## Storm Related Fire Destroys Horse Barn

The Kewaskum Fire Department was dispatched to a barn fire at the Ward Weaver property located at 9045 Forest View Road, Kewaskum, around 5:25 a.m. Tuesday morning, July 2.

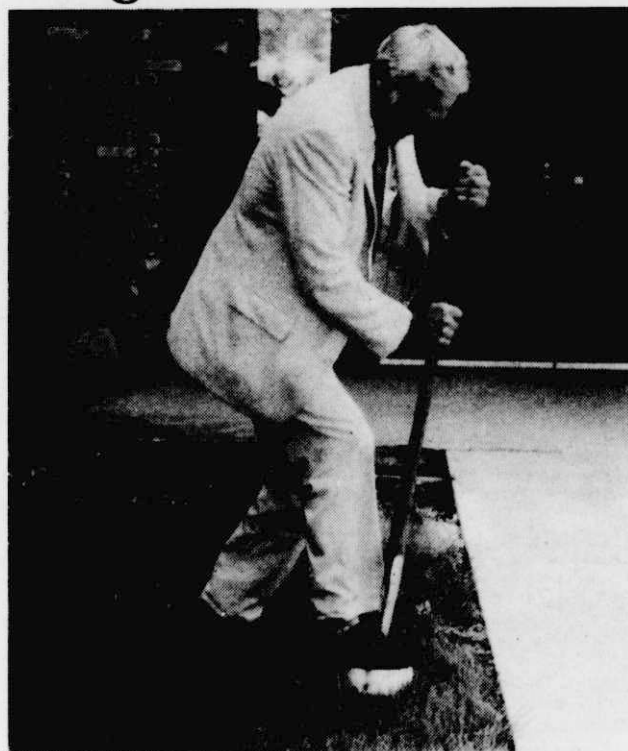
Within five minutes of receiving the page, Kewaskum firefighters were enroute to the fire location. By 5:30 a.m. firemen already on the scene, reported the barn was fully engulfed, at which time Kewaskum Fire Chief Mark Groeschel requested full assist from the Boltonville and Fillmore Fire Departments and mutual aid from Beechwood, with all three departments responding.

The barn, which is located in the Town of Kewaskum, was totally destroyed. All of the horses that were kept on the property escaped the blaze. A Washington County officer reported seeing a large bolt of lightning strike near what he believed to be the fire location about ten minutes prior to the fire call.

No total dollar estimate has been established as of this writing. Kewaskum firefighters were on the scene over four hours. (Additional photo on page 8).

# Wildlife Viewing Sites Located in Kettle Moraine

Through joint initiative from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, with cooperative effort through a national program started by Defenders of Wildlife, the northern unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest has four, newly official wildlife viewing sites, designated by a sign displaying white binoculars against a brown background.

The program has been previously enjoyed in a number of states, and was adopted in this area last year, with the signs put in place this past spring. "The objective of the program is public education, development of tourism, and conservation of our natural heritage," states Jerry Leiterman, Acting Forest Superintendent.

The four sites within this area of the Kettle Moraine Forest include: Spruce Lake Bog, located in the Town of Osceola (take Highway F west, right on Vista Drive, left on Airport Road); the Jersey Flats Prairie Development Project on Highway SS in the Town of Auburn (leading into New Prospect); the public fishing pier overlooking Mauthe Lake; and the Haskell Noyes Memorial Woods on Highway Triple G near Forest Lake.

Presently there are 76 natural viewing sites throughout the state, with the four locations in the northern unit serving as one site. Other locations near the area include the Sheboygan Marsh, the Theresa

Marsh, Horicon Marsh, and Riveredge Nature Center in Newburg.

Leiterman points out that the designated wildlife viewing sites were chosen because of easy accessibility, the existence of nature and free roaming wildlife, and their scenic as well as educational merit. A Wildlife Viewing Guide, with a list and maps of the sites, will soon be available at the Ice Age Visitor Center.

