### Parade Theme Announced

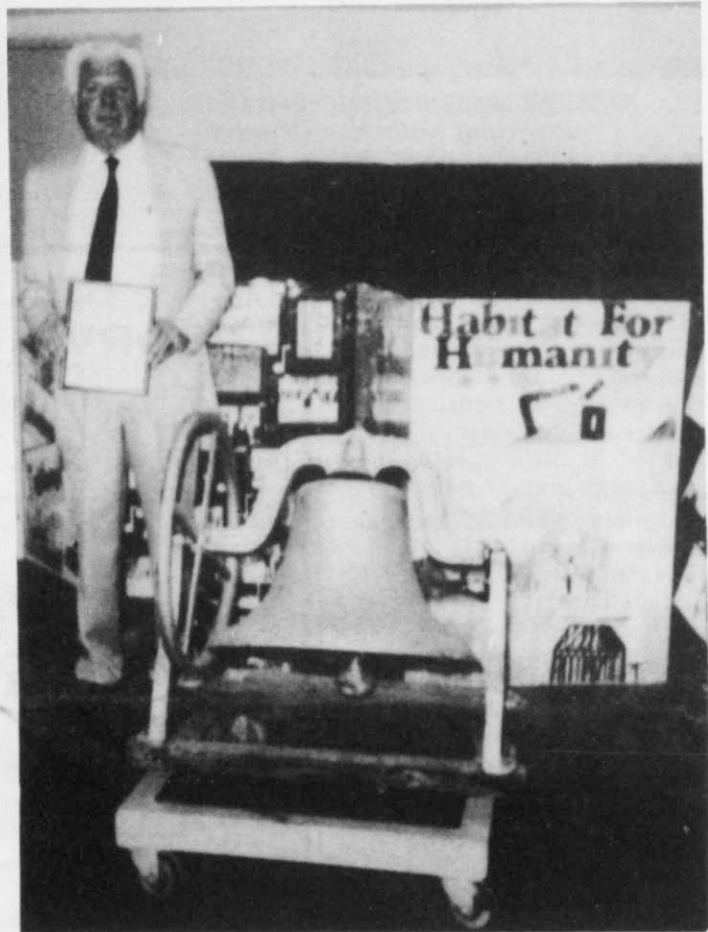

The celebration began with an early morning open house for all to come and bid their best wishes and goodbyes. A banner was hung wishing Mr. Zarling good luck and was signed by all of the students.

In the afternoon, a school rally was held for students and staff to thank Richard Zarling for his 36 years of service to the Kewaskum School District. Mr. Zarling was summoned to the gymnasium with a very loud call by close to 400 stu-

dents.

## Resigning KMS Principal Crowley Will Be Replaced by Clark Pearson

After two years with the Kewaskum School District, Kewaskum Middle School principal Katherine Crowley has resigned from her position to work as principal of McKinley Elementary School in the Appleton area, beginning July 1.

Crowley came to the community in July of 1994, from the Hamilton School District, where she had served the previous four years as Associate Principal of Templeton Middle School.

Looking back over the highlights of her experience as KMS Principal, Crowley states that she truly enjoyed working with the kids, as well as her staff, who were "willing to take some risks and try new things. They were wonderful to work with," she relates.

She was also pleased to be a part of the district during the renovation and expansion projects involving the high school and the middle school, and saw many positive ideas enacted at the Middle School during her stay, including activity days for kids, the eighth grade Spring Fling, the Civil War Reenactment, and the staff and student recognition program in association with the school board.

Ms. Crowley also helped develop a school brochure and parent curriculum guide, and saw an increase in the development of parent groups and their involvement with the school. "The reworking of our middle school schedule also allowed us to offer after school tutoring and computer lab," she points out, and adds that the Gifted and Talented Program helped provide advanced students with additional opportunities.

Crowley's decision to accept a position with the Appleton school district was multi-faceted. "The administration there has the ability to work with staff and make decisions at the cite level," she explained, "and I was looking for a district that is looking into the advancement of technology." She also mentioned that the conflicts within the Kewaskum school district were getting to be a "lot to deal with on a daily basis," and saw more opportunities available in a metropolitan area.

"I'm going to miss many people here, and I'm looking forward to

keeping in contact with the friends I've made," Crowley expressed.

