## George Allmann Resigns As Town of Kewaskum Chairman

After serving 19 1/2 years as Town of Kewaskum Chairman, George Allmann announced his resignation effective August 1, 1996 at the town's monthly meeting on June 18.

Allmann explained that his duties as Business Manager and Curriculum Resource Director for the Kewaskum School District have increased to a point where he felt it would not be fair to the township to continue as chairman of the town board.

He asked the board to appoint a new chairman to complete his term of office and suggested that the nomination of one of the present board representatives be made. Members on the board who would be eligible are David Dorn, who has served as Town Supervisor for 11 years, and is in his sixth term, and Michael Lettow, who is serving his first term as Town Supervisor after being elected in 1995. The Chairman position is up for reelection in April,

1997.

Allmann has found his years of service on the board to be very rewarding and shared that the most significant changes and accomplishments during his tenure were the construction of the town hall, recycling center and salt shed.

The town has increased the number of snowplows available to serve the township from one to four, doubled the number of tractors to service the town, resurfaced 50% of the town roads and most recently, developed a major land use plan which will bring the township into the 21st century.

In other matters before the board, members discussed complaints received regarding road residue and offensive odor from the spreading of chicken waste by Brookside Poultry Farms. A letter will be sent to the farm reminding them of the 1993 verbal agreement reached between the town and the farm.

The farm's response and discussion of the

problem will be on the July agenda.

Following the recommendation of the Plan Commission, the town board approved a bid not to exceed \$900 by Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission (SEWRPC) to update the zoning ordinance and zoning map. Based on previous experiences, the project will take six to 12 months to complete. The ordinance update will correlate with the new land use plan.

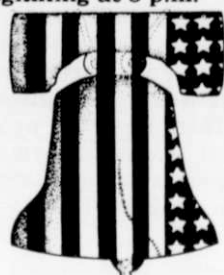
The board reviewed a 1992 Conditional Use Permit granted to Charles and Beverly Schultz for occasional gravel sales. A condition of the permit was for annual review and issuance.

Complaints have been received of damage to portions of Badger, Prospect and Sandy Ridge roads because of heavy trucks and frequent use of the pit. Notification will be sent to the Schultz's requesting them to appear at the July meeting and make application for a new permit. The Zoning Administrator was instructed to issue a stop work order effective immediately until the situation is resolved.

A water runoff problem in the newly developed Shagbark Hickory Estates subdivision was discussed. In an attempt to solve the problem, an extension on a culvert was made.

Placement of road signs was briefly discussed as well as a request to release a Letter of Credit on the development project. The request will be reviewed at the July meeting.

The next Town of Kewaskum board meeting will be held July 15, 1996 at the town hall beginning at 8 p.m.

## Kewaskum School District Awarded \$21,000 DPI Grant

The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction has notified the Kewaskum School District that it has been awarded \$21,000 under the Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Programs for its proposed program called "Keep Kids in School Successfully."

According to George Allmann, district curriculum resource director, the grant will provide tutorial help for approximately 75-100 students in grades K-12 during the 1996-97 school year. Instruction will be provided after school during the regular school year or during a summer tutorial program in 1997.

According to Allmann, the District will look to hire retired teach-

ers and college students to work in small group settings with the students. Materials and some transportation will be provided through the grant.

The grant was written in cooperation with John Baitinger, KHS guidance counselor, John Nell, KMS guidance counselor, Jackie Taylor, KES guidance counselor and Allmann, the District's AODA fiscal agent.

Dr. Charles Johnson, interim district administrator, stated that he was extremely pleased the District was awarded the grant. "It is a positive step toward providing additional academic help to those students who experience difficulty in the academic area."

### New 'Park and Ride' Receives Verbal OK

Construction of a new "Park and Ride" facility in Kewaskum is scheduled to begin sometime in 1997, after it recently received approval from the Kewaskum Village Board.

The parking lot will be located east of Dairy Queen on Highway 45 on the government owned right of way, for the purpose of encouraging car pooling.

