43 Living Units Proposed for New Subdivision

Forty-three living units have been proposed for the first 21-acre parcel of the new Whispering Willow Creek subdivision which will be located in the southwest corner of the Village.

The plat for Whispering Willow Creek subdivision, (see page four) along with a rezoning request for a portion of the land from R-1 to R-4 was brought before the Kewaskum Plan Commission at their monthly meeting last Tuesday, by Gary Gavin of LB Entrepreneurs, L.L.C.

Parcel one of the subdivision will contain 33 single family houses, along with 10 duplexes. The average lot will range in size from 12,000 square feet for a two-story unit to 15,000 square feet for a one story home, however, the lots can vary in size with a few being as large as 27,000 square feet.

According to Gavin, 6.4 acres of parcel two, which is located near the center of the 36-acre subdivision and runs along a creek, will be dedicated to the Village of Kewaskum, with the stipulation that the undisturbed parcel be left in its natural state. The parcel is situated on land that has been designated as conservancy.

The balance of the former Meilahn property will be retained by LB Entrepreneurs for future development.

The Plan Commission gave a favorable recommendation on the re-zoning and the plat and the matter will now be brought before the Village Board at their scheduled meeting on November 4.

Construction on the proposed subdivision is expected to begin in early March of 1997.

School District Policy For Emergency School Closings

The District Superintendent, Charles Johnson, has released for publication the 1996-97 policy for school closings.

As in the past, radio stations WBKV (1470 AM and 92.5 FM West Bend), KFIZ (107 FM and 1450 AM Fond du Lac), WHBL (1330 AM and 97.7 FM Sheboygan), and WTMJ (620 AM Milwaukee) will be used to announce school closings. News stations will only announce a closing. If they do not announce Kewaskum, it means our schools will be open. The announcement will be on the air as early as possible.

When school has opened but weather turns bad, it is recommended that parents listen to one of the above radio stations for a possible school closing announcement. The district is extremely hesitant about closing school during the day. Every effort will be made to announce school closings during the day at least an hour at least an hour before they dismiss the students.

It should be remembered that if school has been cancelled it means that all activities for that day and evening are cancelled as well.

Also, parochial school students and special education students will not be transported when district schools close. If school is delayed by two hours, morning kindergarten and First Steps programs will automatically be cancelled.

One Man's Dream of Free Clinic in County Soon to Become a Reality

Washington County's first free health care clinic will be opening soon. thanks to the efforts of a retired Jackson physician who believes his great faith has been preparing him for this momentous achievement.

Dr. James Albrecht has been a practicing physician since 1948, who firmly believes health care should take a few steps backward, to the way it was in "the old days.'

A friend and colleague of the late "Doc" Edwards, Kewaskum's well known country doctor, Albrecht can recall the days when physicians weren't so insistent on getting paid. "Our patients would give us what they could, be it chickens, potatoes or strawberries, he relates. "They were so grateful, even if they had no money, it was their way of letting us know in tangible terms that our efforts were appreciated."

He saw changes take place during the fifties, the rush of industrial expansion and the nine to five workday, that led to limited medical services. "People would call on the outlying doctors to schedule appointments in the evening because they couldn't get them anymore in the larger com-munities," Albrecht points out. "Doctors were once an integral part of the community.'

Poverty is not an unfamiliar term to him. He was forced to drop out of high school to help support his family, and later struggled with unfailing determination to complete his studies and go on to enroll at UW-Madison.

His strong religious beliefs have led him to wage a lifelong campaign as an advocate for social services, from his role as the county's first ambu-

lance provider, to establishing the first Alcoholics Anonymous program in the area.

He relates in his book, "The Life and Times of a Country Doctor," that his ideals compelled him to become the first medical student in the United States to become drafted due to his insistence on being known as a conscientious objector to war.

Early in October. 1995, Dr. Albrecht was urged by an associate to retire from his profession, while he still could. Always under the impression he would continue to work "as long as he could," the 80 year old doctor fell into a depression, equating retirement with "a living death."

Never forgetting that God put him on this earth to serve, he remembered viewing some literature advertising a free medical clinic in Dodge County, set up in a Methodist Church.

Once the seed was planted in his mind, Albrecht sent out a letter to all employees of West Bend's General Clinic, announcing his retirement and his intentions to investigate the possibility of opening a free clinic in the county.

His long standing relationship with persons in county government led to meetings with Don Ryd, head of Social Services for Washington County, and county nurse Delores Harter, along with St. Joseph's Hospital Administrator Greg Burns, and Associate Director Barb Knutzen. Others in attendance were Nurse Marge Lloyd, Director of the Hospice Program, Nurse Sylvia Cihler, who will serve as coordinator of the free clinic, and Pastor Gruenstern.

The discussions revolved around the problems low income families

face in trying to obtain medical care. "Health care was worse than I thought, and getting worse every day," Dr. Albrecht pronounced.

