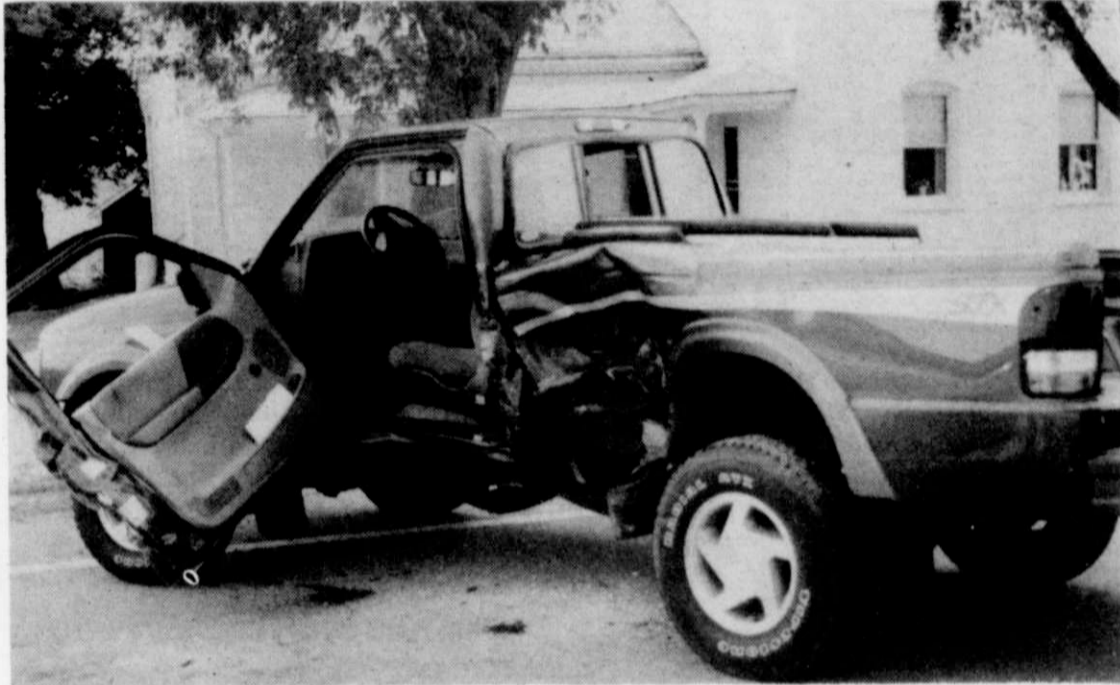

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Three Injured in Hwy. S Accident

Three people were transported to St. Joseph's Community Hospital in West Bend following an accident involving two pickup trucks on Highway S, less than one-half mile north of Kewaskum on Saturday. The southbound vehicle, shown above, driven by James Steil of Oak Creek, collided with the northbound pickup, shown to the right, driven by Clara Trapp of Adell. Her husband, Charles, who was also injured, was a passenger in their truck. Little information on the cause of the accident was available at the time of printing from the State Highway Patrol who handled the accident. At the time of the mishap, two patients were said to be in serious condition and one in critical, however, the hospital did not release information on the condition of the patients or if they had been transferred, late on Tuesday, prior to this publication.

Parents Voice Bussing Concerns

Concerned parents attended last Monday's Finance-Transportation-Building and Grounds committee meeting to discuss the need for bus transportation within the village for lower grade students.

Shawn Roberts, who runs My Little Friends Daycare Center, spoke for the majority that evening. "We're not just asking for the kids that attend My Little Friends, but for all the kids in town that have quite a distance to walk to school," she told the committee. "It wasn't a problem ten, fifteen years ago, but the traffic is twice as much. If any of you go up to the school at the end of the day, there's so many parents

that don't want their kids to walk, they're up there trying to pick them up -- it's a miracle no one has got hurt yet."

