

food, and entertaiment that rivals past years. It just keeps getting better!



The new business is built onto the historic home of Mike and Judy Berger, and reflects the rustic atmosphere of its 19th century inhabitant,

the village blacksmith. A fireplace is built around the remnants of the old blacksmith forge, once used by a man named Stark in the early 1900's. Berger believes that the building was erected in 1878, from research done by her sister-in-law, Diane Susen. The Bergers purchased the building in 1973.

"My daughter was the instigator of this whole idea," Judy points out at their opening this past weekend, but it's obvious the mother-daughter team know their business and have a handle on just what their customers are looking for. Daughter Shari Hanson got both of them started in ceramics ten years ago, when she wanted to paint unicorns, and they both began attending ceramic classes.

Their successful hobby has turned them into regular exhibitors at local craft shows, and keeps them busy year 'round trying to keep up with the demand for orders. "We really have to work to bring our stock back up," Judy states, "since we've used up most of it for the store. and now Kettle Kountry Kolors is coming up this

weekend."

Shari and Judy have been regulars at Kewaskum's fall festival, and consider it their most successful show. Their ceramic work can also be found on consignment in several shops around the area.

"We had the space, and the knowledge, and I thought we might as well put it all to use," Shari points out, and Judy agreed that it would be a great location, with the high volume of traffic that flows along Highway 28.

With a lot of support and encouragement from other businesses within the community, remodeling began in

Mike spent many late night hours trying to get the project completed by fall. "Mike worked day and night, doing all the interior and exterior work, with help from our son, Scott," Judy remarks.

The store was originally scheduled to open in spring, so they thought they had plenty of time. "After talking to some other business owners, we decided it would be advantageous to be open for Kettle Kountry Kolors, as well as the upcoming holiday season." So a race with time began to meet the new dead-

and Main Street Crafts reflects the adage, fromt he white pine exterior, with each board hand planed, to the decorative shutters and railing. Judy has trimmed the exterior with the festive fall look of pumpkins and gathered corn stalks, and the completed effect dresses up the street and appeals to cus-

The interior is let with track lighting, that shows of rustic barnwood shelving laden with unique, one of a kind items. "Basically, everything we carry is hand crafted," Judy maintains, "except for the wildlife prints." Graphic artist Diane Susen has created a line of sweatshirts with "The Gateway to the Kettle Moraine" logo, available at the shop, along with ironwork from Kewaskum's nationally known blacksmith, Dan Nauman of Big Horn Forge.

Also offered for the first time in the area, are antique photo reproductions and original antique advertisements, matted and framed (also using antique frames) by Dan Schmidt, our village administrator, who is also a well known history buff.

Main Street Crafts also features ceramics, wood crafts, dried floral arrangements, wreaths, pressed flower greeting cards, stained glass window hangings, collectible porcelain dolls, hand poured Door County candles, birch bark baskets from Park Falls formed without glue or staples, sunflower pieces, and the recently popular lighthouse collection. "They're really big around Port Washington and other places along the lake," Judy states, "and it's just now catching on in other areas.

Always in demand are Shari's ceramic wizards and dragons, that sparkle with an air of ancient fantasy. "I started making them for my husband, and when I tried bringing some of the pieces to shows, I sold out the first day," she relates. All of their ceramic work is dry brushed, and they try to offer pieces that are unusual and not seen everyday.

The store will display a permanent Christmas corner, as well as a seasonal point of interest that expands on a holiday theme -- right now you'll find Thanksgiving decor to brighten the home or give as gifts. In the future, Judy's working on increasing her selection of wood crafts, and wants to add a line of collectible birdhouses. And, of course, Mike is continuing to finish the rest of the building's exterior, and Judy is hoping to come up with some kind of deadline to give him, since it worked so well last

The new store also offers a tourist information center, carrying lake maps, snowmobile and biking trails, and tourism magazines.

"I'd like to thank all the business people who have encouraged me," Judy adds, "and I hope this will encourage others to open their own business. Kewaskum is so ideally located, and we could attract a lot of people to the area if we continue to work together.'




Jaycees Donate \$2,000 Towards New T-Ball Diamond

tary, while earning a bachelor's degree in biology from Saint John's University in Minnesota, a master's degree in human resources from George Washington University in Washington D.C., and his Ph.D. in administration, including policy analysis and education, from Northwestern University in Illinois.



trict and served as a dedicated volunteer for St. Lucas Church and the community.



Before the Transitional Home can be occupied there needs to be quite a bit of renovation. This Open House will give the community the opportunity to come and see the home and what Friends of Abused Families has planned for the home. Come join Friends for refreshments and a tour.

