The owners of Kewaskum Floral have an idea that someday when they're not so very busy they're going to sit down together and write a book on some of the crazy occurrences that could only happen in the floral business.

There's the time the bride's bouquet got stolen by the neighbors," points out Millie Herman, one of the founders of Kewaskum Floral, along with her husband, Tom. Her daughter, Laurie, chimes in, "and don't forget the bride who walked down the aisle in her bedroom slippers... and the customers who stop in at 2 or 3 a.m. when we're working an all nighter, just to order something at the last minute." After 44 years in business, the Hermans have decided to retire and let the next generation follow in their footsteps. Laurie and Rick Maske officially took over as new owners on August 20, with plans to continue a long tradition of quality floral service to the community, that began in 1952.

War II, they bought a home in the Town of Wayne, just down the road from St. Bridget's Church. One day their car broke down in front of a greenhouse in Slinger, and the couple got to talking to the owners of the business. "It really got us interested in the idea, and Grandma Herman (Tom's mother) encouraged us to open our own store," Millie remembers.

It was Easter, 1952, when Kewaskum Floral first opened its doors in Kewaskum, in a building on Main Street which now houses apartments. 'We operated out of two small rooms, and later moved down the street to a place where Wendi and Randy Dreher's house now stands," Millie relates.



down to the greenhouse to pull the weeds, and it took forever, or at least we thought it did. I was so thrilled when sterilizers came along for the soil, and then the job was done in half an hour."

The greenhouses were started at the Herman home in Wayne in 1947, before the store was ever opened in town. Two buildings, one 100 x 30 foot, and the other 96 x 20, are home to 4,000 geraniums, plus numerous other spring annuals.

"There are at least a thousand flats of flowers every spring," Millie counts, who plans to continue working the greenhouse end of the business, along with her husband. "She's not the type to quit," her daughter Laurie asserts, remembering the tale that surrounds her birth.

Millie laughs, as if it's all in a day's work. "I was working on a wedding order I had to finish, but I knew it was getting

close, so I went to see Shop.

'Doc' Edwards, the town physician. He examined me, and said, 'young lady, you're in labor. I want you to tell Tom to get you to the hospital, now!' This was at 4 p.m. I went back to finish the order, and around 7 p.m. I finally told Tom. We rushed to the hospital, and ten minutes later, the baby was born."

On New Year's Eve, 1962, tragedy struck, and a fire burned Kewaskum Floral to the ground. Laurie tells the story. "A train was coming through town in the middle of the night, saw the flames and blew it's horn all the way from one end of town to the other, waking up the entire community. It scared some of the World War II vets, who said it sounded like an air raid."

The cause of the devastating fire was never determined, and the family operated the business out of their home, until they relocated once again, this time in a building at 119 Main Street that used to occupy McLaughlin's Butcher Shop. The Hermans ended up buying and remodel-

ing the shop, where it has remained to the present. They still use the original butcher shop cooler, and Laurie now plans to add an additional walk-in cooler, update the lighting, and eventually build a new entrance with a wheelchair access.

The couple's seven children, Jane, Tom, Ellen, Laurie, Glen, Gary, and Patti, have all helped out through the years, but it's mainly been Jane, Laurie and



Patti who have stuck with it. Patti recently moved to Madison, but Jane still works part time at the floral shop during off hours from her third shift job at Serigraph. "I've been here forever," she declares. A new employee, Kathy Jacque, started in August, under the businesses new name of Kewaskum Floral, Inc.

Through the years, the business has seen immense changes in the variety of flowers that have become available to the average buyer through world trade. "Back then, customers could only get what was in season around here," Laurie points out. "People don't know how lucky they are nowa-days." Flowers arrive from Holland and South America, the two largest growing regions, and in fact, most of the flowers sold in the United States today are grown in other countries. "The quality is excellent," Laurie adds. They have seen a decline in the availability of

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
dried materials, due to outbreaks of civil wars in the countries that supply them.

Silk flowers, balloons, stuffed animals, baskets, dried arrangements, and an assortment of collectible gifts now fill the shelves of Kewaskum Floral, along with the traditional flowers. "It isn't just a woman's gift anymore," Laurie observes. "It's now commonplace to send arrangements to men and children."

The Maskes look forward to keeping in step with the changing trends, yet remaining steadfast in the tradition of quality service the Hermans have established within the community. They share in the every day lives of the people; their weddings, funerals, birthdays, anniversaries, graduations, births, illnesses... it's all part of small town life, and Kewaskum Floral Inc. will continue to play the role it began more than 40 years ago.







Focus on Careers is coordinated by the Washington County Economic Development Office and Washington County School to Work Partnership, Inc.





The policy does not include criteria for whom a fee will be charged and/or why. Recently, I was charged full price while my friend received materials free of charge.

In the interest of saving others from having to pay for duplicate information, I would like to share two of the more interesting bits of information that I received.


On August 8, the Kewaskum School Board treated themselves and others to dinner at Hon-E-Kor Country Club at tazpayer's expense. They enjoyed \$57.00 spent on flowers, a master of ceremonies, and charged a grand total of \$665.00 to our district for 38 people. No business was conducted.