The village will be hiring an engineer later this summer to design the concept, and easements will also be acquired for the project. Village Administrator Dan Schmidt said they recently received a verbal okay from the Department of Transportation for the

CMAQ project, which stands for Congestion Mitigation Air Quality. The size of lot itself is yet to be determined.

The federally funded program is distributed through each state, with about 80% of the cost being covered by the U.S. Government. Schmidt stated that rough estimates indicate the village's portion of the bill will be about \$50,000, but \$40,000 of that figure could be covered by a grant.

# Town of Scott Discusses Diversion of Storm Water

Diversion of storm water was the hot topic of the June Town of Scott board meeting.

Jeff Scannell, who has constructed a home in the northern section of a subdivision is having current storm water problems in his basement and garage.

Francis Michaels, who owns neighboring farmland is having problems with the same water which is flooding his fields with some of it coming from the subdivision.

While Michaels is of the opinion that Scannell's house should have been built at a higher elevation, Scannell thinks the problem could be solved by other means, possibly installation of a culvert either under Maple Tree Road or in the ditch line, which would direct the water to a nearby swamp.

Michaels, who owns land on the opposite side of Maple Tree, does not want the water diverted to his farm land. He said that his attorney informed him that diversion of water is not allowed in a natural waterway.

The town has become involved because of the "neighbor dispute." Town Chairman Lester Benzschawel stated that the town's association attorney, through a phone conversation, told him that as long as it does not involve 40 acres you are not diverting.

One supervisor suggested that the zoning and building ordinances set regulations requiring specific grades for home building which would avoid this type of problem. Building Inspector Frank Mayer stated that this is not in State Statutes.

Much of the situation remains unclear, with each person and board member having its own opinion on how matters should be handled. In an attempt to avoid a legal battle which would require town funding, Benzschawel suggested that more investigation be done before acting on anything. The board agreed.

Action was taken to rezone a .54 acre parcel owned by George Wendt from A-2 to A-6, which would allow for him to construct a mound system. Similar action was taken to rezone one acre owned by Ron and Beverly Depies from A-1

to A-6, to be sold to Wendt as part of the area for the mound.

To eliminate a conflict of interests, Larry Laux was appointed to serve on the Planning Commission until September, 1997, replacing Gary Held, who is already serving on the Board of Appeals. Held will retain that position.

Laura Chmielewski, W9215 Brazelton Drive, was appointed to a three-year term expiring in June, 1999, on the Library Board, to replace the position which was held by Larry Laux.

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## Village Board Addresses Routine Agenda Items

Routine summer agenda items faced village board members at last Monday evening's meeting.

The board first addressed Public Hearings on Applications for Combination Class "B" and Class "A" Fermented Malt Beverage and Intoxicating Liquor Licenses. Police Chief Richard Knoebel was asked if there were any complaints on any of the establishments making the applications.

Knoebel stated there were few altercations with a minimal amount of problems and those were very routine. Upon closing the Public Hearings, later in the meeting, the board unanimously voted to approve all the liquor licenses.

Department Heads gave their monthly reports with Assistant Fire Chief Mark Herges giving an update on the fire department's new tanker. Discussion was also held on the overhead door in the firehouse that doesn't open properly. The board decided repairs on the door could be handled in-house.

Police Chief Richard Knoebel gave his report and announced that the baseball cards, courtesy of Bank Wisconsin, have come in and officers have already begun handing them out to the children. Knoebel jokingly added, "It could be the last year (for the Brewers); they

could be worth a lot of money."

Knoebel did stress that kids should not go out on the streets to obtain the cards from a police officer. Kids should stay on the sidewalk and flag the officer down. Keep in mind, if he does not stop, he might be on a call and will try to find the kids after taking care of the business at hand.

Trustee Gary Gavin asked which officer was head of Public Relations to which Knoebel replied that it was Officer Tom Bauer.

