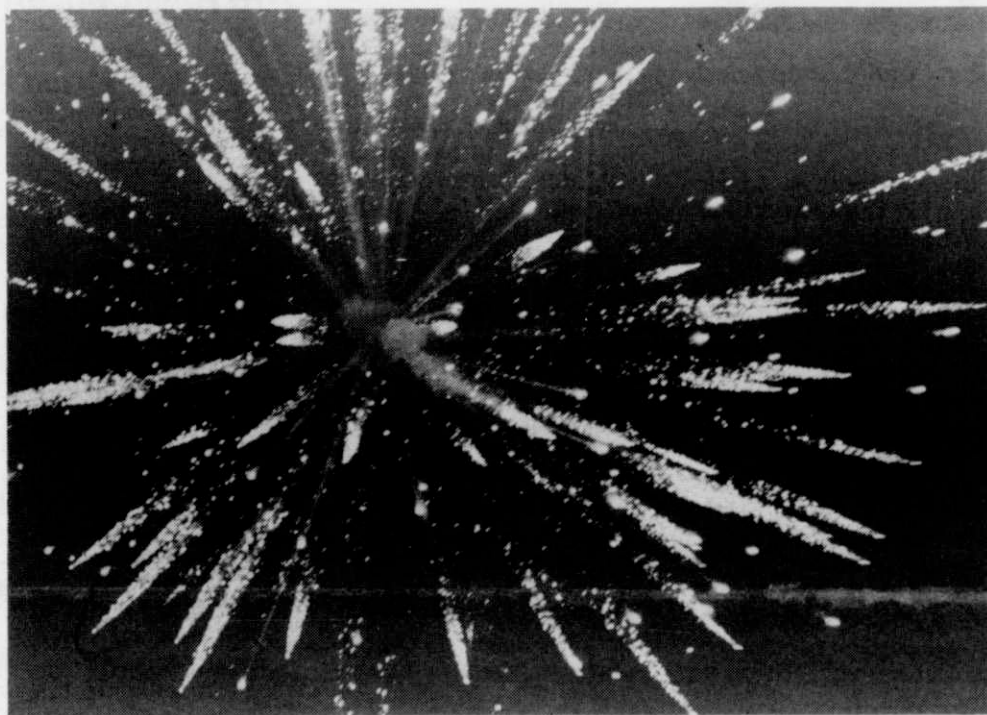

"We get along well, agree on almost everything, and enjoy working together," Brenda says of their new arrangement, and both bring with them years of experience in the profession.

Brenda previously owned and operated Shear Heaven Hair Salon for five years, built onto her home at the time, on Hwy. V. Betty joined her there in 1986, and stayed until Hansen sold the business, when she and her husband Gary bought a new home and devoted their time to starting up Cadens Kennels and Hunt Club, in Campbelsport.

The partners bought all new equipment, wicker furniture, and decorated in burgundies and forest green. The original barber shop mirrors were recut and now hang in the shop as a reminder of Jacob's years of service to the community.

B & B Productions is a full service family salon, offering haircuts, perms, colors, highlighting, manicures and artificial nails, scalp massage, eyebrow waxing, and ear piercing. They offer a complete line of Paul Mitchell,

Superintendent Search Narrows to Three

The Kewaskum School Board will be interviewing three candidates for the position of District Administrator on Wednesday and Thursday of this week, and will either make their final decision at that time, or schedule a third interview session for Monday evening, states school board president Jean Goeden.

The three candidates include Craig Hitchens, Assistant Superintendent of the Mt. Horeb School District, Larry Chase, Superintendent of the Beverly School District in Massachusetts, and Dr. Charles Johnson, interim Superintendent of the Kewaskum School District, and a resident of Neenah.

The Wisconsin Association of School

Boards was hired by the district to launch a search for candidates, which drew in 34 requests to receive applications from across the state, as well as three other states.

Goeden went on to explain that out of the applications returned to the WASB, 20 were properly completed, three were incomplete, eight were withdrawn, and one was returned late. The board worked with WASB consultant Pam Rewey, who Goeden commended for her professionalism.

An external review of applicants was conducted by Marv Lansing from the WASB, a retired superintendent from Eau Claire, and George Kliminski, a UW-Madison professor, who

deals with licensing superintendents. Five final candidates were recommended for interview to the school board, including Dr. Johnson.

