a crowd that numbered 5,000 last year. Hosts Bill and Cyrilla, along with their sons, Mike and Ralph, and daughters-in-law Connie and Mary Lou, extend a warm welcome to everyone who

plans to visit their dairy farm, and hope their Breakfast on the Farm will be an enjoyable experience that folks will remember for a long time.

It was 80 degrees on October 18, 1947, when Bill and Cyrilla (Vogt) were married at Holy Angels Church in West Bend. After a noon dinner was served at the farm, a large gathering of people enjoyed the music of then, "Jack Thull and the Texas Rangers" band, playing out on the front lawn. Bill worked on the farm started by his parents, with his brother, Jack, and two sisters. At the time of their marriage, Cyrilla worked as a secretary at Pick Mfg. Company in West Bend.

After Jack's untimely death in 1955, Bill and his two sisters bought Jack's share of the farm from his widow, Cresence, who still lives in a house next to Bills, on the main farm.

The Thulls have raised five children: Mike, Ralph, Denis, Kathleen and Eileen. Michael married Connie Drummer in May of '73,

at St. Stevens Church in Horicon. After their marriage, they moved into the farmhouse on the third Thull farm (The


Steak Fry Monday

Village of Kewaskum water users may need to exercise caution washing white clothing or other activities where possible iron content could cause stains.



Board Hears Update on MBT Communication System, Reviews DNR Inspection Report

Police Chief Richard Knoebel opened the Monday, June 3rd Village Board meeting with an update on the MBT statewide computer communication system. Knoebel received notification that the system would be up and running by October of this year.

Knoebel explained he was looking to possibly place one system in the marked squad car and the other radio system in the office for license checks, etc. He stated the village would be able to get on the system as soon as the tower is put up in Eden.

Knoebel related, "The one nice thing about it is there would be statewide communications. If you have a squad that for some unknown reason had to go to Superior to pick up a prisoner or something, you'd be able to have contact with that squad through this MBT system. And you would have contact with state patrol cars and anybody else that comes on the system."

Trustee Gary Gavin asked if this system would eliminate going through Washington County dispatch.

Knoebel further explained it would eliminate calling in record checks with the County Sheriff's Department, bartender license checks, etc. He added the system would actually increase stops for registration violations because officers would be more likely to find stolen cars,

wanted vehicles, and the aforementioned registration violations.

Knoebel added now if parking/speeding tickets are not paid, registrations are suspended, but nobody knows the registration is suspended unless the vehicle is stopped for some type of moving violation or for other reasons.

Knoebel reiterated, "It will be so much more efficient for the officers because a lot of times they have to wait for the Sheriff's Department because they're busy with their own cars. This way they'll be able to run it in themselves."

Trustee Gavin asked what the cost of the hardware sys-

tem would be, to which Knoebel replied, "it's probably going to be close to \$10,000 for the whole system."

He added that he has the money for the system set aside in his outlay account because he has been putting the money away for years, knowing this system was coming eventually. The system would include the computer and radio for the car and the radio for the office.

Trustee Gavin also asked if the system would speed up the quality of service. Knoebel replied you will be able to check on things a lot quicker which would also add to the safety of the offi-

cers.

Knoebel added in the future there would be software available for computer generated citations which would help eliminate errors on citations, and the state is coming out eventually with software for accident investigations which would mean accident information could be punched into the computer immediately on the scene.

Knoebel told the board that he would keep them informed as to when the tower in Eden goes up and when he receives the final figures on the system.

Knoebel also advised the board that graduation was held last week for 120 D.A.R.E. students.

Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles reported a good share of the village's asphalt work has been completed with 1,042 tons being put down, and hydrant flushing will begin on Tuesday, June 11, starting late in the evening, and would continue at night as long as it takes.

Gilles also reviewed with the board the annual DNR inspection of the Village of Kewaskum's water system.

Gilles stated the inspector

wrote he was impressed with the well maintained facilities, but after that the report kind of went downhill. The inspector gave a list of work that was very significant.

