School Board and Administration Disagree on Computer Purchase

The approval of the purchase of a laptop computer for use in the Kewaskum School District was the cause for debate between the school board and the new superintendent, Dr. Charles Johnson, at this month's school board meeting.

The need for the computer was made apparent at their June meeting, by a request from the Finance, Transportation, Building and Grounds Committee, for its use by the Director of Elementary Education, Kieth Kriewaldt. His new position requires frequent traveling between three schools, Farmington, Wayne and Kewaskum Elementary, and the laptop would greatly enhance Kriewaldt's capacity to serve the district.

At that time, however, the purchase of the proposed AST Ascentia P Series personal notebook was put on hold, as the board felt the total package price of \$4,629 was over and above the cost of comparable models, and they wanted to obtain more information before a final decision was made.

When the same computer was again offered for the board's O.K. through Dr. Johnson's recommendation, a difference of opinion prompted debate over the question, trust confronted school board members once more.

"I don't think there's any disagreement on the need," Johnson pointed out, "but there is disagreement on how to meet that need." He told the board that his research of six different models still brought him back to his original recommendation, as the one best suited to meet the future needs of the district.

Johnson went on to explain that the board's questioning of a recommendation he made in good faith, in his opinion, reflected a lack of trust and confidence in him, as superintendent. "It does tend to question who's in charge here," he told the board, and asked them to make a yes or no decision before school was in session.

School board member Neal Weare backed Johnson, as well as the original request from the Finance, Transportation, Building & Grounds committee, commenting that either this board is going to listen to the recommendations from administration and the various committees, otherwise the committees should be disbanded.

The one board member with the most access to information on computers, Mary Andera, has spent a great deal of time talking with computer

megaherz model as an alternative solution, which would save the district about \$1,000. "I guess I'm the one that started this whole thing," she related. "I'm very interested in having the **Director of Elementary** Education have a computer by the time school starts. I'm not trying to undermine anybody. I don't know much about anything, but this is an area I happen to know something about. I'm tired of people complaining without offering solu-tions or alternatives to the problem, so rather than just complain, I came up with an alternative.'

She went on to explain that the difference between the two computers was like comparing "apples to apples." "The one that I have here is even a larger hard drive. It gives our district more of what we need, less of what we don't need, and it's cheaper, by \$1,200."

Board member Tom Timblin stated that this entire issue had become bigger than it needed to be, telling Dr. Johnson, "you seem to be offended," by the board's differing opinion. "If we disagree with something, that's what we're here for, there should be no offense taken from it. This whole issue has become very personal, and that's too bad. Every

School Board Discusses Cabling, Phone Plans

Curriculum Resource Specialist and Business Manager George Allmann discussed future cabling and phone plans for Kewaskum Middle School and Kewaskum High School with school board members at this month's regular meeting, and the possible use of state funding to achieve the district's technology goals.

Ten companies recently toured the buildings to put in bids for recabling the schools, and their quotes were due in this past Monday. The Finance Transportation Buildings and Grounds Committee will be reviewing the bids, and will make their recommendation at the September board meeting.

Work will begin sometime this fall, with an installation time of one week for KMS, and three weeks at KHS. Bids for phone line service will go out in September, with work estimated to begin sometime in November or December. Both plans are expected to be completed by the first of next year.


The board is also looking into leasing programs, with an option to buy in three to five years.

Allmann said there was a possibility to get in on a state funded opportunity to cable both Farmington and Wayne Elementary Schools, and in Wisconsin to cable five classrooms to a school, with labor and services done on a volunteer basis. The cabling will be designed so it can be added to, if remodeling of these two schools takes place any time in the future.

Another board approval by recommendation from the Finance Transportation Building and Grounds Committee included painting the KHS gym, Rose Hall. The work will be done by H.C.R. Painting of Fredona, at a cost of \$3,800. The board also authorized a permanent substitute plan for the upcoming school year, increasing the amount of substitutes from two to three.

The First Steps program was expanded for this year, after a June screening found 30 students eligible for the program. The program is for children who are four years old and will be entering kindergarten next fall. Allmann told the board, "If you catch them early, they have a chance to succeed in kindergarten."

The voluntary screening assesses children in the areas of speech, language, vocabulary, and readiness skills, and evaluates special needs. The program helps ready students to start kindergarten with the age appropriate skills. Funding for the program

told the superintendent.