On June 27th, the school board met to internally review the resumes of the five potential candidates, and also look at the 15 other applications. President Goeden stated that the board chose two applicants from the recommended five (one of which was Johnson), and the third finalist was picked out of the 15 that did not receive WASB recommendation.

Attorney for the district, Mr. Mike Spector, will be consulting the school board members at these interviews, to help them through the process of selection.

St. Lucas Musical to Be Aired on Cablevision

The St. Lucas Lutheran Grade School production of "The Greatest Show of All" will be broadcast on Marcus Cablevision, Channel 9, this summer. The dates of the broadcast will be July 17 at 7p.m., July 24 at 5 p.m., August 9, 10, and 11 at 8 p.m.

The setting of "The Greatest Show of All" takes place in a carnival. The teachers and children visiting the carnival

are able to give witness to the wonders of God's creation as compared to the magic and tricks of a carnival.

The students in grades pre-kindergarten through eighth grade take part in the play. Faculty members will also be found in costume.

The production was staged in Rose Hall at Kewaskum High School. It was presented on May 17, 1996.

In lieu of the very disturbing comment published in the July 5th West Bend Daily News-Sound Off section, this letter took on more importance. First of all, I would like to point out that it was the "Village" that put on the fireworks display, NOT the school district. For many years the village has budgeted \$3,200 toward the annual display, and just recently started a campaign to accept private donations to have our Independence Day celebration take on even more importance in showing pride in our country and our community.

Many generous people donated from the goodness of their hearts which added to this great event. It's a good feeling to be part of such a strong surge of patriotism in our country again. After all, there is no greater country in the world.

As we all know, Kewaskum has a reputa-

tion of having the best fireworks in the area, which brings many out-of-towners to our local businesses boosting our local economy. You can't put a price tag on the pride it brings to our community. Next year will be even bigger and better! So on that note, again I want to thank everyone for your generosity and dedicated efforts in putting on the greatest fireworks event in the county. And, yes... you are entitled to your own opinions, but we are very proud in Kewaskum!