From their initial meeting and 21 others since, it was determined there was sufficient community support to launch an effort to achieve this vision, and as of last December, the group incorporated under the name of "Donated Health Care Services, Inc." oth-erwise known as Proj-Hope.

An offer for occupancy came from St. Joseph's Hospital; six rooms were available adjacent to the emergency room in quality medical space. Community leader and President of Bank One, Dave Heying, agreed to accept the position of Fund Raising Chairman, working with M & I Bank

President, Tom Bast. The West Bend Clinic, General Clinic, and Hartford Memorial Hospital have all pledged their support for the project. An estimated \$200,000 is needed for start-up costs and first year operating expenses.

Dr. William Listwan, internist at the General Clinic, has volunteered to serve as medical director of the new free clinic. His list of credentials include president of the General Clinic, president of the Washington County Medical Society, and past president of the State Medical Society of Wisconsin. Many other contacts in the medical community to arrange for doctors, nurses, and

other providers to partici-

pate at the clinic, and accept referrals for follow-up care. Albrecht hopes to see

the clinic functioning by Saturday, October 26th, the date set for a much promoted Thank You Celebration and Fund Raising Party, sponsored by the Volunteer Center of Washington County, and the West Bend Daily News. The party coincides with "Make a Difference Day," a national day set aside for doing good.

The event will take place at the Addison Town Hall, 127 First Avenue, in Allenton, from 3 to 7 p.m., featuring entertainment by Milton Bullock, of the 50's group, The Platters, who performed such hits as "The Great Pretender," and "Only You."

Local entertainer Jerry Becker and West Bend High School's PRIDE group will also be

performing. Food will be provided by Washington County caterers and restaurants, St. Joseph's Hospital, and other volunteers.

People interested in donating their time and talents to the benefit, are still needed in the way of face painters, clowns, and general setup and cleanup. Neighborhood groups, schools, and businesses are encouraged to help raise funds. Contact Patti Christensen, Volunteer Center Executive Director, at 338-8256 if you would like to help make the free clinic a reality. An account for donations has been set up at Bank One, 801 W. Washington Avenue, West Bend 53095.

Plans are still in the making for the opening of a second free clinic in Slinger, through Aurora Health Care's offer of its

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

unused clinic building. Dr. Albrecht hopes to see this vision also become a reality, sometime earlier next year. "We might need to be open two nights a week at each location very soon. There is a crying need for this," he maintains.

The free clinic in

West Bend will initially be open on Thursdays evenings from 6 to 9 p.m. at the hospital. "Everything has come together in a way no one can plan," Albrecht declares, never forgetting his gratitude to God and those who have helped wake up a county doctor's impossible dream.





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
Donors Respond with the Gift of Life


Additionally, the Kewaskum Fire Department Rescue Squad is staffed with firefighters who have extended their training to be an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT).



TYPE E NOTICE - VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified elector unable to get to the polling place on election day may request to vote an absentee ballot. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on election day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least 10 days before the election. If voter registration is required, the elector must also be registered.

TO OBTAIN AN ABSENTEE BALLOT YOU MUST MAKE A REQUEST IN WRITING.

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the primary or election or both. You may also request an absentee ballot by letter. Your written request must state that you will be unable to get to the polling place on election day. It must also list your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote, the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different, and your signature.

Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined to home or care facility, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk.

You can also personally go to the clerk's office, complete a written application, and vote an absentee ballot.



Breast Cancer Screening Offered




LILLIAN E. GIERACH

Minutes of **Village Plan** Commission

Village of Kewaskum Plan Commission August 17, 1996 7:00 p.m.

The Plan Commission of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Robert H. Wagner called the meeting to order. Members present were David Goeden, Richard Schmidt, Theodore Meilahn and Charles Waala, Frank Beesten, John Stephani (arriving at 7:20 p.m.) and Administrator Daniel Schmidt and Richard Zarling (arriving at 7:25 p.m.). A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and the Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Frank Beesten, seconded by David Goeden, and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Commission approved the minutes as printed for July 30, 1996.

The Plan Commission reviewed the request to amend the Zoning Ordinance regarding the installation of fence in the front yard. It was noted the request was to increase the height to 4 feet. The intent of the Plan Commission and Village Board in 1972 was to maintain a more open concept and not to advocate fences in the front yards. Discussion was held on not allowing chain link fences altogether in front yards or only allowing decorative fences in front yards. It was the consensus of the Commission to leave the Ordinance as is but to review the fence issue in its entirety when updating the Zoning Ordinance after the completion of the land use plan.

Plan Commission Member David Goeden asked to have the density calculation in reference to wetlands, floodplain and conservancy areas. The same as reviewed from SEWRPC called for a limit of 25% with another being at 80%. Several questions were raised. The Administrator was asked to check with Mr. Roland Tonn of SEWRPC and to report back to the Plan Commission.

