

Board Approves Budget

Village Tax Rate Reflects 0% Increase

Not a single taxpayer was stirring in the audience at the Public Hearing set up for approval of the 1996 Village Budget on Monday evening.

Whether the conspicuous absence of taxpayers was due to the havoc Mother Nature was rendering outside the Municipal Building, or a lack of interest in how tax dollars are being spent, is yet to be

determined. Lack of attendance at local governmental proceedings generally indicates that John Q. Citizen feels, "all is right with the world." And, actually, John Q. Citizen should be quite pleased with local government due to the fact the Village Tax Rate reflects a 0% increase. This seems to be a fact that is virtually unheard of in government these days.

The Village Tax Rate for 1994 was \$7.318 compared to the 1995 Tax Rate of \$5.258 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

According to Village Administrator Daniel Schmidt the Village has again maintained a stable balanced budget for 1996. The general budget has actually decreased \$173,577 or 10.4%. The tax levy to be collected, that means real dollars to be collected, is actually increased. But the increase is caused by real growth. The Village Property Tax Rate will remain constant in comparison to '94/95. The equalized value has increased \$13,349,000 or 13.8%. The assessed value for '95 increased \$40,522,800

Kelly Wagner's Condition Upgraded

Kelly Wagner, the nine year old Farmington student who was hit by a car on October 26 while attempting to cross the street, still remains at Children's Hospital in Milwaukee, but doctors say she is now conscious, and some signs of health are returning.

For awhile it was touch and go, as Kelly developed a brain infection, and faced surgery, but a spokesperson for the family states that the infection miraculously cleared up, and as far as they know, no further infection has developed.

The second grader has been moved from intensive care to the rehabilitation unit, and is able to breathe on her own. "She does wake up and open her eyes, but we can't tell if she is really seeing us or not," the spokesperson related, since she is still unable to talk or feed herself. They feel she may still be in some pain, since she does cry when she is awake, and doctors will be performing surgery to implant a permanent shunt to relieve the pressure on her brain due to swelling from fluid buildup.

Kelly has a long road ahead of her, and the prognosis is unclear at this point, as to whether any brain damage occurred. It is possible that she may have to learn to do some things over again, but her age is a plus, and friends and family are hopeful that she can make a full recovery.

West Bend Savings Banks in Kewaskum and West Bend are set up to receive donations to a fund set up in her name. Her parents, Wayne and Darlene, are grateful for the prayers and support they have received from the community. All donations to Kelly Wagner will be used to help defray the mounting medical costs the family now faces.

This little girl turned nine on November 12, but was unable to enjoy the milestone most children look forward to. Wouldn't it be nice to acknowledge her birthday by donating to her account during the holiday season? Her family is hoping that by Christmas she'll be well enough to come home on a day pass from the hospital.

"I always worked on cars on my own, so I did have my own business before, but now it's more official," he states, pointing out that Auto Body Dynamics is located in the old Honeck showroom, which also housed a movie theater in previous years.

Insurance work is a difficult field to get into," he explains, "since most companies tend to work with larger shops in the area they've already established business with. art JBI metal spray booths with respirator systems that comply with all safety guidelines regulating the industry today. The 24 x 15 foot booth appears futuristic, with built in lights illuminating the already stark white interior, creating a perfect area for spray painting cars to perfection. "I've had the best luck with this brand, and it seems to be consistent," he said. Two clear coats as a protective seal is applied over three or four coats of color, depending on the color being used. "It varies from shop to shop and person to person." he

or 58.2% due to the revalua-

Administrator Schmidt explained, "In reference to the revaluation process, that's mandated by the State of Wisconsin Department of Revenue. They establish the values; the equalized value, that means the market value, and the assessed value."

The State mandates that once a political jurisdiction (that being a town, village or city) falls below 90% of equalized (market) value, it is necessary for that jurisdiction to be reassessed (revalued). This process must be accomplished within a designated period of time.

The Village of Kewaskum did fall below the 90% about four years ago and was mandated to accomplish a revaluation, which was completed January 1, 1995. The revaluation reflects actual property worth/value by category.

Trustee Gavin asked, "Once you're below, at 89%, you have three years to do the revaluation?"

Schmidt replied, "Actually, four. If the community does not proceed to do it, then the State brings in State Assessors and you pay them whatever. You don't have a choice."

He further explained, "We're at 99 now. Next year, I would anticipate that we'll be down to 94 or 92. Many residential properties went up substantially. We had a property that went up from \$43,000 to \$75,000. That property just sold for \$90,500. That's 23% higher than what the assessment

It should be further noted that values have continued to increase since January 1, 1995, the revaluation date. Residential properties are actually selling for 6% to 12% more than assessed. What this means is that within another year or two the Village may be ordered to reassess property again. This is not only time consuming, but costly, for such a revaluation will cost an estimated \$40,000.

It was noted that the State of Wisconsin has kept the "Lottery Credit" on the tax bill. The level of all basic services has remained at or near the same as in previous years. There will be a modest amount of street maintenance work accomplished in 1996. However, with the State Legislature not increasing the Department of Transportation budget, it is likely the Village will need to cut back that

proposed amount of work.