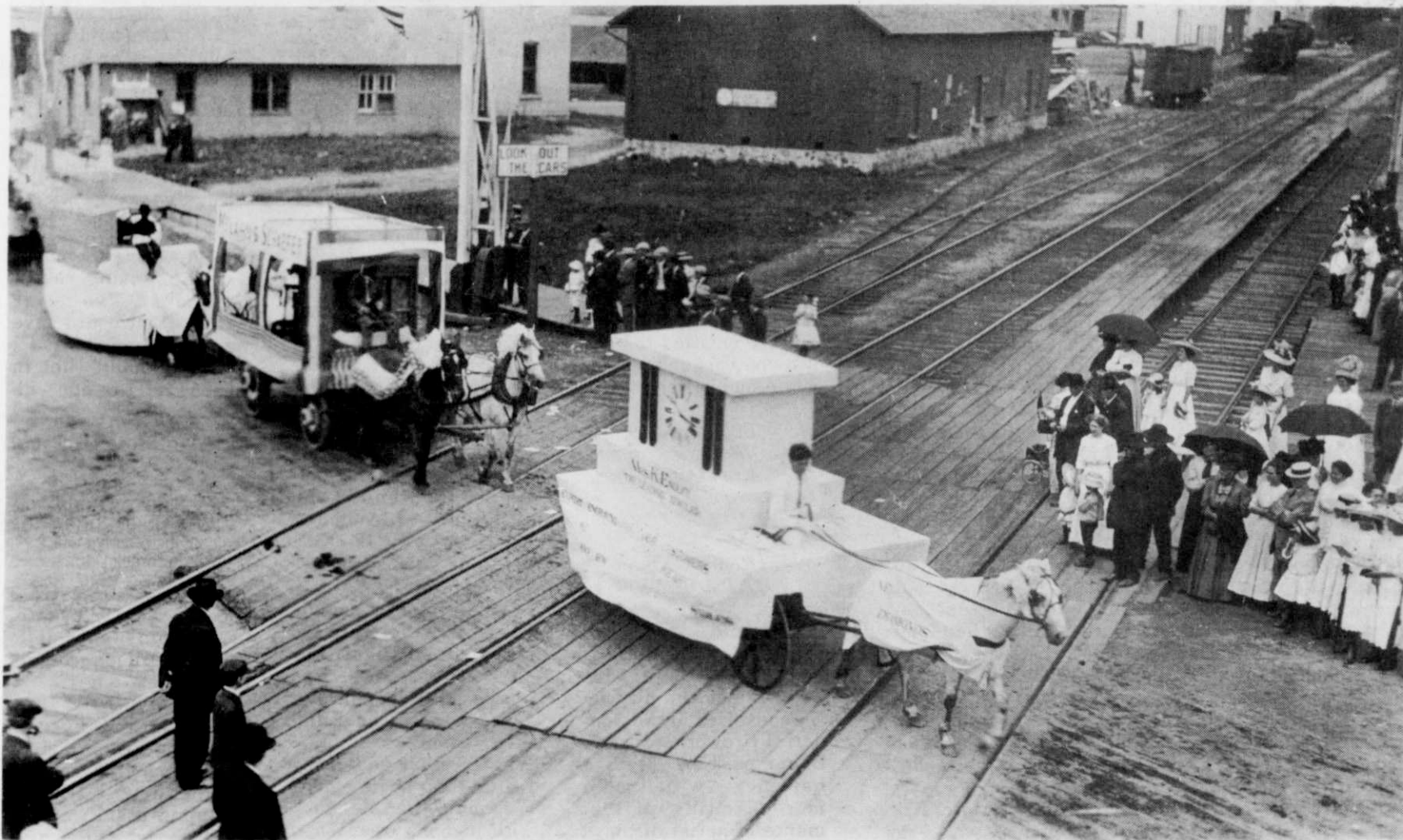

We were all pleasantly surprised at how much more rich in resources we are than we originally thought. Where the problems arise is the organization, planning and promotion of these resources.

Well, we're starting at the beginning... good place, eh? Yes, we are starting at the beginning by meeting with a state representative from the Wisconsin Department of Tourism, Ms. Debbie Skinner. Ms. Skinner will be instrumental in guiding us, as she and others have with other municipalities, to a solid tourism program.

"But we like things the way they are!" ... Holy smokes, if I hear this lament one more time, I'm going to scream so loud that all the milk will curdle in dairy farms for miles around! Things haven't been the way they were for years! I've been here for only nine

Each one of these people has a passion for what they do. They have a stake in the outcome of the project. If one of them falls short, the rest of the project suffers. The other

workers must work harder to make up for this deficit. It will be no different in this endeavor.

We need an honest effort by everybody who calls the Kettles home to see this project a success. We need your help, and cooperation. We want to see people talking at Sentry about their ideas while they shop. It would be wonderful to hear of dinner meetings at the Pony Express to discuss their ideas and points of view. I'd be bowled over if while golfing at Hon-E-Kor someone asked me my thoughts about the future of this community.

From Sunburst Ski Hill to the Old Wade House, to Mauthe Lake, Dundee Hill, Parnell Tower, Kewaskum's Kettle Kountry Kolors, hay rides, shopping, and hiking those trails... we've a rich and blessed community. But it needs the tender loving care of a group of people much like those who refurbish a relic of a house.

Folks, I love this place. Please join me and the many others who are eager to begin a new era of community, cama-

raderie, and a model for other heartland communities to look upon. How can you do this? Support community events. Join the local Chamber of Commerce. Send letters to the various officials in your community and let them know what your ideas and viewpoints might be. Get to know your neighbors at home as well as your workplace. Talk up the towns and villages.

The advent of the Tourism Committee is a sign that the area is aware that an overhaul is needed. That's good news. Help keep enthusiasm like this going with your own ideas and efforts. If you see me on the street, I'd be happy to discuss our community with you... and I'm proud to live here with all of you.