The village residents asked the committee to look into the possibility of setting up several pickup points in town, with busses from around the district arriving in town anyway. There has always been the concern, with trucks coming in and out of Kempels, now taken over by Engelhardt's Dairy, as well as the danger of children walking along the river and the railroad tracks, and parents would like to see busing extended to K through third grade. "With traffic the way it is now, it's an accident waiting to happen," Roberts emphasized.

Agenda Confusion at School FTBG Committee Meeting

Confusion dictated Monday night's FTBG committee meeting, when audience members and the media confronted the committee's changing agendas, and the surprising revival of the issue concerning reduction in custodial positions.

An angry group of school district support staff waited until the end of the meeting for the last of 19 items to come up for discussion. Board member and FTBG committee chairperson Jean Goeden asked the committee to once again consider reducing some custodial positions from full-year, full-time, to school year only, full-time, thereby eliminating benefits they now receive, and in turn saving the district some money, a much sought after consequence considering the budget crunching the district has recently faced.

This time around however, the item would reflect a change in only two custodial positions, instead of the three originally scheduled for reclassification at the school board's monthly meeting in May. At that time the item was tabled until June, and then voted down, after board members listened to emotional statements from employees, some of whom have served the district for over fifteen years.

"I wanted to keep this item on the agenda, as far as, if we have enough custodial staff members, school year, to make sure we have enough cleaning people to do it, with this cleaning up," Goeden began the discussion. "That was my main concern, if we had to bring in other ones from the outlying schools. And we're gonna use that savings to fund, if we needed some cleaning services," she stated, referring to a previous agenda item in which the committee debated recommending the hiring of experienced temporary employees from a cleaning service to help speed up the construction cleanup.

Goeden explained that if they needed some extra cleaning people, she was considering the hiring of more school year janitors, and that may have meant eliminating some full-year positions, but since the committee indicated in the previous item discussed, that they would not be doing this, there was no further need to discuss eliminating those positions.

School board member Ruth Schmitt was in the audience and voiced her disapproval of the entire topic. "The way this is placed on the agenda is very misleading. It was my understanding that you were bringing this

issue back for a second time, which is totally unfair to these two people. I'm aware that you can do it, I just think it's unfair to have these people worry about the fact you were putting this item on the agenda once again."

An audience member stated she was under the understanding that the board had agreed for this school year, they would let it all rest, and if anyone new was hired, then they would look at the possibility of hiring them without benefits.

Committee member Ron Beimborn interrupted the conversation by pointing out that mediation and arbitration with the district support staff was taking place with the negotiations committee, and any discussions that evening could affect the outcome. Support staff employee Betty Mikkelsen answered, "This has nothing to do with arbitration and mediation, this is a completely different item. This is people's jobs on the line, these are people's benefits trying to be taken away from them. We listened to the board, and this keeps coming back, constantly. It keeps sneaking right back."

Goeden tried to close the discussion at this point, but further confusion arose from the fact that two different agendas were being used at the meeting, with perhaps the most outspoken member of the audience being WBKV radio announcer Bernadette Parr, who was outraged that the committee had changed the meeting agenda several times in one week. "There were actually four different agendas," she spoke out, "and as someone from the media, I did not receive proper agendas. There was an agenda posted in the paper that had 12 different items on it, then the agenda I finally received had 17 items on it. Then I was told of an agenda that had 18 items on it, and tonight you're discussing an agenda that had 19 items on it, and there's supposed to be 24 hour posting of new agendas. There's four different agendas floating around."

The policy of the school states that the agenda will be posted on the building if there's a revised addition. Audience members stated that it was not available until Friday afternoon. Committee member Larry Fechter told Parr, "I understand your point, but the thing is, if we're within the policy of posting the agenda, then the problem isn't with this agenda, it's with the policy. Because we can do this again then." Committee member Mary Andera added, "We don't have to send it out, merely post it."

the community sees it as underhanded and sneaky, because they're not informed of it," Parr retaliated. "And when we get calls with a question on something too, they (we) don't expect to hear, how did you know about this? It's difficult for us to inform the public on what's going on at a meeting, when the agenda is changed three or four times in one week. "The committee pointed out that according to state law, she had the right to call the district and request the current agenda.

