David Dorn Named Town Of Kewaskum Chairman

Town of Kewaskum board members appointed David Dorn as Town Chairman, effective August 1, 1996, at the July 15th town meeting. Dorn has served on the board as Town Supervisor for 11 years and is in his sixth term of office.

The appointment of Dorn follows the resignation of George Allmann who served as Town Chairman for 19 1/2 years. Dorn will complete Allmann's term of office. The position is up for re-election in April, 1997. The board will advertise for interested persons to fill the Town Supervisor

position.

Representatives from Eggs R Us, a poultry farm located in the Town of Farmington, were before the board to respond to a letter they received regarding complaints received by board members. The letter was sent after several property owners on Hickory Drive complained about the odor and waste spilled on the road around June 13th. Waste from the farm is spread on farm fields in the Town of Kewaskum.

The representatives stressed their desire to be good neighbors and requested that the farm be called directly when

there is a problem so they can respond to it. According to their records, the farm was in compliance with a verbal agreement reached in 1993 between the town and the farm.

Waste was spread and incorporated into the soil within the required 24 hours and then planted by the farmer within 48 hours. Eggs R Us was unaware of the waste spill on the town road and again requested that the farm be called to rectify any problem stating there have been times in the past when they had gone out and cleaned up spills they knew about.

Dr. Johnson Given Official Vote of Confidence

The Kewaskum School Board unanimously voted to approve a two-year contract to officially hire Dr. Charles Johnson as Superintendent of Schools, board president Jean Goeden announced to the public at a short open meeting Monday night.

Goeden said the decision was an emotional one, after the board reviewed 20 potential candidates from across the country, and interviewed three finalists last week, working closely with Pam Rewey from the WASB (Wisconsin Association of School Boards), the group hired to serve as consultants in the superintendent

search.

A district survey was conducted this past May using interviews done with district residents from all walks of life, to find out what the people of Kewaskum were looking for in a candidate for superintendent, and the WASB used this information to help guide board members in making their decision.

Johnson's previous experience with the district was one of the deciding factors in the board's

final selection, and his eight month track record as interim superintendent impressed both the community, and the Kewaskum School Board.

His implementation of strategic planning, the formation of district goals and beliefs, and the creation of numerous committees, have served to strengthen a weakened relationship between the school district and the community, and involved the public and staff in making school related decisions.

Board member Jon Downs stated that the process they went

through was absolutely necessary for several reasons, one of which was to see if the school district would be better off with a candidate from inside the district, or outside. "People talked to me from both ends of the spectrum... from why are you wasting money when we have the best person -- to we have to look for someone new."

Johnson's \$82,000 per year contract was finalized in a closed session before making the announcement public, and will be effective until June 30, 1998. As interim superintendent, he received \$78,000 as an annual salary. He is con-

tinuing to meet requirements set by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction for his provisional license, which states he must complete three courses: school business, instruction and curriculum. Classes began this past Monday in Madison.

President Goeden said the two other candidates they interviewed were excellent, but the 7-0 vote indicated the great working relationship Johnson has already established with the board. They were Craig Hitchens, Assistant Superintendent of the Mt. Horeb school district, and Larry Chase, Superintendent of the Beverly School District in Massachusetts.

Tom Timblin was the

only other board member to issue a public statement during the meeting. "It was a level playing field, it wasn't a stacked deck," he emphasized. "We entertained applications from all over the nation." He told the community that the district now has the ability to reach achievement they have only dreamed about.

Goeden ended the meeting by thanking Pam Rewey and all the members of the school board, for taking the job seriously, which required long hours away from family and spouses. "We followed the profile set up by the community and staff, in keeping the education of our children first in mind."