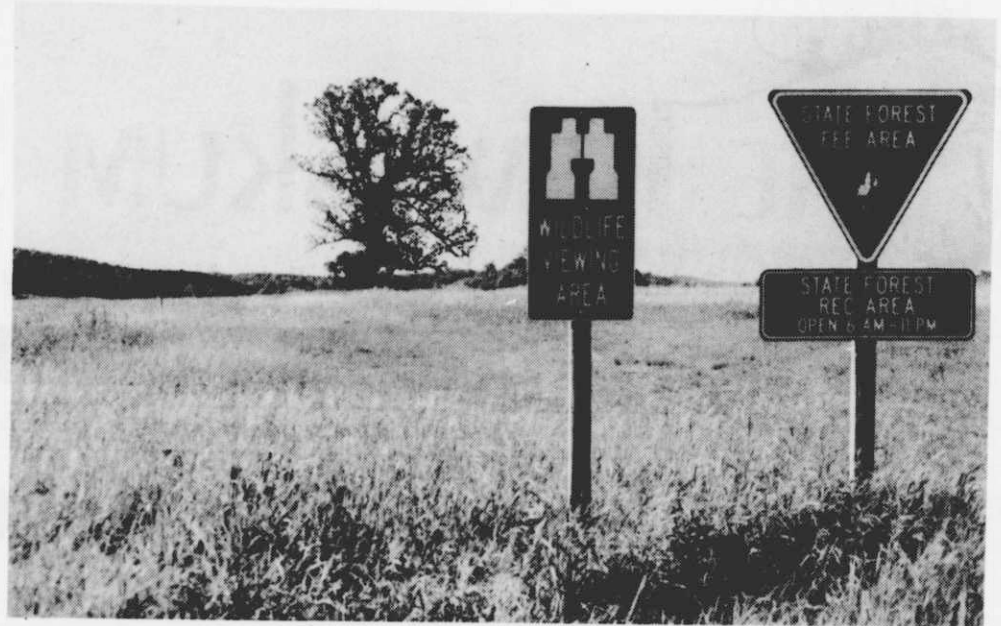

The following poem was taken from the 1996 Edition of Menagerie, an All Conference Writers magazine, that includes the work of KHS students.