The Kewaskum School Board voted in her replacement at Monday night's monthly meeting - KHS math teacher Clark Pearson, who served as the high school principal from 1972 to 1984.

Pearson has been with the district for 24 years, including an eight year stretch as high school football coach.

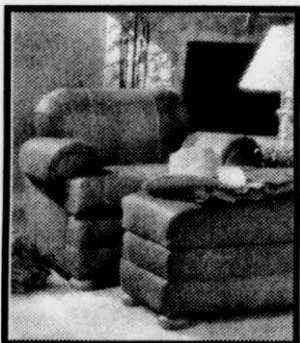
ed to him.

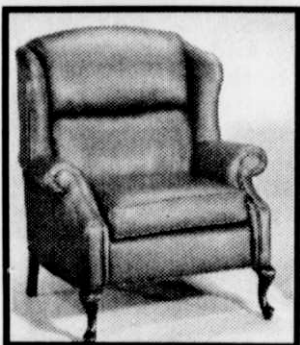


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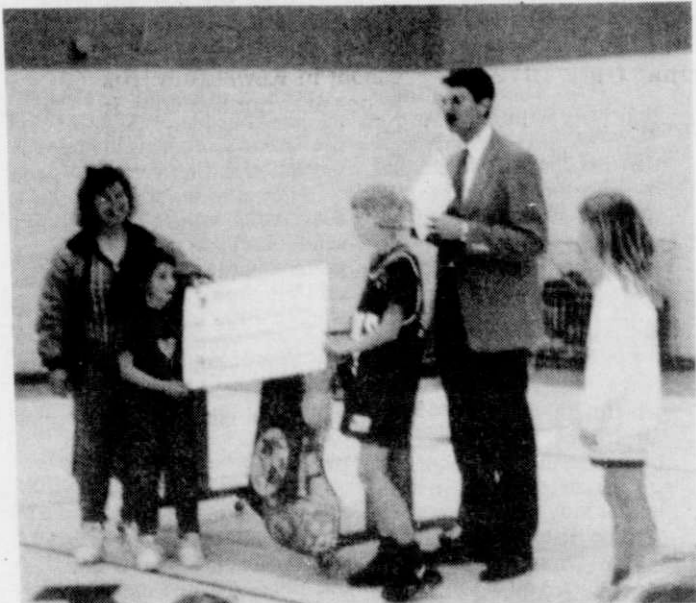
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# FES Fundraiser Held for Wagners

There are two things which fathers alone can give us and which no one else can impart to children in this unique way.

The first is a sense of security. "Son, I love you." "Daughter, you are my little princess." Those words on the lips of our fathers are mighty powerful.

If our father tells us that enough, we truly feel loved and cared for and secure in who we are. This is a gift a father can uniquely give.

The second gift a father can give is a sense of safety or protection. "If anyone messes with you, little one, I will personally chase them out of your life." Compared to his children, a dad is a giant, and if that giant is nurturing and protective, then a child can face the fears of the world with courage and steadfastness.

So if a little boy or a little girl feels safe enough and loved enough, when they become 12 and 13 and 14, they do not have to look for love in all the wrong places. They do not have to join a gang to find protection in a violent world.

They no longer have to ask "Am I loved?" "Am I safe?" They can now ask important questions like "What do I want to be?" "How do I want to differ from my mom or dad?" "What do I want to make of myself?"

I thank God that my father gave me enough of a sense of security and enough of a sense of protection. I could do more giving than taking even in my teens.

It is the function of a father to teach his sons and daughters that the meaning of life is giving, not taking. He teaches it by example, by word, by deed.

Our father simply means "one who gives life." Let's praise all good fathers who give life and who teach their children the only things they ever keep are those they give away.

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## Art Tour to Highlight First 'Summer Surprise' Luncheon

The art collection of West Bend Mutual Insurance Company will be the highlight of the first annual "Summer Surprise" luncheon and tour sponsored by St. Joseph's Community Hospital Auxiliary Friday, June 14.

Visitors on the tour will view the art on all three levels of the building, with West Bend Mutual associates providing descriptions of the works, said Ruth Ramel, an auxiliary who had worked at West Bend Mutual for 43 years.

# Town of Scott Board Hears Zoning Issues

A public hearing which attracted a large crowd and looked as if it would turn into a "gripe" session on a variety of Town of Scott subjects was expertly executed by its Chairman, Lester Benzschawel.

