# Golden Arches to Arrive Here

A McDonald's Express will be arriving in the Village of Kewaskum sometime in late October, according to a Shefond spokesperson.

Steve Kilian, owner of McDonald's franchises in Jackson, Hartford, West Bend and Mayville, will be leasing McDonalds from Shefond-Amoco.

The new restaurant will be attached to the Amoco Station/Mini Mart located on Highway 45, serving customers through a drive-up window on the north side of

the building. Inside seating will be available for up to 15 people.

Shefond-Amoco will also be increasing their parking to the north of the station, to make room for trucks and semis now parking behind

Third Street Residents

Oppose Parking Restrictions

Kewaskum residents living on the northeast end of Third Street attended Monday evening's Village Board meeting to request the Board to revisit action taken on parking limitations placed on Third Street.

Resident George Eggert spoke first, asking board members exactly what the no parking restrictions meant and why there was a difference in parking restrictions on the east end and west end of Third Street.

Eggert stated, "Why is it different on the upper part of Third Street? On the north side they can park for two hours on school days. On the south side they can't park at all from 7 to 4. Now why should there be a difference from that section to our block?"

Trustee Gary Gavin said,
"My question for you is
exactly what is it that you
want?"

Eggert reiterated, "What we want is like up on the

other part of Third Street. On the south side, no parking, and on the north side, two hour parking. That way, if we get company we can at least park two hours on our side of the street like they do on the upper part of Third Street. That's what we want, and no parking on the south side. Give the busses the freedom to go up and down in there the way they're supposed to. I don't know if you know how many cars actually go around that corner in the morning. One morning last year I counted from quarter after seven until twenty minutes to eight. There was 165 cars and busses combined, going around that corner."

Trustee Gavin stated, "I was the initial one that made the motion to have no parking just on the north side and leave the south side the way it was. It was my intent, number one, we're working with the school system to try to relieve the problem of the kids parking on the street and we also had the two other

neighbors that are on the opposite side of the street and they opposed it. They wanted to have parking. So we also listened to the people on the other side of the street. Now we're listening to you."

Gavin further explained, "Let's give it a try," adding that if problems still exist six months from now, the restrictions could be changed or if everything is working fine, there would be no need to change. Gavin stated, "this was a compromise made, that we start eliminating on one side... instead of jumping in and taking it away completely from everybody.

Mrs. Eggert interjected, "Then why didn't we have all Third Street up here to discuss it? That would have been fair to all of us.

Gavin repeated that it had been his understanding that they were sent a letter regarding the parking and then asked Police Chief Richard Knoebel if all the residents had been sent a letter.

Knoebel answered, "Yes they were. I told them my recommendations would be to do it the same as it was on the rest of Third Street. Two hour parking on the north side and no parking on the

south side."

Eggert said they would go along with what Chief Knoebel had originally proposed, but as far as no parking on the north side, it didn't make sense.

Mrs. Eggert stressed, "The people on the north side only have that frontage. The people on the south side have a frontage to Bilgo Lane and Hansons have a frontage to their house on Parkview Drive. Third Street has only frontage on Third Street."

Trustee William Kulas suggested parking restrictions for two hour intervals during peak traffic times in the morning and in the afternoon, which also seemed to be acceptable.

Following further discussion it was decided in order to prevent flip-flopping on the issue, all residents should be mailed a list of options and a notice the decision would be up for discussion at the next village board meeting on Wednesday, September 6. (The meeting will be held on Wednesday due to the Labor Day holiday).

Until the September 6 meeting, the parking restrictions decided on at the previous meeting (no parking on the north side) will remain in effect due to the fact school will already be in session.

Other matters brought up before the board will appear in next week's issue.

and grandfather ran a bakery in Plymouth from 1887 to 1967," Jim relates, "and I've always been interested in the food industry." They hired Issac Solberg as their cook, who's had over seven years experience creating great dishes to please the palate. "I love to cook and make things," Jim explains, "but I can't keep up the pace yet, and consider myself in training to Isaac, so he can get a break in the future."