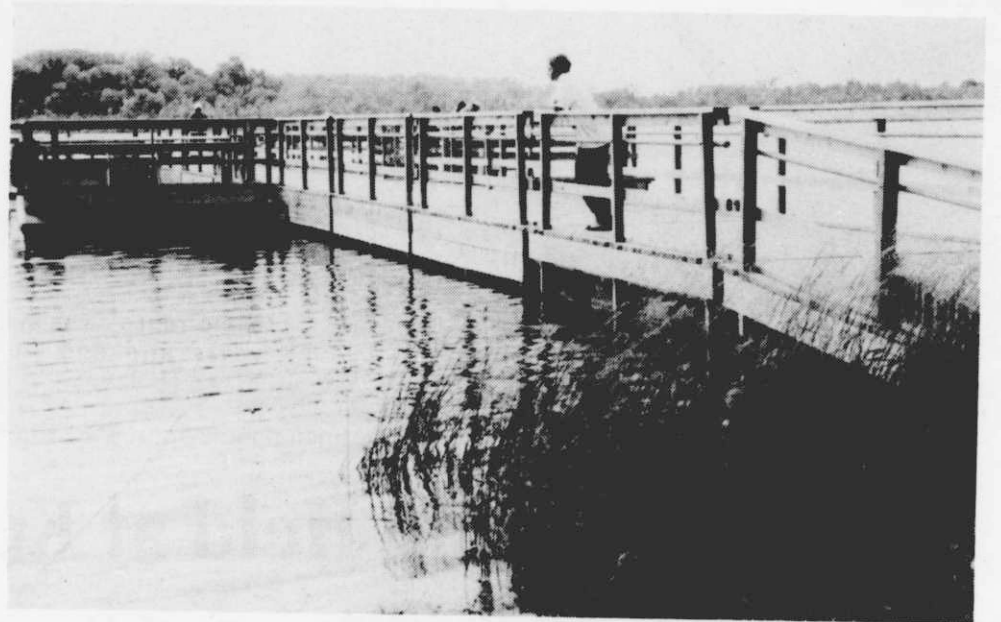
### Poetry

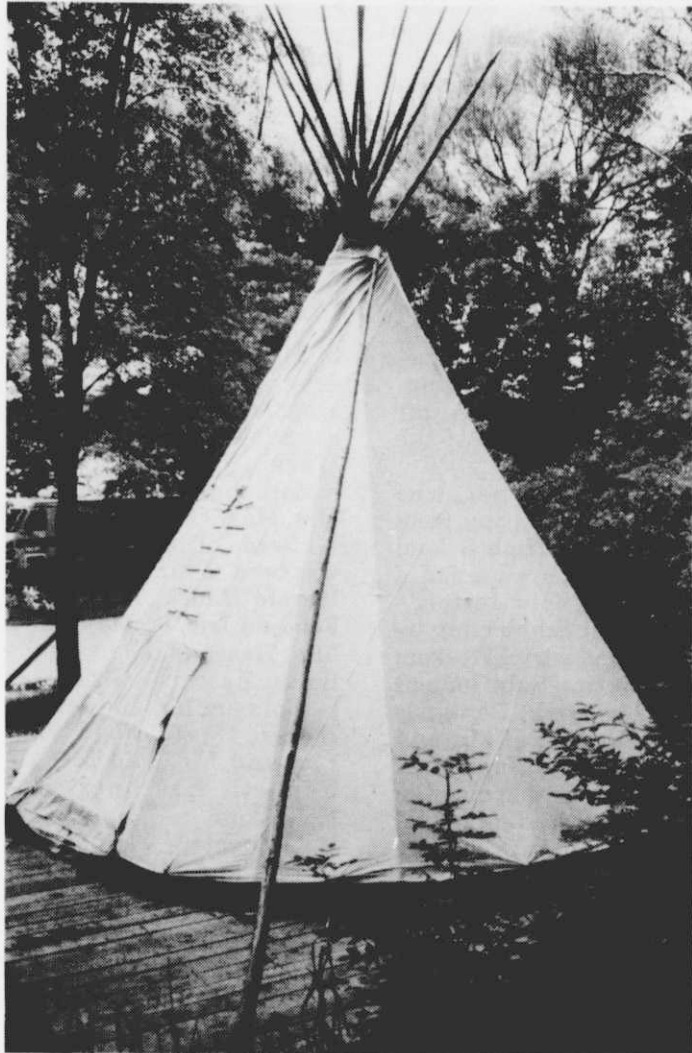

## Unique Campsite Offered at Mauthe Lake



A Native American Tipi is now available for campers at the Mauthe Lake Recreation Area.

Explore the unique opportunity to camp in an authentic reproduction of a Native American plains Tipi in the Mauthe Lake Recreation area of the northern Kettle Moraine State Forest.

Located at campsite A2, on a hill overlooking Mauthe Lake, the Tipi campsite was a joint project between the state forest and the Friends of the Kettle Moraine, a non-profit support group dedicated to promoting a greater appreciation of the Kettle Moraine area.

The canvas tipi measures over 16 feet in diameter and is supported by 25 foot tall wooden poles. There are four cots supplied within, and group size is limited to: Family: parents with their dependent children and not more than two guests; Non-Family: maximum of six persons; Juvenile: maximum of ten children including at least one adult leader.

To the early Native Americans, the tipi was more than just a home -- it was a temple as well. The floor of the tipi represented the earth on which we live, the walls of the tipi the sky, and

the poles were the trails from the earth to the spirit world above. Visitors are asked to honor this tradition by following a few common sense rules during their stay.

Fires will be permitted only in the fire ring provided, and no fuels, or equipment such as stoves, gas lanterns, heaters or candles are allowed inside. Cooking or smoking inside the tipi is also prohibited. Insect repellent can damage the tipi canvas, so no spraying inside or near the structure. Pets are not allowed at the tipi campsite.

Cost of this unique campsite is \$24 per night, from May 15th through September 30th. For information in site availability, call 626-4305, 626-2116, or 533-8322. Reservations must be made in person or by mail.

## Town of Wayne Board Will Discuss Town Police Position

Town of Wayne Board members discussed the possibility of establishing a town law enforcement position at their June meeting.

Members were considering a town constable position, but after receiving information from the Washington County Sheriff's Department, County Clerk Office and legal counsel regarding such a position, it was decided the town law enforcement position would be more fitting to the town's needs.

