## School Board Approves More for Less

The School District's Annual Meeting and Budget Hearing was held last Monday, and budget figures were released for the upcoming school year.

The meeting was low key and ended early, with only seven members of the community in attendance. Board president Neal Weare served as chairman, and Bob Duffy of Quarles and Brady was on hand to answer any legal questions.

Dr. Heather started off the evening with his opening remarks about the previous school year, stating the highlight of the year was the passing of the building referendum. "Our biggest challenge at the moment is to complete the construction project so that the school year can begin on time. The contractor is working very diligently to complete the project on schedule and under budget," he said. An Open House will be held at Kewaskum Middle School on Thursday, Sept. 7, at 6:30 p.m., and at Kewaskum High School on Monday, Sept. 18, at 6:30 p.m. Both will include a short dedication ceremony.

The 94-95 school year was a financially good year for the district, according to the figures. Expenditures totaled \$10,587,814.00, "or we underspent the budget by \$58,063.00," Heather explained to the board.

In reviewing the proposed 95-96 budget expenditures, the breakdown includes \$7,307,286.00 for total instruction, and \$3,897,366.00 for total support services and other expenditures, bringing the Fund 10 amount to \$11,186,652.00, which is an increase of \$598,838.00 more than last year, or 5.66%.

The proposed school year revenues reflect a general fund tax levy of \$5,706,515.00, or \$40,221.00 less than last year's tax levy. Dr. Heather pointed out that estimated general state aid comes in at \$4,579,840.00 or \$545,523.00 over last year's aid. "This is a part of the governor's program to get to two-thirds funding of the schools," he maintained.

Added to the general fund levy is the debt service levy, which included payment on the referendum that

was approved, as well as payment of principal and interest on a loan from 1992, bringing the general fund to \$746,175.00. This means a total 95-96 proposed tax levy of \$6,452,690.00, an increase over last year of \$17,071.00, because of the hike in the debt service levy.

Estimating that our

equalized value of district property increases 7% (actual rates will not be available until October), the tax rate will be \$14.78 per thousand dollars of equalized valuation, or 99 cents per thousand dollars less than last year (6.27% less). This reflects an increase over last year of

## School District Loses Some Key Personnel

The School District of Kewaskum lost some of its' key players last season, and is scurrying to fill the positions before school begins in August.

Currington Coordinator Connie Strand has joined the Campbellsport School District to serve as K-8 elementary principal, and so far a replacement has not been named. Strand said the decision to leave was a difficult one, but a move up in administration.

Farmington principal Kevin Steinhilber recently turned in his resignation to take on a new position in Appleton. Steinhilber had been commuting daily from Oshkosh and wanted to make a move closer to home. District Administrator Dr. David Heather said they would be looking to fill his shoes either internally or from the outside.

Heather has also been sending out his own resume, which is being considered up

in Sturgeon Bay, so there's the possibility the district may be looking for a new administrator in the near future.

The only position filled for this coming year has been assistant high school principal, which was vacated when Dave Dillman stepped down this past spring to accept an administrative seat in Green Lake. Replacing him is Larry Wilson, a former ninth grade principal with the West Bend School District.

Board President Neal Weare said that the Kewaskum School District is often used as a stepping stone and as employees gain experience, they move on to accept new jobs that further their careers, in many cases to administrative assignments.

"Times have changed and people (in the community) have to understand we're not going to see principals like Roy Esser anymore, who stayed with the district for thirty years."

## School Dress Code Will Be Enforced

Starting on August 28th, jackets, and drug/alcohol/tobacco/obscene shirts will no longer be acceptable at Kewaskum High School.

With the passage of Policy #443.1 at the July 10th meeting, the School District of Kewaskum has taken an official position banning high school students from wearing caps, jackets, and shirts that promote drugs, alcohol, tobacco, or obscene pictures or words while at school.

Students who continue to violate this policy will be subjected to appropriate disciplinary action.

Parents are asked to support this policy by reminding their children of the change, starting with the first day of classes on Monday, August 28, 1995. Now the high school will be following the same dress expectations the middle school and elementary schools have had for years.

## Production Discontinued At Marigold Foods Here

Marigold Foods has discontinued all production at their Kewaskum Plant, Executive Vice President Larry Gergens of Corporate Headquarters, announced this week during a visit to the plant to supervise its closing.

