe benefits, for both years of the contract. The KEA had voted to accept the new agreement on June 7th, with the second year salary schedule to be set after July 1st, when new insurance rates will be available. Preliminary budget figures were announced by Dr. Heather, with estimated expenditures for the 1995-96 school year coming in around \$11,087,232. The Fund 30 preliminary budget figure (debt service) of \$746,175, along with the Fund 10 (operational expenses) estimate of \$11,186,652, reflects

a 5.3% increase over last year's budget when the two are added together. These figures would also generate a total tax levy of \$6,462,945.20, up \$27,326. from last year. Dr. Heather stated that if these figures hold true, and it is a conservative estimate, it looks like a tax levy rate of \$14.80 per thousand, which is 97 cents less than the previous year, reflecting a 6.15 percent decrease in the tax rate. The board approved the preliminary budget figures, although none of it will be finalized until the later part of October, when the equalized values become available.

Regretfully, the board accepted the resignations of Mr. Dillman and Ms. Strand, who will be leaving the district at their request. Dillman of KHS, and has accepted an administrative position with the Green Lake School District. Connie Strand will be stepping down as district curriculum coordinator to take over as K-8 principal for Campbellsport Elementary school.

Construction representatives were once again on hand to give the board it's monthly update, and let them know everything is going well schedule wise, with the KMS project slated for completion by August 15, or earlier, and that the quality of the work has been excellent so far. The board approved adding air conditioning to the new music area of the high school, at an estimated cost of \$25,000. Mr. Dell'Agnese of EU, told the board that it had been left out of the original plans because they thought there would be a lack of funds. Now, considering the number of students who will be using the area during class time, the moneys will be taken from the contingency, or interest funds.

They have also been working closely with Building and Grounds Superintendent Fred Boehlke on the asbestos issue, with the FTBG committee recommending the board approve asbestos removal at a total cost of \$42,450. This would be done by Environet Inc., of Wisconsin, and would cover all phases of construction. The board O.K'd these construction expenses.

Parent Gail Ramerez addressed the board with her concerns regarding teacher's expectations, pointing out that the district needed more unity and consistency, and felt the standards were being lowered to meet the needs of some students. "Teachers and parents need to raise expectations for our kids," she expressed. "Kids are bribed to behave and do their work. We need to raise reading and comprehension abilities, and we can and need to expect more from our kids." When she questioned the board as to who was in charge, President Weare answered, "In my opinion, you are in charge, all the people who hire the school board."

Other items receiving confirmation that evening included an auction list, comprised of miscellaneous obsolete equipment and materials that will be taken to TriCounty Auction; the sale of a used lawnmower; the purchase of playground equipment for KES by their PTO; the approval of student trips in 1996 to Spain and Germany; the addition of a style manual (provides sample forms for writing papers/reports) for middle schoolers, for a \$6 student fee; and an increase of \$2 for the KHS yearbook.

The board turned down a request from long time teacher Clark Pearson, who proposed he take early retirement, but continue to work in a teaching capacity for another year. This concept is legal, and would have saved the district \$5,900 on the WRS contribution. Dr. Heather pointed out that this kind of proposal may become quite popular in the next few years, and once you approve it for one person, it will be difficult to deny this fringe benefit to anyone else. The vote denied the request 2-3, with Andera, Goeden, and Beimborn voting no and Ruth Schmitt abstaining. The following personnel appointments were approved for the district: Karah Holle as a KHS English instructor, Joe Kinney as KHS social studies teacher and assistant football coach, Manny Alvarado as soccer coach, Carla Pritzlaff as girls' tennis coach, and Debra Stone to the art position at KHS, replacing Mary Stephan

Kiwanis Hears About County Parks and Golf Course

The guest speaker at the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club's regular Monday meeting on June 12 was Paul Mueller, Land Use and Park Administrator, Washington County.

Mueller has held this position for the past 15 years, and his duties include Land Use Planning, Zoning, Sanitation Regulation, Solid Waste Planning, Economic Development and operation of the 1000 acre County Park System.

It is interesting to note that Washington County has nine public parks. They are located at Ridge Run in West Bend (the oldest park); Sandy Knoll, Town of Trenton; Goeden County Park on the Milwaukee River, Town of Trenton; Lizard Mount Park, Town of Farmington (formerly a state park); Cedar Lake Wayside, Town of West Bend; Homestead Hollow Park, Germantown; Glacier Hill Park, Town of Richfield; Heritage Trails, Town of Polk; and Family Park and Golf Club, town of Hartford, located off the southeast corner of Hwy. 83 and Clover Road intersection.

It is anticipated that the new golf course and family park will have the landscaping completed late this fall, and the club house will be built in the summer of 1996. The Park, the three-hole practice course, and the 18 hole (approximately 7000 yards) golf course are scheduled to open before May 1, 1997. This will allow the new Bent grass seeding to root in and establish itself.