But the audience would not let the issue rest, with another pointing out, "It probably wouldn't have been a big deal, what happened here, if it had been something to do with the building, but when you're talking about people's benefits and people's jobs, that's important! That should not be put on the last day. People should be notified well in advance when something like this is going

to be spoken about."

Goeden again pointed out that she wasn't trying to disguise the item, and the members indicated that they received their revised agendas in the mail on Friday. But a district employee stated that she left the school office at 10 a.m. on Friday to post the agenda at Farmington, and this item was not on the agenda. "In fact, it was not posted on the office window until Betty (Mikkelsen) came and asked for it, because someone told her about it," another employee stated.

The committee's defended themselves by saying they aren't in control of mailing the agendas, and anyone concerned with the items discussed by the committee should be sure to attend the next FTBG meeting on August 21st.

Holy Trinity School will open its doors to welcome students as it has done for the past 116 years. The 1995-96 school year will begin on Monday, August 28th.

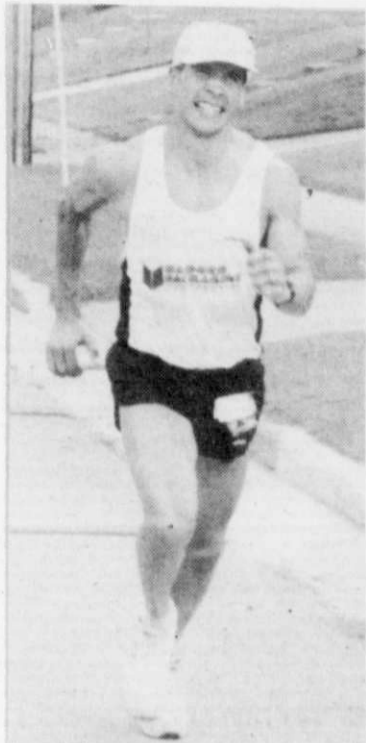

School Will Be Ready to Open Aug. 28

Board, Committee Members and Residents Disagree on Contingency Fund Expenditures

School will be opening right on the scheduled date of August 28th, Hunzinger Construction representative Brian Cohan told the school board at their Monday night monthly meeting, although residents passing by the high school continue to have doubts.

"The high school has definitely been challenging, he admits, with problems arising from the beginning involving a great deal of asbestos removal, not to mention holdups due to water main breaks and a mason's strike.

If all goes as planned, high school principal Charles Heidner will be able to move into the new administrative area this weekend, and the kitchen, which has doubled in size, is done and ready for setting up by food supervisor Kathy Robinson before school starts. "We will be turning over areas as they are completed," Cohen related, with the new science and biology rooms almost ready, but the music room, family and consumer area, CD (communicative disorders) room, and the concessions area behind schedule.

"We're pleased with the way the high school is done, and we think it's a beautiful facility," Cohen remarked, and credited the architects for designing and blending a new building with an existing one.

There will be a little juggling taking place as far as teachers getting in and setting up on inservice days, but principal Heidner pointed out

they were notified of this and are aware of the situation. "I think everybody understands this will not be a normal opening of school," he stated, "but I think we'll do quite well under the circumstances."

Over at the middle school, equipment is being moved into finished areas this week, and the builders considered this a very smooth running project. "We're pleased with the way it went, and pleased with the way it looks," Mr. Cohan said, "and comments I've heard have been very favorable." With only a few minor finishing touches left to complete this week Kewaskum Middle School will be opening on time.