So far, the community has given them a lot of support, with the snowmobile and Lions clubs booking the restaurant for their upcoming meetings, and Jim and Jan are making it a point to become involved in community projects, recently participating in Dundee's Mill Park

The menu is simple and uncluttered, catering to the locals as well as the tourists who flock through the town on their way to the lakes and nearby campgrounds. Steaks, chicken, pork chops, four seafood plates offered daily, as well as traditional sandwiches, hot or cold, salads, soups and a variety of appetizers, appease appetites of any age. Prime rib is the featured attraction on Saturday nights, and if customers are any indication of the chef's

success, the restaurant has already received some great reviews by word of mouth and repeat patrons.

They uphold to the team philosophy at Crock-A-Dial Inn, as far as their employees are concerned. "They're not my employees," Jim emphasizes. "We work together to serve the customers as best we can. 
Army Pft. Anthony L. Stunt has completed basic training at Fort Jackson, Columbia, S.C.

# **Additional Days of School This Year For KHS Seniors**

Kewaskum High School seniors can look forward to a few more days of school than they're used to, but it's for their own good, school board members decided at last week's monthly meeting.

The Class of '96 graduation date will change from it's traditional Friday before Memorial Day (May 31st), to Thursday, June 6, 1996, which is also the last scheduled day of school.

District Administrator David Heather asked the board to consider the change for two reasons. First, the seniors would lose several days of instruction with an early graduation date compounded by the fact they get out a couple of days ahead of that. Secondly, the state track meet falls on Memorial Day weekend next year, as it has in previous years, and seeing many of the senior boys and girls participate in the meet, many are faced with the decision to skip one or the other.

Students should not have to face making a choice between two once in a lifetime experiences, high school principal Charles Heidner pointed out.

When we have graduation the Friday before Memorial Day weekend, it becomes very disruptive to the rest of the educational process," Heidner told the board, and said he had discussed this with Larry Ammel, high school band instructor, and other teachers, and they agreed that a change would be beneficial. The last day of school was preferred over other dates since students and faculty would be available to participate in graduation ceremonies, in vocal, instrumental, and supervisory capacities.

Board member Mary Andera asked how early graduation came about, with seniors traditionally getting out a week ahead of the rest of the high school, and audience member Larry Ammel explained, "one of the reasons was because we experienced many skip days." Dr. Heather said that the seniors would still be getting out a couple of days before the 6th.

Although Dr. Heather was asking for a permanent policy change, board president Neal Weare indicated they'd consider the change for this school year only, then bring it back next year to give the

community a chance to respond to the decision if they so choose. The board unanimously approved the change for the '95-'96 school year.

After lengthy discussion, the board voted down Ron Beimborn's request to close the west side service road at the high school. Beimborn had asked for the closure to create better parking areas and a smoother traffic flow. He stated that the road was put in with taxpayers money, but he understood that only the busses were allowed to use it, and that was contradictory to it's purpose. A sign is posted at the beginning of the road that reads, "student traf-fic prohibited." Dr. Heather indicated that parents could use the road but risked getting mixed up with the busses in that vicinity.

It was agreed that keeping the road open allows for separation of bus traffic from the rest of the traffic flowing onto the school grounds. The board did suggest it would be beneficial to watch the traffic situation once school starts to study the problem further.

Other items approved that evening included the removal of asbestos from the KHS cafeteria by Environet, at a cost of \$11,035.00 and the construction of a solid wall with double doors for the cafeteria, for \$5,443.00. The committee also approved the purchase of four secretarial work stations, totaling \$11,094, and music and art department equipment in the amount of \$17,876.00.

To save the district some money, it was agreed that a block wall without windows would be built in the high school Tech. Ed. department to replace an existing garage door that is sealed shut. The cost is estimated to be around \$1,200 to \$1,500.

The inclusion of a sidewalk along the east side of Reigle Drive was made part of the district's 96-97 budget, at an estimated cost of approximately \$7,000.

A bid for snow removal from Fischer Truck Service of Kewaskum was also approved by the board, with John Schulte voting no.

Under new business, the

board approved the resignations of KMS LD teacher Kris Wetherall, 5th grade KES teacher Fran Lider, and elementary principal Kevin Steinhilber. Ms. Tracy Schomberg was hired as the new KMS LD teacher.

