the amount of traffic in the area since Timblin Drive opened up onto Memorial Drive. One resident stated there were 18 to 40 children living there, with 29 of those being under the age of 12

They were concerned because they felt the area "was an accident waiting to happen," with the additional traffic flow.

Residents added there has also been an increase in "cruising" on the street and they were becoming more and more concerned about the safety of the children in that particular area.

It was decided at that meeting to do a traffic count on the street and to have police officers monitor the situation at various times.

Chief Knoebel brought the results of this traffic survey to the August 19th meeting. Knoebel stated he had officers in that area for six different intervals for an hour at a time. According to his survey, most of the traffic


the day. The Kettle Moraine Squares will be demonstrating their fancy footwork, beginning at 3 p.m. Free horse drawn wagon

was northbound. Knoebel stated, "The

average speed was 26.3 miles per hour. We did issue four citations during the time we were up there.

When asked about the speed of the violaters by a board member, Knoebel stated all four were cited for 37 miles per hour.

He added, "There's definitely a lot of traffic there. The traffic's picking up.

Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles had his men set up the traffic counter on the street for a 24 hour period. Gilles stated, "Southbound going into the subdivision, one lane only, was 283 cars. Going northbound, exiting the subdivision, was 365 cars. Then we set up on a Friday at 8 a.m. and ran through until Saturday morning and that was both lanes, we had 712 cars.

Trustee Gary Gavin asked, "What do we have to compare it to?"

Chief Knoebel stated, "We don't know. We've never run a traffic study there before. I know there wasn't that many cars going through there before they had that road through. We haven't got any other figures to compare it to because we never had the road before.

Knoebel said the average speed is over the normal speed of 25, saying it's not excessively over, but it is over. Trustee Gavin asked, "Wouldn't you probably find that on every street?" to which Knoebel added, "You possibly could. The stop sign definitely would slow them down.

Trustee David Goeden added, "I personally would like to see a stop sign before something happens.

President Robert Wagner asked what effect a slow children sign might have, to which Knoebel stated, "it might help some, but most of the people who drive through there aren't going to even notice that sign. The only sign that does any good is a stop sign.'



A racing fan all his life, Bill Lehmann III has spent the past year touring the country to promote the role Mercedes Benz plays as sponsors of IndyCar drivers.

Lehmann, who was raised in Kewaskum, landed a job with Motorsports International, a division of the Penske Corp., while he was vacationing in Michigan with his wife, Nicole. "I went into the job with a sort of gentleman's agreement that I would try it for a year. I took the gamble because I have always loved racing," he explains, remembering the summers he spent as a kid watching the competition at Slinger Speedway

The IndyCar schedule includes 16 races, beginning in March and running through September, and Bill's role in the events entails driving a Mercedes Benz custom built silver Marathon coach to each race.

As clients of Motorsports International, Mercedes Benz supplies engines for eight IndyCar drivers, like Al Unser, Emerson Fittipaldi and Bobby Rahal, and the big silver coach acts as a traveling office for the race car drivers and company officials. About 26 drivers compete for the coveted checkered flags and big cash prizes, and Mercedes Benz is one of four manufacturers building engines to outfit the powerful machines, along with Honda, Ford, and Toyota.

Built in Eugene, Oregon, the vehicle is divided into three sections. The fully equipped office area includes a copy and fax machine, computer, printers, basically everything you need to issue press releases and other printed materials needed for publicity and communication between Mercedes Benz and the IndyCar scene.

The second section holds a large meeting room with a hospitality







Resolution No. 96-18 Resolution/Policy/Procedure ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR PUBLIC WORKS PROJECTS

RESOLVED that the Village of Kewaskum in order to assure proper compliance with Village and State standards for sewer, water, streets, sidewalk, curb and gutter and other public works projects, and to place control of all engineering functions with the Village, a resolution/policy is to be enacted which describes the functions and responsibilities of personnel involved in these projects.

1. Effective immediately, procedures regarding sewer, water, streets, sidewalk, curb and gutter and other public works projects will be followed as stated herein, concerning methods of implementing design and construction phase of engineering services. It will be the responsibility of the Director of Public Works to carry out these procedures within the framework of this resolution/policy and be subject to the review of the Village Administrator.

2. Any deviation from this policy will be reviewed by the Village Board on a case-by-case basis, subject to their approval or rejection.