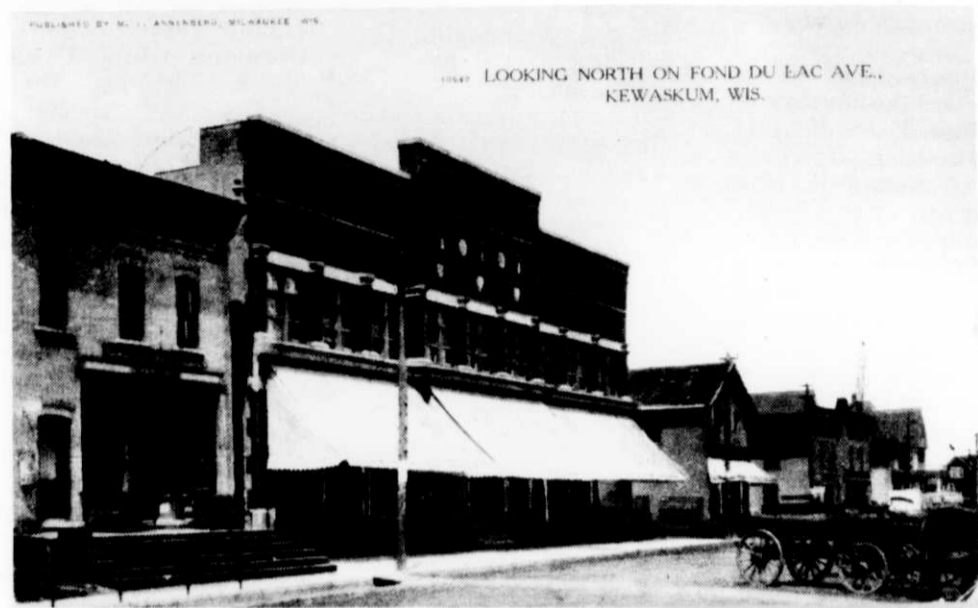
Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles stated CTW had picked up pump #3 and would be examining it for wear, etc., and the flushing of hydrants had been completed.

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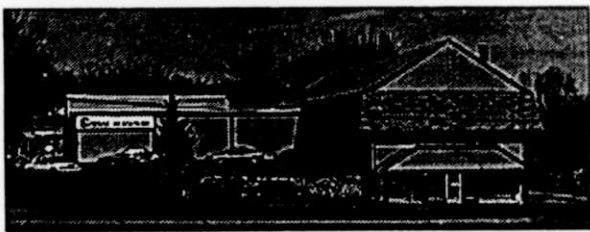

## July Exhibitions at the West Bend Art Museum

It all began with a dream, a garage space and a few willing experimenters. Now, some of the most well-known pioneers of the Contemporary Glass Movement will be on exhibit at the West Bend Art Museum from June 29 through August 4 in the upper galleries.

Featuring some of the most prominent names in the Studio Glass Movement, including Harvey Littleton, Paul Stankard, Dale Chihuly and Josh Simpson. The exhibition is on loan from the permanent collection of Bergstrom-Mahler Museum of Neenah.

The Studio Glass Movement was born in 1962, when Harvey Littleton, a University of Wisconsin professor and Dominick Labino, Vice President of Research at John Mansville Fiber Glass Corporation conducted two glass workshops sponsored by the Toledo Museum of Art. Littleton gathered workshop participants to learn about glassblowing, but the glass they were using wouldn't melt.

Lubino assisted by creating a glass formula that would melt at the lower temperature. The new formula, along with Labino's invention of a small furnace, opened the door to a whole new medium for artistic expression, making glass more accessible to individual artists in their studios.

Throughout the 60s and 70s, artists worked to gain control of the new glass material and building technical expertise. They also began to investigate ancient techniques for use in contemporary design.

Today, glass is a dynamic sculptural medium, chosen for its beautiful reflection, clarity and the luminous color. Sometimes it is selected for its amazing ability to be shaped and formed through an endless variety of methods.

