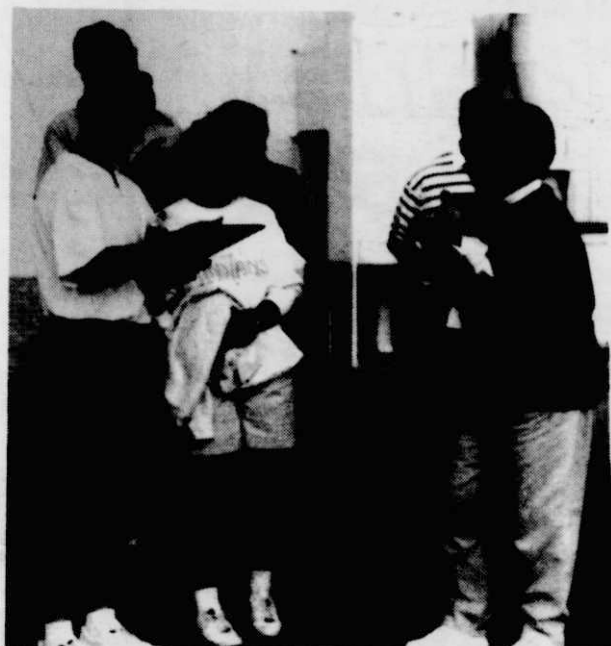

New Lights Dedicated to Community of Kewaskum



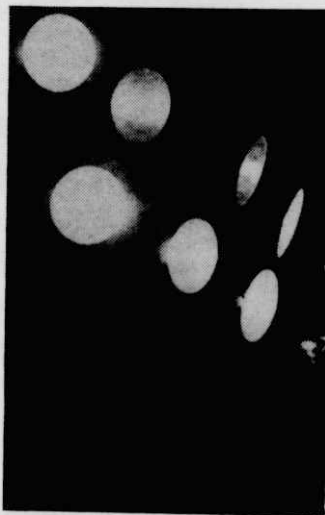

"Let there be lights!"

With that proclamation, Kewaskum School Board President Jeanne Goeden and local project coordinator Terry Cartwright flipped on the new football field lights to open the 1996 football season at Kewaskum High School.

When the football field was rebuilt two years ago, the money needed for lights -- over \$27,000 -- wasn't available. Shortly thereafter, the KHS Booster Club undertook the staggering task of raising the funds. Through tremendous community support, corporate donation, and individual effort, the purchase and installation of the lights -- originally estimated as a three to five year project -- was completed in less than eighteen months.

"The response of the community has been overwhelming," stated Terry Cartwright, the local man who spearheaded the project with

his wife, Cindy. "It could not have been done without their contribution and commitment."

Fittingly, in a pre-game ceremony held Friday evening, the new lights were dedicated to the "Community of Kewaskum."

Primary Election Tuesday

On Tuesday, September 10, voters of Washington County, including the Kewaskum community, will be facing a partisan primary election that includes a hot race for the position of county sheriff.

Vying for placement on the November ballot are two Republican candidates for Sheriff, Jack Theusch of Farmington and Jim Grover of Hartford. The office is currently held by Robert Schulteis, who will not seek re-election since he announced his plans to retire.

As far as the race for County Sheriff is concerned, this partisan primary is THE election. Both candidates, Theusch and Grover, are running on the Republican ticket, thereby eliminating one of them in this primary.

Three candidates are competing for the Republican nomination to run for Clerk of Circuit Courts. Kristine Deiss, 49, of West Bend, Bonnie Schmidt, 45, of Jonckheere and Mary L. Schuette, 49, of Hartford, will appear on Tuesday's bal-

Town of Wayne Rezones Controversial Land Parcel

The controversial rezoning of 78 acres from agricultural to residential A-1 of land in the Town of Wayne owned by Kim and Mary Rodenkirch was again before the Town of Wayne Plan Commission and Town Board in August.

It was the third time the rezoning request was being considered, and was met with opposition again from area residents including the presentation of a written protest to the Plan Commission.

Because the original request was made prior to June 1, the 18 month land division moratorium now in effect does not apply to this request. During the Plan Commission public hearing, in a standing-room only town hall, several residents raised concerns about how the development of this property would affect the environment, increase road traffic particularly on Sunset Drive and Broadview Lane, the narrowness of Broadview and property water drainage.