A town constable was described as one who "keeps the peace" compared to town police who would actually have law enforcement authority. Board members are finding that as the township grows, more problems are surfacing particularly with violation of and the need to enforce town ordinances.

A job description, qualifications and specifics of the position will be on the July agenda for further discussion.

Legal counsel for Kim and Mary Rodenkirch was present to ask the town board to reconsider a rezoning request that was denied on May 15, 1996, and to reschedule that request for action in July. In May, following much discussion, the board denied a request by the Rodenkirchs to rezone approximately 12

acres of land from agricultural to residential.

Counsel for the Rodenkirch's explained the reason for the request was basically when the public hearing was held, the Rodenkirchs were unprepared. It was requested that the hearing be withdrawn from the agenda. The Rodenkirchs were under the impression that it would be withdrawn. It was not and they were not prepared to proceed.

No action was taken by the board to reconsider the rezoning denial.

Per legal counsel, the town board took no action on a rezoning agenda item by Art Terlinden to rezone ten acres of land from agricultural to residential because the request was not in compliance with the land division moratorium that went into effect June 1, 1996.

Any land divisions that were submitted and considered at a Plan Commission meeting prior to June 1, 1996 are not affected by the moratorium. The Terlinden plan was submitted but not considered by the Plan Commission. A representative for the Terlindens felt the request complied with the ordinance and indicated she may seek legal advice.

An opening meeting will be held on Tuesday, July 9, beginning at 7:30 p.m. at the town hall to begin compiling ideas for

the new town land use plan. Private consultants and Dan Wilson from the University Extension Office will be in attendance.

Dave Beyer from Uncle Sam's Fireworks requested permission to erect a billboard sign on the property where the previous store was located on Highways 28 and 41. Beyer was instructed to discuss the request with the town zoning administrator, Gordon Hoffmann.

Beyer announced and invited the public to the grand opening celebration of the new store on Highways 41 and D, complete with a spectacular fireworks show on Friday, July 5. A rain date is set for July 6.

In other matters before the Board, a conditional use permit was approved for Sprint Spectrum to erect a 150' cellular tower. Town maintenance man, Ken Ralf, informed the board that

the town will be receiving \$26,050 from the Department of Natural Resources for the repaving of Mohawk Road and suggested the board consider resurfacing and spot patching the west half of Wayne Center Road. The board agreed with the suggestion.

The next Town of Wayne Plan Commission meeting is set for Tuesday, July 16, 1996 beginning at 7:30 p.m. at the town hall with the monthly town board meeting to follow on Wednesday, July 17, 1996 at 8 p.m.