Sometimes it is the sheer paradox of a material that it can be molten, then frozen, that captures the soul and imagination of those who work with it.

**MOVEMENT, FORM, COLOR AND LIGHT** illustrates the dynamic designs, sculptural forms and the diversity of glass techniques used by several of the leading contemporary glass artists including the founding fathers of the movement, Littleton

and Labino and today's leading glass artist, Dale Chihuly

On Sunday, June 30, Jan Smith will present a gallery talk at 2 p.m. on the exhibition, the Bergstrom-Mahler Museum's specialized collection and the history and processes of glass making as it relates to this collection. Join Jan and Friends of the Art Museum for refreshments and an informative informal presentation.

Continuing Exhibitions at the museum include the **ACADEMIC DRAWINGS OF CARL VON MARR**, now on through September 15 in the lower gallery.

From childhood renderings to student studies and mature works, this exhibition chronicles the creative endeavors of a typical 19th century art career. The art museum's collection of drawings from this prominent American-German artist numbers in the hundreds, and this exhibition reveals some of the best.

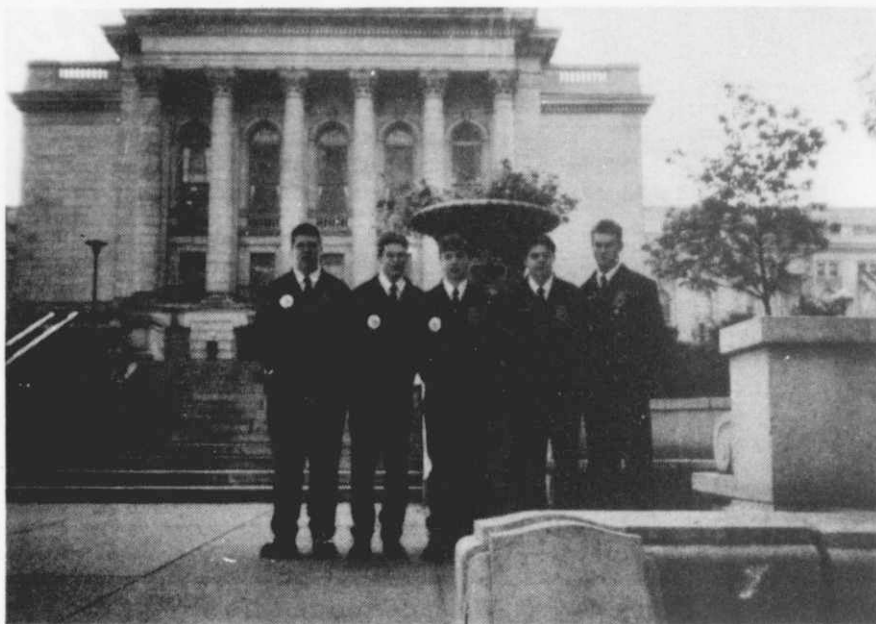

## Ground Beef's Color Not Always An Accurate Predictor of Doneness

Now that backyard barbecue season is officially here, many people will be firing up their grills in anticipation of a juicy burger.

But when checking to see if your burgers are done, don't rely solely on the color of the meat, according to the United States Department of Agriculture. Checking hamburger for doneness is important because many outbreaks of *E. coli* -- a potentially lethal food borne illness -- have been linked to undercooked hamburger.

Recent studies have indicated that some hamburger may appear brown before it has reached the safe cooked temperature of 160 degrees F. Other sources of ground beef may remain pink even after reaching a safe temperature.

If hamburger has been exposed to air for an extended amount of time or has been ground from older meat, it may appear somewhat brown even before cooking.

As ground beef cooks, it usually changes from red to pink to brown. However, if it is already brown, it will not change color during cooking. Recent studies show some ground beef patties look well-done at temperatures nearly 30 degrees

F. below the safe level.

To prevent premature browning, buy red round beef that is tightly wrapped. Freeze it immediately or store in the coldest part of the refrigerator no more than two days.