The announcement to move all operations to their Cedarburg division came in June of 1994 and the decision was influenced by the purchase of Cedarburg Dairy, and the need to consolidate for financial reasons.

The building itself has

been leased to one of their local distributors, Engelhardt and Sons Dairy, who will use the storage part of the facility.

"It is kind of sad," relates Gergens, whose home base is Minnesota. "The plant and the community have always been great. The problem was we got landlocked."

Some of the employees qualified for retirement, and a high percentage transferred to the Cedarburg location.

The Kewaskum Plant had employed 65 people, and was originally started in 1903 by Moritz and Adolph Rosenheimer.



# Wayne Board Discusses Town Road Name Changes

Change can be difficult and sometimes inconvenient as Town of Wayne resident, Ron Norman shared at the Town of Wayne board meeting on Wednesday, July 19. Norman cited economic, record keeping and possible mail delivery problems as his primary objections to a local road name change.

Norman, who resides on Badger Lane, came before the board requesting to have the newly named Badger Road changed back to Badger Lane to eliminate confusion. The name has not officially been changed, but new signs have been posted with the new name.

In the fall of 1994 the board discussed changing names of several town roads as a result of the Highway 28-41 construction. Lanes are considered by town officials as deadend roads with roads considered thoroughfares. Badger is a thoroughfare thus considered a road.

Board chairman Mark Strobel remarked the changes that have been made are only the beginning. More changes will be made resulting in temporary inconveniences for town residents but for clarity the changes need to be done. Although understanding Norman's dilemma, the board voted to proceed with the name change.

Following the recommendation of the Plan Commission, board members voted to amend the zoning ordinance regarding culvert permits, installation specifications and construction procedures. The ordinance was revised to include more details regarding culverts and to close loopholes in the previous ordinance.

Like many rural areas, the Town of Wayne is seeing an increase in building and zoning change requests and in an effort to control the type of housing coming into the town, board members voted to amend the zoning ordinance for a single family dwelling to require a housing structure to be a minimum of 24 feet wide, have a permanent foundation, a minimum roof slope of three to 12 in addition to the current minimum square footage requirement of 1,200. The amendment is basically to discourage individual mobile homes in the township.

In other matters before the board, approval of a conditional use permit was granted to Shelby and Associates to construct a communications tower for cellular phones; the bridge limit on Skyline Drive was increased from eight ton to 15 ton; a reassessment contract with Erna Franke was approved; a decision on replacing a fuel storage tank at the town hall was tabled and preliminary

plans were reviewed for the section of Highway H from Wayne to Highway 41 which will be eventually turned over to the town from the county.

District Assemblyman Glenn Grothman visited and advised those in attendance with an update of legislative happenings in Madison.

Town resident, Art Filber requested the board place on the August agenda the speed limit on Midland Drive citing vehicles traveling at excessive speeds on Midland creating a very dangerous situation for those who live there.

The Town of Wayne Plan Commission will meet on Tuesday, August 15th at 7:30 p.m. at the town hall with the monthly board meeting scheduled for Wednesday, August 16th at 8 p.m.

\$17,071.00, or 3/10th of 1%.

An increase of 7% in equalized valuation will result in the following mill rate: a property valued at \$70,000 would receive a tax levy of \$1,035 (\$69 less than last year); \$110,000 a tax levy of \$1,626 (\$109 less than last year); and \$150,000 a tax levy of \$2,217 (\$149 less than last year).

"These figures are as close as I can get them at this particular time," Dr. Heather repeated. "We have to wait until we have our third Friday count in September to determine what our FTE and student load is so that we can finally determine our revenue cap limits, and we also have to wait until October 1 to receive the equalized value of the district from the Department of Revenue."

The school board approved the tax levy, with a motion by John Schulte, seconded by Karen Sparks.

Other discussion that evening centered around the reimbursement of expenses to school board members, when duties require the member to be absent from regular employment. The board and electors approved their annual salary of \$1,000, but board member Ruth Schmitt felt the \$80 per day reimbursement fee was high, and unnecessary, and motioned that it be reduced to \$50 per day.

"I believe the \$1,000 more than covers our expenses," Schmitt explained, "and I believe that the real reason a

person should run for the school board would be for public service." John Schulte pointed out that the wording, "absent from regular employment," may be discriminatory if it would exclude homemakers from this benefit because they weren't employed outside the home.

