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West Bend Clinic to Move Into New Facilities Here Monday

The West Bend Clinic's newest facilities in Kewaskum will open its doors for business next Monday, October 21.

Construction of the two level, 5,600 square foot building began in May, and the clinic is now preparing for the big move from the Sison Building to its new location on the north side of the village.

The medical office structure can accommodate four physicians, expandable to eight physicians, should the need arise, with 12 examining rooms, two nurses stations, office, staff and administrative space, X- ray, lab, and blood work rooms, and large reception areas designed to accommodate children.

Dr. David Brown, Family Practice, will be joining Dr. Cesar Sison in the new offices on Monday. Brown is a recent addition to West Bend Clinic's professional staff, and has been working in the Kewaskum community since July.

Paradise Development Group Administrator Bruce Steinert said the new location offers potential future expansion for office and retail space, and the possible addition of OB services sometime in the future.

This week, barring rain, the building will be readied for the move with general cleanup, carpeting and final inspection. Landscaping will be minimal until next Spring because of the mud and the planned construction of the pharmacy, which will take place some time in April, 1997.

"We're really excited about the facility, and plans are in the making for a grand opening one Sunday afternoon in December," Steinert related, and invited the general public to stop by and visit the new clinic, once it opens.

The Kewaskum site mirrors West Bend Clinic's new offices in Jackson, which opened this past March.

School District is State Front Runner in Efforts To Initiate Standards

The Kewaskum school district is a state front runner in their efforts to initiate standards in schools, school board members lauded at their meeting this month.

Prompted by board member Neal Weare's recent appointment to a WASB committee designed to draft state standards and assessment policies for school districts, the board relayed its belief that the Kewaskum school district was ahead of the game, and had already put forth efforts to create policies that focused on "accountability measures," and student grade standards.

Weare told the board that the WASB committee had been working on drafting the policies for the past five months, and their recommendations will go through the WASB's Policy and Resolutions committee, to be voted on at the Delegate Assembly during the state convention in January of 1997.

"One of the provisions that we have in there is to have standards on a grade by grade level, that would be developed by the community," he stated, adding that he felt it was best to have standards set locally by school districts to represent the community's values and expectations.

Board member John Schulte recognized Neal for his leadership in education, but noted he was disappointed in the apprehensive response to setting state standards he perceived from school board members across the state at the recent Focus conference he attended in Stevens Point, as a representative of our district. "The fears that this struck into the minds and hearts of so many board members there, to think that they should have the responsibility of

developing standards and assessments for the students that they really have a charge over it will be quite a topic, I'm sure, in January," he related. "If we don't set the standards and assessments through our communities and boards, the state will, and if the state doesn't, the federal government will. This is something our district is not afraid of, this is something our district looks forward to."

Another board member, Mary Andera, was of the same mind, set after attending a conference for "Parents Raising Educational Standards in Schools," with Lt. Governor Scott McCallum as the guest speaker.

"In looking through them (DPI Standards), they are ambiguous and vague at best, that's at best. They are so watered down, that it's impossible to assess whether you've met these standards," she asserted. She pointed out that the Virginia state standards, which are very specific, were heralded at the conference as the ideal model for other school districts.

"As I started looking through these standards, it occurred to me, this looks like our kid's program that we're already doing in Kewaskum." She told the board that this district has a lot to be proud of, as far as setting specific standards goes, and she did not fear state standards, as long as the district of Kewaskum can set higher ones. "We are basically setting the

new three part plan to up ent test scores. and require students to measure up to their own abilities. In looking over last year's WSAS (Wisconsin Student Assessment System) test scores involving mandatory eighth and tenth grade testing, and voluntary fourth grade participation, results shown indicated Kewaskum students scored below state averages, and surrounding area school districts.

"After analyzing the test scores, it was the general feeling of the profesional staff that some type of intervention was needed that involved student accountability,' Curriculum Coordinator George Allmann stated, adding that the staff also believed the students were already capable of completing the objective. The three part Accountability Measures plan includes: 1) The

Students of the Kewaskum School District will be held accountable for their education, the school board announced at this month's regular board meeting. In other words, from now on they're going to have to prove they have really learned what they're supposed to be learning.

The idea of measuring accountability is part of the school district's

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Accolades for Weare, Ammel, Herman Board Approves Football for KMS

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Beginning next school year, seventh and eighth grade students will be able to participate in a full contact conference football program, with support from parents and community organizations.