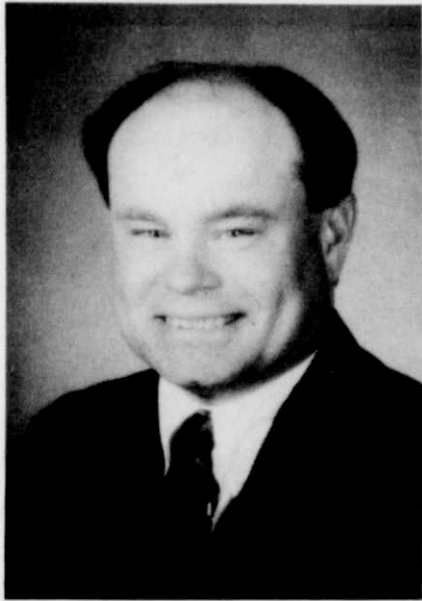

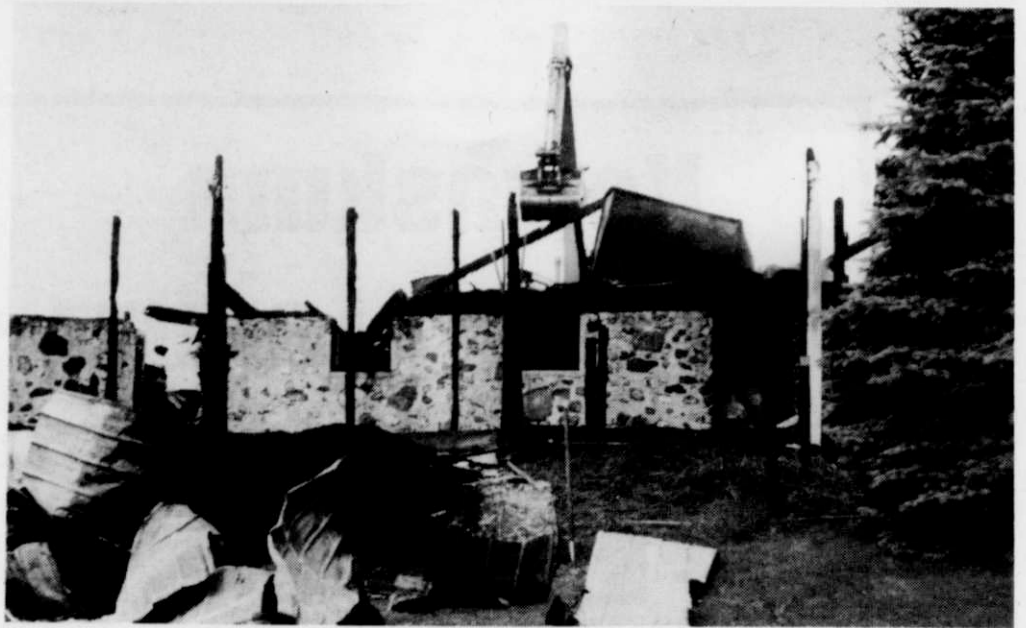

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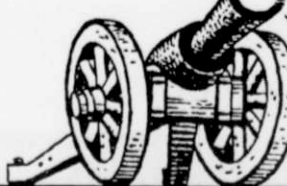
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# Concrete Footings Poured for New Lights at Track, Football Field

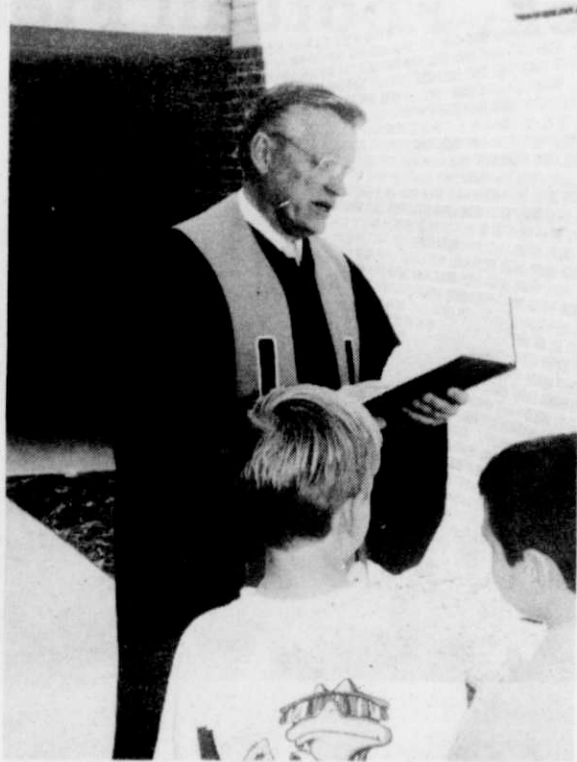

As part of Holy Trinity's recent commitment to "BUILD A PATH TO CHRIST," groundbreaking took place on Sunday, June 30, on a project dedicated to making church entrances accessible to all people.

With 600 family units within the congregation, the parish realizes the growing needs of the elderly, and with a renewed goal, structure, and energy, have moved the idea off the drawing board and into active service to fund priority needs of the congregation.

The \$400,000 project will provide a new and expanded entrance to the church, the addition of an elevator and increase square footage of the church itself.

The new church facilities will accommodate all present and future members, regardless of age or physical limitations, provide a new, protected entrance for drop off closer to the parking lots, give easy access to the sanctuary and the church basement with the new elevator, improve safety for all parishioners with an enclosed stairway to the church, gain a second entrance, provide a more convenient entrance to the church and basement for the school children, and enhance the entrance/greeting area with more space for fellowship and display areas.