The other potentially confusing problem may occur when lean ground beef or ground beef containing seasonings and flavorings -- such as spices -- remains pink, even after reaching 160 degrees F.

There are several reasons ground beef may remain pink at temperatures above 160 degrees. Meat from bulls has a higher concentration of pigment, so may remain pink even after it is fully cooked. Also, low-fat beef appears to conduct heat less effectively.

Therefore, low-fat beef patties -- including those containing water, oat bran, carrageenan, or soy

protein -- require longer cooking times and higher temperatures to reach a safe internal cooking temperature.

To ensure that ground beef is fully cooked:

- use a meat thermometer whenever possible, even on ground beef patties. If the patty is thin, the thermometer may have to be inserted into the side of the burger.

- Look at the meat's juices. While the color of beef may not indicate doneness, the cooked juices are more reliable. Cooked juices should have no trace of red, pink, or cloudiness when done.

- Look at the meat's texture. Raw meat has a soft, mushy texture even when it looks brown. Cooked meat has a firm, flaky texture.

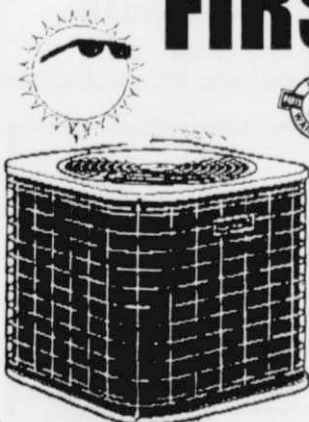


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## Relay for Life Team Signup

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## Children and Fireworks: A Dangerous Combination

Fireworks have played a colorful part in American history. Fourth of July celebrations have traditionally been observed with a joyful bang.

However, newspaper headlines on the fifth of July tell the other side of the story: "Casualty Recounts the Fourth." The Fourth of July should be a time for celebration, not injuries.

Yet, every year, children and others lose their sight from fireworks. In 1995, an estimated 2,441 people visited hospital emergency rooms for injuries involving the eye due to fireworks.

Sparklers are considered to be safe by many parents, but hundreds of young children will be injured this Fourth of July while playing with sparklers, according to Prevent Blindness Wisconsin, an affiliate of the Prevent Blindness America.

Sparklers are fireworks. They shoot out sparks when lit. The chemicals in sparklers are pasted on "needle-thin" wire. Unlike other fireworks devices, sparklers don't explode, splatter or fly up like rockets.

These "silent" fireworks sizzle at temperature of 1,800 degrees Fahrenheit (nearly hot enough to melt gold) and injure hundreds of preschoolers each year throughout the country.

Sparklers cause corneal burns and burns to the hands and fingers. When children swing burning sparklers, they and those around them risk penetrating eye injuries.

In addition to sparklers, bottle rockets and firecrackers are major causes of summer holiday injuries.

"Often we don't realize -- until we or someone we care about are injured -- that the risk of blindness or other injury outweighs the momentary excitement of exploding fireworks," states Kathleen Nelson, executive director of Prevent Blindness Wisconsin.

Finally, Prevent Blindness Wisconsin urges people to attend fireworks displays conducted by trained professionals. "It's the best and safest way to enjoy fireworks," adds Ms. Nelson.

## ORDINANCE NO. 96-5

### AN ORDINANCE TO AMENDING CHAPTER 13 MUNICIPAL UTILITIES

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

WHEREAS, S. NR 811.10, Wisconsin Administrative Code, directs suppliers of water for municipal water systems to require the abandonment of all unused, unsafe or noncomplying wells located on the premises served by their system, and to provide a permit system to allow retention of safe and code complying wells, by local ordinance or water utility rule, to eliminate sources of unsafe water and to prevent such wells from becoming channels for vertical movement of contaminated water and to eliminate all existing cross-connections and prevent all future cross-connections.

