

Receives State Award

Kewaskum Police Chief Richard Knoebel has announced Officer Tom Bauer of the Kewaskum Police Department received a statewide award from the Wisconsin Chiefs of Police Association this past week at their Annual Training Conference. Bauer was one of only four selected statewide in only two incidents to receive this prestigious award.

The award recognizes Officer Bauer for his quick action "above and beyond the call of duty" during an incident last spring when he heroically rescued a five-year-old boy who was trapped beneath a vehicle.

The boy had somehow become wedged underneath the moving vehicle with his legs up over his head, cutting off all circulation. According to the boy's mother, Kathy Tangeman, Officer Bauer responded within a minute and with the help of three neighbor women, lifted the car off the boy.

The child was blue and unresponsive, but was administered mouth-tomouth resuscitation by his mother and was transported to the hospital by Kewaskum Rescue Squad to St. Joseph's Hospital where he was treated with oxygen. Further testing found no injuries.

The mother credits the quick response and clear thinking of Officer Bauer in saving her son's life.

Fire Destroys Barn

Fire engulfed and destroyed a barn on the David and Mary Beck farm, 9179 Highway W, located in the Town of Wayne, Monday evening at 8:10 p.m.

The Kohlsville Fire Department was paged out first and immediately requested the Kewaskum and Allenton departments to remain on standby. Minutes later, Kohlsville asked for full mutual aide from Kewassport, Cedar Lake, Theresa, Slinger, Boltonville, Fillmore, St. Lawrence, and West Bend, were called on for assistance in getting as much water as possible quickly on to the fire scene.

Three calves perished in the fire, but the rest of the approximately 20 cows that were in the barn were rescued by Mrs. Beck.

Members of the Chamber's newly formed Kettle Moraine Tourism Committee enthusiastically shared information on what has been transpiring at the past three meetings scheduled with Debbie Skinner of the Wisconsin Department of Tourism.

Committee members agreed there is an excitement and "electricity" that has generated from these meetings that has snowballed and become contagious with chamber members on the committee and Kettle Moraine businesses who also currently serve on the Tourism Committee.

Ms. Skinner was extremely impressed with our Kettle Moraine area and helped the committee appreciate and see our "treasure" in a whole new light. Please take the time to talk with your teachers so that what happens in the classroom is known in the home. You have a vital part in helping to develop a "desire to learn" attitude in your children.

Sometimes mistakes are made and we should not pretend otherwise. But, I hope you always find that our intention is good and focused to help your children. We are striving to improve what we teach, how we teach, and what our students learn. "What our students learn" remains the key reference to real growth and we ask for your support and help in this important endeavor.

Our entire staff looks forward to welcoming the children to a new school year and toward working with you to make it a year of valuable memories.

School Coordinating Instructions

1. Monday, August 26th is the first day of school for new and returning students of the Kewaskum School District.

2. Johnson Bus Company will soon be sending out information on bus rules and pick-up times. If you have not received this information by August 23rd, please call Johnson Bus at 626-4414 to complete arrangements. We ask that families take time to review the bus riding rules and safe boarding, riding, and unloading procedures. If this is your child's first experience riding on a bus, why not take some time to accompany him/ her or arrange for someone else to accompany him/her for their first pick-up and drop-off? Also, please be aware of the times crossing guards are present on village street corners and utilize them accordingly. Do not send or drop your children off at school before the school doors open because they will be unsupervised.

3. Information for those interested and eligible for the free and reduced hot lunch program was published in last week's edition of the Kewaskum Statesman. During registration the forms were available to those interested. If you did not receive a form and would like one sent to you, or wish to review the qualifying criteria, please call the business office at 626-8427.

4. Hot lunch prices will remain the same as last year and are as follows: elementary schools \$1.25 per day <u>or</u> \$5.50 per week; middle school and high school \$1.40 per day <u>or</u> \$6.25 per week. School on Monday is a full day and hot lunch will be served.