The increased space will also allow greater space for parish functions, weddings, funerals, baptisms, committee meetings, accommodate the overflow from Masses, and provide classrooms for CCD and CYM use.

Construction plans include a 25 x 60 foot addition (approximately 2,487 square feet) to the west side of the church, and a 25 x 40 foot drive under roofed area. Within the addition, a 10 x 7 foot single stall bathroom will be situated at church level, along with a 30 x 21 1/2 foot room with a full basement underneath.

Another 20 1/2 x 21 1/2 foot room will be located at ground level, with a same size room above it. The full size elevator will stop at the basement, ground level, church level, and the second floor. The exterior front of the church will remain unchanged.

Holy Trinity's total campaign goal of \$400,000 will be reached over a three year period, with pledges and contributions from its members already promised.

Construction will begin sometime in July as weather permits, and completion should take place before Christmas, 1996.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my relationship with the Kewaskum Schools and the community and appreciate all the wonderful support I received for gifted programs over the years. Noon hour "Career Cafes," Odyssey of the Mind, Youth Art Month displays, the Middle School Literary Magazine, Junior Great Books, Harmony in the Arts,

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## UW Hospital Lists Top 10 Common But Preventable Summer Poisonings

MADISON - Each year about 19,000 people call the Poison Control Center at University of Wisconsin Hospital and Clinics, where pharmacists certified in poison information advise people on what to do following an accidental poisoning or exposure to a toxic substance.

Nearly a third of the center's calls occur in summer. Fortunately, most don't involve serious accidents, but these poisonings easily could be prevented with a little common sense. "While at first glance they may seem unbelievable, they do happen and cause a lot of scares, if not injury," said UW Hospital pharmacist and poison information specialist Donna Lotzer.

Here is the UW Poison Center's "Top 10 List" of the most common summer poisonings, ranked in order of caller frequency:

**1. Eating inedible plants.** Primarily involving children under five, plant poisonings occur both indoors and out. Common outdoor poisonings include wild mushrooms, which can pop up in the yard and elsewhere overnight; brightly colored berries and many garden flowers. Parents also need to keep indoor plants out of reach of children.

**2. Siphoning/swallowing gasoline.** Often those who siphon gasoline into the boat, motorcycle or car use their mouth to start the process and accidentally swallow some of the gasoline. If the gasoline gets into the lungs, it can cause chemical pneumonia, a potentially fatal condition. Usually, however, people say they can't stop belching and also complain of severe heartburn.

**3. Getting sick on the wrong medication.** Though this is a problem all year, medications are carelessly placed in beach bags, coolers, diaper bags, purses and in the refrigerator, where children easily get to them. Also, people often reach for medication without their glasses on or in the dark. Common accidents involve taking pet medication, using the wrong dropper bottle, or instilling ear medication, super glue or VCR cleaner into the eye.

**4. Cleaning till you drop.** Some believe that mixing chemical agents will result in a cleaner

clean. Actually, mixing bleach with acids or ammonia produces a dangerous mix of gases that can cause burning and irritation to the eyes, nose and throat. It can also cause respiratory distress, a particular danger for smokers and those with heart disease.

**5. Taking a shower in pesticide spray.** For whatever reason, people frequently choose to spray their lawns, trees and fields on a windy day and while wearing scant clothing. Result: the chemical drifts onto them and others, causing skin and eye irritation, gastrointestinal symptoms and muscle weakness. Chemicals can also land on gardens, so be sure to wash fruits and vegetables thoroughly.

**6. Going back for spoiled leftovers.** A good rule of thumb is never to leave food out for more than two hours. Otherwise, be prepared to suffer from nausea, vomiting and diarrhea for the next 12 to 24 hours. And, no, pets don't like spoiled food any more than humans.

**7. What did I just drink?** Never place windshield wiper fluid, gasoline, motor oil, antifreeze, or other substances in soda cans or milk jugs because people invariably drink out of these containers. Windshield wiper fluid contains methanol, which can be fatal.

**8. Daring to handle snakes.** Snakes, including poisonous ones, are found all over Wisconsin, both in the wild and in yards. Never pick them

up, even if you think they're dead. Bites from poisonous snakes can cause life-threatening symptoms within a few hours; even bites from non-venomous snakes can be painful and lead to infection.