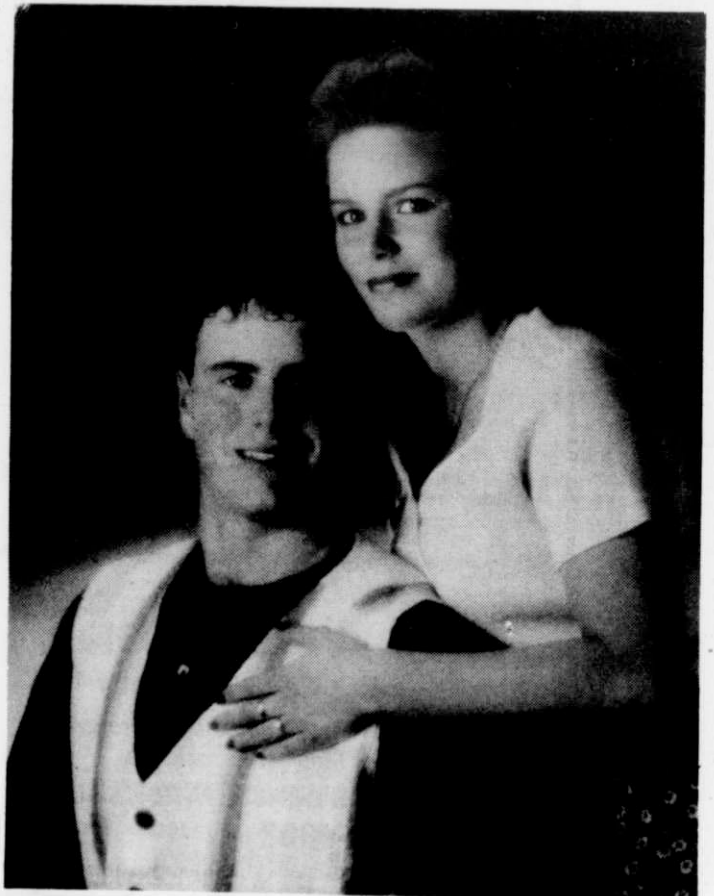

Major Water Line Breaks Under Railroad on July 4th Holiday

Village workers had a little "fireworks" of their own as Independence Day dawned on Kewaskum. Shortly after his shift began on July 4th, police officer Tom Bauer noticed an inordinate amount of water collecting in pools near the Second Street railroad crossing.

Upon closer investigation, Officer Bauer discovered a main water line break. He immediately radioed the Washington County Sheriff's Department, and asked them to contact Wisconsin Central Railroad and notify them of the problem.

Bauer advised the County dispatcher, who in turn spoke to railroad personnel, that trains would have to be rerouted due to the massive amount of sand, gravel, water and debris that had washed across the tracks. The asphalt on the roadway had also lifted up from the force of the water pressure when the line let go.

After talking to railroad officials, the County dispatcher advised Officer Bauer a train was already on its way and was due to arrive in Kewaskum in 20 minutes. She also told Officer Bauer Wisconsin Central was sending out one of their area supervisors, who was enroute, to assess the damage to the tracks.

Wisconsin Central Supervisor Joel Peterson arrived on the scene shortly thereafter, along with village DPW workers Craig Gruber and Dennis Aupperle, Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles, and Water Department personnel Bob Manthei and Jim Noren.

It was determined at that time, even though there was a possibility the southbound train might derail, the supervisor would "walk" the train over the damaged track area. The gravel and debris was cleaned off and workers waited for the arrival of the train.

The train crawled into Kewaskum at "walking speed," approximately ten miles per hour. As Supervisor Peterson walked alongside the train, it made its way slowly over the damaged track without incident.

Warmed by the morning sun, the asphalt which had lifted nearly six inches, sunk into the

six foot hole made by the force of the water main break.

Another crisis averted, workers began the tedious task of cleaning up and barricading the area so that motorists would not travel over the damaged roadway. Due to the fact it was a holiday, workers shut off the water, which actually only affected Glacier Processing and Engelhardt Dairy. (Engelhardt was serviced however, from a nearby hydrant).

A full crew of workers, utilizing a front end loader and a backhoe, and a good portion of "elbow grease" fully repaired the break on Friday morning.

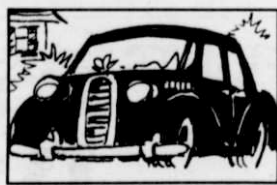
But the "what ifs" still remain... "What if" Officer Bauer had not noticed the break when he did? "What if" the train had not been aware of the situation and the debris had not been cleaned off the track? "What if" the train had been traveling faster than ten miles per hour? And lastly, "what if" the train had been transporting hazardous chemicals?