On August 14-16, six Kewaskum administrators travelled to Fox Hills Golf/Conference Center in Mishicot, WI. Twelve items of business were conducted during an administrative planning session." A cost in excess of \$1,400 has been billed to taxpayers of our district.

I will continue to pay 25c per page because it is well worth it to me to know where tax dollars are being spent. Few, if any, governmental bodies charge a fee for information. I believe the Kewaskum School Board should reconsider their policy on public records. An open door policy will create far more public trust than one that picks and chooses those offered materials with no cost and those who must pay.







Parents will receive letters this week with additional specific information on the examinations as well as a brochure developed by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction explaining the Wisconsin Student Assessment System.

hours to complete and will be taken in the student's individual classrooms. The tests are designed to show student understanding of language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies.

All students will also complete a 45 minute writing sample as part of the test. Eighth and tenth grade students will also take a career inventory test.

Results from the tests will be available to students, teachers, and parents in early March.

All students including special education students, in the three grades, are required to take the test battery unless parents request that they be exempted.

According to George Allmann, the district assessment coordinator, these tests give the District and parents a chance to see how students are achieving and how well that achievement compares to the state and national level.

"Effective this year," said Allmann, "students who score at or below the 25th percentile as a total test score will be required to retake those sections of the tests in the spring of 1997. If the student fails to score above the standard, he or she will then be required to attend summer school. If students fail to pass the examination after summer school, they would be retained in their previous grade."

The summer school instruction will be specifically designed at each grade level to accomodate the student's deficiency in the knowledge and concept areas of the major disciplines.

In addition to the fourth, eighth and tenth grade tests in October, kindergarten, second and sixth grade students will also be administered examinations in April to determine their level of achievement. Results of these tests will be given to teachers and parents in May.



Indians Narrowly Lose Non-Conference Tilt, 21-20

After an easy win last week, things got tougher this week, as the Kewaskum football team traveled to Manitowoc to take on the Manitowoc Roncalli Jets.

Roncalli will be a member of the Eastern Wisconsin Conference next year, so this game was a preview of what might be in the coming years. It turned out to be another tough game for first year Head Coach Perry Koth, as the Indians lost 21-20 to the unbeaten Jets.

Kewaskum took the opening kickoff and marched 65 yards in 10 plays, highlighted by Kevin Martin's 42 yard touchdown pass to junior Ryan Rammer for the first score of the game.

Freshman Chris Koth kicked the extra point to give the Indians a quick 7-0 lead. Koth was kicking for the Indians regular kicker, junior Sean Cotter, who pulled a hamstring in the Chilton game and was not kicking for this one.

Martin ended up

completing eight of 17 passes for 185 yards and one TD. In the second quarter, the Jets marched 67 yards in nine plays capped off by Marc Wadzinski's 12-yard run for the score. The try for two points was not good, so the Indians went into half time with a 7-6 lead.

Wadzinski led all rushers with 131 yards in 27 carries and scored two touchdowns.

Kewaskum did have one late drive in the second quarter that covered 54 yards which was highlighted by a Martin to Dan Jeserig (three catches for 49 yards) 29 yard pass play to give the Indians a first down on the Jets 26 yard line. Kewaskum reached the 11 yard line, but after a couple of sacks for losses, they gave up the ball on downs.

The third quarter belonged to the Jets as they outgained the Indians by 80 yards (88-8) in the quarter and scored a touchdown with 11 seconds remaining to take a 14-7 lead.

It looked like the Roncalli Jets had taken over the game as they dominated the line play as they entered the fourth quarter. But this year's Kewaskum's team does not give up so easily. On their first play in the fourth quarter, Kevin Martin connected with his brother, Ryan, for a 34 yard gain to the Jets 29 yard line.

The next play, Eric Kopecky broke through the middle of the line after shedding several tackles, and scampered 29 yards for the touchdown. Koth's kick tied the score at 14 a minute into the final stanza.

Roncalli came right back with another long drive covering 72 yards and regained the lead with quarterback Greg Steizer snuck it in from the one. The kick for the extra point was good and the Jets had a 21-20 lead with six minutes left in the game.

Once again the Indians responded when they had to, as they came right back with a 70 yard, nine play drive with Kevin Martin running the ball in from the six yard line. The drive was highlighted by Martin's 19 yard run on a fourth down play and by Martin's 33 yard pass play to Ryan Rammer (two catches for 76 yards).

With the Indians trailing by one point, Koth decided to kick the extra point. The snap from center was short and the holder could not handle the low snap. By the time the ball was picked up and put on the tee, the Jets were deep in the backfield and blocked the kick, giving them the one point margin of victory, 21-20. "There were four

There were four minutes left and we felt that if we stopped them we would have had enough time to score one more time," said Koth. "We talked it over on the sidelines about going for two points and the win, but we decided that it was a non-conference game and if the game should go into overtime, it would be a good experience for the team heading into our final four conference games." Koth also added that if this game had been a conference game, they

would have gone for the two points and the win. Kewaskum had 274 yards of total offense