The hearing was scheduled to hear comments on two zoning issues and a conditional use permit requested by the Batavia Fire Department to convert the Hilltop into a fire station and meeting room.

However, after publication of the notice, the fire department trustees asked that the permit request be tabled until the June meeting agenda, in the hopes that a lease agreement could be negotiated with a group who will work with the Department in keeping the Hilltop for the community.

Chairman Benzschawel said, "A fire department discussion is not relevant to the evening's agenda, but I will leave the taxpayers speak only as a courtesy to them, but it must be brief." And it was.

Michelle Deitsch read from a prepared paper saying, "Save the Hilltop from becoming a fire station. We would like to see it become a community center." She also presented the board with a petition containing 200 signatures, indicating opposition to the plan for a fire house and meeting room, and asking for denial of the conditional use or zoning change for that location.

Llama farmer, Larry Laux, County A, called everyone's attention to a portion of a letter which had appeared in The Sounder that very day. He referred to a provision in a proposed lease which would have a local citizens group lease the Hilltop to what he termed as, "anyone without collateral if money was needed."

He asked, if the furnace or other major repair is needed during the term of the lease, "where would a group without collateral get the funds to take care of the repair?"

During the meeting which followed the board approved a change in zoning for a 15.15 acre A-1 parcel owned by Paul and Jill Rhoads, located in Section 3, near the intersection of County S and SS. Acres in the

amount of 1.96 was changed to A-6 and 13.19 acres was changed to A-5.

Mark and Neal LaFever received a zoning change from A-3 to R-1 on a 1/2 acre portion of a lot located in Section 13. The change was made to correct the zoning which had been overlooked when establishing the zoning on the larger portion of the R-1 lot.

A certified survey map was approved for a large area of the subdivision located on County A, north of Beechwood. Next a certified survey map was approved for the same area which has been split into three residential lots by the new owner.

Although a portion of the town's zoning ordinance indicates that all certified survey maps must be accompanied with soil test results before certification, the town has been lax in requiring the results at the time of certification and most maps were approved upon presentation. This will no longer be the case.

Plans are to follow through as the ordinance dictates. Certified Survey maps presented for approval will be held until the next month's meeting, giving time for a thorough review of test results and/or examination of the area in question.

Supervisor Richard Bemis also suggested

that if the map is not accompanied by the soil test that it be labeled "unbuildable" until building plans and placement are presented to the board.

A nuisance ordinance passed recently by the Town of Sherman has aroused the attention of Scott board members. The board will give consideration to establishing a nuisance ordinance similar if not the same as the one in the Town of Sherman, in the near future.

Bemis suggested the review after looking at a 50 page zoning ordinance and not being able to determine the exact definition of "set back" which appears to be defined differently under different zoning classifications. He said, "We must attempt to make it easier to read."

Another item will be the definition for buildings termed as mobile homes, house trailers or modular homes.

Another item to be researched is the possibility of restricting the placement of houses in the middle of a 35 acre parcel as opposed to putting in on the outside edges of such parcels.

Building Inspector Frank Mayer assured the board that at the present time he was not aware of any regulations which would prohibit an individual from placing his building on any location within the 35 acre parcel. He also mentioned the possible requirement of a certified survey on all parcels over 10 acres giving the board the ability of turning down place-

ment of homes if the majority of the land is determined to be agricultural.

Another suggestion was a minimum land size for raising of horses or other animals, possibly one per acre. The board will be asking the planning commission to examine all ordinances at a meeting scheduled for July 18.

Clerk Colleen Narbatovics reported that 53 less households signed in at the recycling center during 1995 thereby causing a cut in the town's recycling grant. Final payment of \$769.71 has been received. If the amount of users had been the same as in 1994, the town could have received an approximate additional \$880.

Because the town has a user fee, it is entitled to a larger portion of the recycling money than if costs of operation are supported solely by the tax roll.

Riverview Road and North Maple Tree will be given facelifts during the summer. Bids were opened recently for these projects with contract awards to be completed. Leveling, shouldering and a new surface were part of the bids.

Prices for both projects were received from Northeast Asphalt, Sheboygan; Scott Construction and the Sheboygan County Highway Department. Total costs ranged from \$24,019 to \$26,050 for Riverview and \$37,723 to \$39,546 for Paradise.