Rodenkirch addressed the issue of Broadview

Lane as a narrow road and agreed to allow 33 feet of his property to widen the road to accommodate any increased traffic resulting from the development.

Legal counsel for the town, Gerald Kiefer, advised the board in the event they approved rezoning the property it would not be unusual or out of line for the board to require a developer's agreement which could cover these concerns and others including deed restrictions limiting the number of lots allowed on the parcel, restrict any further land splits and could require the developer to be bonded.

The agreement would be reviewed by and need the approval of the town board, town zoning administrator and town legal counsel. Kiefer also advised the board a town engineer should review any land development plans.

Following the recommendation of the Plan Commission, the town board approved the rezoning on a developer's agreement drafted to the satisfaction of the town board.

A proposed Child Day Care Center on the corner of Highway H and W in Wayne was made to the Plan Commission and town board by Dottie Sargeant. Because the property is non-conforming, Sargeant will seek a zoning ordinance variance.

Jim Schmidt notified the Plan Commission that due to time constraints he was resigning from the commission effective immediately. An appointed position, the town will advertise for individuals interested in serving on the commission.

Acting on the recommendation of the Plan

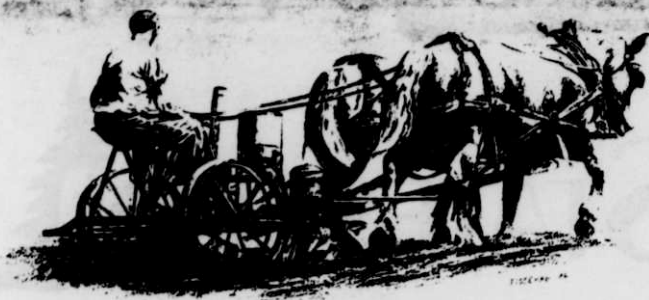

School District Offers Hep B Immunization

Free hepatitis B (Hep B) immunizations will be available to sixth graders this year, thanks to a partnership program between the Washington County Health Department and the School District of Kewaskum.

The Hep B vaccine is given in three doses over a four to six-month period, with the first dose scheduled for September 16.

Due to a proposed Wisconsin rule change, the Hep B vaccine may join the list of vaccines

required for school entry, affecting students in day care, kindergarten and grade seven, beginning in the 1997-98 school year. The only students who should not receive the vaccine are those who have had a serious allergic reaction to common baker's yeast, or a previous dose of Hep B vaccine.

A signed permission slip, which will cover all three doses, will be required. Permission/refusal slips may be obtained through Kewas-

kum Middle School.

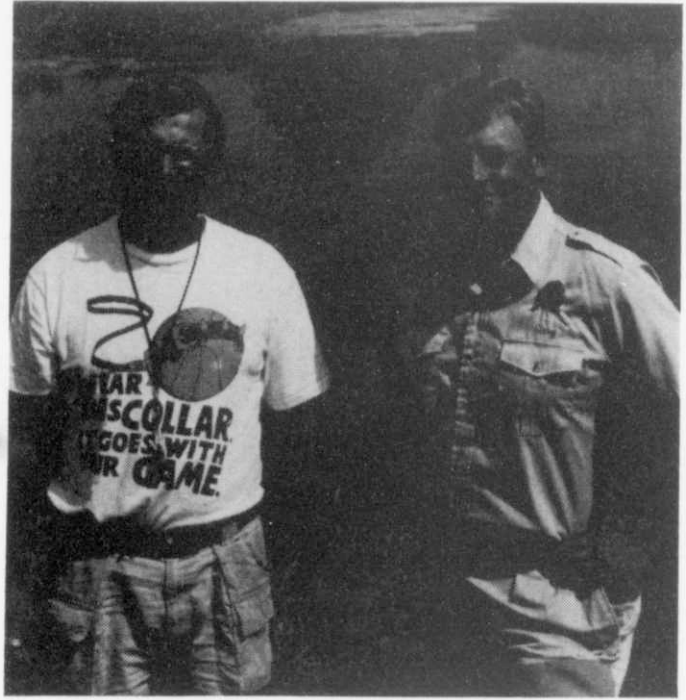

Leisure time is fast becoming a luxury these days, and hunting enthusiasts have felt the crunch as available hunting areas give way to private lands, and work schedules conflict with time once spent painstakingly training dogs and practicing that long range shot.