The extreme heat and violent storms this summer have promoted queries of emergency action. The established plan will be explained and questions answered as part of disaster awareness and preparedness.

This meeting will be held at the Wayne Town Hall on Hwy. H, west of the elementary school. All Wayne resi-

dents are welcome.





# Start of School Year Can Add to Family Stress

By the end of August, most families eagerly anticipate the new school year. Kids look forward to seeing friends again, while parents may breathe a sigh of relief that a more structured routine replaces a chaotic summer. However, the beginning of a new school year can add to family stress. Shuffling child care, transportation, and after-school activities presents a challenge to parents. Yet, even with all the added responsibilities, its' usually easier for adults to make transitions than it is for chil-

For kids, there may be apprehensions or fears about entering a new grade or moving to a new school. Younger children may be worried about leaving home and their ability to find their way in a new environment. Older children may feel pressured by academic expectations and may wonder if they will make friends easily in a new setting.

Before the school year starts, parents should sit down with their children and discuss the changes and expectations brought on by a new school year. Typically, parents talk among themselves about changes and transitions, but rarely talk to their children about the same issues. Holding a family meeting or talking informally to children about their concerns may help them voice their fears. Then, together, the family can work to come up with solutions.

These tips will help your family alleviate school-year stress and make a smooth transition.

-Gradually ease into your new schedule. After the long days of summer, children may be staying up too late. Several weeks before school starts, make bedtime 15 minutes earlier. Wake the kids up 15 minutes earlier each morning. Continue moving up their bedtime every few

days. You may have to spend extra time in the evening establishing bed time rituals, such as reading or storytelling.

-Block off a few minutes each evening, perhaps at bedtime, to spend time with your children. Discuss what happened that day, tell stories, or read together. Being accessible to children will encourage them to talk to you about their concerns.

Once a week, set aside time to do a special activity as a family. Take turns letting different family members choose the activity. Being together and anticipating an event will build closeness and can encourage open discussion.


-Set aside regular times each evening for homework. Sit down at the table with your children and read or work on your own "homework" or project. This will show your children that you value the importance of taking time to improve yourself or learn new things.

-Get to know your children's teachers in advance and keep in contact with them throughout the school year, not just at conferences. If your kids know you are interested and knowledgeable about their school and teachers, they will be more willing to share their feelings and experiences with you. Knowing the teacher's style and philosophy may help you think of ways he or she can be most effective in working with your child.

-When new opportunities arise at school, encourage your child to participate by giving them options. Many children are reluctant to try new things because of the fear of failure. By presenting options to your child, like a choice between a sport and learning to play an instrument, you encourage participation with- out forcing your child to get involved.

## August 21, 1970

The Kewaskum Community Schools will open next week following the summer vacation. Friday, August 28 will be the first full day of school for the students. Holy Trinity Parochial School will also open the same day. The largest freshman class in history had registered at Kewaskum High School as of Monday of last week with 188 students enrolled. A total of 665 students are expected in high school, grades 9 through 12.

Only about 2 1/4 hours from returning from fires in the Kettle Moraine State Forest in the afternoon, Kewaskum firemen were called out again Sunday. The

second call came about 6:45 p.m. to the Otto Giese farm several miles west of the village and about a mile north of Highway 28, in the Town of Auburn, where a barn, pigs, chickens, hay and farm machinery were destroyed in a barn fire. The entire 40 by 68 structure was destroyed. Lost with it were a chopper, blower, seeder and other farm machinery and equipment, two brood sows and a boar, 17 small pigs, 50 chickens and approximately 10 to 15 ton of baled hay. The cause of the fire has not been determined.

Fire destroyed eight buildings, livestock and machinery on the farm of Alvin Berres located about eight miles north of Kewaskum on Highway 45. The loss was estimated between \$175,000 and \$200,000.