Johnson remained adamant with his decision, and made sure the board was aware any other options were not recommended by administration. "It isn't personal, but it's the only time I've seen we haven't operated in good faith," he expressed. "Leave the future to me, and I'll be accountable for it," Johnson stated at one point in the meeting, and told the board he would authorize taking the difference out of his pay, and again emphasized the importance of trusting each other (the board and administration).

Jon Downs was another board member that supported the purchase of the lower priced model, and felt that although this big of a debate over the purchase of a small item was perhaps not necessary, the process was important, and reflected fiscal prudency. "We can change our minds. If we've got a couple of computers, and both can do the same thing ... why not?," he maintained.

Board member Larry Fechter agreed, adding, "occasionally the board is correct and right in some things, in disagreement with administration."

The motion to approve the original computer recommendation failed 6-1, with Weare voting yes, and a new motion to purchase a complete PC not to exceed \$3,600 passed, 6-1, with Weare voting no.

including materials, transportation, and staff salary would be through Title I or the Federal Entitlement Program.

The Extended Day Kindergarten program provides additional help to kindergarten students who are not realizing their full academic potential. Students are selected by their teacher based on needs and age, and attend two extra half day sessions. Allmann stated that in years to come, they will be doing an analysis on starting a four-year-old kindergarten program.

Board member John Schulte asked the school board to look into implementing STEP (Seniors Tax Exchange Program) within the Kewaskum School District. The program offers senior citizens an exchange in tax dollars (credit) for services rendered working in the district.

The opportunity could be offered to any district home owner, 62 or older, that receives Social Security. Schulte said that the Kaukauna schools already have this program in force, and he hoped it was something the board would consider for the future.

An all staff in-service breakfast will be held on Thursday, August 22, at 7 a.m. Dr. Johnson invited the board to attend, and guest speaker Dr. Mitchell, will be holding a seminar following the breakfast.

Board member Jon Downs announced a five mile KEYS run/walk will take place on Saturday, October 12, the same weekend as Kettle Kountry Kolors. This event is a great fund raising tool, where pledges are obtained to help fund the KEYS scholarship account. He related that last year's event brought in a fantastic amount of pledges, and suggested that classrooms could compete for the greatest amount of pledges brought in.

Other approvals under new business included the 1996-97 DPI Food Service Contract, with the prices remaining the same as last year, the payroll and A/P in the amount of \$920,156.48, and the IASA Grant application.

The board accepted district employee resignations from high school ED instructor Mrs. Heather and seventh grade teacher Susan Wagner. New appointments were as follows: David Kraft as KHS assistant girls' basketball coach, Mary Koch as KHS FACE instructor, Terry Christie as parttime music instructor, Marirose Lucey as K-12 reading teacher, Erv Uhlman as KMS teacherin-charge, Steve Rup-linger as KMS wrestling coach, Robin Dorst as KMS FACE instructor, Lynn Molenda as KMS art instructor, Kathleen Kowalczyk as part time elementary/ high school art teacher, and three assistant KHS football coaches -- Chris Harlow, John Swanson and Rick Schlehlein.

Kewaskum Juniors to Sponsor Bike-A-Thon



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Computerized Lunch Program at KMS

Starting on the first day of classes, Monday, August 26, the Kewaskum Middle School, Food Service Department, will be piloting a computerized lunch accounting system for the hot lunch program.

This system will be set up using individual accounts. It is a pre-paid system with a variety of payment methods (weekly, monthly, semester). If you have more than one child in the middle school you only need to make one deposit. However, tell us what amount to put into each child's account.

The system works as follows: All students/staff members will be issued a card with their name and a bar code. A check or cash is sent/taken to the middle school on a weekly, monthly, semester basis. (Please write your child's name and "LUNCH" in the memo area). The deposit is entered into the computer. When going through the line, the I.D. Card is scanned and the amount of purchase is subtracted from the appropriate account balance. If your account balance falls below a determined amount, your child will be told.

Lunch prices are the same as last year: Monthly - \$25.00, Weekly, \$6.25, and Daily - \$1.40.

Since the weekly lunch charge is \$6.25, it is suggested that a minimum of \$12.50 per child be deposited. Families receiving reduced priced

meals (\$0.40 per day), should deposit a minimum of \$4.00 per child. Students who have been approved for free lunches will also use their I.D. Card. The cards are all the same, thus eliminating any discriminatory practices. Any remaining funds in your account at the end of the school will be returned, at your written request, or carried over in your account to the next school year.

