

Alvin Benford, 12 of Cruger, Mississippi is spending twenty days with the Roger Neumann family. Alvin arrived on Sat., July 1. Alvin has three sisters, Loleta 17, Ashley 7, Brittany 6 and one brother Earl 9. His mother, Martha, works at home taking care of the family. Benjamin, his father, is a tractor driver for a cotton farmer.

Alvin enjoys playing basketball, football and all different kinds of video games. He likes rap and pop music. Pizza and hamburgers are his favorite foods. At the Neumann's he enjoys playing on the comptuer, hide and seek around the farm, swimming, and renting video games.

The population of Cruger is 520. The land is flat with many trees. Some of the businesses include a gin mill, two grocery stores, post office, three churches, fire department and several parks. Alvin attends S.V. Marshall School in Tchula. It is a fifteen minute school bus ride. This coming school year Alvin will begin junior high. Classes run from 8 am to 3 pm Alvin's favorite subject is math and someday might be a math teacher. To visit a doctor, go shopping, swimming, see a movie or do other activities you must go twenty minutes north to

Greenwood. The population of Greenwood is 20,000.

The program Alvin is participating in is called Project Self-Help and Awareness, Inc. Its purpose is to promote better understanding among all people. The project was started with Project Understanding in 1968 by a black woman in Mississippi and a white law student of the University of Wis., both of whom were very active in the civil rights movement in the South.

They found that a great deal of myth existed about each others' cultures. A number of families in the South were interested in having their children learn more about the north and its people. The law student placed an ad in a Madison, newspaper asking if any families were interested in hosting a black child for three weeks during the summer. Quite a number of people responded and since then many counties and areas in Wisconsin have been matched in the exchange program.

### New Book Written on the Story of The Settlement of the Kettle Moraine

Ploughs Among the Eskers, a new soft bound book written by Bernard L. Michaels, is the story of the settlement of the Kettle Moraine area.

Bernard, a lifelong resident of this unique land named for it's rolling kettles of hills and hollows, now resides in Cascade, and begins his historical account with childhood memories of growing up on his parent's farm.

He writes that at that time, "countless reminders of the settlement period remained in the neighborhood, and most importantly the old men and women lived whose memories could still envision the epidemics, the blizzards, and the great flights of wild pigeons, and gloried in telling of them to all who would listen."

Before the settling of the area by immigrants from other countries, the region was inhabited by the Winnebago Nation, and later included Potawatomi, Chippewa, Sauks, Menominee, Ottawa, and Fox Native American tribes. Michaels states that it was not unusual in later years to find members of two or three different nations living together in the same camp, determined by necessity as they were driven further out of their once vast territories.

His book relates a little known tale of the great 1862 Indian uprising, in which a



throughout the Kettle Moraine, and with it the startling news that "thousands of Indians were sweeping down from the north, burning and pillaging everything in their path.'

It took three days for the rumor to settle down, and by that time around 40 or 50 thousand people were affected, Governor Solomon was telegraphed and the State Guard called out. "It took the local citizens another two weeks to dig up the silverware, grandfather clocks, and whisky, and chase the last cow from the swamp," he states.

The book goes on to explore the development of the fur trade, and the coming of the settlers, whose names were not identified until the year 1844. They came in waves, lingering for a year or two, before "heading on to new horizons," and included wealthy investors as well as victims of economic, natural and political misfortunes, described as "farmers from the worn out soils of the eastern seaboard, famine sufferers from Ireland, and refugees of political and religious turmoil from the German Confederation.

The author goes on to explain that "seemingly overnight the wilderness was transformed into a patchwork of wheat fields and woodlots. The Native American had lived on these lands for almost ten millenniums, leaving scarcely an imprint. The




The grist mills, the corner cheese factories, and the general store, were an irreplaceable part of the rural lifestyle, as communities sprung up throughout the Kettle Moraine. Michaels devotes entire chapters to the histories of some of the small towns located in the region, such as New Fane, New Prospect, Dundee, and Greenbush, adding anecdotes about the people that were instrumental in the development of businesses.