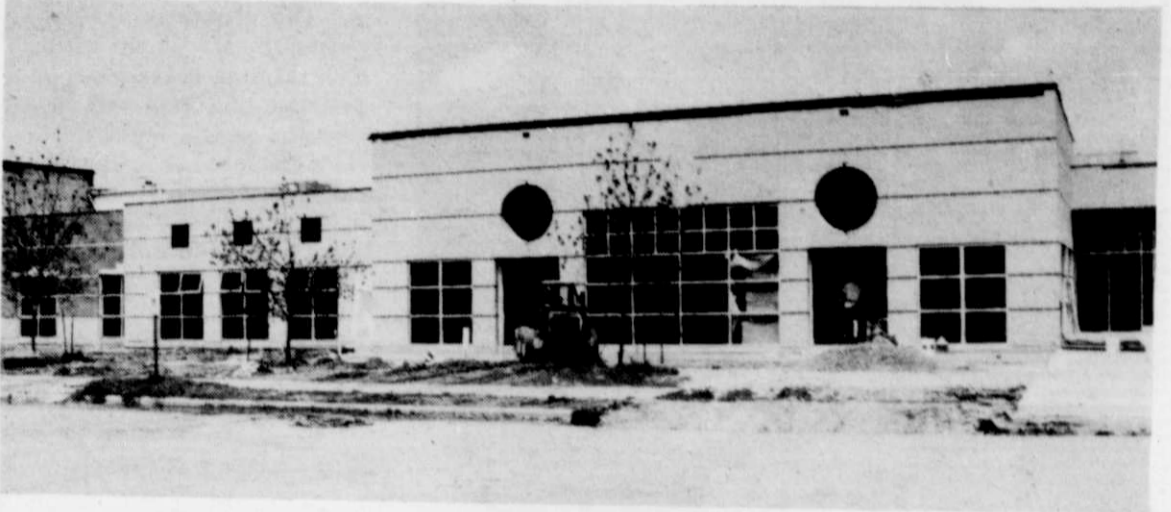
Financially, both construction projects have come out well so far, with a remaining contingency for Kewaskum Middle School of \$67,450 more than one half of the original sum. The high school started with a contingency of \$318,000, and as of now have a remaining \$170,744. Cohen estimates \$150,000 will be left over at the completion of the project.

Meanwhile, factions are divided on the exact meaning of contingency money, and what it should be used for, causing a split in the unity of board members, committee members, and administrative personnel.

At the Finance-Transportation-Building and Grounds committee meeting last week, disagreements arose over spending the remaining monies on needed equipment, carpeting, walls, and windows, as opposed to putting the money toward much needed roof repairs. When faced with frugal committee members who nixed further spending, Dr. Heather spoke out. "Speaking just as a citizen, when I voted for the referendum to build, remodel and add on, I did not vote to use that money to replace roofs. I voted to use that money to come up with the finest facility money could buy, for the school district of Kewaskum."

This opened up debate, with committee member Larry Fechter declaring, "That's just a difference in philosophy, and that doesn't do any good if the roofs are leaking. We should have some fiscal responsibility here to the people. I mean, we're not trying to buy some luxury, and I'm gonna hang my head if we complete this job and we gotta go back to the citizens and ask to borrow \$400,000 (for roof repair)."

Heather, and others felt the district should first complete the facility, and buy

what's needed in the line of equipment to make sure the new areas were will furnished, and not left empty and unused after all that money was spent.

The topic was fired up again at the school board meeting this past Monday, revolving around the replacement of worn carpeting at Kewaskum Middle School and the blocking off of a wall in the KHS shop department. "We're just pick, pick, picking away at this contingency fund," board member Mary Andera voiced her opinion, and FTBG committee member Rick Welch, who was in the audience that night, felt

the builders and architects were taking advantage of the contingency money, stating, "they get a markup on everything that goes into this building, everything. This just goes on and on."

Principal Heidner had earlier stated that he understood the contingency money was there to cover unforeseen expenditures. Resident John Meiser disagreed, telling the board, "a lot of these alternates have nothing to do with the kids. They're a lot of nice little extras. If you've got a large contingency fund set aside, a contractor's gonna put in a low bid, knowing very well they can go to the

well for these other things. I just think it's important to save money here and there and not spend every penny like some board members would like to do."

Despite the committee's recommendation they not purchase new carpeting and tiling at this point in time, the board agreed to purchase what was needed to give the building a better look, and replace carpeting that was damaged and worn out, at a cost of \$14,382, with Goeden and Andera voting no.