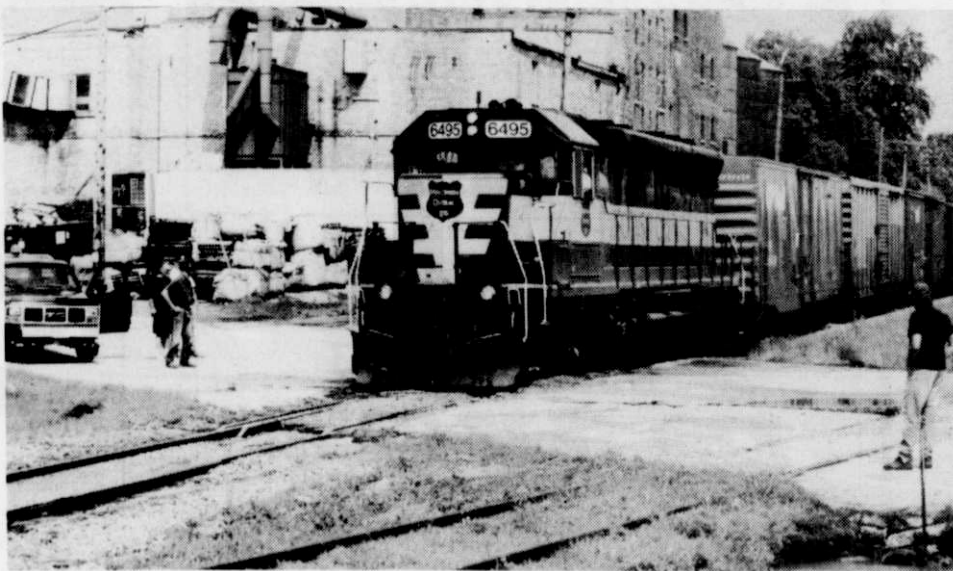

Shown above is the water, gravel and sand that washed over the railroad tracks shortly after the main line break was discovered on July 4th.