The book also takes into account the impact of the Civil War, and the high price paid by the residents of the Kettles, who sided with the union. "Of the three hundred men who had taken part in the crusade to keep the Union, more than seventy had died, and most of these lay in southern graves scattered from Texas to the Carolinas."

Those serving from Kewaskum totaled 12 from the 27th Infantry, Company B, and 27 Kewaskum and Auburn men served in the 12th Infantry, Company D.

Bernard also researches the growth of education and what life was like in the one room schoolhouses found scattered throughout the rural countryside, starting with the first school, which opened in a maple grove just outside of

the village of Greenbush in 1848. Fifteen students met there in a sugaring shanty belonging to the Wade family. Over the next decade, nine more shanty schools opened their doors along the length of the Kettles extending as far south as District #6 of Washington County.

The final chapters discuss the expansion of transportation routes, from the beginning stagecoach service to the importance of road building in these frontier communities, and the gradual rise from the depression era, which severely affected the local economy.

The need to set aside preservation land was dramatically marked by a constant haze of smoke, which filled the atmosphere during the mid-thirties. He writes, Wetlands drained during the land boom of the early twenties began to burn during the dry years of the following decade. Thick layers of humus, ranging in area from the five acre bog in the back forty," to the ten-thousand acre expanse of the Sheboygan Marsh continued to smolder for years.

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Regardless of the season, invariably on wind-free mornings, the acid smell of burning peat lingered over the length and breadth of the Kettle Moraine. In the late thirties, the intentional flooding of larger marshes, coupled with a return of normal rainfall patterns finally put an end to the troublesome fires."

Finally, in the year 1936, eight hundred acres were acquired by the state, to be set aside for recreation/conservation purposes, preparing the way for a new era, as the days of the plow drew to a close.



Anthony attends the University of Wisconsin-Platteville and is a 1994 Kewaskum High School graduate. He is the son of James and Margaret Rix.







### Recycling Program Shows Profit for Town of Scott

#### By Bernadette Mondloch

Enthusiasm over the new recycling program was evident at the Town of Scott's June meeting.

Chairman Lester Benzschawel reported that the first bale of cardboard, weighing in at 1160 pounds, has been sold along with tin and aluminum cans for a profit of \$219.45.

Board members calculated that this was actually a near \$500 profit considering the fees which would have to have been paid if the pick up of this material were still under contract with the salvage disposal firm. The town previously contracted with E & K Hauling for its disposal of recycle material.

Scott has purchased baling and crushing equipment and a fork lift and has begun marketing its recyclables.

The enthusiasm soon faded after Benzschawel's announcement of a revised compensation schedule and an additional position for the recycle operation. The new job classification had been discussed during a closed session held near the end of the regular meeting.

A motion was made to create a "recycle machine operator" position and that the recycle attendant wage was being changed to \$5 per hour, and the Machine Operator pay established at \$6.50 per hour.

The objection to the wage decrease came from Orville Mileager, whose daughter is currently the recycle attendant. Mileager said, "You hired her for \$6.50 and now you want to drop her wages because you are hiring another person to assist." He felt that despite his daughter being "small" in stature, she is strong, able to lift a 65 pound bale of hay and is able to do anything which either job description requires. He asked that she be given a chance to prove herself.

The motion died for lack of a second and further discussion followed. Benzschawel who also assists at the recycle center, along with a number of volunteers (residents from the town) changed his position on the operation and agreed to work with her for three weeks to establish capabilities and "give her a chance to see what she can do." He said, "I will give her every opportunity to prove herself."

Decisions on creating the additional position will be delayed until the July meeting.

Review of beer and liquor license applications also ran into a snag when supervisors questioned the accuracy to a question on the application from Tillie's in Beechwood.

The question which asks, "are there any criminal charges (other than traffic

unrelated to alcohol beverages) presently pending against such persons since previous application," was answered "no." It appeared to be common knowledge that the "no" answer was incorrect if applied to the date of the application, but it was also common knowledge that since that date, the previously pending case has been settled.

License applications are due in the clerk's office no less than fifteen days prior to the meeting at which they are to be approved. The clerk was instructed to withhold the license for Ottillia Schultz until it has been corrected. All other licenses were approved.