The request was approved by the Kewaskum School Board at their regular monthly meeting, after several years of coaches and parents asking that the district initiate a program. Kewaskum schools are in competition with surrounding districts that already have a seventh and eighth grade football program, and as result, these schools have a definite advantage at the high school level, District Administrator Charles Johnson pointed out.

'I believe that any time we can offer co-curricular or extra curricular activities to students, we would be improving our attempt to provide a safe and drug free environment," Johnson told the board. The board allocated \$3,200 to start up the football program, which will be self sustaining after the first year, paid for by a player fee, as well as contributions from local community groups, like the **Kiwanis and the Booster** Club. Parents have volunteered to run the progam.

The Board was introduced to a visiting group of ninth and tenth grade students from the Schuler von Kathe Kollwitz Gesamstschule in Germany, as part of an exchange program between both schools. High School German teacher Terry Rosenthal stated that this was the fifth year Kewaskum has participated in the program with the German state of Hesse, matching students with host families

In summer, Kewas-kum students have the opportunity to stay with their host partners in Germany, and learn about their culture and school system. Herr Jochen Peter, who travels to Kewaskum each year as chaperone, thanked the Board for allowing this experience, and the staff, for being so helpful and open to the German students. The board approved Rosenthal's request to send our students on the three week summer exchange program to Germany, at a cost of less than \$1,200 per student.

The board will also be looking into the possibility of authorizing a ten day student trip to Germany, March 31 through April 9.


Although this German/History tour has not been taken since 1990, due to current involvement in the exchange program, Ms. Rosenthal felt that if enough students expressed an interest in going during the Easter break, it would be a beneficial learning experience for students in the district. The request was put on hold until more detailed information about the trip could be obtained.

Through recommendation from the Finance, Transportation, Buildings and Grounds committee, and per request from Food Service Supervisor Kathy Robinson, the board voted to increase temporary food service employee wages to \$6.50 per hour, as well as the wages of temporary secretarial help, for those who have worked in the district for over two years. Substitute teacher pay was also increased to \$67 per day, to stay in competition with the surrounding school districts, to be

increased to \$79 after five continuous days.

Other FTB & G committee business included the approval of a contract with Fischer Truck Service for snow plowing and removal; payment of the KMS emergency sewer repair bill, at a cost of \$14,622; and a change in the district's Long Term Disability Insurance coverage, switching to Schools Insurance Fund, for a net savings to the district of



The board and audience members were also introduced to the district's new Buildings and Grounds Superintendent, Chad Kyle, who arrived from California to take on the new position.

Accolades were in order for a variety of individuals as well as endeavors throughout the meeting. High School principal Larry Wilson highlighted a letter of recommendation received by KHS student Jennifer Hermann. Joining one million other college bound students throughout the nation, Hermann participated in the PSAT NMSQT (Preliminary SAT and National Merit School qualifying test.). and placed in the top 5% of all students who took the test.

School board member Jon Downs took a moment to recognize Larry Ammel for all the things he does for the schools, above and beyond the call of duty. "There's no question this district is a richer district for having Mr. Ammel here," board member Tom Timblin added. "He never asks for anything, he's so unas-suming. We're lucky to have him.

Board member John Schulte put in a good word for fellow member, Neal Weare, who was chosen to serve on the WASB committee formed to develop some standards and assessment policies, which will be presented to regional

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Principal Larry Wilson. A KHS high school student, Jeremy Hahn received the board's okay to enroll in post secondary education in advanced German, since he had exceeded German language four at the high school level.



(Continued from Page 1) development of a high school proficiency exam; 2) Demand the completion of certain credit requirements per grade (beginning in ninth grade), and 3) Additional instruction required for students who fall below the 25% mark (roughly two grades below peers) as a composite on WSAS scoring.

According to Allmann, development heads will be working on a pilot proficiency test, with plans to try it out on senior students in April, 1997. Regular proficiency testing will begin next school year.

"The whole idea is for the student to get a sense of where they are," district administrator Dr. Charles Johnson told the board, although board member Neal Weare voiced his concern over

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the voluntary aspect of student testing.

"How many students, or parents of students are going to exercise their right to exempt?," Weare asked. "My sense of that is that isn't how most parents operate," Johnson answered. "These tests are positive things, they help the student," he indicated, and emphasized the need to keep the focus of the test on the resulting useful information for the student and their parents.

Board member Mary

Andera expressed that the district has a responsibility to provide students with some standards. "Sometimes you aren't helping a child to move them ahead. Sometimes you are doing them a favor by holding them back," she told the board.