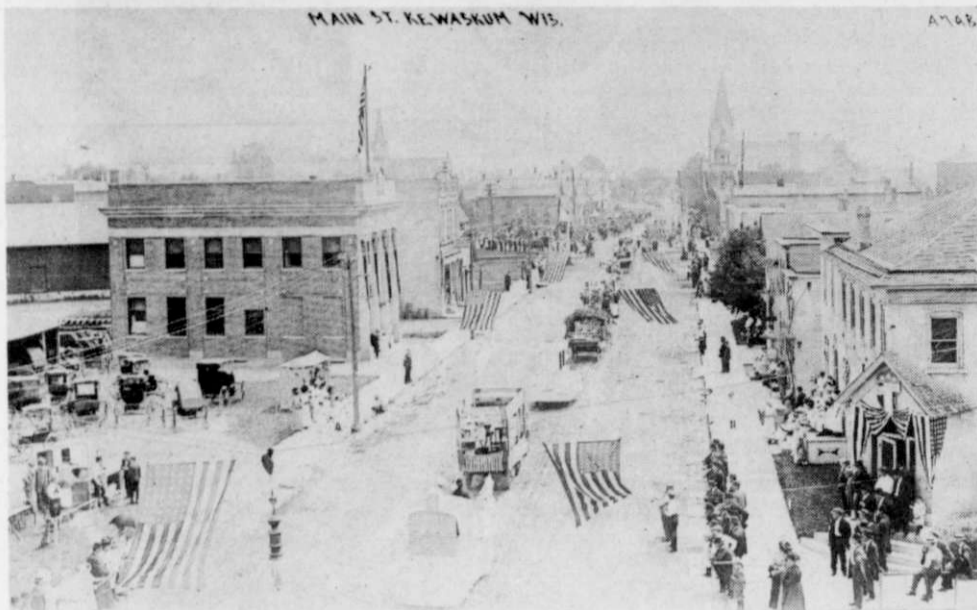

School Board Calls Public Hearing on Purchase of Central Village Complex

Attendance was sparse at a public hearing called by the Kewaskum school board before their monthly meeting, to hear what residents had to say about the district's possible purchase of the Central Village Complex on Main Street.

Members of the community came to voice strong opposition against spending district money on the village owned building, with an asking price of \$200,000. It was originally purchased by the village for \$100,000 from West Bend Savings, when they relocated to their new offices on Fond

du Lac Avenue.

School board member Tom Timblin told everyone he was a little disappointed that a member of the village board wasn't there to discuss the building with the voters of Kewaskum.

"Elmer Hallen (an audience member) had a terrific point that this thing's not on the tax rolls right now, it's just sitting there. I thought the village would want to work with us a little bit, so it's collecting money. Kewaskum needs a shot in the arm, the whole downtown is for sale there, and there's not a whole lot going on there. That's why we kind of thought they'd work with us a little bit on this," Timblin expressed.

Cost estimates to remodel just the upper level of the building (5,000 square feet) are approximately \$200,000, and after including the lower level, which is

another 5,000 square feet, plus the cost of the building, could bring the finished figure up to \$550,000, just to do it right.

Interim Superintendent Dr. Charles Johnson said that what excited him about the building was its intrinsic value, if it could be acquired at the right price. "We've done the analysis of building, and there's no question we can build an office whenever we need to," he pointed out. "But in a way, it's a neat building, because instead of tearing something down, we'd be right in the heart of town. So there was some interest in just the idea of making that building useful, a key building that has a history in Kewaskum. We're not willing to do that at any price, obviously. There's two sides to this story, about 'I can build it new,' but you can never have that same

history either. We are hoping our ties to the village become closer and closer, and we thought this might be one avenue to begin those discussions."

Audience member Elmer Hallen was outspoken at the meeting, and told board members, "This thing is 50 years old. If the village gave it to you for one dollar, I think it would be a bad investment, for the amount of money you're gonna have to spend on it. I think the thing that upsets me the most, is when they're trying to sell me my building for twice what it was originally bought for. Plus, it is a white elephant. They're stuck with it," he stated.

Board president Jean Goeden said the Finance, Building and Grounds Committee had taken a tour of the building, for possible administrative use, and the public hearing was called to hear community input on the matter, since the school board was considering putting the building purchase as an agenda item at the annual meeting scheduled for July 22.