Gilles added the water department functions aren't real visible, stating, "Everybody sees when we cut the grass, or we're out on the street, but alot of the water department functions, people don't really see and they are not aware of what we are doing here, but this list gives you an idea of the tremendous amount of effort and time that we have to put into it by their request."

Gilles also discussed the decline of water production in well #3 and the DNR suggestions on closing well #1. He added some items on the DNR "to do" list has previously been grandfathered in.

President Wagner stated the report surprised him and added the inspector said we looked so good, and so much of the report just "showed up out of the blue," and asked Gilles to keep the board informed.

Village Administrator Daniel Schmidt added they would be working to comply with all the DNR directives

stating that is the reason the board was given the report, so that they would be aware of the cost factors and funds needed to be budgeted to correct the situation.

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

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

Grothman Announces Re-Election Bid



State Representative Glenn Grothman (R-West Bend) announced at a recent Kewaskum Village Board meeting that he will seek another term as the Assemblyman for the 59th District.

Grothman, who won the seat in a December 1993 special election, originally campaigned on a platform of less government and welfare reform. He is satisfied with the \$1 billion in property tax relief to show up on local tax bills in December, and particularly, with the passage of Governor Thompson's W-2 welfare reform initiative.



However... if anyone is interested in participating in that "payback" convoy to Appleton, please contact Lana Kuehl. Get ready for us Tim... when you least expect it...





St. Martin's Hilltop Altar Moved in Preparation of Field Mass Sunday



St. Martin's outdoor fieldstone altar was moved back to its original location overlooking the Ashford church. A 15-ton SkyTrak was used to do the job, donated by Tom Rego, Construction Supervisor at Quad Graphics in Lomira. Roy Rohlinger Construction, Inc., provided the transportation of the huge rig.

What does it take to move a concrete slab and fieldstone altar weighing approximately seven tons?

How about six strong men and a small dog?

If the scene at Ashford on the afternoon of Saturday, May 11, was any indication, it takes a couple of hours, a great deal of planning and a great deal of horsepower.

With Roy Rohlinger at the controls of the 15 ton SkyTrak, it took nearly two hours to pick up a separate slab of concrete and move it, followed by the fieldstone altar and attached identical concrete slab and move both back over and around the hillside to their original site overlooking St. Martin's Church. With the 40 foot tall wood cross in the background, Frank Fell, Pat Jaeger, Leo Emmer, Paul Koch and Lenny Fleischman pitched in with a tractor, log chains and shovels to make the impossible possible.

The cold wet spring made some portions of the hilltop soft under the weight of the SkyTrak and altar, leaving the small audience with some

breathstopping moments. But, by 2 p.m., both concrete slabs and the fieldstone altar were in place, waiting for the finishing touches to prepare for the upcoming annual Hilltop Field Mass. (Photos of the move will be displayed the day of the Mass).

The 40 foot tall cross is undergoing repairs to the lighting to again make it shine as a blue beacon for miles around. Its height makes it vulnerable to the elements and the lighting needs regular maintenance, more possible after the cold winter weather passes.

All is expected to be ready for Father Wayne Barta to celebrate the 10:30 a.m. Annual Hilltop Field Mass on June 9 (rain date is June 16). The Mass will again be followed by a social on the grounds. There will be hamburgers, brats, beer, soda, booths, games, a bake sale and entertainment.

Johnson Bus Service and two drivers are donating free shuttle bus service from St. Martin's parish grounds to the hilltop and back for the

Mass. In addition, there is a raffle with a John Deere riding mower and several cash prizes. Tickets are available from parish members as well as at the social on June 9. The event traditionally attracts as high as 1000 or more worshippers to the hilltop.

Frank Fell again expressed gratitude to the landowners who make the annual hilltop Mass possible: Willie Fochs, Tom Fleischman and the Irene Jaeger family. Tom Rego, construction supervisor at QuadGraphics of Lomira, made possible the donated use of the SkyTrak and Roy Rohlinger Construction, Inc., provided the transportation of the huge rig.







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Rep. Glenn Grothman: Milwaukee Students Exploited Under Guise of 'Field Trip'

It is not unusual while working in the state capitol building in Madison for me to be visited by groups of school children. This is an interesting and worthwhile experience for them. In addition to learning about the legislative process, the children tour the building -- probably the most impressive piece of architecture in the state.