Mueller said there will be no emphasis on group or corporate outings, and there will be no membership. Residents of Washington County will be able to reserve tee times earlier than non-residents who will also pay a higher greens fee. Junior and Senior residents will get a discount.

The golf club will be operated on an "Enterprise Account." That is, all indebtedness will be paid by green fees and club house revenue and not supported by any property taxes.

Approximately \$2.2 million has already been donated by some kind and thoughtful county residents. The total cost of the park, golf course three-hole practice course and the club house is expected to be about six million dollars. Based on experiences of Waukesha and Ozaukee Counties, our county golf club should retire its debt in about 17 years.

The DNR approval and permits have been completed, and field and landscaping work has begun.

Grothman Reins in DILHR Regulations Proposed Septic Rule to be Fixed in Budget

MADISON...State Representative Glenn Grothman (R-West Bend) has announced that assembly Republicans, meeting in a June 14th budget-writing briefing, have come up with a plan to repair an embattled septic system rule.

The new septic rule, known as ILHR 83 and proposed by the Department of Industry, Labor, and Human Relations, has drawn hundreds of complaints from state residents. It would have required all new septic systems to produce output meeting federal clean drinking water standards for nitrate content by the year 2005, a regulation which might have cost affected home owners tens of thousands of dollars. Grothman stated, "as written, ILHR 83 is ridiculous. While it might have accomplished some good things, it really had the potential to prevent people from selling their homes without spending several thousands of dollars on a new system."

would exempt all private sewage systems from the restrictive nitrate standards. The amendment also eliminates DNR restrictions on the installation of new and innovative septic systems, designed to work in soils unacceptable for traditional treatment systems.

"This amendment recognizes that homeowners, who are responsible for only 5% of all nitrate pollution, should not bear the brunt of It also gives landowners greater freedom to build on a wider range of lands than is currently possible."

Grothman commented, "it is high time that government stop regulating people out of their homes and fortunes. This amendment accomplishes that."





How Do You Measure Your Fish Properly?

With a size limit on bass (14"), walleye (15"), and northern pike (26"), a number of people have been asking, "How do you measure a fish properly? Are you allowed to open the mouth, can you one was more than likely making up an excuse for possession of an undersized fish. The proper way of measuring a fish can be found in the fishing regulation pamphlet. The fish is to be laying flat, it pays to make a measuring board. For in that way undersized fish can be more quickly returned to the water and therefore increase their survival chances. When in doubt whether a fish is of legal size, return it to the water. The minimum citation for an undersized fish is \$131.80, and it goes up from there. If you have any questions on this topic or any other feel free to contact me.



squeeze the tail, these are just a few of the more common questions that I have heard in regard to measuring a fish.

Often times the question comes up after a person has been apprehended for possession of an undersized fish and that the Warden measured the fish in an improper manner. In fact, the other day a fishermen asked me if all Wardens were measuring fish from the nose to the middle of the tail, where it would be 1/2" to 1" shorter than measuring to the tip of the tail. He went on to say that he knew a person who had been cited and that was how the fish were measured.

I informed him that some-

\$5.4 Million Settlement Awarded to Campbellsport Youth

Judge Richard T. Becker recently approved a 5.5 million dollar settlement of a personal injury case arising from a Campbellsport, Wisconsin railroad crossing accident which occurred on September 21, 1991. In the collision at the Main Street crossing, a van being operated by Vicki Scheerer of Fond du Lac was struck by a Fox River Valley Railroad train. A passenger in the Scheerer van was killed and three minor occupants were injured. The court approved the settlement of the children's claims.

Under the terms of the settlement, 5.4 million dollars are to be paid the guardian of 17-year-old Kelly Scheerer of rural Campbellsport who was the most seriously injured of the three minors. She will require lifetime medical and supportive care. The settle- ment provides current funding for a support trust, as well as an annuity to ensure her needs are met for

the Fox River Valley Railroad had been negligent in failing to provide adequate protection for motorists at the crossing. The Campbellsport Building Supply Center and its insurer were also joined in the case. The Building Supply Center was alleged to be negligent for obstructing and distracting a motorist's view of the crossing by illegally placing an advertising sign in the street in front of the store.

The settlement funds were paid by the railroad, the insurer for Campbellsport Building Supply and American Standard Insurance Company of Wisconsin, the automobile insurance carrier for Vicki Scheerer.

The settlement may be one of the last of its type in the state as a result of recent legislation passed which altered the law known as joint and several liability. Under the former law of joint and several liability, any defendant who caused an innocent party's injuries could be held responsible for paying part or all of the victim's damages. The revision of the joint and several liability law significantly limits the amounts which have to be paid by negligent defendants who are only partially at fault.

found to be only partially at fault and, therefore, responsible only for a fraction of the damages. Vicki Scheerer only had a minimal total insurance coverage for the accident.