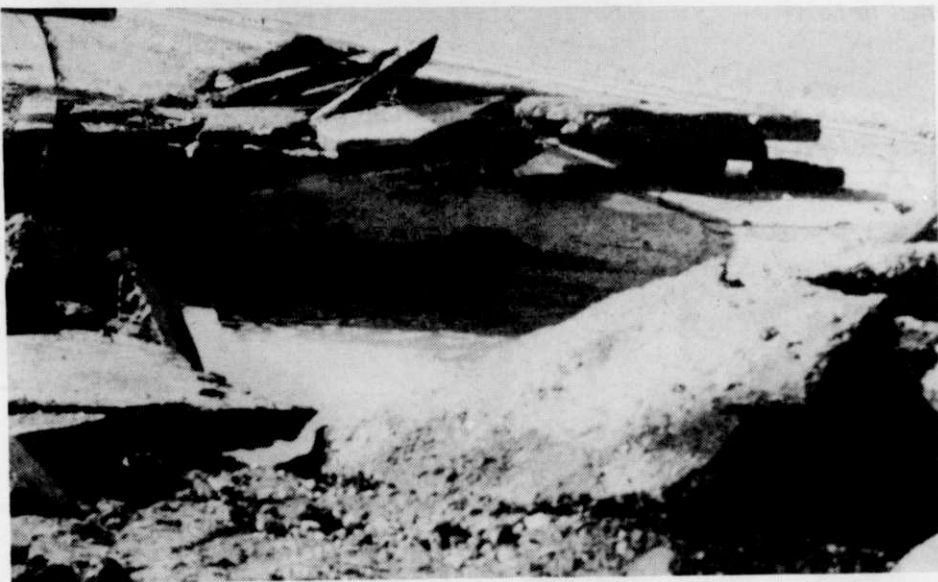

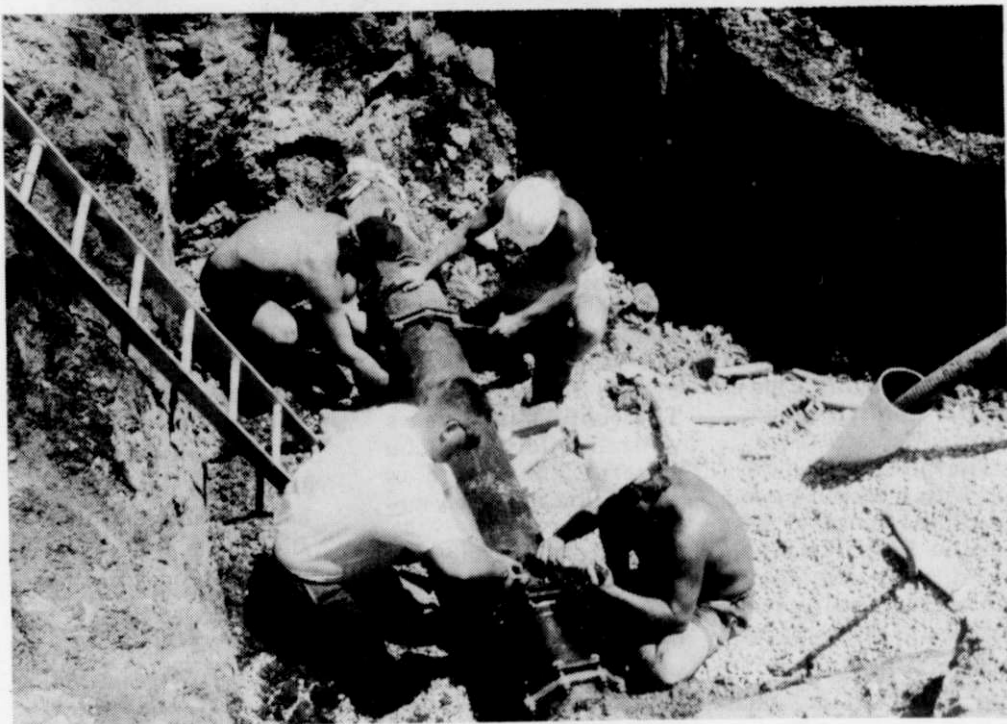

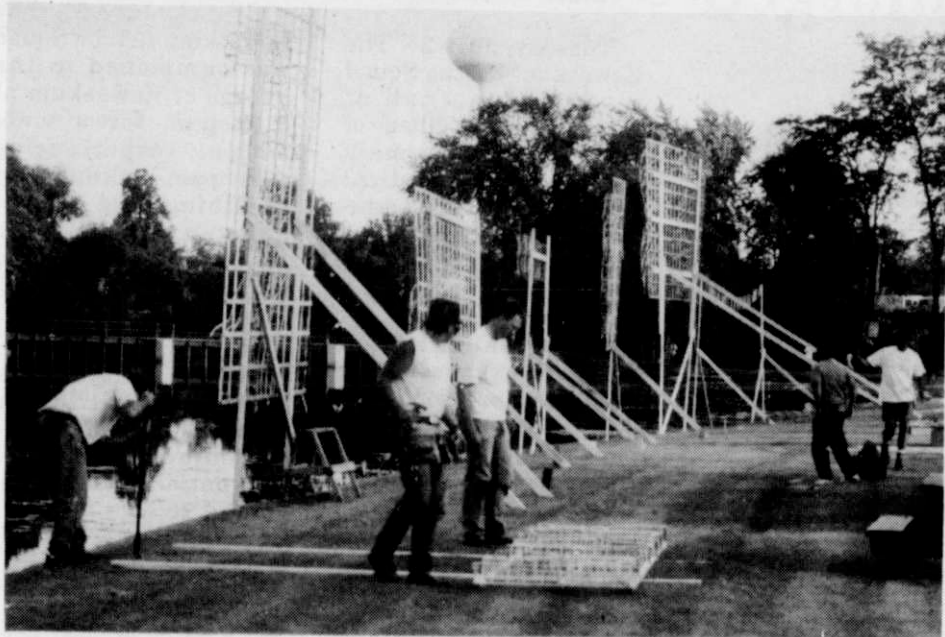
This rebuttal is directed to the ANONYMOUS letter writer to the West Bend News Sound-Off column. A Big Fuss...