The Ridge Riders Motorcycle Club of Clark Air Force Base near Manila in the Philippines has set up a memorial for the late Sgt. Clifford Bales, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sylvester Bales of Route 1, Kewaskum, one of two American airmen who were found slain in the Philippines in April of this year. Filipino police attributed the slayings to Communist led Huk terrorists. They have made arrangements with the Kewaskum Floral Shop to place flowers on Sgt. Bales' grave at Holy Angels Cemetery in West Bend, on his birthday for the next ten years.

# Town of Scott Recycling Is No Longer a 'One Man' Operation

By Bernadette Mondloch

The Town of Scott Board Recycling Center is in need of machinery operators. An individual is being sought to operate baling and shredding machines. The board will be meeting on September 23 to

determine qualifications and hourly rates to be paid for the new employee. Recently the town has begun marketing the recycling items and have found that the recycling center is no longer a "one man" operation.

During the "citizen input" portion of the August meeting, comments were directed at the excessive noise coming from the A & R Pipeline operation on Tower Road. In addition to the verbal complaints, a letter was read from a town resident who lives nearly two miles from the pipeline. Town Chairman Lester Benzschawel explained that he has been in contact with the officials of the pipeline and that they are working on diminishing the amount of sound generated by the large engines being used at the plant.

A resolution was passed, applying for exemption from the county library tax for 1996. In order to qualify for the exemption, the town will expend for the local library fund an amount at least equal to the sum which it would have to pay toward the 1996 Sheboygan County Library tax levy. This year that figure is \$24,787.23, approximately \$1,200 more than in 1995.

Citizens who are planting trees along their front lot lines are reminded that trees should not be any closer than 33 feet from the center of the road. This does not mean that

the planting can be at the 33 foot mark, but allowances should be made for spreading branches

Approval was given for a number of zoning changes. The first went to Erhard Klug for 8.99 acres zoned from A-2 to A-1 located in the Section 21. A number of years ago Klug intended to build on this property so it was zoned A-2. Plans have changed, and therefore the request was to go back to A-1

The second approval was for a 3.21 acre parcel owned

by Larry Fechter in Section 33. The change was from A-1 to A-6. The property is located on Paradise Drive.

Two acres in Section 35, owned by Armin Arndt, was changed from A-2 to A-6, allowing for a home to be built at that location. The land is being separated from a 3.02 acre parcel on which Arndt currently lives. In addition, a conditional use permit was issued to Armin and Melissa Arndt, allowing for a beauty salon to be operated out of the home which is being built.



The Village of Adell continues to pursue the possibility of obtaining a Block Grant to assist in the construction of a Community Based Housing Development which would be located in the village.

There is also a possibility of the availability of village owned land being sold to Phil and Penny Jones and Wayne and Connie Springs, potential developers.

A CBRF is a community living facility that provides room and board, supervision and supportive services to persons who are unable to live independently in the community or who choose to live in these facilities.

If it is determined that the land east of the Municipal Garage is a suitable location for a CBRF, the village board would give some consideration to selling. A public hearing would be held prior to taking any form of action. No selling price has been established.

The block grant program is administered through the State of Wisconsin Department of Administration, Division of Housing. It makes available favorable financing to the developers, offering lower than market finance rates, low loan initiation costs, and provides that as the loan is repaid, the money is placed into a revolving loan fund for the municipality to appropriate for other projects. Facilities such as this have shown great success in Oostburg, Sheboygan Falls, Plymouth and Port Washington, most at 100%

capacity.

The next step will be to contact the Department of Industry, Labor and Human Relations and to set up a meeting with the Department of Development to review the developers plans and to make sure that all requirements of the CBRF are met.

Attorney Dean Stange, who has left the Ritger Law Firm in Random Lake has been chosen to continue as the village's attorney. Stange's office is now located in Saukville.

A resolution was passed, applying for exemption from the county library tax for 1996. In order to qualify for the exemption, the village will expend for the local library fund an amount at least equal to the sum which it would have to pay toward the 1996 Sheboygan County Library tax levy. This year that figure is \$6,104, \$66 less than was due for 1995.

Relocation of a fire hydrant which was recently struck by a delivery truck at the Adell Market will be included in the 1996 budget.