Picnic licenses approved included the Batavia Athletic Club for the July 20th tournaments and for the Beechwood Fire Department for the June 8th and 9th picnic.

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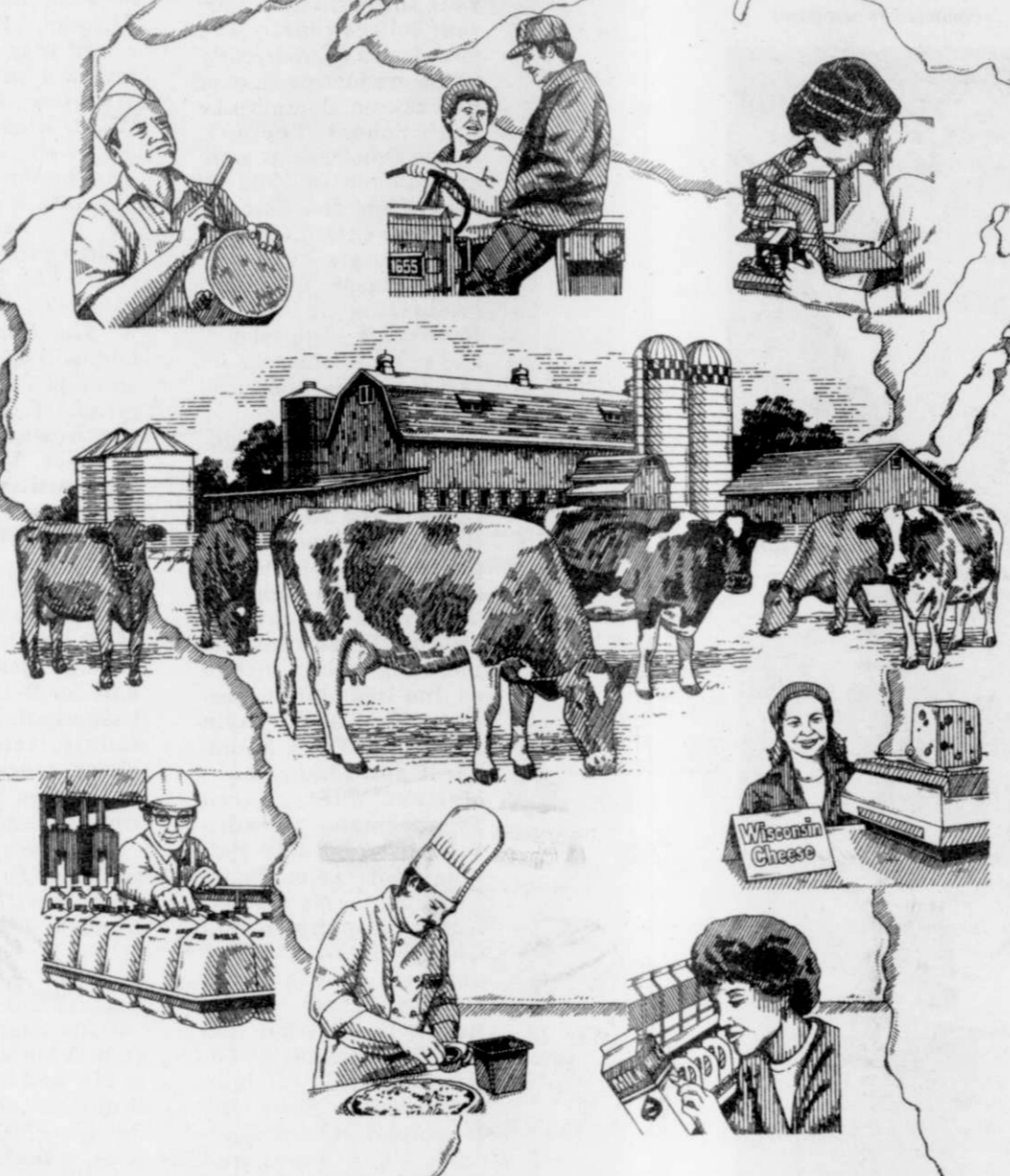
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# Firefighters, EMT's Stage Dramatic Simulation

The Kewaskum Fire Department recently simulated a parent's worst nightmare when they staged an alcohol-related, two-car collision involving several area teen-age students at the high school.