The advantage to this program is a more efficient system for you and the district - no lost tickets, no student forgetting their daily lunch money, no calculating how much money to send with each child, more accurate accounting and improved accountability.

We are very excited about this new program. Computerized lunch programs in Ozaukee, Ripon and Fond du Lac have been operating for several years. Most of these parents feel that it is a much easier, more efficient way of handling lunch money for their children.

Account payment may be: Sent with your child to the middle school, or mailed to Kewaskum Middle School, P.O. Box 432, Kewaskum, WI 53040. Payments may be mailed anytime after August 15th. If you are paying by check, please write "LUNCH," and your child's name in the memo area. If possible, put enough in your account to avoid running low.



Town of Scott Board Acts On Rezoning Requests

Scott Town Board members spent the majority of the August meeting reviewing planning commission recommendations for rezoning. Almost all of the requests involved small parcels of land being joined to larger parcels, either to make more room for septic systems or to define the proper zoning which would allow for building in qualified areas.

Zoning change approvals were granted to Floyd Klug which combined a 13.677 acre parcel and a 2.156 acre parcel and a zoning change from A-1 to A-5.

A second parcel requested by Klug, along with Glen Klug and Rogene Engleman, combined an existing 1.0 acre parcel with two acres of a 4.116 acre parcel, the result being a three acre parcel zoned from A-1 to

Third, Donald Ruplinger had a .834 acre parcel changed from A-1 to A-6 and a .75 acre strip of land from A-2 to A-6. Both are to become one lot to allow for septic expansion.

These three changes are all located in the North East quarter of Section 32.

A fourth change went to Michael Reindl combining .636 acres which was changed from A-1 to A-6 and two acres from A-2 to A-6, to become one lot, also located in Section 32.

A request from Jon and Patty Mudlaff, which had been tabled last month, received the same treatment this month. This was done because the board was not furnished with a proper description of the property. If that information becomes available, the matter will be considered at the September meeting

In other action, a unanimous roll call vote resulted in rescinding approval given in February, 1995 of a certified map for property belonging to F. Klug. Some of the property rezoned earlier was shown on the now invalid certified map.

After three months of discussion with no progress concerning the diversion of storm water from the Jeff Scannell property on Maple Tree Road, in the northern section of Glacial Hills subdivision, the board has finally taken a stand.

The board voted unanimously, with Chairman Benzschawel abstaining due to a conflict of interest, that the problem belongs to Scannell and the Town would be unable to assist.

A suggestion had been made last month that a ditch be established in that area. The County Highway Department looked over the situation and recommended against it. The board agreed, and so there will not be a ditch because of the lay of the land. The buildings were built much lower than road level and heavy Spring rains and Spring thawing caused water problems for Scannell. It was the consensus of the board that this Spring's weather was out of the ordinary and under normal conditions, no water

A request from a con-

tractor for refund of money paid for heating and air condition permits for a house which burned before the installation could be made, was turned down. The name of the contractor was not mentioned.

Supervisor Clarence Janz reported that all shouldering has been finished, and gravel is being applied to the street in the LaFever subdivision north of Batavia. Scott Construction will be applying "ash seal" between August 13 and 15.

County D, west of the intersection of State Highway 28/144 was closed to traffic beginning August 12, and traffic was rerouted westerly on County A, just south of Batavia. It will however, be open for local traffic. The Ramel bridge is being replaced. Closing is expected to last through September and October.

A new town truck ordered earlier this year is nearing completion and should be ready for painting within two weeks. Action was taken to apply undercoating which will cost \$250. This was not included in the original contract.



Top qualifiers for IndyCar on Friday included Bryan Herta, Jimmy Vasser, Gil De-Ferran, Paul Tracy and Michael Andretti. Herta had a top lap time of 102.648 with a speed of 140.285.

Racing seems to draw celebrities to many of these events. In the World Challenge race last year, Tim Allen, from TV's "Home Improvement," made his racing debut. He finished sixth in his class and 11th overall in his first professional SCCA World Challenge race. He amazed himself that he managed to finish the race.