During the final week of the May floor session, however, a very different type of school group visited my office and those of other legislators. Between 400 and 500 students from the South Milwaukee School District -- some as young as nine years old -- came to lobby us. Their teachers had given them signs bearing slogans such as "Save Our Schools," "We Need Money," and "Fix the School Aid Formula."

The children, and many of their teachers, wore matching "Save Our Schools" t-shirts. Apparently, the teachers were upset that under state law, school districts are allowed to increase costs at a rate of only three percent per pupil per year. Of course, local voters may, if they wish, vote in a referendum to allow the local district to spend more than that if the need arises.

Many of the teachers were being paid by the school district for this

day of lobbying in Madison, as several hundred of the students traveled here under the guise of a school-sponsored "field trip." Some parents from the district have expressed surprise at the "lesson plan" for this trip. They were unaware that their kids were being taken to Madison to be used as props for lobbying by the state teachers' union, which has offered to pay for the trip.

One of the most oft-repeated criticisms of public education is the growing trend among teachers to instruct students in their own view of controversial events, as opposed to teaching basic skills. School funding certainly is one of those controversial subjects. Parents should be able to tell their children to trust their teachers. Younger children should even be taught that their teachers are always right. Obviously, when teachers indoctrinate nine-year-old students on political issues, they cannot expect parents to stand behind them. Indeed, parents may view the teachers with disdain for lobbying for higher salaries and spending while on the payroll. Sadly, this attitude may be passed on to their children.

In the most recent year for which data are available, Wisconsin ranked 11th in the nation in per-pupil expenditures, despite having

below-average per-capita income. Beginning in the next school year, we will be one of only seven states to pay for at least two-thirds of the cost of public education. The South Milwaukee School District spends about \$69 more per child than the state average (1994 school year), and receives above-average state aids. Will these children, who have never paid taxes, be told any of the above? Of course not.

The state teachers' union and a frustrated minority of South Milwaukee electors, unable to convince local taxpayers of the need to exceed the spending caps, have abused these children and have given a black eye to a public school system they claim to support. Political indoctrination does not belong in the public schools.


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Kewaskum Post Office Opens Job Register

Postmaster Bonnie has announced that the following examination will be given and urged all those interested apply to take the job-related test that can lead to Postal Service employment:

RURAL CARRIER/ RURAL CARRIER ASSOCIATE

The Rural Carrier register is used to fill Rural Carrier Associate (RCA) vacancies. An RCA employee is entitled to employment and compensation only in the absence of a career regular Rural Carrier. This could involve working one day each week, one day each two weeks or only filling in for the regular Rural Carrier when that carrier is on leave, depending on the classification of the route. The hourly rate of pay for RCAs is \$11.55. RCAs are not eligible for health or life insurance or the Federal Employees Retirement System (FERS). RCAs with service in excess of one year as an RCA will be eligible to bid on full-time Rural Carrier vacancies at the offices where they are employed.

Position requires ability to sort mail into delivery sequence, load mail into vehicles, including parcels weighing up to 70 pounds and delivery of all mail and parcels to the designated addresses. It requires the recording of information and changes of address, maintenance of reports and forwarding of mail where required. It requires the acceptance, collection and delivery of all classes of mail on the designated route as well as the sale of stamp supplies and money orders.

Carriers must have a valid state driver's license and must demonstrate a safe driving record and pass the Postal Service Road test to obtain the required type of Government Motor Vehicle Operator's Identification Card. They must furnish and maintain at their own expense vehicle equipment necessary for the prompt handling of the mails, but are given an equipment maintenance allowance based on the daily mileage scheduled, or a minimum allowance per day, whichever is greater.

Eligibility for the above examination is limited to two years unless, after eighteen months, applicants request to have their eligibility extended for an addition-

al year.

"I do not want to give the impression that we will be hiring great numbers of people in the coming months," the postmaster said. "I anticipate approximately ___ vacancies will occur in the next two years that will be filled by hiring people from the above hiring register. We need qualified people who will be willing to accept employment, and we want to offer people in the local community the chance to compete for these openings by signing up for and taking this examination."