The amount of tax dollars budgeted towards

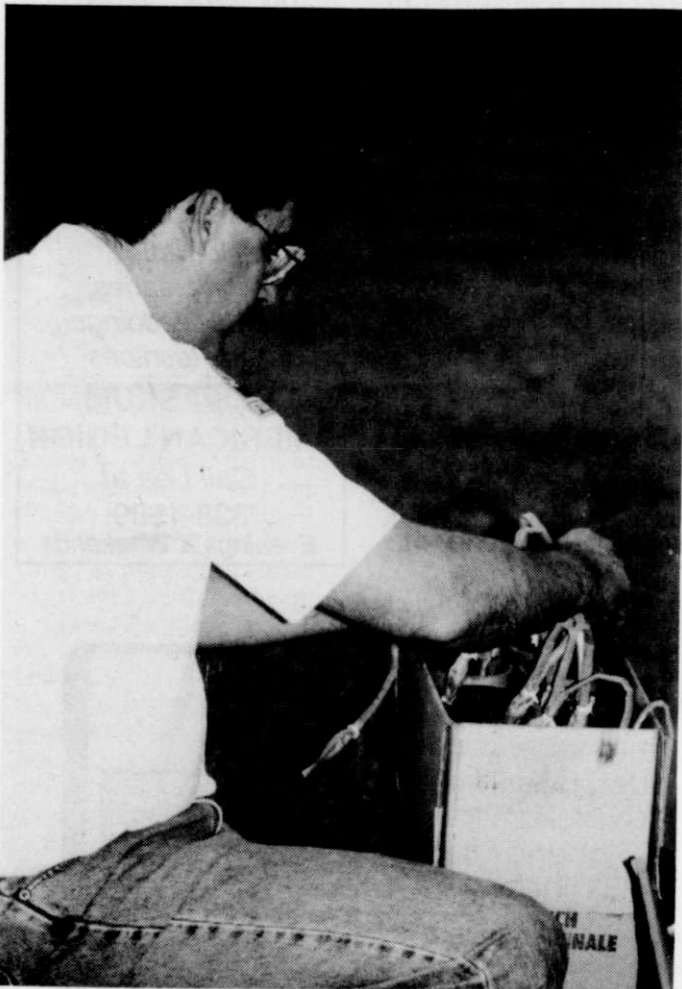

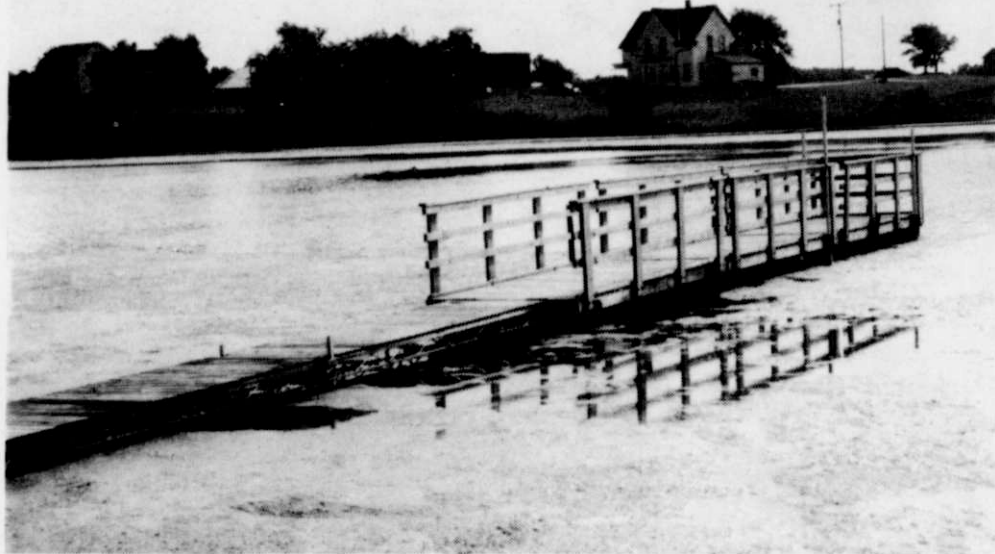

Beechwood Lake Pier Enlarged

Improvements continue to be made at Beechwood Lake's public pier and boat landing area. Previously, residents had to access the lake by driving behind the old 1913 Firehouse, where they filled the

water tanks, but if cars were parked there, it wasn't possible to always get through.

When a subdivision went up next to the lake 22 years ago, a piece of land was dedicated to the town for the purpose of developing a park on Beechwood Lake.