Caden's Kennels and Hunt Club in rural Campbellsport is located on 460 acres, set on the fringe of Wisconsin's scenic Kettle Moraine area. Owners Gary Hansen and Dennis Brath are well aware of the demand to preserve the traditional hunting experience, and have successfully created an environment that offers the hunter

and their dog a wide variety of terrain and cover in a private setting.

The two facets of their business, dog training and hunt club, function well hand in hand, and they offer both the beginner and the veteran hunter the thrill of upland hunting pheasants, bobwhite quail and chukars from August 15 through April 1.

With 20 years of successful dog training and trialing under their belts, word of their work with hunting breeds has spread across the country, and their kennels are busy as dogs arrive throughout the summer to prepare for the approaching season.

"Clients can leave their dogs for specific training in the area they

desire, or we have programs that train the dog to work with his client," Hansen explains, who first started out working with Labradors, Golden Retrievers, and Springer Spaniels.

Dennis specialized in Pointers, and their methods of training have expanded to encompass all hunting breeds, and all levels of training, from the leisure hunt to champion field trial competitions. "We don't favor one breed over the other, we favor good dogs in general," Gary observes.

Capitalizing on the natural high energy of these canines, Gary and Dennis believe the key to successful training lies in how the methods are presented to the dog. "First, we teach the dog what is

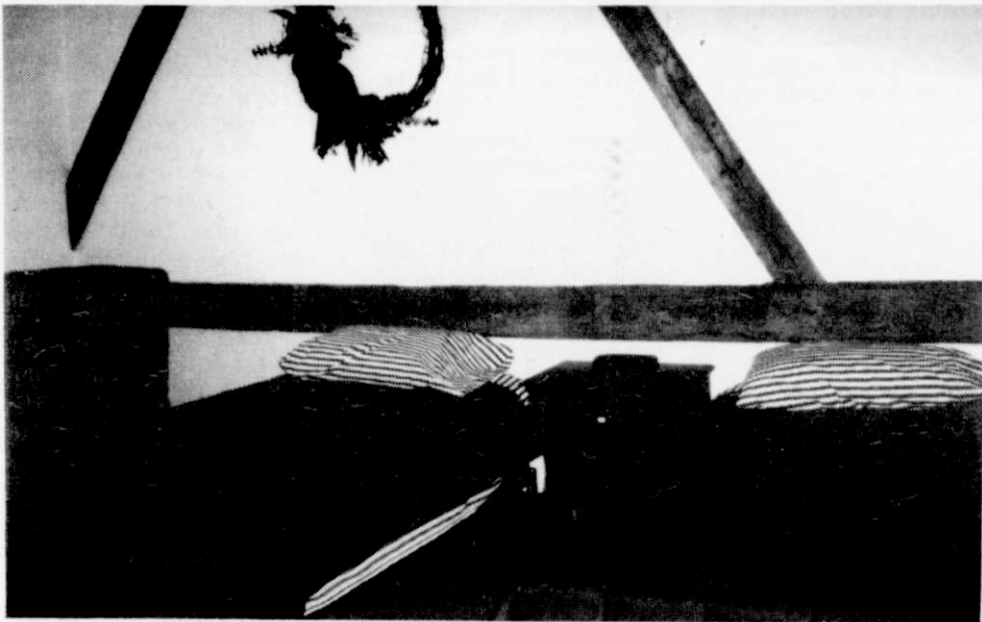
expected of them, and then we direct the dog's energies to the job they're supposed to be doing," Hansen relates. "If properly trained, the dog should be happy with what they're doing."

Their acreage is specially groomed for gun dog training, but they also offer basic obedience, weekly seminars to tune your dog up for the hunting season, and host field

trial competitions.

A typical training session lasts from eight to ten weeks, while dogs used in trial competition may remain for four months. Advanced training can continue for years, depending on the level of competition. The kennel has been busy this summer, with 70 dogs in for schooling, including some owned by

members of the Chicago Bears.