The school board later removed it from the proposed agenda at their regular meeting, which followed the public hearing. It is apparent that as this district continues to grow, the board will need to make decisions regarding administrative space, and will be looking into

other options that include searching for another existing building, returning to the high school, or building a new facility.

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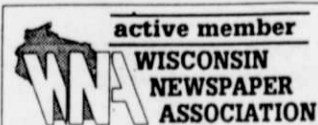

Board to Ask Taxpayers to Add \$1 Per Thousand to Reduce Long Term Debt

The Kewaskum School Board agreed to ask district taxpayers to accept a plan to reduce their long term debt by adding one dollar per thousand of equalized value onto the 1996-97 tax levy.

The complete plan has already been presented to the general public through articles appearing in several newspapers, and will be formally addressed at the Annual School District Meeting and Budget Hearing, set for July 22 at 8 p.m. in the high school commons.

If accepted, residents will be paying \$11.42 per thousand, instead of \$10.42, still down from the previous year's rate of \$14.42.

Board member Larry Fechter emphasized that the public should also be made aware that any monies acquired through debt reduction will be earmarked only for this particular cost, and is legally required to go directly into the debt service fund. "This money is going strictly, and can only go for this reduc-

tion," he pointed out.

Interim Superintendent Charles Johnson stated that the only change in the preliminary budget since the board last met, is the addition of \$40,000 to the total revenue that they anticipate coming in next fall through TIF, as being settled by the village.

The new expected total revenue figure is \$11,907,795.00. "This is the only new change to the budget in conjunction with the annual meeting," he stated.

Mike Lettow stated the method of application was appropriate and he personally saw it being incorporated into the soil. While understanding of the property owners situation, Lettow stated, "people have to realize that when they move out into the country, they have to put up with some of the country elements."

Dorn reiterated the property owners frustration stating he would like to see the roads kept cleaner particularly when residents drive through the waste and then have the odor in their yards.

Allmann suggested Eggs R Us call the property owners on Hickory Drive and explain their procedures to them.

Town resident John Kletti and his son, David, came before the board requesting suggestions for an Eagle Scout project that would benefit the township. A suggestion was given to construct several picnic tables for use at the town hall when the facilities are rented to people who want to use them. The tables would be stored in the garage when not in use.

Another suggestion was to design a recreation area with possibly a horseshoe pit, volleyball area and playground equipment. Kletti will expand on these ideas and report back to the board.

Charles Schultz came before the board regarding the review of a 1992 Conditional Use Permit

for occasional gravel sales from a pit located on his property. Schultz was asked to attend after complaints had been received of frequent use of the pit and road damage.

The permit was issued in 1992, with restrictions, for annual review and issuance. The problem appeared to be different interpretations of the permit between Schultz and the town board.

Town Zoning Administrator Gordon Hoffmann explained the town's position and imposed restrictions. The major difference of opinion appeared to be the number of truck loads of gravel that could be removed per day and who is responsible for the road damage.

After much discussion, the board voted that Schultz will be responsible for the road repair on Prospect for an estimated cost of \$5,400. Hoffmann will draft a new conditional use permit for the town board's consideration with additional language to clarify terms of the permit. A stop work order, issued after the July board meeting, remains in effect.

The next town of Kewaskum Plan Commission meeting will be held July 22, 1996 at the town hall beginning at 7 p.m. when work will begin on new zoning ordinance guidelines. The next town board meeting will be August 19th at 8 p.m.

Board Approves New Director of Pupil Services for School District

Beginning July 17, Heidi Olsson will be serving as the school district's new Director of Pupil Services, after the board unanimously approved her two year contract at this month's regular board meeting.

Olsson will be heading the special education programs, previously supervised by retired KES principal Richard Zarling, as well as coordinating the gifted and talented program, left vacant by resigning coordinator Carol Zoerb. The position also requires grant writing, performing public relations duties for the district, and taking care of its transportation needs.