The citizen input portion of the board meeting is always a popular one. Lynes Fellenz questioned the validity of planting of trees on a Hickory Hollow property. He felt that once grown they would become a hazard to snow plowing.

Benzschawel said the rule is 40 feet from the center of the road and that the board recently made an agreement with a property owner in Glacier Hills subdivision to move the trees which were in violation of that rule. He was not aware of those in Hickory Hollow and would investigate the situation.

Betty Mileager was reappointed to a three year term expiring in 1998, on the Random Lake Joint Community Library Board.

Earlier in the year the four municipalities involved in renovation of the Random Lake Auditorium into a new home for the library, had agreed to contribute proportionate amounts of money by June. Some budgeted for the expenditure while the Town of Scott has applied to the state for a State Trust Fund Loan for it's commitment. The clerk was given permission to turn over the \$40,425 to the library as soon as the money is received from the state fund.

A road which is actually a private road, leading to Crooked Lake was missed when the Emergency 911 system was activated in the county. At that time, all roads, including private roads which served at least three homes, were given a name for identification purposes only. The three residents on the driveway were contacted for name suggestions. Action was taken to name the road "Jetty Lane." The name will be used for identification purposes only. It does not mean that it would now be a town maintained road.

Farmers are cautioned that cultivating too close to the roadway and depositing stones in ditches is in violation of state law. Wisconsin Statute 86.021 governs cultivation of lands within the right of way and provides for a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$50 or imprisonment in the county jail not less than 10 days nor more than 30 days plus the cost of restoring the right of way area. Depositing of stones or other obstructions is considered to be a misdemeanor and the fine ranges from \$10 to \$100. Although cautioned in years past there are still some residents which continues to violate these provisions. The board will be looking into these violations.

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





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### Tim Allen Makes Driving Debut on Saturday Villeneuve Wins at Road America




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

As the checkered flag came down Villeneuve, driving car #27 was first, followed by #3 Paul Tracy with #12 Jimmy Vasser finishing third. The unofficial time of the race was 107.52.

So far this year Jacques Villeneuve has had a pretty good season. He started the season with driving his Player's LTD Reynard-Ford to a first place finish at the Grand Prix in Miami, winning the 1995 season opener. After transmission problems in Australia, he had a solidfifth place finish in Arizona, the first oval race of the season. first Canadian ever to win the Indianapolis 500. He went on to place 6th in Milwaukee, and 9th in Detroit. Problems with his car once again forced him out of the race at Portland, Oregon in June. He is back on the road to victories after a successful weekFord, finished second while racing with a broken left foot. He was hurt while racing gokarts last week. With five pins in place, and hobbling around on crutches on Sunday he managed to hang in there despite his pain. Tracy has previously won the

Road America at Elkhart Lake, was the place to be for the Texaco Havolin 200 Indy-car race on July 9. A record setting crowd, rumored at over 100,000 fans, filled the stands and lined the track to watch the action.

Jacques Villeneuve, the Canadian who drives for Player's LTD. won the pole position with a record-setting time of 1:41.261 (142.206 m.p.h.) during qualifying on Saturday. This is his second consecutive pole of the season and his second career pole.

"I knew I would have to give it my all in the last lap to take the pole," said Jacques. "Sometimes you go over the edge and crash, and sometimes it works. Today it worked."

In 1994 Villeneuve won his first Indy race running out of fuel after crossing the finish line, forcing the 23-yearold rookie to walk to Victory Lane. This year he claimed his second victory at Elkhart Lake during the Texaco In Long Beach, California on April 9, Jacques birthday, differential problems with the car forced him out of the race after only 34 laps. The next race was in Pennsylvania where he finished second behind veteran driver Emerson Fittipaldi.

On May 28, Villeneuve made history becoming the end at Elkhart Lake.

A surprising accident took veterans Michael Andretti and Al Unser Jr. out of the race when they made contact coming out of turn #4.

"I lost sight of Al and didn't know if he was on my left or my right," said Michael. "When I went back to my normal line, I got hit. If I bad known he was there I wouldn't have moved over. I thought as the race went on the leaders would come back to us, but I didn't want to let them get away. It was just racing luck. It's such close racing. I was lucky after the hit and just went along for the ride," he added.






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