It should further be noted that the Village has again had its share of State Shared Revenue and Expenditure and Restraint moneys cut. This year approximately \$28,000 will be lost.

The assessed gross tax rate has decreased from \$37.91 (\$26.99) to \$25.57 this year, a decrease of \$1.429 or 5.3%. All taxing jurisdictions have followed in the Village's footsteps generally, stabilizing their budgets and even decreasing them slightly. The Village Board has no authority to approve or disapprove of these rates, just mandated to collect those

The state tax credit will be coming in at \$1.22 which reflects a modest increase. The final rate will actually end up being \$24.34 which is down \$1.34 from last year.

Filing Deadline Is Extended

For Village Board Candidates

All village and school district residents are reminded that the deadline for filing candidacy papers and noncandidacy papers is rapidly approaching. The deadline for filing non-candidacy papers was Friday, November 24.

Normally any electors desiring to be a candidate for either school board or village board, must file a Sworn Declaration of Candidacy at the respective offices of the School District (1450 School Street) or the Village Municipal Building by Tuesday, December 5th.

However, due to the fact

an incumbent for the position of Village Trustee failed to file non-candidacy papers by the deadline, the filing deadline for candidacy has been extended for 72 hours.

This will give non-incumbents only the opportunity to file candidacy papers until 5 p.m. on Friday, December 8. This rule will affect only candidates (who are not incumbents) for Village Board. The School Board candidates must have their papers filed by December 5.

There are three positions open on the Kewaskum School Board and three positions open on the Kewaskum Village Board. Please exercise your civic right and duty to serve on one of these boards. Your community could very well be a better place if you decide to become involved in it.





Santa Will Appear at Breakfast in Kewaskum



WINTER PARKING

The Winter Parking Restrictions and Snow Emergency Parking Restrictions go into effect at mid-night (12:00 a.m.) on December 1, 1995.

Municipal Code Section 7.04(3) Night Parking Restrictions, reads as follows: Signs have been erected at or reasonably near the corporate limits as provided in Section 349.13, Wisconsin Statutes, no person excepting physicians or licensed emergency vehicles on emergency calls, shall park or stop any vehicle on any public street or highway within the village between the hours of 2:00 A.M. and 6:00 A.M. from December 1, to April 1, of each year; provided that, notwithstanding such restrictions vehicles may be parked a period of time not longer than 3 minutes for actually loading or unloading of passengers, and provided further that no other regulation restricting parking as to place, time, or manner violated thereby.

The fine for violating the ordinance is:

\$5.00 if paid within three (3) days of the issuance of the parking citation.

\$10.00 if paid after ten (10) days but before 28 days.

After 28 days, the amount is \$25.00 and a notice will be sent to the Motor Vehicle Department to suspend your vehicle, registrations and refuse renewals until the citation is satisfied.

An important fact is the owner of the vehicle is responsible for the payment of the citation whether or not he was the operator.

Municipal Code Section 7.04 (4) <u>Removal of Illegally Parked Vehicles</u>. This section covers the issuance of citations to and possible removal of such vehicles in violation of this ordinance. In addition to other penalties provided by Section 7.04(6) of this code, the owner or operator of a vehicle so removed shall pay the cost of the towing and storage.



Hunters Register 186,103 Deer on Opening Weekend

MADISON -- A large, healthy deer herd and perfect weather conditions statewide marked the 1995 Wisconsin gun deer season opening weekend as one of the most enjoyable on record, Bill Mytton, Department of Natural Resources deer and bear ecologist, said.

Wildlife managers working deer registrations reported many successful hunters throughout the state. Hunters mentioned spotting good numbers of deer in certain areas while the ideal hunting weather tempered the attitudes of hunters that in some areas didn't see the number of deer they expected.

A total of 186,103 deer were registered during the opening weekend which included 96,242 bucks and 89,861 antlerless deer.

"The total is very encouraging from a management aspect. It indicates a lot of hunters participated in Wisconsin's tradition of hunting and that many were able to harvest a deer," Mytton said. "The two-day registration figure is the highest we've had, topping 1990 when 168,546 deer were registered. There were 146,335 registered opening weekend last season."

Hunters had until 5 p.m. on Monday, November 27, to register their deer. The nine-day season ran through Sunday,

November 26.

Under the framework established for the gun deer season -- with opening day the Saturday before Thanksgiving -the season came earlier this year, and many hunters reported that rut, or mating, activity was still going on causing increased natural movement of deer during the day. Several wildlife managers also reported signs that the rut was later this year.

Along with the ideal hunting conditions, hunters also had the highest number of antlerless permits ever issued. Managers reported that statewide many young hunters harvested their first deer this season. The marginal acorn crop this fall caused deer to congregate near agricultural crop fields and affected movement patterns in forested areas.

"Snow cover held from the northern forested area as far south as north-facing hills in Dane County, which helped hunters see into the woods and made for better tracking," Mytton

Several hundred deer have already been donated to feed the hungry through the Sportmen Against Hunger program. Hunters who participated in this program donated the cost of processing the meat and took their deer to participating meat processing plants.