Her previous experience includes Special Ed. instructor in Palm Harbor, Florida, and employment with the Menomonee Falls School District. First year salary is \$57,000.

Buildings and Grounds Supervisor Fred Boehlke has stepped down from his position to take on a newly created full time position as High School Building Custodian. The board approved his resignation, with board member Neal Weare voting no

because of the way the motion was worded.

Board member and Policy Committee Chairman John Schulte announced that the committee has formulated a Mission Statement, along with a list of goals. The statement reads: "To support the District's learning environment by providing policies that are fair, concise, consistent and that foster a positive atmosphere." Goals include the development of a Human Resource Manual and Administrative Manual by July 1997, and replacement of the current Policy Manual with the two new ones by August, 1998.

Curriculum/Business Manager George Allmann was on hand to inform the school board on the results of the recent district technology assessment conducted by Entre Computers P.C. of Milwaukee. The company was hired to make hardware and software recommendations in specific areas in the schools for the next four years.

Allmann emphasized the major recommendation, prior to making any computer related purchases, was the need to recable each building to meet the needs of the current hardware and

any future updating.

This would include cable drops in every classroom for computer network hookup, telephone service to every classroom for communication with the office and public, a PA system through the telephone hookups and internet accessibility for every classroom, and the recabling of computer labs and server locations.

The JET Committee received endorsement from the board to proceed with acquiring bids on recabling KMS and KHS, within a \$75,000 limit. The 1996-97 allocated budget for JET is \$125,000. Allmann stated that the committee's projected three year timeline would also focus on bids to update the computer

labs at KMS and KHS, the recabling of FES, WES, and KES (if that building is to continue to be used for a length of time to justify the expense), and review leasing, rather than purchase of hardware.

"The advantage to leasing is there's a chance we can get on the state leasing program," Allmann pointed out.

The composition of the District Implementation Planning Teams was reviewed by the board as part of the district's strategic plan, to attack five formal goals, beginning in August. These goals are 1) District Communication; 2) Curriculum for the Basics; 3) Job Standards and Evaluation; 4) Maintenance and; 5) Capital Improvement.

The sessions will be

discussed by committees, and should be completed by November 11, for review by the school board at that time.

Other board approvals for the evening included a teaching contract for Kathryn Renderman as high school math teacher to replace Clark Pearson, and the appointments of Dennis Reha as seventh grade KMS intramurals coach, and Claire Weidner as assistant KHS tennis coach. Resignations were accepted from Mary Reilly-Kliss as assistant director of the KMS musical, Kristina Schumacker-Rasmussen as KMS art instructor, Karah Holle as KHS English instructor, and Carol Zoerb as GT coordinator.

A/P and Payroll was approved in the amount of \$11,015,804.38.

St. Joseph's Hospital To 'Zap' Kidney Stones

Lithotripsy, a non-surgical outpatient procedure that effectively disintegrates painful kidney stones, is the latest addition to patient services at St. Joseph's Community Hospital of West Bend.

The procedure uses highly focused sound waves to disintegrate kidney stones, allowing the particles to be easily passed through the body's urinary tract.

The hospital has contracted for the service with Prime Kidney Stone Treatment Inc. of Austin, Texas, a major provider of shared mobile services, and expects to do approximately 25 procedures a year, according to John Flanders, director of Patient Care Services at St. Joseph's Community Hospital. The service's fully-equipped mobile unit will visit the hospital regularly based on patient demand.

Flanders said several patients are already scheduled to use the new service, which will begin in mid-July.

"Lithotripsy is a non-invasive alternative to major surgery, and has many patient benefits," said Flanders. "Traditional kidney stone surgery requires a large incision and a hospital stay of almost a week. The patient is left with a large scar and an often long and painful recovery. With lithotripsy, there are no side effects,

no scars and recovery time is short."

Lithotripsy means "stone crushing" and is also known as extracorporeal shock wave lithotripsy or ESWL.