Board member Jean Goeden said that the \$80 would not even cover someone like John of some of the other board members who were employed full time. Schmitt countered by again stating that the \$1,000 would more than cover it, since the need did not occur very often. The main expense is the WSB convention which is held in Milwaukee in January, but the district pays for rooms, meals, mileage and registration. It is also done on a voluntary basis. "There are still several boards in the state which there is no salary," Ruth added. The Board and electors approved the reduction in reimbursement to \$50 per day with some voting no.

The next Annual Meeting and Budget Hearing will be held on July 22, 1996.





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

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## Early Canada Goose Hunt Applications Due Aug. 4

MADISON -- Hunters interested in participating in the 1995 Southeast Wisconsin Early September Canada Goose Hunt must have permit applications in by Friday, August 4.

Hunters will find more opportunities to hunt this year, because the 1995 season is three days longer than in previous years and features a larger subzone, according to John Bergquist, Department of Natural Resources waterfowl ecologist.

This year's early hunt opens for one day on September 1, closes for the Labor Day weekend, reopens Tuesday, September 5, and runs through September 13. The daily bag limit is five.

The subzone has been expanded to include all of Kenosha, Racine, Milwaukee, Waukesha and Ozaukee counties. Portions of Sheboygan, Washington, Dodge, Jefferson and Walworth counties are also included. Most geese will be found on private lands, because few public lands exist in the region, so hunters should be certain they have a place to hunt before seeking permits, Bergquist says.

"The expanded subzone and longer season should increase hunting opportunities while helping slow the growth of southeast Wisconsin's flock of giant Canada geese," he says. "These geese breed locally and are viewed by some as a growing nuisance in urban areas." Only Canada geese are legally hunted during this special season.

The Southeast Early Canada Goose Hunt is held in September before the arrival of the migratory race of interior Canada geese from Hudson and James Bay in Ontario. Geese harvested in this hunt do not count toward the statewide quota for Canada geese set by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for the regular fall season. People applying for the early hunt are still eligible to apply for either an Exterior, Collins or Horicon zone permit.

In 1994, over 20,000

people obtained permits for the early hunt, but only 2,947 reported they actually hunted. The total harvest was 1,633 Canada geese.

Free permit applications for 1995's hunt are available at DNR and county clerks' offices. Conservation patron license holders received applications in a packet sent out July 17 if they requested that application.

To reduce processing costs, people are encouraged NOT to apply for the early hunt if they do not expect to hunt. All permits, whether the holder hunted or not, must be returned to the DNR within 48 hours of the season's closing.

## St. Francis Capital Corporation Announces 3rd Quarter Earnings

MILWAUKEE - July 25, 1995... St. Francis Capital Corporation (NASDAQ: STFR) recently reported increased earnings for the three and nine months ended June 30, 1995.

Net income for the three months ended June 30, 1995 was \$3.78 million compared with \$2.02 million for the three months ended June 30, 1994. Earnings per share increased to \$0.62 for the three month period compared with \$0.30 in the prior year. Net income for the nine months ended June 30, 1995 was \$9.05 million compared with \$5.66 million for the nine months ended June 30, 1994.

Earnings per share increased to \$1.49 for the nine-month period compared with \$0.81 in the prior year. The increase in earnings for both the three and nine months ended June 30, 1995 were due to increases in net interest income and other operating income, which consisted primarily of gains on mortgage-backed securities, partially offset by increases in operating expenses and income tax expense.

"The quarterly results include a significant amount related to gains from mortgage-backed and related securities," stated John C. Schlosser, President and Chief Executive Officer. "In addition, core earnings also improved due to the Company's leverage strategy and its investment in Bank Wisconsin and in its affordable housing subsidiary. These strategies are intended to derive earnings from the capital raised in our June, 1993 conversion."

Net interest income was higher primarily due to increases in earning assets which averaged \$1.14 billion and \$1.11 billion for the three and nine months ended June 30, 1995 compared with \$911 million and \$861 million for the three and nine months ended June 30, 1994, partially offset by a decrease in the net interest margin during the periods. The 1995 results include the effects of the Company's acquisition of Bank Wisconsin from November 21, 1994 through June 30, 1995, which increased average earning assets approximately \$74 million and \$60 million for the three and nine months ended June 30, 1995, respectively, and added net interest income of \$858,000 and \$2.07 million for the same periods.

Other operating income was higher in both the more recent three- and nine-month periods due to gains on sales of mortgage-backed securities and mortgage loans, gains on trading account activity and increased income from the Company's affordable housing subsidiary.