Postmaster Bonnie explained that those wishing to take the examination could apply by completing application cards at the Kewaskum Post Office, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Applications are being accepted on a continuous basis. Applicants will be notified of the date, time and place of the examination and will be sent material to prepare for the two-and-one-half-hour written examination.



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


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Yogerst, Jagielski Runners-Up At State; Team Finishes Third

The Kewaskum girls track team completed its season by participating in the State Track and Field Meet held last Friday and Saturday at UW LaCrosse.

The girls had gone there for a chance to showcase their individual talents, but they also went there with the intention of challenging for the State Team Title. As usual they didn't disappoint anyone with their efforts in either category. The girls used talent and depth to finish in third place for what is believed to be the highest team finish in the school's history.

Leading the way for the Indians were juniors Katie Yogerst and Jenny Jagielski. Yogerst, after having gone from seventh place to first place (and a state berth) on her last throw (121 feet) in sectionals, decided not to wait this time, as her first throw in State competition traveled 123 feet. It was her best throw of her career, but she wasn't satisfied with the great effort.

In three of her last five throws, she threw 122', 126' and her last throw traveled 128'9" to move her into her second place finish. The 128'9" throw is also now the new school record in the discus (Holly Kempf had held the old mark of 125').

Her throw was only one foot short of the winning throw of 129'9" by Mayville's Maria Krapfl. Katie has really been a consistently strong performer and she didn't let the pressures of a State Meet get to her. When asked what her goals for next year were after finishing as the second best Division II discus thrower in the state, she responded, "What do you think?" It was her first appearance at the meet, but as you can tell, she plans on returning next year.

Kewaskum's other runnerup was Jenny Jagielski in the 100m dash (13.02). Jagielski, who came in tied for the fastest time breezed through the preliminaries on Friday, leading the pack by three strides while winning her heat.

In the finals, Cheatek's Amber Lindblad edged Jagielski with a winning time of 12.84. The second place finish, however, is one of the best in the 100m dash in the school's history. Jagielski also placed in the 200m dash (third) in a time of 27.03, after qualifying on Friday. Her qualifying time in the 200m moved her into the fifth position for Friday's finals.

Parents and coaches had a scare at the start of the 200, finals as there was a false start by one of the runners (a false start is automatic dis-

qualification). When the second gun sounded, stopping the start of the race, parents and fans in the Kewaskum section were saying, "It was Jenny, it was Jenny," while Coach Koth was saying, "No, it can't be her...!"

While Jagielski may have "technically moved" as she put it, it was Palmyra Eagle's Lisa Kincaid who had jumped early causing her DQ from the race. The race was restarted and Jagielski not only ran a good race, but she moved from her fifth position to third as she passed several runners the last 15 meters of the race.

The third place finish gave her a second and third in her two individual events, an outstanding performance for Kewaskum's ace sprinter.

In her third event, the 800m relay, Jagielski, along with sophomore Carrie Wiesner, and seniors Jenny Strobel and Erin Stockhausen, ran their fastest time of the year for a seventh place finish.

While placing at the State Meet is a major accomplishment, the girls were disappointed in not being able to medal in the meet (eight places score team points, but only the top six get a medal). It was the second year in a row that seniors Erin Stockhausen and Jenny Strobel had qualified for the State Meet in

relays (last year the 800m and 400m relay qualified) placing sixth in the 400m relay last year.

Junior Rachel Nysse made her first appearance at the State Meet in the shot put, an event which she has excelled at for several years. Coming into the meet, she was in the fifth position and that is where she was able to finish. Her throw of 36'9" was within a foot of the first place throw of 37'8 1/4" by Ann Lewandoski of Waterford.

While Nysse was pleased with her fifth place finish, it was also frustrating for her because the winning throw was so close to her own throw. You can bet that she will be coming back to LaCrosse next year to improve on her position.