The simulation, held in conjunction with National EMT Week,

demonstrated first hand the possible tragic results of mixing alcohol, drugs and driving. Kewaskum area high school students, firefighters and emergency medical technicians worked diligently to create a realistic accident scene.

The dramatics were staged to give the EMT's

and firefighters the opportunity to sharpen their skills and to develop the sense of reacting instinctively in a real-life situation.

Ironically, village residents were invited to witness the demonstration with their families to bring home the urgency

of the problem and to make them more aware that this type of senseless catastrophe can and does occur anywhere... even in Kewaskum.

It was unfortunate that only a handful of community members

took advantage of this opportunity to view these highly-skilled individuals as they went about the task of "doing their job" extricating "victims," addressing life-threatening medical situations and stabilizing patients

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## Village Board Meeting Minutes

**Mid-Monthly Meeting**  
**May 20, 1996**  
**8:00 p.m.**

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Mid-Monthly Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Robert Wagner presided. All Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee Harry Roecker and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the April 29, 1996 meeting were approved as printed.

Assistant Fire Chief Mark Herriges presented the April 1996 monthly report:

Fire calls - 4, Year to date - 12; Jaws calls - 2, Year to date - 9; Rescue calls - 23.

Trustee David Goeden thanked the Fire Department for filing their minutes and indicated they were informative. A question was asked if the expenditures could be reported in more detail? It was noted that a complete break down is accomplished on a monthly basis and used by the Village in conjunction with the budget process.

Chief of Police Richard L. Knoebel presented the April 1996 monthly report: Criminal arrests - 45; Criminal investigations - 53; Traffic warnings - 154; Traffic citations - 33; Adult arrests - 21; Juvenile arrests - 21; Property stolen - \$908; Property recovered - 0; Parking warnings - 9; Parking tags - 6.

Chief of Police Richard L. Knoebel reported to the Board that the DNR has been in contact with the Village regarding the "Urban Fishing Waters" between the dam and the Main Street bridge. It is being suggested by the DNR to limit fishing between the 1st Saturday in March through the last Saturday in April. This would limit fishing to only juveniles, senior citizens and handicapped individuals during that time frame. Something will be brought back to the Board when more information is made available to the Village.

It was also noted that 1,250 trout have been released in the river this spring, along with the 500 released in the fall of 1995. Also the local sportsman's clubs have joined forces to promote Kids Fishing Day, June 1, 1996.

Director of Public Works, Jerry Gilles reported that the asphalt company has moved into the Village to begin work on the streets; also that the canvas on the playground equipment was in need of repair and that Ace Canvas completed that repair at no cost. It was suggested by the Park Committee to send a thank you.

2) Review of League and Taxpayer bulletins.

3) Review of Mid-Moraine schedule.

4) Review of building permit report for period ending April 30, 1996.

5) Review correspondence.

Chairman of the Public Works Committee, Trustee Warren Dums reported that the Committee met at the Fire House to look at some potential items for the 1997 budget. Two main items were discussed, those being the cracked asphalt on the north side of the building and the two large overhead garage doors.

Chairman of the Park and Recreation Committee, Gary Gavin reviewed the results of the Committee meeting as follows:

1) It was indicated the majority of those items budgeted for 1996 have been scheduled and we are just waiting for suitable weather to see them completed.

2) It was noted the Horseshoe Building at KKCP needs to be replaced and temporarily touched up paint wise.

3) Picnic tables in both parks are in need of paint and some repair. It was noted for the budget of 1997 we should continue to add additional metal coated tables.

4) At RHP the bingo stand is scheduled to be painted in 1996.

5) Additional electrical wiring should be looked at for security lighting at RHP for 1997.

Board Representative for the Plan Commission, Trustee David Goeden announced a Commission meeting scheduled for May 28, 1996 at 7:00 p.m.

Board Representative for the Library Board, Trustee John Kenworthy reviewed the Library Board meeting of May 6, 1996. It was noted the computerization is progressing very well, as well as plans for the summer reading program. As noted on the events calendar, on November 20, 1996 there will be a Library Open House in reference to the Library being in the County system for 10 years.

Board Representative for the Mid-Moraine Municipal Association, Legislative Committee, Trustee Robert Stoltzmann reported on the meeting of May 8, 1996. The topic was on the transportation system and the lack and shape of our roads.