5. The school district does not carry accident insurance for students. We therefore urge parents/guardians to review their own policies to be certain coverage is adequate. Particularly in the case of athletics, this is a necessity. The schools do have insurance forms provided by Student Assurance Company of Stillwater, Minnesota, available to parents who would like to purchase additional insurance or insurance for their children. The parents purchase the insurance on their own -- the district is not involved in the sale of insurance.

Visitors to the Mauthe Lake area have reported sighting an abundance of rabbits in the vicinity recently, dressed as a variety of whimsical characters. These appealing creatures are the creation of Sue Teschendorf, who displays her original 'Country Rags" Character Wabbits inside the Parkview General Store's gift shop. Since 1992, her award winning rabbits have been stealing the hearts of collectors who happen upon her little known art form, and Sue's workshop fills orders coming in from across the country. "I've made everything from Minnie Pearl to Gorbachev," Sue exclaims, whose sewing experience lends to the original clothing designs that personalize each rabbit.

The idea came to her when she saw a simple lop-eared cloth rabbit in the pages of a magazine, and drew up a pattern of her own, including a weighted body so they sit by themselves. Sue had previously been successful with her Country rags sweatshirt designs, sewing panels of coordinating fabric underneath the shirt, then cutting out designs on the sleeve or front to expose the hidden layer. In the mood for something new, her talents tempted her to play "dress-up" with her rabbit design, and the

results gave birth to 65 different characters, all dressed for the part.

Her rabbits were first featured in Sue's Country Rags Gift Shop, located in West Bend from 1993-94. When the building was sold, she closed her store and continued to travel the show circuit from Illinois to Door County, and although she's since retired from the craft fair scene, the word continued to spread about her character wabbits. "I always had a good time at the shows," she recalls. "Even if they didn't buy one, I'd always crack up from the look on people's faces when they saw them. Even the men who were dragged along to the shows, really got






into the male characters."

When the shows proved too experience and time consuming Sue rented a spot at Parkview General Store, across from Mauthe Lake, where she's been enjoying the tourist's reaction to rabbits with "personality." On shelves throughout the store sit golfers with knickers and saddle shoes, an Amish couple donned in wool coats with fur collars, a Victorian ice-skater with a velvet dress, a photographer, baker,fisherman, bride, violinist, a skier equipped with skis and a stocking hat, a German couple, a Mexican ready for a siesta, and a blushing bride.

Each character Wabbit has a story, a name, and a carrot. "The carrots are symbolic of my bunnies," she points out, "and you'll most often find one hidden somewhere on them." Sue signs each one personally on the leg, and each creation is a one of a kind original.

Some of her favorites? "Carol Burnett, she was really a stitch! Charlie Chaplain was fun too." Some of her special orders have included a pilot, rock star, cowboy and Indian, country western singer, and a chimney sweep, ordered by a man from Missouri who



Other areas around the old mill will feature demonstrations by blacksmiths, quilters, candle makers and many other craft artisans from that era. Be sure to check out the Civil War photos and artifacts on exhibit in the mill plus see how an old mill worked and how it works today. 



In addition, the first Agricultural "Clean Sweep" program was held in Slinger for farmers to dispose of their unused, damaged, canceled, banned or otherwise unwanted agricultural chemicals.

The amount of publicity done was a small amount compared to municipal newsletters, private industry newsletters, notices mailed with municipal services billings, radio, cable TV, newspaper articles, promotions through nonprofit organizations and others not as yet known.

As people arrived, they were handed a sheet which explained the "Rules of The Day" and explained "What Happens to the Waste That is Collected."

Volunteers then filled out a survey sheet. After items were removed from vehicles, participants were given two pamphlets. One pamphlet explained "How to Dispose of Latex and Oil Based Paint," and the other gave "Alternatives to Hazardous Household Products."

Farmers were also given fact sheets from the University of Wisconsin-Extension entitled "Pesticide Container Disposal" and "Pesticide Waste Reduction Guidelines."