As the building projects wind down, it is inevitable that individuals will differ on how to spend the remaining funds, which needs are greatest, and whose priorities should come first, and hopefully decision makers can agree to disagree, yet remain a group with continuity for the district.

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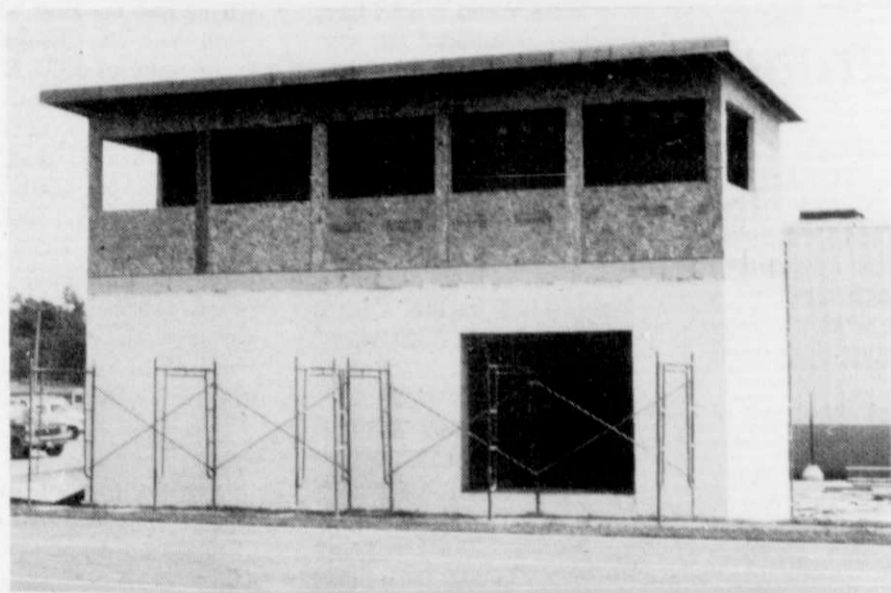
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Funds Still Being Accepted For KHS Press Box

Deer Hunting Licenses Now Available at Statewide Outlets

MADISON -- The 1995 deer hunting licenses for both the archery and gun seasons are now available statewide at license outlets, according to Marilyn Davis, Department of Natural Resources Licensing and Registration Section Chief.

"The bulk shipment of licenses was made to all county clerks in the state last week," Davis said. "Deer hunting licenses cost the same as 1994 with resident archery and gun deer licenses at \$18 and nonresident licenses at \$120." Small game and trapping licenses are also available at the same prices as 1994.

The antlerless deer harvest quota this year has been set at 236,360, up from 177,340 in 1994. There will be 577,335 permits available to deer

hunters this season. The deadline for applying for Hunter's Choice permits, which allow gun hunters to shoot a deer of either sex in specified deer management units, is Wednesday, September 20, 1995.

"We encourage hunters to use the Hunter's Choice application as a means to apply for bonus antlerless deer permits as well," Davis said. "The Hunter's Choice application will be the first crack hunters have at securing the desired bonus antlerless permits in the units where they want to hunt."

New for 1995, both the Hunter's Choice and Bonus antlerless permits will be valid for antlerless deer during the archery deer season to people possessing a valid archery license. Also, the

Hunter's Choice and Bonus Antlerless deer permits will be valid during the muzzle-loader season after the regular gun-deer season.

"Depending on the license processing, some archery hunters will be able to take advantage of using either their Hunter's Choice or Bonus Antlerless deer permits during the early bow season," Davis added. "Most assuredly they will be able to use them during the late bow season."

The statewide archery deer season opens Saturday, September 16 and runs through Sunday, November 12. The gun deer season runs from Saturday, November 18 through Sunday, November 26. The muzzleloader hunt starts Monday, November 27, and runs through Sunday, December 3. The late archery season begins Saturday, December 2 and runs through Sunday, December 31.

Bussing

(Continued from Page 1)

Committee chairperson Jean Goeden told the visitors, "there would have to be a cost factor, how many students on the busses, how many were coming through. We'd really have to look at the monies, and I know the budget doesn't have that available."