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Beginning in ninth grade, students will also be required to complete a certain number of credits each year, before they will be allowed to advance to the next grade, which may involve in-

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creasing credit requirements, Mr. Allmann explained.

The demand for certain credit requirements per grade level will force students to plan ahead, and account for their achievements throughout the four years of high school. Those who fall below the district's new requirements may be taking more courses offered in the summer school program.



They found that below the dam there were more living organisms, more oxygen in the water, clearer water, and faster moving water even though it was more shallow. They worked in cooperative groups and found crayfish, mayfly nymphs, leeches, fresh water clams, and other aquatic organisms.

Above the dam, the water was dark and hard to see through. They mostly found frogs and crayfish. There were not many other living aquatic organisms. The water pressure, they found, was much greater than they expected. The undertow of the river was strong and they were not allowed out past their knees.


The eighth graders had a great time, even though some of them didn't like their river friends.

ORDINANCE NO. 96-9 AN ORDINANCE ANNEXING TERRITORY TO THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows

SECTION 1. Territory Annexed. In accordance with Section 66.025 of the Wisconsin Statutes the hereinafter described property, in the Town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, is annexed to the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin:

That the area to be annexed is described as follows, to-wit:

Being part of the Southwest 1/4 of the SOUTHEAST 1/4 of Section 9, Township 12 North, Range 19 East, Town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin.

That part of the Southwest 1/4 of the SOUTHEAST 1/4 of Section Nine (9), Township 12 North, Range 19 East, Town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, bounded by a line described as follows:

Commencing at the South 1/4 corner of said Section 9; thence South 89 degrees 48 minutes 32 seconds East (all bearings in this description refer to Grid North of Wisconsin Coordinate System - South Zone) on the south line of said quarter section, 340.00 feet to the point of beginning of the tract herein described;

Thence continuing South 89 degrees 48 minutes 32 seconds East on the south line of said quarter section, 165.00 feet; thence North 00 degrees 55 minutes 48 seconds West, parallel with the west line of said quarter section, 156.75 feet; thence North 89 degrees 48 minutes 32 seconds West, 165.00 feet; thence South 00 degrees 55 minutes 48 seconds East, parallel with the line of said quarter section, 156.75 feet to the point of beginning.

Containing 0.5936 acres. (Exhibit A-Survey)

SECTION 2. Effect of Annexation. From and after the effective date of this ordinance the territory described in SECTION 1 shall be part of the Village of Kewaskum for any and all purposes provided by law and all persons coming or residing within such territory shall be subject to all ordinances, rules and regulations governing the Village of Kewaskum.

SECTION 3. Temporary Zoning Classifications. (a) Upon recommendation of the Plan Commission the territory annexed to the Village of Kewaskum by this ordinance is temporarily designated to be part of the following district of the Village for zoning purposes and subject to all provisions of the Ordinance of the Village of Kewaskum entitled "Zoning Ordinance" relating to such district classifications and to zoning in the Village:

R-1 SINGLE-FAMILY RESIDENCE DISTRICT

(b) The Plan Commission on October 1, 1996 recommended the perma-nent zoning classification of R-1 SINGLE-FAMILY RESIDENCE DIS-TRICT described here with.

SECTION 4. Ward Designation. The territory described in Section 1 of this ordinance is hereby made a part of the 2nd ward of the Village of Kewaskum, subject to the ordinances, rules and regulations of the Village governing wards.

SECTION 5. Town From Which Detached. The above described property is being detached from the Town of Kewaskum Washington County, Wisconsin.

SECTION 6. Severability. If any provisions of this ordinance are invalid or unconstitutional, or if the application of this ordinance to any person or circumstances is invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the other provisions or application of this ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provision or application.

SECTION 7. Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication as provided by law, and upon compliance with the filing requirements of Section 66.025 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

Pathologists, doctors who treat patients through laboratory medicine, say that steroids can build muscles, but they often cause a cascade of physical and emotional side effects, including baldness, acne, swollen breasts, or shrunken testicles. Users may experience symptoms ranging from nausea to violent mood swings, to the development of blood filled cysts that can be life-threatening.

Athletes who get caught using steroids can lose their eligibility for future sports and have awards they won in previous competitions taken away.

Steroids are derivatives of testosterone, a natural male hormone. While some types of steroids may be prescribed by physicians for specific illnesses, the type found on the street or in locker roomsanabolic steroids—is illegal and dangerous.