Gains on the sale of mort-

gage-backed securities were \$1.19 million and \$1.38 million (or approximately \$0.12 and \$0.14 per share after tax, respectively) for the three and nine months ended June 30, 1995 compared with losses of \$113,000 and \$258,000 for the three and nine months ended June 30, 1994. The gains were primarily due to declining interest rates and the Company's repositioning of its existing leverage portfolio, whereby the Company sold securities from the existing leverage portfolio and replaced them with similar securities with more favorable interest rate cap and maturity positions, while the losses in the prior year were primarily the result of the effect of increased interest rates on the Company's mortgage loan pipeline and includes market value losses from related securities.

Gains from the trading account were \$583,000 and \$671,000 (or approximately \$0.06 and \$0.07 per share after tax, respectively) for the three and nine months ended June 30, 1995 compared with losses of \$12,000 and gains of \$47,000 for the three and nine months ended June 30, 1994.

The gains during the current year reflect the effect of recently falling interest rates on the Company's holding of trading assets. Year to year increases in operating income of the affordable housing subsidiary were \$220,000 and \$530,000 for the three- and nine-month periods, respectively.

Other operating expenses were higher in both the three- and nine-month periods ending June 30, 1995 due to the inclusion of Bank Wisconsin operations and the operations of the affordable housing subsidiary. The Bank Wisconsin acquisition, effective as of November 21, 1994, added \$696,000 and \$1.74 million of operating expenses to the results for the three- and nine-month periods, respectively, while expenses related to the affordable housing subsidiary increased \$606,000 and \$848,000 for the three- and nine-month periods, respectively.

Total assets at June 30, 1995 were \$1.19 billion, an increase of \$161 million or 16% from the \$1.03 billion at September 30, 1994. Of this growth in assets, approximately \$85 million was the result of the acquisition of Bank Wisconsin. Loans receivable increased \$86.4 million, including \$45.7 million in the Bank Wisconsin acquisition while the remainder of the increase was generally in consumer loans.

Mortgage-backed and related securities (including available for sale and held to maturity) increased \$38.0 million. The increase was

primarily due to the continuation of the Company's leverage strategy whereby Federal Home Loan Bank advances are utilized to add earning assets. Advances and other borrowings increased \$14.8 million. Deposits increased \$136.5 million during the period of which \$71.8 million was included in the Bank Wisconsin acquisition and \$42.8 million was due to the Company's use of brokered deposits.

Non-performing assets totaled \$6.0 million or 0.51% of total assets at June 30, 1995 compared with \$7.7 million or 0.75% of total assets at September 30, 1994. The decrease in non-performing assets was due to the settlement in the second quarter of fiscal 1995 of a loan on a multifamily property in Houston, Texas. A charge-off of \$210,000 was taken at that time. The allowance for loan losses increased to \$4.1 million at June 30, 1995 compared with \$3.4 million at September 30, 1994 primarily due to the addition of \$694,000 as part of the Bank Wisconsin acquisition. Including the multifamily loan, net charge-offs for the nine months ended June 30, 1995 were \$246,000.

The Company's book value per share was \$21.89 at June 30, 1995 compared with \$18.40 at September 30, 1994. The Company adopted a change in accounting for its ESOP plan which affects the calculation of book value per share by excluding from the calculation ESOP shares not yet released to employees. If the change had been in effect as of September 30, 1994, book value per share at that time would have been \$19.67. Shares are included in the per share calculations as shares are released from the plan.

On May 3, 1995, the Company announced the adoption of a share repurchase program whereby it could repurchase up to 5% or 312,600 shares of its common stock through March 31, 1996. As of June 30, 1995, the Company had repurchased 92,500 shares at an average price of \$19.50 per share. "The repurchase program was adopted to improve earnings per share and return on equity," noted Schlosser.

St. Francis Capital Corporation, with \$1.19 billion in assets, is the holding company for St. Francis Bank, F.S.B. and Bank Wisconsin. The Company operates 18 offices in Milwaukee, Waukesha, Ozaukee, Washington and Kenosha counties.

### School District of Kewaskum Annual School District Meeting and Budget Hearing

MINUTES - July 24, 1995

Mr. Weare proceeded with introductions which included board members Ron Beimborn, John Schulte, Mary Andera, Jean Goeden, Karen Sparks, and Ruth Schmitt. Also introduced were District Administrator David Heather, Legal Representative Bob Duffy and Administrative Secretary Jeanne Jacak.