The heated concrete kennels are kept clean and comfortable, with indoor/outdoor runs, and its own septic system. They also offer boarding of all breeds, short and long term.

During the winter season, midwest dogs often travel down to Texas with one of the trainers, where the business leases land so there is year 'round access to water training for the animals. The ponds on the club grounds in Campbellsport are designed to accommodate all training aspects, from puppy to master hunter.

Caden's breeding program has been developed over the years to produce a quality dog in the field, as well as a devoted family companion. Puppies and started gun dogs are available, with eyes, hips and temperament guar-

anteed. Presently, they have their hands full raising 30 puppies, including Springers, Labs, and German Shorthair Pointers

The hunt club continues to grow in popularity, and guided hunts are enjoyed by individuals, groups and businesses out to entertain employees or clients. A two level, 3,500 square foot rustic lodge offers relaxation with friendly, "down home" touches, including a bar and dining facilities, shower and locker rooms, a balcony lounge for additional seating, a conference room, and four guest rooms with private bathrooms, each capable of accommodating up to four hunters.

After the hunt, clients and club members can relax in the lounge while their birds are prepared. While watching sporting events or reliving the hunt, light drinks

and bar refreshments are available, and meals can be served, including private and corporate banquets for moderately sized organizations.

Employees Scott Benzschawel, game manager, and Hillary Schrauth, maintenance director, help make sure guests are comfortable and all hunts run smoothly.

A variety of membership packages are available that offer hunting, lodging, seminars, a membership banquet, and discount rates. Memberships range from individual to corporate

and lifetime charters. A fully stocked bass pond awaits avid anglers, and bow hunting fans will be eager to sharpen their skills on the club's outdoor 3-D and silhouette archery courses.

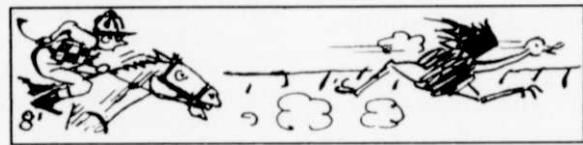
Caden's Kennels and Hunt Club also offers shotgun instruction by experts on an individual or group basis during late spring, summer and early fall. She was a member of the VFW Ladies Auxiliary of the Fred A. Schaefer Post 1393 in West Bend.

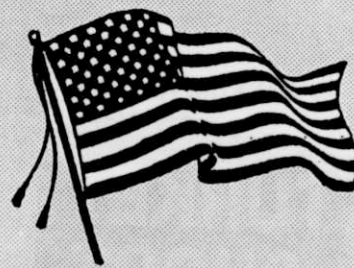

ordinance.

In other matters before the board, approval was made to accept a contract with SEWRPC (Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission) as the town land planner, town maintenance man, Ken Rahlf advised the board the bridge in Kohlsville will most likely be replaced with a culvert, reported the theft of two road signs and eight knocked down in the township, John Steger was approved as the new culvert inspector and the town treasurer will invest extra funds in short term CD's.

A vision meeting will be held on Tuesday, September 10 beginning

at 7:30 p.m. at the Wayne Elementary School. The purpose of the meeting is to obtain input for the Land Use Plan and is open to the public.

An open book meeting is set for Thursday, September 12, from 3 to 7 p.m. and a Board of Review scheduled for Monday, September 16, from 6 to 10 p.m. Both meetings will be held at the Town of Wayne Hall.

The next Plan Commission meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, September 17, in the town hall with the monthly town board meeting to follow on Wednesday, September 18, at 8 p.m.

Notice is hereby given of a partisan primary to be held in Washington County, on Tenth day of September, 1996, at which the nominees for the offices named below shall be chosen.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his or her name and address before being permitted to vote. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot.

At the partisan primary the elector shall select the party of his or her choice or the ballot containing the names of independent candidates for legislative office.

To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall write in the name of the candidate of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval on the write-in line, where a marksense system is used.

In order to qualify for participation in the Wisconsin Election Campaign Fund, a candidate for state office must receive at least 6% of all votes cast on all ballots for the office for which he or she is a candidate.

On referendum questions, where lever machines are used, depress the lever or button at the right of "yes" if in favor of the question, or at the right of "no" if opposed to the question.

If an elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector.

After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the voting booth, properly deposit the ballot, and promptly leave the polling place.