**9. Getting burned without the sun.** When resurfacing a cement driveway, don't wear low shoes or low boots. Cement is an alkaline corrosive which can cause chemical burns if not washed off promptly. Likewise, don't use paint thinner to remove paint from the body; it burns the skin. Use baby oil or vegetable oil instead.

**10. Gardening with mothballs.** To keep rabbits and other "pesky" animals out of their gardens, some people line the area with mothballs: not a smart idea, because curious children suck on or bite into the mothballs. They can cause mouth and skin irritation, irritability and vomiting.

Enjoy your summer, but remember these common hazards so they don't happen to you or your family. If you suspect a poisoning has occurred, call the Poison Center or your physician immediately. In most cases, the Poison Center can eliminate the need for a costly or unnecessary trip to the emergency room. The emergency number for UW Hospital's Poison Control Center, one of only two poison information centers in the state, is 1-800-815-8855. It is reachable 24 hours a day.

The Plan Commission of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

Zoning Administrator Richard Zarling called the meeting to order. President Robert H. Wagner asked to be excused and was absent. Members present were David Goeden, Richard Schmidt, John Stephani, Frank Beesten and Charles Waala (who

arrived late). Paul Ziebert, Administrator Daniel Schmidt asked to be excused and were absent. A quorum was present. Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles was also in attendance.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and the Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Richard Schmidt, seconded by John Stephani and unanimously carried by voice vote, David Goeden was asked to serve as Chairman pro-tem.

On a motion by Richard Schmidt, seconded by Frank Beesten and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Commission approved the minutes as printed for April 23, 1996.

Discussion was held on the Plat of the Sunset Estates Planned Unit Development Phase 3. The PUD has been zoned for duplexes to allow for the placement of single and two family residences. Mr. Gary Gavin was present to explain the PUD plat. It was noted that 19 building pads are planned with 9 designated as single family, 4 designated as duplex and 6 to be either single or two-family. Mr. Gavin indicated that the curbing to be used would be butterfly type curb with sidewalk placed on the north side only. The traffic flow would be from west to east one way. Also an access walkway is to be provided from the sidewalk to the park on the eastern side of the property. This access walkway is to be maintained in the same material as is the Village's walkway within the park.

On a motion by Frank Beesten, seconded by Charles Waala to send the PUD plat to the Village Board as presented, plus modifications of a few points as follows:

- 1) The PUD is to have up to a maximum of 29 living units as proposed.
- 2) The PUD is to have up to a maximum of 19 building pads (structures).

3. That the private drive (undedicated roadway) as proposed will have travel from west to east with sidewalk on the north side. It was further noted the lots off of Gavin Parkway are not corner lots and that the proposed sidewalk is to be installed and maintained by the PUD Association.

4) That when building permits are requested the PUD Association President or Vice President need to co-sign prior to issuance and that if major structure placement adjustments are to be made and amended plat of that area would need to be submitted.

5. That an access pathway to the parks will be provided from the private drive and from Edgewood Road of equal or better material as that of the rest of the pathway within the Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park. This access pathway will be provided by easement entering the development from the east off the concrete sidewalk then following the western edge of the wet lands area.

NOTE: That these points be added to the plat to clarify the Plan Commission's intent.

Mr. Rick Kania of SEWR-PC was present for discussion on the Master Plan. Mr. Kania reviewed potential street and lot delineations in the Kewaskum planning area.

On a motion by Frank Beesten, seconded by Richard Schmidt, and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Commission adjourned the meeting. Roll call vote was 5 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 2 "Absent."

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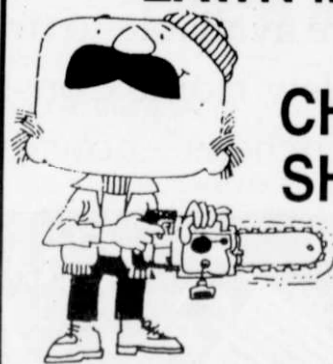

The wins pushed Kewaskum's conference record to 9-4.

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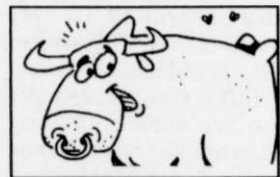