District Administrator, Dr. David Heather, indicated that other districts do use consolidated pickup points, and Johnson Bus estimates a cost of over \$27,000 to bus kindergarten students to and from school, going door to door. The company charges per route, not per capacity. The district policy states that kindergartners living more than one mile away within the village limits are bussed into school.

Roberts indicated that parents would be happy with set pickup points, and Mrs. Goeden asked Dr. Heather to look into getting costs for four to five points in town, possibly on Highway S, Highway 45 north and south, and Highway 28. The problem with this, Dr. Heather pointed out, is "if you're going to stop in one point, you'll have to stop at another. Whether the bus has the capacity to take everybody that will be there, I have no idea at this point."

Committee member Larry Fechter agreed. "If we pick them up in front of Shawn's place, then the people over at Bel ric, or wherever, where we don't pick them up, they'll ask, why theirs? The other issue is, if there's any kind of mix of grades. I know it seems like a simple solution, when the busses go right by, but unfortunately it doesn't work that way, that would be too easy."

One of the parents in the audience disagreed, stating that most people do realize that a smaller child has different needs, and would understand these allowances. "If you're a working mother, you don't need the added worry of looking at the clock and saying, OK, now he's crossing the street right about now. Is he gonna make it to school or will I get a phone call?" Goeden related there are crossing guards located at the busier sections of town, including Highway 45.

Children older than kindergarten, are required to walk to school, if they live up to two miles away, and this brings up another reason parents worry, as one mother expressed, "I worry about my kid getting picked up by a stranger in a car." Shawn told the committee that she would be willing to call the bus company, and pay them a fee to pick up the children at My Little Friends, and others agreed that a charge would be a small price to pay, if it meant protecting their children.

"It comes down to basically if the board would entertain changing their bussing policy, which is an issue that's a very good one for discussion," Fechter maintained. "You can't put dollars on any of these kids, there's no two ways about it."

At this point in time, the topic could only be discussed, as the committee can only make recommendations to the board. "We're just telling Dr. Heather to look at the costs on this," Goeden reiterated. A few years ago, this was brought to the attention of the board, and Mrs. Goeden has worked to establish more crossing guards at the busy intersections. "Maybe if this doesn't work, we'll all have to compromise, one way or another," she added.

Committee member Mary Andera asked the parents why the crossing guards weren't enough, with locations to cross at Highways H and 45, Highways 28 and 45, and Second street and Highway 45. Shawn Roberts answered, "Now the groups are bigger, and it seems like once they're past the crossing guard, and the crossing guard leaves, that's when they start to wander, because they're younger and on one's watching them, and that's when the trouble starts."

Ron Beimbom told parents that the school board has been very vocal as far as writing letters to Madison,

and has been very instrumental in getting the stop light in the south end of Kewaskum. "Don't feel that the board is not aware of the dangers of crossing the street, we are."

When the item was brought before the school board this past Monday, the consensus agreed the budget could not support the kind of figures Dr. Heather received from Johnson Bus. To provide transportation for K-5 public and parochial school children residing within the village limits could cost an estimated \$72,084 per year, using two additional routes, for kindergarten alone, around \$27,000. "I don't know where we would get the money for it right now," Goeden said.

Even with four or five consolidated pickup points, the bus company still believes that would require the two additional routes, and Dr. Heather expressed that he thought the best solution would be to let the parents enter into a private contract with Johnson Bus to transport individual children at a cost to the parent of \$35 per month.

The board approved the private contracting, hoping this at least gave parents an alternative other than having their child walk.

School Lunch Policy At St. Lucas School

St. Lucas Lutheran School of Kewaskum today announced its policy for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch Program. The school office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by

any interested party.

The following household size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility. Children from families whose annual income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Application forms were given to each family. To apply for free or reduced price meals households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To obtain free or reduced price meals for children for whom households receive Food Stamps or Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), an adult member needs only to list the names of the school children, give food Stamp or AFDC case number for each child, sign his/her name and return the application to the school office. Households must inform the school authorities when they no longer receive

Food Stamps or AFDC.