After an official marksense ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the ballot sleeve provided so the marks do not show. The elector shall then insert the ballot in the voting device and deposit the ballot sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot.

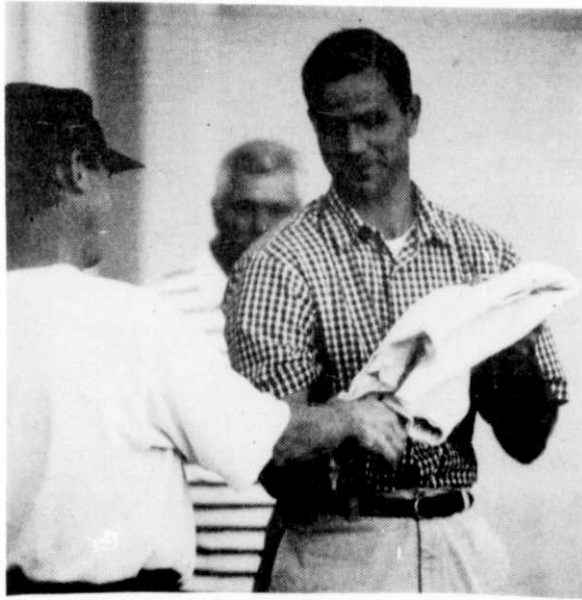

The resume being distributed as part of Capt. Jack Theusch's campaign for sheriff is impressive, but left me puzzled. With those credentials, why has James Grover received overwhelming support from the law enforcement community? Why are officers from all over the county, and even firefighters, giving Grover the nod while abandoning Theusch?

Then I read the resume a second time, and began to see why.

Mr. Theusch claims command experience in a laundry list of areas since he was appointed as Captain by Sheriff Schulteis... but the list is too long. He recognizes that, as sheriff, he will be surrounded by able people who should be encouraged to contribute their ideas, not discouraged.

Finally, I applaud the courage of Jim Grover in mounting this campaign, and members of the sheriff's department who have made their views public, knowing that they are going against the two most powerful people at their agency.

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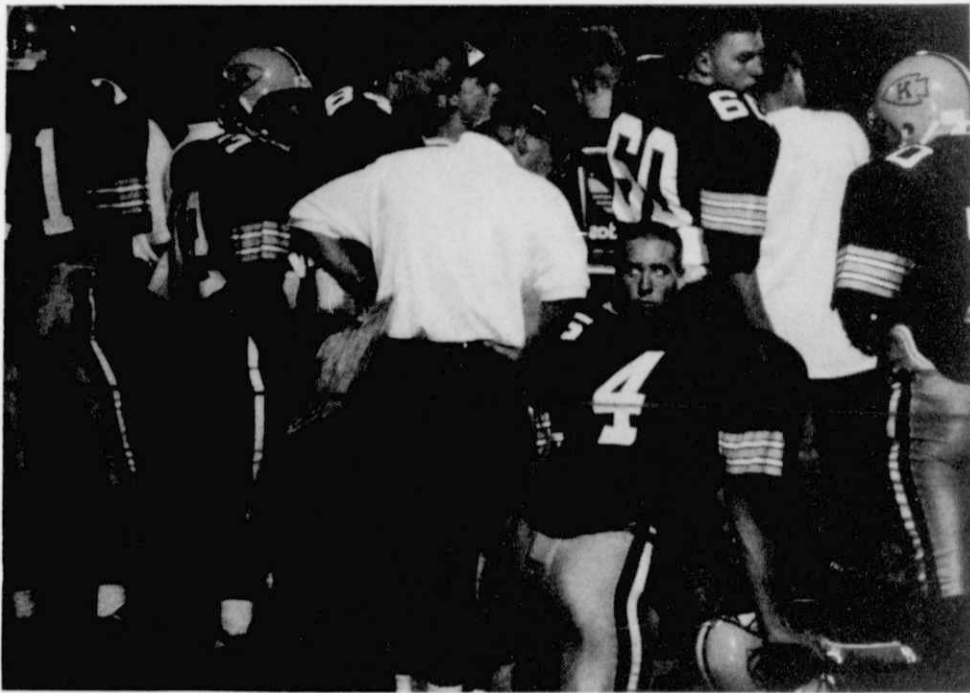

Indians Lose Opener to Cougars, 34-0

A large crowd attended the first home night football game under the new lights, but unfortunately for new head coach Perry Koth, the lights turned out to be the brightest moment of the night for the first year coach.