Tim Allen and Steve Saleen worked together in 1993 on building a one-of-a-kind Saleen Mustang. It was something Tim always wanted to do. Saleen, won all four major championships in the SCCA **Escort Endurance Series** in 1987. They included Team Driver, Manufacturer and Tire. The two shared a dream and decided to form the Saleen/Allen "RRR" Speedlab.

Dreams are something not everyone has a chance to play out in real life. "I started out putting Plymouth Roadrunners up and down Woodward Avenue in Detroit when I was a kid," said Tim. "It takes a lot of concentration, but the opportunity to race is something I always wanted to do."

races. Many showed up early to view the sights and watch the practice and qualifying rounds that start early in the morning.





Christian Fittipaldi tried to avoid it, swerving, and managed to keep control and take the lead. Eight laps later, Paul Tracy spun out, and he also managed to stay in the race.

Six laps after that, Greg Moore bumped Andre Ribeiro. Moore slid on two wheels, hit the wall, did a wheelie and skidded into the gravel. On the same lap, Davey Jones lost control and flipped over.

Adrian Fernandez braked too hard, sending his car into the gravel and Robby Gordon suffered electrical problems, sending him to shower early. Tempers began to flare among drivers.

While in second place behind Al Unser Jr., Fittipaldi developed engine problems, finishing his chances of completing the race.

In the white flag lap, Parker Johnstone bumped Paul Tracy. Johnstone was sent onto the gravel where he flipped the car over twice. He was shaken, but not hurt.

Two turns from the end of the race, Little Al blew the engine, allowing Michael Andretti to take the lead to win his 34th career IndyCar victory, his fourth win of the year.

It has been a good year for Andretti, who won the race at Detroit (in sponsor Kmart's hometown), the previous race, the Milwaukee Mile on June 2 (promoted by team owner Carl Haas) and the Nazareth, Pennsylvania race on April 28 (Michael's hometown). This win had special meaning to it as well. Andretti's other sponsor is Texaco/Havoline.

This year, a new tradition has been started for the Texaco/Havoline 200. The winner was presented with a "Take It to the Star" Champion's Ring, created for the winner by Husar's House of Fine Diamonds in West Bend.

The ring is crafted in 14-carat gold, with the Texaco Star logo, surrounded by 14 ideal cut diamonds and the name of the event. On the side is the pantographed Road America logo and there is a place for the name of the event and the winner. It seemed only fitting that Michael Andretti added this special meaning win to his ever-grow ing list of accomplishments.

(PLYMOUTH,WI) Randy Butler of Juneau passed defending track champion K.J. Skelton of Cascade four laps from the finish of the 30 lap Eastern Wisconsin Stock Car Association Modified main event en route to his first feature victory since the 1992 season Saturday night at Sheboygan County Fair Park.

Polesitter Danny Cain of Kewaskum jumped into the lead on the drop of the green flag. Cain controlled the top spot until lap 8 when Skelton rode the high groove into third place from his fourth row starting slot. The tenth year racer bolted around Cain and second row starter Ken Jay Fiedler of Sheboygan Falls to take the lead on lap 9 with a thrilling move exiting turn four.

By the mid-way point of the event, Skelton had built up a half-lap advantage over the rest of the field. When Skelton began to encounter heavy lapped traffic on lap 20, Butler moved up from the tenth starting spot to challenge for the lead.

On lap 26, Butler used the low groove to slip underneath the rim riding Skelton entering turn three. The only red flag of the race flew on lap 28 when West Bend's Jay Schneider lost a drive shaft. Following the restart, the 11th year Modified driver worked the low line over the final two circuits to record his first feature triumph of the season.

The victory also snapped a four year winless streak in EWSCA Modified competition for the former Sprint Car racer. Skelton finished second, Fiedler was third, 1994 track champion and current point leader Pete Ostrowski of Milwaukee charged up from the seventh row to take fourth and Jim DePagter of Sheboygan Falls came home fifth.

Cedar Grove's Brian Schmidt led every lap of the 25 lap Sportsman main event on the way to his first career feature victory.

Schmidt powered into the lead on the opening lap from his outside front row starting spot. The second year driver then proceeded to open up a 10 car length lead over polesitter John Scharenbroch of Sheboygan Falls.

The first red flag of the event appeared on lap 4 when Jeff Fechter of West Bend stalled his machine in turn two. another red flag flew one lap later for gle car spin in turn three involving Mark Zimmer-mann of Kohler. A four car incident on the restart forced the race to be halted for the third time. 