Friends of Abused Families has been providing services to victims of domestic violence since 1977. We are dedicated to providing

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

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Lego Mania in Children's Tent at Kettle Kountry

Lots of Legos will be coming to Kettle Kountry Kolors this year, thanks to architect John Peine from Wauwatosa, who thinks that using creativity and imagination is a neat way for kids to learn about design, structure, and how to plan a city.

Peine has his own business designing commercial and residential projects and is also a member of AIA of Wisconsin (American Institute of Architects). Fifteen years ago, the group wanted to sponsor a children's event at Summerfest in Milwaukee, and they contacted the Lego company who responded by sending them one million legos.

This was the beginning of Lego Mania, a children's program that has increased in popularity over the years. John has been chairman of this activity for the past five years, and he considers it a unique outreach program for his AIA chapter. "Teachers observed us at Summerfest, and asked if we would present the program at their school," John states. "Now I haul my Lego's around on Fridays and travel to schools to teach the kids about architecture.

A typical class of about 25 students would participate in an hour long program, with each student receiving a box of 400-500 Legos. "Each child draws a card that tells them what to build, a bridge, playground, bank, store, etc.," John explains. "They're the architects. "Meanwhile, Peine builds a city to accommodate the children's designs, including roads, rivers, lakes and parks, and talks to the class about architecture and what it takes to design a workable community.

Afterwards, the kids have to decide where their building or structure would be most appropriately located in the city. "You wouldn't put a plastics factory next to a playground," John mentions, and the students learn the fundamentals of building and planning, while having fun a the same time. Then the next class comes in, and by the end of the school day, Peine says the city ends up with 100 to 150 buildings, and the kids go away with a feeling of pride and accomplishment.

Offered for the first time at Kettle Kountry Kolors, work tables will be set up in the children's tent on both days, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., and children can stop in and try their hand at architectural design. John will have the city set up on a big piece of carpeting, and spectators can wander in and watch the city grow throughout the day. Don't let your children miss

this educational opportunity, at Kewaskum's fall festival of family fun on Saturday and Sunday, October 7th and 8th at River Hill Park.

Grothman Denounces Stadium Plan as Unconstitutional

Last week the state legislature voted to impose a onetenth of a percent sales tax to build a new Brewers' stadium on five counties (Milwaukee, Waukesha, Ozaukee, Washington and Racine).

Much of the debate focused on players' salaries, whether we should help the Brewers' ownership and whether baseball was still popular in Milwaukee. Is it better for the state to have people spending their entertainment dollars on Brewer tickets, parking, brats and beer, or at local restaurants, taverns, movie theaters and golf courses? Will people who never go to the games still miss listening to the Brewers on the radio or reading about them in the paper?

While I feel we must try to keep the Brewers in Milwaukee, there was a much larger issue which caused me to vote no: this plan is unconstitutional. The State of Wisconsin should not be able to tax one county differently than another without that county's approval. That is why we have county boards.

This plan is contrary to Article VII of the State Constitution which forbids the state from levying a different tax on a geographic area. The proposal is opposed to the equal protection clause of our federal constitution as well.

Our taxpayers and business community were outraged three years ago when groups who would like to see more government spending tried to change the uniformity clause of our Constitution. We understood at the time that if government could raise taxes on only some people but not everyone, the government

The stadium proposal, which allows outstate legislators to vote for a tax without our approval, sets a very dangerous precedent. While this tax is small, Milwaukee will want more expensive projects (i.e. light rail) in the future. Would it be right to force a special tax on us without our approval then? Like all constitutional guarantees, we must be vigilant to the first efforts to erode our rights.

Sadly, the proposed plan was not necessary to build a new stadium.

There were two ways to ask for local approval without being forced in by the rest of the state.

We could have had a fivecounty referendum.

The results of the sports lottery referendum held last April at the worst possible time --- as games were being suspended because of the strike --- indicated approval in four counties. The referendum lost by only 3,000 votes in Racine, but in the more positive environment of today would have passed as well.

A better way to get local approval would be to condition approval on a vote of the county boards.

Indications were that four county boards would have volunteered to approve the plan if they were asked.

Ozaukee County rejected a resolution opposing the stadium 20-10. We received a letter supporting the stadium from Waukesha County Chairman on the eve of the vote. Milwaukee County will have to vote to approve infrastructure costs. I personally talked to over 25 Washington County supervisors and am sure Washington County would have voted for the stadium, too.

Yet, instead of setting a referendum for December or asking for county board approval, the State Assembly plunged ahead without either. J support the Brewers. I would have voted to have a referendum in each county or a four-county tax conditioned on county board approval. But, an unconstitutional tax imposed from Madison sets a precedent we will long regret.