The Campbellsport Cougars brought an experienced and very talented team to town, spoiling the opening festivities for the Indians. The Cougars were able to rip through a porous Indian defense for 355 yards, rushing on 62 carries for an average gain of 5.7 yards per carry.

Leading the way for Campbellsport was 5'10," 215 pound, Josh Heisler, who ran for a game high 130 yards on 23 carries, while Matt Stuht and Brian Beck ran for 100 and 90 yards respectively.

Meanwhile, the Indian offense showed signs of being able to move the ball at times, as they rushed for 66 yards in 21 carries, for 3.1 yards per carry and passed for 115 yards (11.5 yards per catch). The offense however, turned the ball over five times on four interceptions and one fumble.

"You can't afford to turn the ball over that many times and expect to compete against any team, much less a talented team like Campbellsport," stated Koth after the game.

Kewaskum took the opening kickoff and after picking up 25 yards on five running plays, went to the air for the first time with disastrous results as the bootleg pass was intercepted and returned to the 40 yard line.

Ten running plays later, the Cougars reach-

ed paydirt for the first time as Josh Heisler took it over from the two yard line. The turnaround seemed to take something out of the Indian offense, as they went three and out giving Campbellsport the ball back on their own 39 yard line, following a clip on the punt return.

This time it took the Cougars only seven plays to cover the 61 yards as Brian Beck took the ball on a counter play and raced 41 yards for the second Cougar score of the night. The extra point made it 14-0, with only a couple of minutes left in the first frame.

It took only two plays to give the ball back to the Cougars, as Eric Kopecky fumbled on the second offensive play, setting Campbellsport up at the Indian 43 yard line. The quarter ended after one play, but six plays later, Campbellsport scored again as Matt Stuht carried the ball in from the seven to make it 21-0 early in the second quarter.

"I knew we were in trouble after their third score, because we couldn't even slow their offense down," said Koth, adding, "Our kids on defense put forth a good effort, but they were not prepared for Campbellsport's offense. You can't blame the players for that because that is my responsibility as head coach. I have been spending all my time working with the offense, but I need to take a look at how the defense is being prepared this week for Horicon."

The Indian offense stalled and punted the ball back to the Cougars. This time it was the

Cougars turn to turn it over, as on the fourth play Eric Kopecky recovered a fumble for the Indians. Kewaskum wasted no time in attacking. On the first play Eric Kopecky made a sensational diving catch from quarterback Kevin Martin for a 27 yard gain to the Campbellsport 39

yard line.

The Indians used a mixture of short passes and runs to move the ball to the Cougar 12 yard line before a fourth down dropped pass gave the ball back to Campbellsport for the remainder of the quarter.

"I thought that if we had scored at that point, we may have had a chance, but our poor fundamentals and lack of experience really are hurting us at this point," said Koth.

The third quarter looked a lot like the first half as the Cougars took the opening kickoff and then proceeded to march the ball 52 yards in 12 plays, as Mike McCallum took the ball over on fourth down from the seven for the last offensive touchdown of the game.

Campbellsport's final score came on a 25 yard pass interception, returned for a touchdown. The extra point was blocked by Ryan Rammer to make the final score 34-0.

The Indians did get the ball inside the 20 once more in the third

quarter, as Ryan Rammer made a great sideline catch which covered 32 yards. The drive however, ended with another interception.

Koth had the following things to say about the game. "The offensive line played very well for most of the time. They will get better and better with each game and I feel very good about our ability to move the ball. Ryan Rammer had a very solid game and has solidified his spot on the offensive unit. We need to eliminate the turnovers, and make better decisions on the field. Our fundamentals right now are at about ninth or tenth grade level. We need to improve the mechanics of our game. This game may have been the best thing to happen to us in terms of identifying our weaknesses. The coaching staff needs to do a better job of preparing the team for the team we are playing. WE WILL PLAY BETTER AGAINST HORICON!"

The Indians host the Horicon Marshmen at 7 p.m. Friday at the High School field.