Under the new law, in a case like this, there would be little or no reimbursement to the state for the substantial medicaid funds paid to treat the victims. Additionally, the state and county would be responsible for the cost of providing the lifetime medical and nursing care which Kelly will require.

This case provides a good illustration of how the legislation has shifted the burden of caring for accident victims to the taxpayer from negligent businesses, such as the railroad and lumber yard.

Town of Scott Meeting Held

Bids and proposals for summer road work in the Town of Scott were opened at the May meeting. Several projects are on the schedule for this year.

They include installation of a three foot wide strip of asphalt to be added to the edge of School Street making it a safer place for children who ride bicycles or walk to school; new surface of asphalt on one mile of Cranberry Road north and 1 1/2 miles of Cranberry Road South; one mile of Boltonville Road from County D to the south, one mile of Maple Tree Road from County W to the south, north 1/2 mile of S. Maple Tree Road from Brazelton Drive.

Cranberry Road will also receive new shouldering and other areas will experience a minimum of patching. Awarding of the contracts was scheduled to take place May 18.

Two conditional use permits was approved. One was for Franklin Palmer, State Highway 144 for operation of a electronic repair operation, and the second was to Henry Derler, County Road S, to repair horse harnesses and buggies.

Rezoning from A-3 to R-1 for three lots on County Road A in Section 13 was approved for Neal and Mark LeFever and Joel Helminger.

The planning commission reviewed the requirements for conditional use permits earlier in the month with the conclusion that if a hobby is done in the home, and is not the principal occupation, no conditional use permit will be needed.

The Town is easing into a recycling operation, which will be partially new to the Town. It has purchased equipment for glass and tin crushing, a baler, and the necessary containers and other equipment necessary to

complete the job.

Volunteers are assisting in the operation and instead of paying a contractor to haul away the collected recyclables, the town will be doing its own marketing. Several suggestions were

made for improving the building permit system. One of these was to have a minimum charge for a permit, perhaps for as little as 25 cent. Every project would be required to obtain a permit for all types of work.

The permits would be obtained from the clerk who would then notify the building inspector for larger projects requiring an inspection. If so the regular charge would be utilized. No action was taken but the idea, which originally surfaced several years ago, will still be considered at a later date.

The chairman and clerk were authorized to sign a contract awarding the bid for renovation of the Random Lake Auditorium to Mike Koenig Construction of Sheboygan.

The Board of Review is scheduled for June 22 between 6 and 10 p.m.

Supervisors Clarence Janz, Chairman Lester Benzschawel, Clerk Colleen Narbatovics and Treasurer Marie Edeler will serve on the Board of Review.



Town of Scott Meeting Held

Bids and proposals for summer road work in the Town of Scott were opened at the May meeting. Several projects are on the schedule for this year.

They include installation of a three foot wide strip of asphalt to be added to the edge of School Street making it a safer place for children who ride bicycles or walk to school; new surface of asphalt on one mile of Cranberry Road north and 1 1/2 miles of Cranberry Road South; one mile of Boltonville Road from County D to the south, one mile of Maple Tree Road from County W to the south, north 1/2 mile of S. Maple Tree Road from Brazelton Drive.

Cranberry Road will also receive new shouldering and other areas will experience a minimum of patching. Awarding of the contracts was scheduled to take place May 18.

Two conditional use permits was approved. One was for Franklin Palmer, State Highway 144 for operation of a electronic repair operation, and the second was to Henry Derler, County Road S, to repair horse harnesses and buggies.

Rezoning from A-3 to R-1 for three lots on County Road A in Section 13 was approved for Neal and Mark LeFever and Joel Helminger.

The planning commission reviewed the requirements for conditional use permits earlier in the month with the conclusion that if a hobby is done in the home, and is not the principal occupation, no conditional use permit will be needed.

The Town is easing into a recycling operation, which will be partially new to the Town. It has purchased equipment for glass and tin crushing, a baler, and the necessary containers and other equipment necessary to

complete the job.

Volunteers are assisting in the operation and instead of paying a contractor to haul away the collected recyclables, the town will be doing its own marketing. Several suggestions were

made for improving the building permit system. One of these was to have a minimum charge for a permit, perhaps for as little as 25 cent. Every project would be required to obtain a permit for all types of work.

The permits would be obtained from the clerk who would then notify the building inspector for larger projects requiring an inspection. If so the regular charge would be utilized. No action was taken but the idea, which originally surfaced several years ago, will still be considered at a later date.

The chairman and clerk were authorized to sign a contract awarding the bid for renovation of the Random Lake Auditorium to Mike Koenig Construction of Sheboygan.

The Board of Review is scheduled for June 22 between 6 and 10 p.m.





'Spring Fling' Held at KMS