Board Representative for the Board of Review, Trustee

Gary Gavin informed the Board that no one filed in advance for an appointment and that two individuals appeared with questions regarding their assessments. It was noted the Board of Review tried to answer their questions.

Trustee David Goeden reviewed the results of the meeting with the Commissioner of Railroads on May 9, 1996. It was noted that they would work with the Village to have the crossings upgraded and signals improved. The removal of the sidings on Second Street was discussed as well. The timing of said work may take until 1998, unless the Village is interested in paying 100% of the cost.

On a motion by Trustee Gary Gavin, seconded by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board approved the issuance of a Class "B" Fermented Malt Beverage License for the Kewaskum Lions Club for June 10, 1996 for the Kiwanis and Lions Steak Fry. Roll call vote was 7 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 0 "Absent".

On a motion by Trustee Gary Gavin, seconded by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board approved the issuance of a Class "B" Fermented Malt Beverage License for the Kewaskum Lions Club for August 11, 1996 for the Lions Chicken BBQ. Roll call vote was 7 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 0 "Absent".

On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee Warren Dums and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the two agents for the aforementioned events. Robert E. Scannell and Leroy C. Bier.

A Proclamation for community service was acted on as attached hereto:

Discussion was held on the request of Mr. Gary Gavin and Mr. Joel Fehlhaber to use the Village Engineers, Ruekert & Mielke for a proposed development involving the land known by tax key number V4-0191-00D an estimated +30 acres also known as the Meilahn property. It was noted that this practice has been allowed in the past and that the Engineers have agreed to do this. It was also noted that the Engineers recently completed an audit of sorts with the Village and numerous points were discussed. One of those points was the establishment of a policy limiting the Village Engineers from working jointly for a developer. This was suggested with the potential continued growth of the Village and to have a better checks and balances relating to the projects. Mr. Gavin noted some preliminary review has been completed and would appreciate continuing with the Village Engineers. He also noted the fact that the three phases of Sunset Estates have all been handled in this manner.

Director of Public Works, Jerry Gilles informed the Board that he would agree with the Engineers that such a policy would be appropriate as the Village continues to grow. It was noted that with a separate double review a better checks and balances could be maintained. Director Gilles indicated there were no problems thus far, but all development in the future may not be from the immediate area creating a need for a little more control and review. Trustee David Goeden felt that

this would be a good policy and should be implemented immediately. Mr. Gavin agreed with the establishment of such a policy, but indicated it would best serve the Village if a policy be prepared in resolution form and shared with developers in advance of proposed projects. He was hopeful that the Village Engineers would be able to work with him seeing they have previously done so and already reviewed the proposed site.

On a motion by Trustee John Kenworthy, seconded by Trustee Warren Dums and carried by the majority voice vote, the Board approved the use of Ruekert & Mielke by Mr. Gary Gavin and Mr. Joel Fehlhaber with their proposed development. Trustee David Goeden voted "Nay" and Trustee Gary Gavin "Abstained." Trustee John Kenworthy indicated that the policy/resolution should be prepared and then acted on prior to enforcement. The consensus of the Board was to have the Administrator prepare such a policy/resolution and bring it back to the Board for action.

President Robert Wagner informed the Board that at the Mid-Moraine Municipal Association meeting of May 15, 1996 they talked about the promotion of economic development and industrial growth. President Wagner indicated he supports managed growth and would like to see a local industrial park, but he took exception with the promotion of bussing workers into the area and promotion of affordable housing that could end up being low income housing.

President Robert Wagner informed the Board that he attended a Chamber of Commerce tourism meeting on Tuesday, May 14, 1996 and that a representative of the State of Wisconsin Department of Tourism was present to assist the local Chamber promote tourism. He noted that he supported the Chamber's goals and was committed to working with them.

On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee Harry Roecker and carried by the majority roll call vote, to adjourn. Roll call vote was 7 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 0 "Absent."