Jean Goeden nominated Neal Weare as Temporary Chairperson. Dr. Heather asked that nominations be closed. Dr. Heather moved that a unanimous vote be cast for Neal Weare. Mary Andera seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Chairperson Weare appointed Jeanne Jacak as secretary. Chuck Heidner, Larry Wilson and Fred Boehlke were appointed as tellers.

Karen Sparks moved that Robert's Rules of Order for Parliamentary Procedure be used to conduct the meeting. Jean Goeden seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Maurice Hovland moved to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the 1994 Annual Meeting and accept them as presented. Ruth Schmitt seconded the motion. Motion passed.

The financial report of the Kewaskum School District was presented by Dr. Heather.

There was no old business.

Dr. Heather gave his opening remarks which included information on the building/remodeling project as well as a summation of the academic/extracurricular successes of the students during the 1994-95 school year.

Dr. Heather presented the 1995-96 budget.

Ruth Schmitt moved:

Be it resolved by the electors of the School District of Kewaskum that the annual salary of the School Board Members be set at \$1000 per year. Gerald Secor seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Ruth Schmitt moved:

Be it resolved by the electors of the School District of Kewaskum to authorize the payment of actual and necessary expenses of a school board member when traveling in the performance of duties and the reimbursement of a school board member for actual loss of earnings, not to exceed \$50 per day when duties require the school board members to be absent from regular employment. Mary Secor seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Irene Heather moved:

Be it resolved by the electors of the School District of Kewaskum that the School Board be authorized to sell or otherwise dispose of obsolete or unused furniture and equipment which is no longer needed for use by the district. Ruth Schmitt seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Karen Sparks moved:

Be it resolved by the electors of the Kewaskum School District that the School Board provide for a school lunch program and appropriate funds for that purpose. Irene Heather seconded the motion. Motion passed.

John Schulte moved:

Be it resolved by the electors of the Kewaskum School District that the School Board be authorized to furnish textbooks to students under conditions prescribed by the Board of Education. Ruth Schmitt seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Jean Goeden moved:

Be it resolved by the electors of the Kewaskum School District that the School Board operate and maintain transportation vehicles and to purchase liability insurance for such vehicles, and to finance contracts for the use and services of such vehicles. Marcia Theusch seconded the motion. Motion passed.

John Schulte moved:

Be it resolved by the electors of the School District of Kewaskum that a tax be levied on all taxable property of the district for operating expenses and capital outlay for the 1995-96 school year in the amount of \$5,706,515 and for debt retirement in the amount of \$746,175. Karen Sparks seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Chairperson Weare asked those in attendance if anyone cared to discuss any other matters provided by law relating to the management of the district. Maurice Hovland asked where the governor planned to get the funds from if school taxes are cut from property taxes. The board replied that no information regarding that plan has been received yet.

Jean Goeden moved that the date of Monday, July 22, 1996 be set for the 1996 Annual Meeting. Ruth Schmitt seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Karen Sparks moved that the meeting be adjourned. Jean Goeden seconded the motion. Motion passed. The meeting adjourned at 8:38 p.m.

### Despite Rain, Water Trees

Despite the recent rains, urban street and park trees still may need watering by local citizens, according to John Van Ells, a Department of Natural Resources Urban Forester. Van Ells works with communities in Sheboygan, Ozaukee, Washington and Waukesha Counties.

"Though we have had some rain the last several days, it has been widely scattered," said Van Ells. "Citizens should work with their local community officials to water trees, especially newly planted ones."

Landowners should not just water the base of the tree. Van Ells says to water well beyond the tree's drip line since the root system extends beyond that point. A tree's drip line is that zone below the crown's outermost edge. The area to water deciduous trees should be twice the tree's height. For evergreens, the area should be equal to the height of the tree.

For new trees, Van Ells recommends about one inch of water per week. Allowing the water to soak into the ground about two feet is the most helpful. The amount of water needed depends on the soil type, tree species, site condition and weather. The community forester or University of Wisconsin Extension office can provide advice on how much water is needed.

Van Ells notes there are other steps that citizens can do to help newly-planted urban trees. They can maintain the mulch ring, keep the base of the tree weed free and not fertilize the tree.

"Watering trees, especially during dry periods, is important to their survival," Van Ells said. "It doesn't take a lot of effort to promote healthy and successful trees in urban areas."