BE IT RESOLVED that the procedure for the design engineering services is as follows:

1. Private Developments on Public Projects. A. All public works projects constructed in conjunction with developments that are undertaken by a private developer are subject to the design standards and practices set forth by the Village. All design work associated with any public works project will be carried out by a suitable design engineering firm hired by the developer and approved by the Village Board. In approving the design engineering firm the Village Board shall give first consideration to the engineering firms designated by the developer. B. Upon completion of the design engineering work, two sets of plans and specifications will be sent to the Director of Public Works to be forwarded to the Village Engineer for review, comment and approval. A minimum of two copies need to be pro vided, plus a compatible computer disk upon completion of said work to be used to integrate the plans into the Village overall system. (The disk shall be in a format acceptable to the Village's computer system). Proposed changes to these documents can be presented to the design engineer and developer. If the design engineer or developer wish to appeal said sug-Engineer directly. If said change is not agreed to, the design engineer and/or developer may appeal the matter to the Village Board. Where such change is not in compliance with the Village and State standards the matter will be considered irregular, and will not be considered by the Village.

2. Village Funded Projects, A. All public works projects con-

and/or Village Engineers to be required.

The resident inspector will have complete authority over the project and will preside over all project meetings as directed by the Director of Public Works.

BE IT RESOLVED that the coordination of services is as follows:

1. Design Engineering. All design engineering work shall be carried out with complete study and reference to other existing and planned utilities and street patterns. Particular attention shall be paid to coordination with Village of Kewaskum Water and Waste Water Pollution Utilities to accommodate existing and proposed water and sewer mains, structures and other improvements.

Upon completion of utility work plans and specifications, copies shall be sent/provided to the Water and Water Pollution Utilities for review and comment.

2. Construction Related Engineering. In cases where concurrent construction with the Village's Utilities construction occurs, coordination with the Village Utilities shall be required. Where practical, the resident inspector shall work with the utilities to provide reciprocal assistance and avoid redundancy of efforts. Where conflicts arise, both private and public managers and the Director of Public Works shall be informed immediately.

BE IT RESOLVED that payment for services is as follows:

1. For those projects undertaken by a private developer, all engineering related costs, including review, comment, inspections and approval performed by a private engineering firm will be paid by the developer. When the Village Engineer is used as reviewing agent, the engineering firm will bill the Village and the Village will in turn bill the developer, plus an amount equal to one (1%) percent of the engineering bill to cover coordination and other related costs incurred by the Village with respect to the project. Individual payments by the developer to the Villages Engineering Firm will not be allowed. All engineering related documents, plans, specifications, etc., will become the property of the Village. Request for copies of the documents should be made through the Director of Public Works and/or the Village Administrator.

1) Do nothing additional with the well and have our flow remain at 180 to 200 gallons per minute. (no cost).

2) If option one is used then a new water supply will be needed for more volume which would require a new well, pump house and equipment. (cost estimated to be \$500,000.

3) To redrill closed 60 feet of well and install a screen type liner. (cost estimate \$10,000 to \$12,000)

4) To redrill and install smaller steel casing, which would reduce flow from original 400 gallons per minute, but hopefully improve from declined amount. (cost estimate in excess of \$50,000).

On a motion by Trustee Gary Gavin, seconded by Trustee John Kenworthy and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized proceeding with option #3 with CTW, evaluating the situation after each step.

Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt reviewed the following with the Board:

1) Review of budget control sheet for June 30, 1996. The time for receipt of the different revenue funds was again explained to the Board.

2) Review of Taxpayer and League bulletins.

3) Announcement of the Mid Moraine Municipal Association meeting of August 28,

1996. 4) A review of the Village of Kewaskum's property tax status in comparison to the rest of the Villages and other municipalities from the state. It was noted that the Village was 303 of 394 Villages in the state that the state average for villages was \$27.06 while the Village of Kewaskum was at \$24.34 and the state per capita for just the municipal tax was \$257.50 while the Village of Kewaskum was at \$165.71.







Section 1. Section 3.03 is repealed and recreated to read:

- 3.03 MINOR LAND DIVISION NOT REQUIRING A CERTIFIED SURVEY MAP Divisions of land creating lots of parcels greater than ten (10) acres in area shall be required to submit a plat of survey complet-ed by a registered surveyor to the Town for review and approval. The plat shall include the entire parcel from which the lot division(s) is extracted. This section does not apply to sales or exchanges of parcels of land between owners of adjoining property which do not create additional lots or result in the reduction of any lot below the minimum size required by these regulations, the zoning ordinance or other applicable laws,codes, or ordinances. Divisions of land that are not reviewed and approved shall be voided and the deed resulting from the division shall not be eligible for recording. The subdivider shall prepare the Plat of Survey in accordance with this ordinance and shall file twelve (12) copies of the map and the letter of application with the Town Zoning Administrator at least seven (7) days prior to the meeting of the Town Plan Commission at which first consideration is desired.
 - A. A Pre-application Conference as suggested in Section 3.01 of this Ordinance is recommended
 - B. The Town Zoning Administrator shall receive the formal filing of a Plat of Survey and transmit copies of the map to the Town Plan Commission.
 - C. The Town Plan Commission shall review the map for conformance with this Ordinance and all Ordinances, rules, regulations, comprehensive plans, comprehensive plan components, neighborhood plans and other planning tools.
 - D. The Town Plan Commission shall, within 60 days from the date of filing of the Plat of Survey, recommend approval, conditional approval or rejection of the Plat of Survey, and shall transmit the Plat of Survey along with its recommendations to the Town Board.
 - E. The Town Board shall approve, conditionally approve (and thereby require resubmission of a correct plat or reject such Plat of Survey within 90 days from the date of filing of the Plat of Survey unless the time is extended by mutual written agreement with the subdivider. 