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WISCONSIN WISH TO AMEND 13.29 (1) through (7) AND ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

#### 13.29 WELL ABANDONMENT and WELL OPERATION PERMIT.

(1) **PURPOSE.** To protect public health, safety and welfare and to prevent contamination of groundwater by assuring that unused, unsafe or noncomplying wells or wells which may act as conduits for contamination of groundwater or wells which may be illegally cross-connected to the municipal water system, are properly maintained or abandoned.

(2) **APPLICABILITY.** This ordinance applies to all wells located on premises served by the Kewaskum Water Utility system. Utility customers outside the jurisdiction of the municipal system may be required under contract agreement or utility rule to adopt and enforce equivalent ordinances within their jurisdictions for purpose stated in Section 1 above.

#### (3) DEFINITIONS.

- A. "Municipal Water System" means a community water system owned by city, village, county, town, town sanitary district, utility district, public inland lake and rehabilitation district, municipal water district or a federal, state, county or municipal owned institution for congregate care or correction, or privately owned water utility serving the foregoing.
- B. "Noncomplying" means a well or pump installation which does not comply with s. NR 812.42, Wisconsin Administrative Code, Standards for Existing Installations, and which has not been granted a variance pursuant to s. NR 812.43, Wisconsin Administrative Code.
- C. "Pump Installation" means the pump and related equipment used for withdrawing water from a well, including the discharge piping, the underground connections, pitless adapters, pressure tanks, pits, sampling faucets and well seals or caps.
- D. "Unsafe" well or pump installation means one which produces water which is bacteriologically contaminated or contaminated with substances which exceeds the drinking water standards of chs. NR 140 or 809, Wisconsin Administrative Code, or which a Health Advisory has been issued by the Department of Natural Resources.
- E. "Unused" well or pump installation means one which is not used or does not have a functional pumping system.
- F. "Well" means a drill hole or other excavation or opening deeper than it is wide that extends more than 10 feet below the ground surface constructed for the purpose of obtaining ground water.
- G. "Well Abandonment" means the proper fill and sealing of a well according to the provisions of s. NR 812.26, Wisconsin Administrative Code.

#### (4) ABANDONMENT REQUIRED.

All wells on premises served by the municipal water system shall be properly abandoned in accordance with Section 6 of this ordinance no later than one year from the date of connection to the municipal water system, unless a valid well operation permit has been issued to the well owner by the Village of Kewaskum under terms of Section 5 of this ordinance.

#### (5) WELL OPERATION PERMIT.

Owners of wells on premises served by the municipal water system wishing to retain their wells for any use shall make application for a well operation permit for each well no later than 90 days after connection to the municipal water system. The Village of Kewaskum shall grant a permit to a well owner to operate a well for a period not to exceed 5 years providing all conditions of this section are met. A well operation permit may be renewed by submitting an application verifying that the conditions of this section are met. The Village of Kewaskum or its agent, may conduct inspections and water quality tests or require inspections and water quality tests to be conducted at the applicants expense to obtain or verify information necessary for consideration of a permit application or renewal. Permit applications and renewals shall be made on forms provided by the Clerk. All initial and renewal applications must be accompanied by a fee of \$20.00. The following conditions must be met for issuance or renewal of a well operation permit:

- A. The well and pump installation shall meet the Standards for Existing Installations described in s. NR 812.42, Wisconsin Administrative Code.
- B. The well and pump shall have a history of producing safe water evidenced by at least 2 coliform bacteria samples taken a minimum of 2 weeks apart. In areas where the Department of Natural Resources has determined that groundwater aquifers are contaminated with substances other than bacteria, additional chemical tests may be required to document the safety of the water.
- C. There shall be no cross-connections between the well's pump installation or distribution piping and municipal system.
- D. The water from the private well shall not discharge into a drain leading directly to a public sewer utility unless properly metered and authorized by the sewer utility.
- E. The private well shall have a functional pumping system.
- F. The proposed use of the private well shall be justified as reasonable in addition to water provided by the municipal water system.