The Wisconsin Fertilizer and Chemical Association had a representative on site that collected triple rinsed plastic containers. These containers will be chipped into small pieces and the plastic will be recycled.

Agricultural small businesses which meet certain requirements were also eligible to participate in the Agricultural Clean Sweep. Seven such businesses did ticpate, including Washington County. When people filled out the survey sheet, 29 stated they brought waste from more than just their own household. If each person brought waste from just one more household, the total would be 453. This compares to 879 vehicles plus some walk-ins in 1992. Vehicles coming through the sites were 219 at the West Bend site; 131 at the Slinger site, and 74 at the Agricultural site.

Both sites on both days had a back up of 15 to 20 vehicles at the beginning of the day. This created about a 20 minute initial rush. After the initial rush was over, the pace was about one vehicle every five minutes.

A total of one 85-gallon drum, one hundred three 55-gallon drums, five 30-gallon drums, seven 14-gallon drums, and fourteen 5-gallon pails of material were collected.

AETS chemists and technicians worked a total of 156 hours. Assisting them were 42 volunteers, including amateur radio operators. Both sites were cleaned up at about 6:30 p.m. on Friday, and about 7 p.m. on Saturday.

Overall, the program went very well. A lot of material was removed from Washington County residences, but it is believed there is still more that was not brought in. The exclusion of latex and oil based paint made the totals substantilly lower than 1992. The costs therefore, are also substantially lower.

422,000 Apply for Antlerless Deer Permits

MADISON -- Early estimates indicate that 335,000 hunters applied for Hunter's Choice and Bonus Antlerless Deer Permits for the 1996 deer season by the July 20 deadline. In addition, 87,000 hunters applied for free antlerless permits for use in the new special Zone T deer management units, bringing the total number of applications to over 422,000.

Hunter's Choice permits allow hunters to shoot an antlerless deer prior to shooting a buck, and can tag their antlerless deer with the free permit or bonus permit.

The number of Hunter's Choice applications fell from 414,000 applications received in 1995. "That was expected, so we're not surprised by the reduction," says Kevin Wallenfang, Assistant Deer and Bear Ecologist for the Department of Natural Resources. "The availability of free permits in the Zone T units made it unnecesThere were a total of 534,860 antlerless permits available statewide for the 1996 season, which will be issued through a drawing process in early August. The total number of Zone T permits was not established, and hunters are entitled to one free special permit each for their bow license and gun license.

If hunters missed the July 20 deadline, they will still have opportunities to obtain antlerless permits for many units. Beginning Monday, September 16, hunters may go to selected DNR offices throughout the state and purchase leftover bonus antlerless deer permits for those units that didn't sell out during the mail-in appli-Permits cost \$12 each for residents and \$20 each for nonresidents. Hunters may purchase up to two permits per day in southern farmland

units, and one per day in the Northern Forest Region. Leftover permits will continue to be sold through the end of the year, or until the unit sells out.

Free Zone T permits may also be obtained over the counter at DNR offices starting September 16, or they may still submit an application to receive their permit through the mail. Hunters can apply for the free permits any time throughout the fall.

In addition to the free permits, a limited number of bonus permits have been made available for sale in these Zone T units and leftovers will be sold at a rate of two permits for the price of one. All antlerless permits are valid only in the unit for which they are issued.

in a designated deer management unit. A bonus permit allows a hunter to take an additional antlerless deer in the unit for which the permit was issued.

For the first time, free "special antlerless" permits will be issued in 19 deer management units, designated as Zone T, where deer numbers are well above population goals. Hunters in Zone T will be required to harvest an antlerless deer sary for many hunters to apply with a Hunter's Choice application."

Lower deer numbers in the north due to last winter's severe weather may also have discouraged some hunters from applying, Wallenfang said.

"We've been putting out information about the new application date for over a year now, so we're glad to see that so many people have seen the information," he said.