St. Joseph's Community Hospital's operating room and anesthesia staff, along with technical staff from Prime Kidney Stone, will staff the procedure, which is performed by a urologist. The patient is admitted to the hospital in the usual way and prepared in the Ambulatory Surgery Unit (ASU) before the hour-long procedure.

The patient is placed on a type of form-fitting water bed and electrical impulses are passed through the water, aimed directly at the site of the kidney stones, which are made of hard mineral deposits. Under the repeated pressure of the shock waves, the stones are shattered and reduced to the size of grains of sand, then passed from the body. After the procedure, the patient may spend a half hour in the recovery room and another hour in ASU before going home.

"St. Joseph's Community Hospital is pleased to be able to offer this service to patients. Urologists now have the option to send lithotripsy patients to their local community hospital. Mobile services are also more economical since

the hospital is using the most advanced equipment without a major investment in its purchase," Flanders said.

A half million Americans experience kidney stones annually.

Lithotripsy is not the only mobile service used by the hospital. The hospital shares magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) services with other hospitals through Wisconsin Mobile Imaging. The lithotripsy mobile unit will link up directly to the hospital building in the same way as the MRI unit.

Lake Michigan Daily Perch Bag Limit Reduced to Five

MADISON -- The sport fishing daily bag limit for yellow perch on Wisconsin waters of Lake Michigan has been reduced from 25 to five, following adoption of an emergency rule by the state Natural Resources Board last month.

"The yellow perch population in Lake Michigan is continuing to decline, following six consecutive years of very poor natural reproduction," explains Bill Horns, Great Lakes fisheries specialist with the Department of Natural Resources. "This emergency rule is intended to help protect the remaining adult population."

The board also postponed from September 15 to October 1, the opening of the commercial yellow perch season on Lake Michigan.

The board directed the DNR to hold public hearings on a permanent reduction from 25 to five in the sport bag limit and a closure of the commercial yellow perch fishing season on Lake Michigan. The hearings will be held in mid August in the Sheboygan and Racine areas at dates and locations that are yet to be determined, Horn says. The DNR will announce the hearing times and locations when they are set.

"We will be monitoring yellow perch reproduction during 1996," Horn says. "Any final decision by the Natural Resources Board on permanently reducing the bag limit and closing the commercial season will be guided by what we find through that monitoring."

The rule does not affect sport or commercial fishing for yellow perch from Green Bay. The sport fishing daily bag limit will remain at 25 for Green Bay and commercial fishers who have quotas for zones one or two (Green Bay and waters of Lake Michigan north of Algoma) may harvest yellow perch from Green Bay starting September 15.

"Although the yellow perch population in Green Bay has also declined in recent years, the situation is not as grave as that in Lake Michigan," Horn says.

These actions follow reductions in sport and commercial harvests from Lake Michigan, implemented in 1995 in conjunction with similar reductions in Illinois,

Indiana and Michigan. At that time the sport bag limit was reduced to 25 and the total allowable commercial harvest was reduced by 65 percent.

The DNR is working with fisheries managers and scientists from four other states, several universities, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and the National Biological Service to develop a research program to study the decline of yellow perch in Lake Michigan.

"Yellow perch populations have fluctuated widely in the past. There are several hypotheses to explain the current decline, and more than one factor may be responsible," Horn says. Possibilities include predation by alewives and ecosystem changes caused by the spiny water flea or reductions in organic pollution.