#### (6) ABANDONMENT PROCEDURES.

- A. All wells abandoned under the jurisdiction of this ordinance shall be done according to the procedures and methods of s. NR 812.26, Wisconsin Administrative Code. All debris, pumps, piping, unsealed liners and any other obstructions which may interfere with sealing operations shall be removed prior to abandonment.
- B. The owner of the well, or the owner's agent shall notify the Clerk and/or Director of Public Works at least 48 hours in advance of any well abandonment activities. The abandonment of the well may be observed or verified by personnel of the municipal water system.
- C. An abandonment report form, supplied by the Department of Natural Resources, shall be submitted by the well owner to the Clerk and Department of Natural Resources within 30 days of the completion of the well abandonment.

#### (7) PENALTIES.

Any well owner violating any provision of this ordinance shall upon conviction, be subject to a penalty as provided in ss. 25.04 of this Municipal Code. If any person fails to comply with this ordinance for more than 30 days after receiving written notice of the violation, the Village of Kewaskum may impose a penalty and cause the well abandonment to be performed and the expense to be assessed a special tax against the property.

This Ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication as provided by law.

PASSED, ADOPTED and APPROVED, this 17th day of June, 1996, by the Kewaskum Village Board.

## Village Board Meeting Minutes

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Robert Wagner presided. All Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee David Goeden, seconded by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the May 20, 1996 meeting were approved as printed.

Chief of Police Richard L. Knoebel reported that the State's project of a tower installation to provide MVP service is progressing. The initial hardware cost is estimated to be \$10,000.00 with a monthly charge of \$50.00. If all goes as planned the system should be up and running in October, 1996.

Director of Public Works, Jerry Gilles reported that the bulk of the asphalt work has been completed and that the hydrant flushing and testing has been scheduled for June 11th to the 13th.

A review of the DNR annual inspection of the Village of Kewaskum Water System and to its affects on the budget were discussed. It was noted the order of the items to be addressed and the need to use the Village Engineers for a portion of clarification, etc.

On a motion by Trustee Harry Roecker, seconded by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the issuance of Operator's Licenses upon proper payment of fees and documentation for the following:

Chairman of the Park and Recreation Committee, Gary Gavin announced a Committee meeting scheduled for June 17, 1996 at 7:30 p.m.

Chief of Police Richard L. Knoebel reviewed with the Board the information regarding the Urban Fishing Program and the need for authorization to sign an Agreement to allow said program. It was noted that the Village can request to be taken out of the program and that the process would take about 18 months. On a motion by Trustee Gary Gavin, seconded by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized the Administrator to sign the Agreement for the Urban Fishing Program.

Board Representative for the Plan Commission, Trustee David Goeden informed the Board that at the Plan Commission meeting of May 28, 1996, Mr. Rick Kania was present to review information regarding the Land Use Plan and the Plat for the Sunset Estates Planned Unit Development Phase 3.

Board Representative for the Library Board, Trustee John Kenworthy reported that the Library is preparing for their Summer Reading program and that a survey is being prepared for distribution regarding library services.

The Village Board reviewed the Plat for Sunset Estates Planned Unit Development Phase 3 along with the five recommendations as sent to the Board from the Plan Commission. On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee John Kenworthy and carried by the majority voice vote, the Board approved the plat with the five recommendations from the Plan Commission as follows: (Trustee Gary Gavin abstained from voting.)

- 1) The PUD is to have up to a maximum of 29 living units as proposed.
- 2) The PUD is to have up to a maximum of 19 building pads (structures).
- 3) That the private drive (undedicated roadway) as proposed will have travel from west to east with concrete sidewalk on the north side. It was further noted the lots off of Gavin Parkway are not corner lots and that the proposed sidewalk is to be installed and maintained by the PUD Association.
- 4) That when building permits are requested the PUD Association President or Vice President need to co-sign prior to issuance and that if major structure placement adjustments are to be made an amended plat of that area would need to be submitted.
- 5) That an access pathway to the parks will be provided from the private drive and from Edgewood Road of equal or better material as that of the rest of the pathway within the Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park. This access pathway will be off the concrete sidewalk then following the western edge of the wet land area. These pathways will be designated by an easement to the Village of Kewaskum.