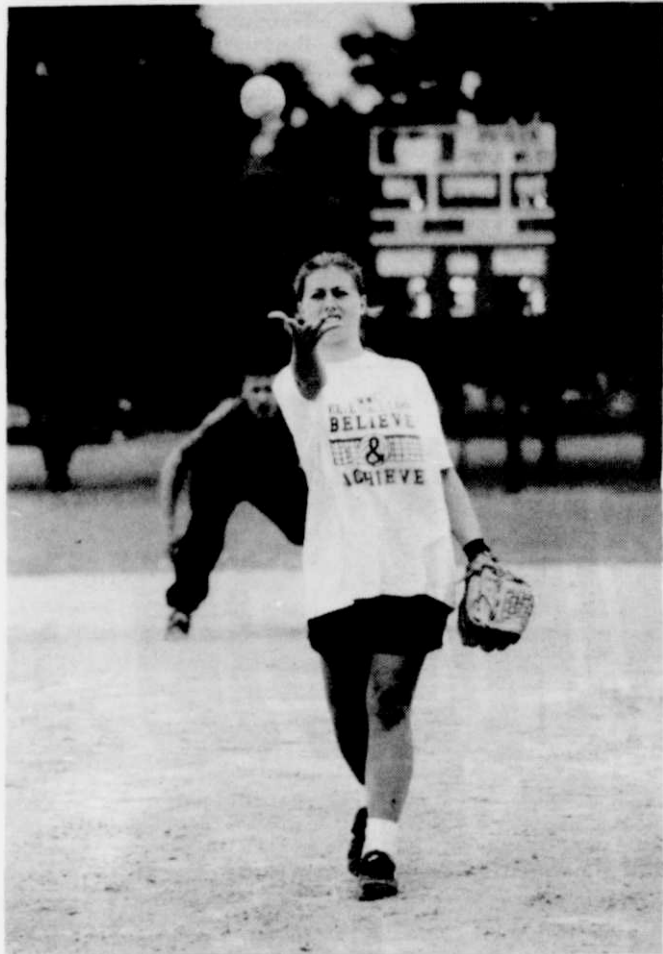

## Indians Lose Two Conference Matches

In between rainouts, the Kewaskum Indian baseball team managed to squeeze in a pair of games last week, each resulting in a two-run loss.

After Monday's game versus New Holstein was rained out, Kewaskum traveled to Sheboygan Falls on Tuesday to face the Falcons, who are picked to perch atop the Eastern Wisconsin Conference standings this season.

Kewaskum jumped ahead early in the game, taking a 1-0 lead in the first inning, after Jim Kopecky was hit by a pitch and then driven in when Kevin Martin singled later in the inning.

After a solid first inning, Indian pitcher Dan Jeserig gave up a hit and a walk, allowing the first two Falls batters to reach base. The runs started to pour in for the Falcons after an error allowed the third batter of the inning, Ryan Rau, to reach base, followed by three consecutive singles, as Falls came out of the inning with five runs, and added another one in

the third to take a 6-1 lead.

Kewaskum picked up a pair of runs in the fourth, off a solo homer by Tim Gundrum, his third of the year, and a double by Jason Bartelt, scoring Bruce Gundrum, who had also reached on a double.

Bruce came across

again in the sixth, scoring the Indians lone other run, resulting in a 6-4 loss for Kewaskum.

"We looked alot better today," Coach Mark Heise said of the Indians, whose record dropped to 1-5 on the season. "We just need to cut down on the errors and capitalize on our scoring chances," Heise added, referring to the sixth inning when Kewaskum loaded the bases, but could muster only one run.

The Indians left a total of eight runners on base, and also committed four errors in the loss.

Wednesday brought the Indians back home for a contest with another of the Eastern Wisconsin Conference's top teams, the New Holstein Huskies, to make up Monday's rainout.

Both teams put up a single run in the first inning, with Kewaskum's coming off a triple by Tim Gundrum, pushing in Eric Kopecky, who singled earlier.

New Holstein added a single run in the third and another in the fourth to go ahead, 3-1, when Kewaskum rallied to score four runs, highlighted by Joe Rettler's double and pitcher Josh Christopherson's single.

The 5-3 Indians lead was erased quickly however, as the Huskies came back in the fifth to score three runs, and added another in the sixth and a pair in the seventh to take a 9-5 lead going into Kewaskum's last at bat.

The Indians got a gift in their last at bat when Tim Gundrum struck out, but reached base when the pitch got away from the Huskie catcher.

Bruce Gundrum, Christopherson and Bartelt all followed with singles, but the game ended