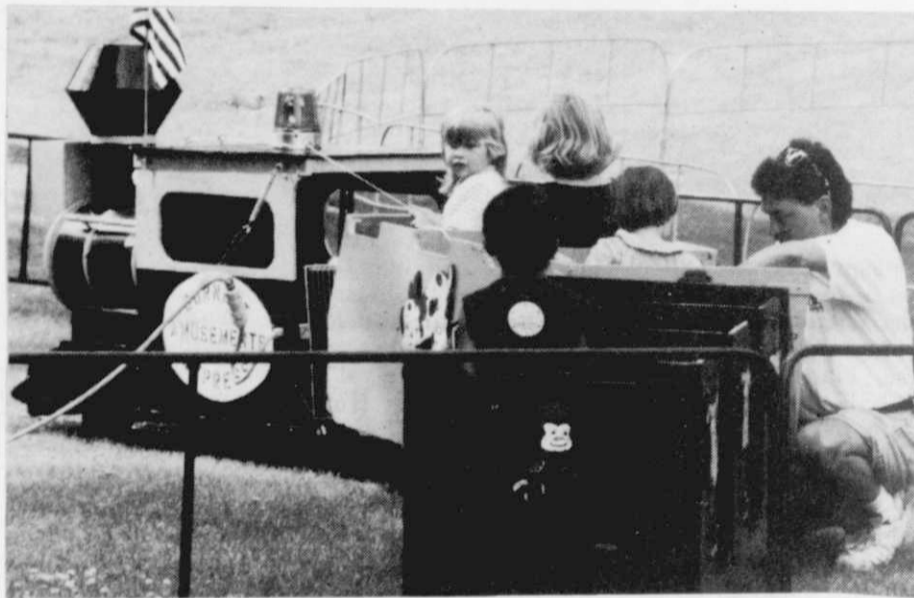

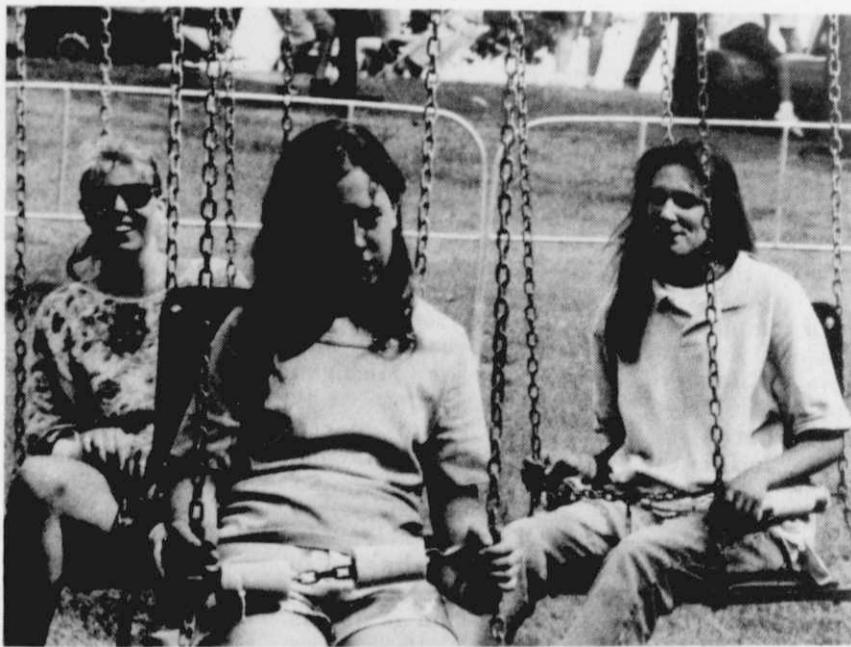

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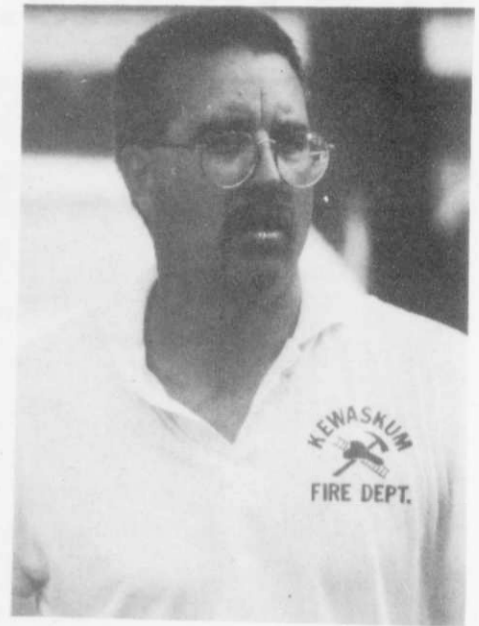

Governor Approves New Bridge in Town of Eden

Governor Tommy Thompson has approved a \$119,000 contract to replace a 66-year-old bridge over the Milwaukee River on Fond du Lac County W, 1.7 miles south of the junction with County F, in Eden Township.