Another budget item will be the maintenance and possible repair for Well #1 pump and related equipment. It has been ten years since the equipment has been inspected and reconditioned.

Matthew Oberhofer, pro-

ject environmental specialist for Fluid Management, Inc. and David Henderson, specialist for Advent Environmental met with the board to discuss rates for discharge of water from the groundwater cleanup operations currently being done at the Adell Coop and Adell Motors. A decision is being held over until next month pending investigating research on the village's costs for the additional flow through the force main to the Onion River Waste-

water Treatment Plant.

The county highway department will be contacted to investigate alterations needed to adjust the storm water flow to a lot on Wisconsin Street, owned by John Pederson.

The Audit committee will meet prior to the September board meeting at 6 p.m.



# Local Anachronists Preparing for Activities

The local chapter of the Society for Creative Anachronism (SCA) is preparing a number of activities, starting in September. The SCA is a non-profit educational organization that studies and recreates the Middle Ages. Many people in the area have seen SCA participants dancing or participating in other activities in costumes of the Middle Ages at Port Washington's Fish Days and West Bend's Historic Fest. The SCA also helped out at Milwaukee's German Fest this year.

The local chapter is offering free dance classes on the first, third and fourth Wednesdays of each month. The dances are from England, France, Germany, and Italy and were first recorded in the 15th to 17th centuries. Dances will include formal, entrance dances, such as European Pavanes, formal court dances, such as Burgundian Basse Dances, and Italian Renaissance Court Dances. Some of the later period dances are predecessors to the Minuet, the Waltz, and the Virginia Reel.

The second Wednesday of each month, and the fifth Wednesday, when there is one, will feature a free game night. The Games of the Middle Ages will include some games which are still popular today, such as Chess, Backgammon, and Dominoes. There will also be more obscure games, such as Nine Man Morris and Miller in the Middle. This is a study and re-creation of what really was, in the best and most fun ways.

All of these activities, and more, will be taking place indoors at the Midwest triclone (the remote-control racecar track) in Jansen Family Park, on Schuster, just West of Hwy. B in West Bend. Activities are Wednesday nights from 7:00 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. These activities are open to the community and are free of charge.

The local chapter also has small groups who meet for other activities, recreating many other aspects of the Middle Ages. These other activities include fighting (using practice swords), archery, needlecrafts, costume making, brewing and vintning, music, storytelling, cooking, and much more. The group endeavors to study and recreate all of the best aspects of the Middle Ages. The Society for Creative Anachronism is Creative in that indoor plumbing and other modern conveniences are welcomed as the group studies and has fun with history. 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
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## EWSCA NEWS

(PLYMOUTH, WI) Gary Laack of Glenbeulah held off point leader K.J. Skelton of Cascade to record his first 30 lap Eastern Wisconsin Stock Car Association Modified feature victory of the season Saturday night at Sheboygan County Fair Park.

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

## Muzzleloader Season to Include Bucks!

Muzzleloaders will be happy to know that this year they will be able to take an antlered deer in the muzzleloader season. In the past, when the muzzleloader season opened on Monday, the day after the regular deer gun season closed, muzzleloaders were only allowed to shoot antlerless deer.

To participate in this hunt the hunter had to have an unfilled Hunters Choice Permit or a Bonus Tag, for the management unit they wanted to hunt in or hunt with someone, under the group hunting law, who had one or more of these unused tags. This law change has been passed and will go into effect this muzzleloader season.

Beginning this year, hunters who possess an unused Hunters Choice Permit will be able to fill their tag with either an antlerless deer or a buck. Bonus Tags must still be filled with an antlerless deer only, which is the same as in the regular deer gun season. This rule

David Gosa, a 1995 graduate of Kewaskum High School, recently signed a scholarship to cross-country ski for the University of Wisconsin - Green Bay. David is the son of Jerry and Mary Gosa. UW-Green Bay is a NCAA Division I - four year college. The scholarship will provide tuition on a one year renewable basis the maximum the school can offer athletes.

While at Kewaskum High School, David lettered 4 years in track and 3 years in cross-country. He earned 2nd team All-Conference honors once and 1st team All-Conference honors twice in cross-country. 