New Head Coach Perry Koth Opens Non-Conference KHS Football Season Here Friday Under New Lights

New head football coach Perry Koth welcomed 115 players for the first day of summer football practice, including 35 juniors and seniors.

Koth is replacing Clark Pearson who resigned to take the principal job at the Kewaskum Middle School. While it looks like there will be plenty of players to choose from, the number of experienced players will be minimal.

Ten of the eleven starters on offense were lost to graduation and eight of the eleven on defense. On offense, lone starter senior Jeff Heller returns at his left tackle spot, while seniors Eric Kopecky (strong safety), Brian Prom (defensive line), and Tim Bunkelman (defensive line) return on the defensive side of the ball.

Kevin Martin is returning after having started at quarterback for two games last year when Brian Butschlick was injured. With the open positions you would think that there would be a lot of competition for the spots, but according to Koth, he just hasn't seen it happening thus far.

far. "The biggest dissappointment so far has been the lack of competitiveness in practice," said Koth. Koth is particularly dissappointed in the juniors who seem to have conceeded the starting spots to the seniors. "I really thought that there would be five or six juniors starting for us this year. The talent is there, but they haven't stepped forward and earned those spots yet," he added.

On Friday, August 30, the Indians will open their season with a home nonconference game at 7:30 p.m. against Campbellsport. This will mark the first time the Indians will play a home night game since 1994, thanks to the Indian Booster Club, which raised enough money to purchase the lights for the seniors Jeff Heller (LT), Brian Prom (LG), Bruce Gundrum (C), Tim Bunkelman (RG) and Mike Danielson (RT) have been working with the first group, but Kasey Brath, Jon Eckes, Matt Gundrum, Mike Smith and Joe Thull did some good things in the scrimmage last Friday against West Bend East and West.

It will be junior Ryan Martin starting at the tight end spot. "Ryan has had some very good practices and I am impressed with the way he can catch the ball," said Koth. Martin, who stands 6'3" and weighs 220 pounds, not only catches the ball well, but should be an excellent blocker.

Sean Cotter made a real nice catch during the scrimmage and may be used in two tight end situations. At the running back spot, senior Eric Kopecky will start at one of the spots, while juniors Jim Kopecky and Tim Vetter will be fighting for the other spot.

Koth was particularly impressed with Vetter's all-around play in the scrimmage and he may have the edge for the second spot.

At quarterback, strong-armed Kevin Martin will be starting while senior Dan Jeserig has moved into the number two quarterback spot after an impressive outing in the scrimmage with the second offense.

The defensive players starting in Friday's contest will be greatly affected by who is starting on the offensive side of the ball, so it is too early to name any starters.

Some players who have the best chance of starting are: juniors Kasey Brath (DL), Sean Cotter (DE), Jon Eckes (LB), Jim Kopecky (LB), Ryan Rammer (CB), Tim Vetter (SS), and Troy Staehler (FS).

also will have some new looks from the coaching staff. After having coached the defensive unit for 16 years, Coach Koth has decided to become the offensive coordinator. While he expects the first few games to be a learning experience for himself, he feels that his experience coaching on the defensive side of the ball will be a positive asset when he plans his offensive strategies.

"I understand what defenses are trying to do and the responsibilities of each player. If I take that knowledge and transfer it to the offensive side, we could be successful," said Koth.

Moving into the defensive coordinator's spot will be Randy Westerman who was one of the freshman coaches last year. Dave Rockhill will remain with the JV team and will be the receivers coach for varsity. Joining Rockhill will be Joe Kinney, moving up from the frosh team. Joe will be the linebackers coach at the varsity level.

The freshmen will have three new coaches this year, led by Rick Schlehlein. Rick has been the West Bend East varsity head coach for the last seven years. Rick will also coach the quarterbacks and will be in the pressbox helping Koth with the offense.

The other two coaches are former KHS graduates and football players who played together on the championship team that went to State in 1983. Chris Harlow and John Swanson will be working with the freshmen, as well as being the running backs and line coaches.

Having each of the coaches in the program be responsible for a position is something new this year and according to Coach Koth it is working out very well. "I have been impressed with the enthusiasm and knowledge of all the coaches this year," said Koth. Any way you look at it, there are a lot of changes going on with the KHS football team this year.

According to Koth, the expectations are very high this year, but there are a lot of things to fix before the first game.