Mr. Rick Kania of SEWR-PC was present for discussion on the Master Plan. Mr. Kania reviewed potential bicycle trails, central business district and Natural trails in the Kewaskum planning area.

Mr. Gary Gavin brought in a preliminary draft of a plat for Whispering Willow Creek Subdivision. It was noted that the layout is basically the same as proposed in the land use plan. There would be some additional Two-Family Lots. The Plan Commission will be reviewing the matter at the next scheduled meeting. The meeting schedule for the remainder of 1996 was reviewed. On a motion by John Stephani, seconded by Charles Waala and unanimously carried by voice vote, the tentative meeting schedule was adjusted as follows: October 1, 1996 versus September 24, 1996, October 29, 1996 versus October 22, 1996, and December 10, 1996, versus November 26 and

December 24, 1996. On a motion by Richard Schmidt, seconded by Frank Beesten and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Commission adjourned the



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Indians Defeat Raiders In Homecoming Attack

It was a great night for football as the Kewaskum Indians hosted the Two Rivers Raiders for Homecoming last Friday night. The Indians made sure that everyone from Kewaskum went home happy as they beat the Raiders, 26-12.

Senior Dan Jeserig led the Indian attack as he hauled in 10 catches for 128 yards and one touchdown.

The game however, certainly did not start out like head coach Perry Koth wanted it to. After a short drive by the Indians, the Raiders took the ball over on downs at their own 24 yard line and marched 76 yards in nine plays for the first score of the game.

The try for two points was no good, so the score read Visitors 6, Home 0, halfway through the first period.

The drive was highlighted by the old "hook and ladder" play in which a receiver laterals the ball to another back after they catch a short pass. The play went for 35 yards before Troy Staehler was able to pull him down on the 12 yard line.

After a Kewaskum punt, the Raiders put together a 30 yard drive that ended when Ryan Rammer intercepted a pass at the Kewaskum 37 yard line. Kewaskum picked up a couple of first downs on runs of 11 and 16 yards by Kevin Martin and Eric Kopecky, as the first quarter ended.

The first play of the second quarter was a good one, as senior end Dan Jeserig took a two yard hitch pass and ran 31 yards for the score. Sean Cotter's kick made it 7-6, Kewaskum.

We wanted to get the ball in our receivers hands more this week, and Dan just had a great game," said coach Koth. 'It was the jump start we needed to get control of the game.'

The Raiders coughed up the football on their ssession and the Indians were back in business at their own 46 yard line. This time it took the Indians seven plays to cover 53 yards, as Eric Kopecky scored the first of his three touchdowns from the three yard line, to put the Indians up 14-6, after the Cotter kick. Kopecky carried 22 times in the game for 121 yards and three touchdowns. "Eric has been

our go to guy this year and he has done a great job for us," according to Koth. Kopecky has rushed for 672 yards and ten touchdowns in six games this season.'

With the half-time score of 14-6, in favor of Kewaskum, it looked like the Indians had all the momentum as they stopped the Raiders on their first possession of the third quarter on three plays and forced a punt.

But momentum can swing quickly as the punt by Two Rivers was fumbled by Ryan Rammer and recovered by Two Rivers on the Kewaskum 47 yard line. The Raiders quickly moved the ball down the field on six plays to make it a 14-12 game (the try for two was not good) early in the third quarter. The Indians came back with a 14-play, 57 yard drive that ended when a fourth down play fell just inches short of a first down. The drive consumed the last seven minutes of the

third quarter. In the fourth quarter, the Indians once again stopped the Raiders and forced a punt. Kewaskum took over on their own 31 yard line and moved to the Raider 14 in six plays before Adam Kennedy intercepted a Martin pass to end the drive.

Two plays later Jeff Satterberg could not han-dle a pitch from quarterback Josh Blaha and the Indians recovered on the Raider 14 yard line. Three plays later Eric Kopecky scored from the three to put the Indians up by eight, 20-12. The kick for the extra point however was blocked which left the door open for the Raiders to tie the game with a touchdown and two-point conversion.

The Indian defense which has struggled this year at times, shut the door on the Raiders this time, as a fake punt pass fell incomplete and the Indians took over on the Two Rivers five yard line with two minutes left in the game. Two plays later Eric Kopecky walked into the endzone untouched for the final score of 26-12 (Cotters kick was wide left). The Indians had 285 yards of total offense compared to 311 for Two Rivers. Kevin Martin completed 10 of 23 passes for 128 yards, one TD, and one interception. The win puts the Indians record at 3-3 overall and

2-1 in the conference.

The Indians travel to Plymouth to take on the 3-0 Panthers on Friday (7:00 p.m.). Plymouth is a big physical team that uses its size and strength to wear down opponents and features 6'1" 220pound running back Nick Mueller.

To win the conference Kewaskum will have to win this game against the heavily favored Panthers. To insure a playoff berth the Indians will have to win two of their last three games