Improving your performance doesn't always mean an improvement in your finish at the State Meet, as junior distance ace Marni Lynn found out. Last year Lynn ran the 1600m run in 5:13 and placed fourth. This year she ran an even faster time of 5:10 and finished sixth.

The 5:10 time was 10 seconds faster than her personal best time (this year) of 5:20 which she ran at Sectionals. It also set a new school record in the event which Lynn had previously held. Lynn, who has had some injury problems this year, led the first lap, then dropped back into

the pack for most of the race before finishing strong for the sixth place finish.

The winning time in the race this year was an amazing 5:01.99 by Lena Van Heren of Mount Horeb. Lynn did not place in her other race, the 800m run as a leg injury bothered her, and perhaps kept her from placing. Her time of 2:23 was one of her better times of the year but she could not generate enough speed because of experiencing tightness in her calf. You can bet that Lynn will also be making a return trip next year to the big show.

The youngest of the qualifiers for the State Meet was sophomore Carrie Wiesner who besides running in the 800m relay, also qualified in both hurdle events. In the 100m high hurdles, Wiesner placed eighth in a time of 17.21, after having qualified for finals the day before. While it was not one of her better times, she definitely ran the race better the second time around improving her time in the finals by two seconds over her qualifying time. It is the first year she has tried the event, so look for her to be returning and improving her finish as she gets more experience.

In the 300m hurdles, Wiesner passed three runners in the last 50 meters to finish in sixth place. It was her fastest time she had run the 300's (47.62). Being only a sophomore gives her several opportunities to improve and return to this major event.

So the season ends with a great finish for the Kewaskum girls track team. All the coaches and parents who watched these girls give it their all, were very proud of their efforts and accomplishments. The third place team finish will be hard to improve on, but all the girls who qualified this year in individual events, will be returning to KHS for another year of track and field. So don't be surprised to see Kewaskum challenging for the State Title again next year with all the great talent that returns.

Boys 1600m Relay Team Fifth at State

The Kewaskum High School boys 1600m relay team of Ryan Herman, Joe Rettler, Aaron Kurth, and Matt Tonn placed fifth at the W.I.A.A. State Track Meet on Saturday, June 1, at UW-LaCrosse with a time of 3:30.1.

The relay team advanced to the State Meet on the merit of its second place finish at the Waterford Sectional, when they ran their season's best time of 3:27.6.

This was the first time in many years that the boys team advanced a relay team to state. A total of nine teams advanced to the finals of the 1600m relay with only a little over three seconds separating them. Mayville was the number one seed with a time of 3:26.6 and Kewaskum

was the number two seed with a time of 3:27.6.

Spooner was the next seed in lane three with a seed time of 3:28.6. The next five teams were all only within 1.8 seconds of each other.

Kewaskum needed to run their best time of the season if they expected to place in the top two or three. With the meet drawing to a close during the second to the last event before the 1600m relay, the heavy rains began.

Mayville raced out to the lead during the first leg of the relay and ran a very impressive 3:25.31 with McFarland second in 3:26.15, Sauk Prairie third in 3:26.50 and Reedsville fourth in 3:29.76 and Kewaskum had to settle for fifth in

3:30.17.

The goal for the KHS relay team early in the month of May was to become Conference Champions in the 1600m relay. They met this goal and then set and reached the goal of qualifying for the State Track Meet. The last goal of the season was to place and medal at the State Meet. "They had an extremely successful season. They gave 100%. I'm very happy for them and proud of them," reported their coach, Jerry Gosa.

Highlights of the season for this relay unit include winning this event at the Washington County Outdoor, the Vanderpan Invitational at Sheboygan Falls, the Conference Championship at Kewaskum, the

Conference Relay Meet, third at Regionals, second at Sectionals and fifth place at the State Meet.

During this impressive string of competition, the relay team of Ryan Herman, Joe Rettler, Aaron Kurth and Matt Tonn broke the school record at the Vanderpan Invitational and then lowered the record three additional times.

The old record, set in 1980, was 3:33.5 and was lowered to 3:27.6. "It will take a group of extremely talented and dedicated athletes to break this record. I wouldn't be surprised to see this record up on the wall for quite a few years," commented their coach.

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