Town Chairman Lester Benzschawel said that credit goes to local resident Linus Fellenz for starting the ball rolling, to get the land developed for public use.

The pier was put in about two years ago, with three new sections added this past year to enlarge the structure. A boat landing was constructed two years ago, with the DNR putting in the underwater concrete slabs. The town recently laid down three inches of stone, and built it up to about 40 feet from shore-

line. The area surrounding the pier and boat landing has also been landscaped.

The entire project was paid for by funds available through Sheboygan County and the Wisconsin Dept. of Natural Resources. The Beechwood Sportsman's Club maintains the aerator in the lake, as well as the pier.

Deadline for Hunters Choice Applications

It may be hard to believe but it is time to start thinking about the upcoming Hunting Seasons. It know the 4th of July weekend just ended and we have a lot of summer ahead but an important deadline is coming up next week, Saturday, July 20th. If you don't know what I'm referring to you are more than likely, not a hunter, or have been sleeping for the last year. Hunters Choice applications are to be postmarked on or before the 20th of July. In the past it was Sept. 20th. Applications are available at Coast to Coast, other license vendors and at DNR Offices.

Try not to wait until the last moment to purchase your Hunters Choice application. Also check now, to be sure, that you have your Hunters Safety Certificate. Persons born after January 1st, 1973 are required to display a Hunters Safety Certificate before a Hunting License can be sold to them. You need to buy a Deer Hunting License to apply for a Hunters Choice or Bonus tag. If you lost yours, a duplicate certificate can be obtained, but it will take several days.

Again, don't wait until the last moment to discover you lost your safety Certificate, because you will not have time to get a duplicate. Parents should also check with their children to be sure that they have their certificates. Applications for duplicate Hunters Safety Certificates are available from me and at DNR Offices. You can also pick up a Duplicate Hunters Safety Certificate in person at the Horicon DNR Office between 8:00 AM and 4:30 PM on weekends. Through the mail it takes about 4 days to get a duplicate certificate.

Why the earlier

Application Deadline? So that hunters can get their Hunters Choice and Bonus tags prior to the opening of the Bow Hunting season which will open on September 21st.

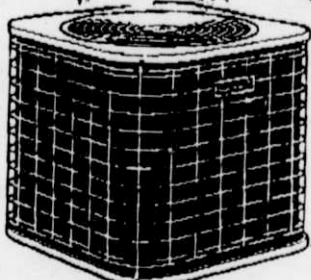

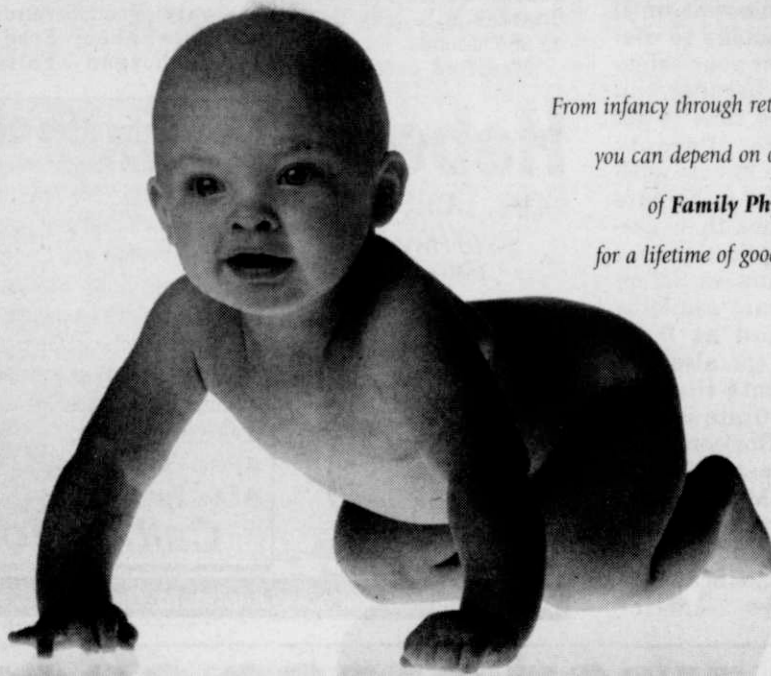