For the school officials to determine eligibility for free or reduced price meals of households not receiving Food Stamps or AFDC, the household must provide the following information requested on the application: names of all household members, and the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. In lieu of a social security number, the household may indicate that the signer does not possess a social security number. Also, the income received by each household member must be provided by amount and source (wages, welfare, child support, etc.). Households are required to report increases in income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size.

Under the provision of the free and reduced price meal policy, the school official will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian is dissatisfied

with the ruling of the official, he/she may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If the parent/guardian wishes to make a formal appeal, he/she may make a request either orally, or in writing to: Mr. Erv Uhlman, school board Chairman, 339 Knights Avenue, Kewaskum, WI 53040, phone: 626-4497. If a hearing is needed to appeal the decision, the policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a household member becomes unemployed, or if the household size changes, the family should contact the school. Such changes may make the household eligible for reduced price meals or free meals if the household income falls at or below the levels shown above, and they may reapply at that time.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for free or reduced price meals, the household should complete an application for a family of one or contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household on the application is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age, or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington D.C. 20250.

Any questions regarding the application should be directed to the determining official.

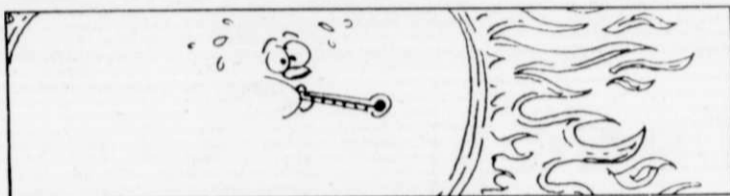

Board Representative for the Plan Commission, Trustee David Goeden reported on the Commission meeting of June 27, 1995.

The Board reviewed the letter received from the Kewaskum School District's Attorney regarding the placement of sidewalk on Reigle Drive. The Board by consensus declined their proposal to pay for 50% of the cost of the sidewalk. The

Board was agreeable to the School District contracting and installing said sidewalk to Village standards during the 1996 and 1997 construction season and maintain same without any Village involvement.

On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee John Borland and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized amending the Agreement For Operation of the Municipal Court For Washington County to allow for the Village of Grafton and City of Port Washington to join the system.

Action was taken on Ordinance No. 95-7 an Ordinance to Amend the name of the Municipal Court to "Mid-Moraine Municipal Court" as attached hereto:

On a motion by Trustee John Borland, seconded by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board approved the application for a Temporary Class "B" Retail License for Holy Trinity Home and School Association for August 26, 1995 at River Hill Park upon payment of fees. The Police Department had no objections to any of the applications. Roll call vote was 6 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 1 "Absent."

On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee Harry Roecker and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the appointment of Tom Piwoni as the agent for Holy Trinity.

On a motion by Trustee John Borland, seconded by Trustee David Goeden and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized the signing of the agreement for ornamental street lighting service with Wisconsin Electric Power Company on Fond du Lac Avenue in reference to the USH "45" reconstruction. Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt reviewed the cost again with the Board indicating that on an annual basis the street lighting budget will increase an estimated

\$3,700.

Trustee Gary Gavin brought up for discussion the water problem at 1238 Roseland Avenue. This problem had been discussed in 1993 when the property was rezoned. The owner at that time was asked to install a swail on both sides of the property to help divert the water. It was indicated the Village could try to help work on a solution, but that the options were rather limited.

Trustee Robert Stoltzmann asked that the Administrator and Police Chief check into the possibility of drafting an ordinance to ban water balloons and squirt guns from use in and around a parade; also that the throwing of candy, etc. is forbidden.

On a motion by Trustee John Borland, seconded by Trustee Harry Roecker and carried by the majority roll call vote, to adjourn to closed session under Chapter 19.85(1)(c) of the statutes to consider employment, compensation and performance of public employees over which the governmental body has jurisdiction and Chapter 19.85(1)(e) of the statutes to deliberate and negotiate the disposition of public lands.