A preliminary discussion was held on a resolution/policy on engineering services for public works construction. It was

noted the draft should be shortened and more specific and brought back for another review.

Discussion was held on the possibility of adjusting the July meeting scheduled, but it was the consensus not to make any changes at this time.

On a motion by Trustee Harry Roecker, seconded by Trustee Gary Gavin and carried by the majority roll call vote, to adjourn. Roll call vote was 7 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 0 "Absent."

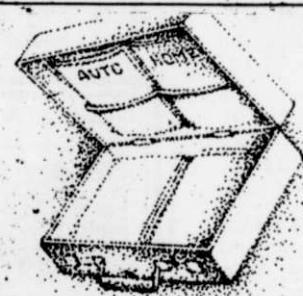

## Indians Win One, Drop Two

The Kewaskum High School varsity baseball team extended their conference win streak to five games last Wednesday, outscoring the visiting Chilton Tigers, 5-4.

Josh Christopherson led the Indian offense early in the game, hitting a three-run homer in the first inning, and collecting another RBI in the third on a single that scored pitcher Erik Kopecky.

With a 4-0 lead and a solid defense behind him, Kopecky held the Tigers to only one hit and no runs until the sixth inning, when Chilton mustered a single run, making the score 4-1 in the Indians favor.

With victory only three outs away, Kewaskum stumbled and allowed the Tigers to score three runs on a pair of hits, a walk and an error.

The 4-4 tie forced the game into extra innings, and after Indian reliever Joe Rettler shut down Chilton in the top of the eighth, Kewaskum loaded the bases in their half of the inning.

Jim Kopecky opened with a base hit to left, fol-

lowed by an error that put Tim Gundrum on base. With two on and no outs, Christopherson was hit by a pitch to load the bases for Rettler, who ended the game with a deep flyball that landed near the centerfield fence, scoring Kopecky and giving Kewaskum the 5-4 win. The win pushed Kewaskum's record to 5-2 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

The Indians weren't as lucky the rest of the week, however, as they dropped a 7-1 decision to New Holstein on Thursday and were battered 14-4 by the visiting Sheboygan Falls Falcons on Friday.

"We looked tight," Coach Mark Heise said of the loss to New Holstein, in which the Indians committed six errors and were able to collect only two hits.

Josh Christopherson and Erik Kopecky both homered in the 14-4 loss to the Falcons on Friday, but it wasn't enough to catch Falls, who banged out 12 hits off of five

KHS pitchers and scored in all but the fourth and seventh innings.

"They (Falls) were a good hitting club, up and down the order," Heise commented after the game. "We have the toughest part of the schedule behind us now," he continued, noting that Falls and New Holstein were both picked to finish atop the Eastern Wisconsin.

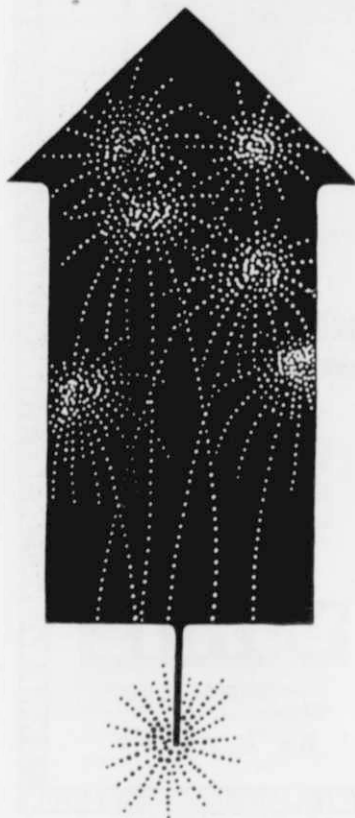