The deteriorated steel deck structure will be replaced by a 48 feet long, two span, reinforced concrete flat slab, 24 feet wide. The two-lane bridge will be set to provide a better vertical alignment with the roadway. The new bridge will ease traffic flow and increase safety, said Project Manager Fred Abadi of the Wisconsin Department of Transportation.

County W will be closed in the work area, with a detour posted. The contractor, Pfeifer Brothers Construction Companies, of Neenah, was slated to begin the work in July and finish in about two months, Abadi said.

The roadway carries an average daily volume of 660 vehicles, including 12% trucks. Daily volume is expected to reach 1,000 vehicles in 20 years.

Federal funds are to pay 80% and Fond du Lac County the rest of the costs.

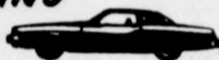
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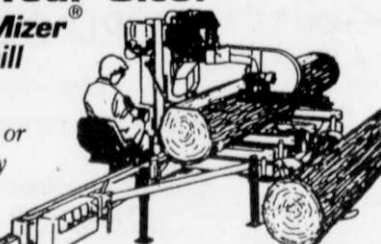

Skelton of Cascade held off a late charge from point leader Pete Ostrowski of Milwaukee to record his first Modified feature victory of the season in the Eastern Wisconsin Stock Car Association's second annual 40 lap Pat Rand Memorial Race of Champions Saturday night at Sheboygan County Fair Park.

Polesitter Barry Maas of Cascade out duelled outside front row starter Brad Dahmer of Sheboygan to take the lead entering turn one of the opening lap. Maas built up a quarter-straightaway lead over Dahmer before a red flag slowed the pace on lap 11 when West Bend's Etchie

Biertzer spun out in turn two.

The Kewaskum Indians finished up the varsity baseball season by dropping two out of three games last week.

The lone win came Monday at Kiel as the Indians ripped the Raider pitching staff for five runs in the first inning and coasted to a 13-4 victory.

Jason Bartelt went 5 2/3 innings giving up just two runs on five hits, while teammates Joe Rettler and Luke Chesak went 4x4 and 2x4 respectively.

"We really played a good game tonight," skipper Mark Heise said after the win. "Good hitting, good baserunning, no mental mistakes... just a well played game all around."

Pitcher Josh Christopherson threw a fine game on Wednesday at Random Lake, going the distance and striking out eight while walking only one, but Kewaskum's offense and defense both had problems, as the Indians were shutout 5-0.

The brunt of the damage came in the fifth inning when Random scored three runs off of two Indian errors.

Kewaskum slapped five hits off pitcher Brandon Cline, but the Indians were unable to drive in the runners as they were blanked for the second time this season.

Thursday evening, the Indians tried in vain to split the season series with Campbellsport, dropping an 8-5 decision in a continuation of a tie/rainout from July sec-

Saturday's game was a different story compared to Friday. The Indians obviously were tired and showed some wear as they traveled to Random Lake and lost.

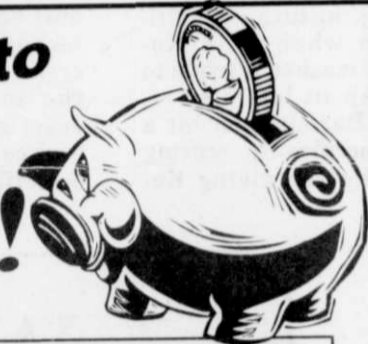
Random's strong defense allowed the Indians

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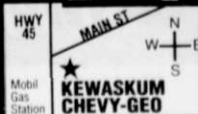
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Indians Defeat First WIAA Playoff Opponent
