band visited, often to see former AFS students who had lived in Kewaskum.

Area artist May Bierman painted the flowers on the square mesh patterns. And when Mrs. Peterson completed the stitchery over four years later, Sue Secord provided the finishing touches to the rug by assembling the separate pieces.

The hostess and her friends-of-symphony helpers are making sure that the halls will be decked with Christmas glitter and that there'll be something for the sweet tooth.

Board Okays RezoningFor Butler Financial Group

In addition to passing the 1997 budget, the Kewaskum Village Board also faced a lengthy agenda at last Monday's meeting.

The Board opened the meeting by unanimously approving the rezoning request of Butler Financial Group for the property located at 1551 Fond du Lac Avenue, Kewaskum. They had asked to rezone the property from R-3 Two-Family Residence District to B-1 Limited Retail and Service District. The property is located on the southwest corner of the intersection of Fond du Lac Avenue and Knights Avenue.

David Goeden reported the Plan Commission had given the rezoning a favorable recommendation after addressing a few issues regarding lot setback and a "vision corner."

Trustee Robert Stoltzmann asked what the plans were for the building. Village Administrator Daniel Schmidt stated, "The downstairs of the building will be converted into general office area. Basically, they're gutting the downstairs and making it handicapped accessible and it's going to be an insurance financial type office building. The layout is designed that at some point in time, it really could convert back into housing.

Schmidt added the Butler's son, who is also a member of the business, would be residing upstairs.

Following the November report by Assistant Fire Chief Mark Herriges, Trustee Gary Gavin related he felt the village residents should not have to subsidize the cost of transporting nonresidents by village ambulance. Gavin stated, "If it's \$50 a call or whatever it is, that's what these people should be charged. At least so it's break even, instead of the village subsidizing it."

Herriges agreed, saying, "I don't think there should be any problem with that at

all. I did mention that at one of the last meetings, when we tried to sit down with all the townships. That's what they agreed upon, so it that's what it's going to be, we can up it."

Herriges added he wasn't exactly sure what they were at right now, to which Trustee Stoltzmann stated, "We're at \$35 now."

Trustee Gavin added,
"You should make it enough
to try and recoup from this
year. You're not going to get
it all back, but at least set it
above 10% of what you're
projecting the fees will be."

Herriges further explained, "I'm not even sure if Medicare covers the non-resident. That's where you run into problems, when Medicare will only pay X amount of dollars, no matter what it is."

Administrator Schmidt added, "You have to sign a statement that you're willing to accept the assignment. So whatever they decide to give you, that's what you end up getting on all Medicare patients."

Village President Robert Wagner asked, "What do you do, bill the patient for the balance?" Schmidt stated, "No, you can't. Once you sign the assignment, you're just out."

Herriges added, "It's probably close to \$100 a run that we lose on them (Medicare patients)."

Following further discussion on the increased usage of the rescue squad and the decrease in rescue squad personnel, it was thought some transports would either have to be contracted out, or the village would have to seriously consider looking at full time people, to which Herriges stated, "We all know what that gests."

Herriges added, "This weekend (opening of deer hunting) was a real rough weekend. We spent all weekend with about 10 people in town. We did have one fire call, which was not our fire. We had two people come back from deer hunt-

ing, so we had 11 people sign in that showed up. We didn't have enough people to run two rescue squads over the weekend. We had several car accidents. We had to have Campbellsport come in and transport one patient for us, because we were only able to run one squad."

Police Chief Richard Knoebel gave his October monthly report, adding the D.A.R.E. program would be commencing in January and the department had received their "Tiger Paw" high-speed chase stopper. It is hoped the "Tiger Paw" would be in use within a few weeks. Discussion on the merits of the "Tiger Paw" was held with Chief Knoebel stating he felt it was an extremely useful tool to cut down on accidents, injuries and liability during a high-speed chase. It is also hoped to have a demonstration on this new piece of equipment in the near future.

During his report, Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles stated during the recent light snowfall, there were many residents who did not clear off their sidewalks. Letters were sent to these residents to make them aware of village requirements on clearing walkways.

Kewaskum Swing Choir is made up of Kewaskum High School students who demonstrate an above average ability to sing and dance and "make spirited music." The KEYS Christmas concert is the only Christmas concert that the Swing Choir performs.

This concert is a primary fund raiser for KEYS. Plan to attend the concert to hear the excellent Christmas music provided by the Moraine Chorus and the Kewaskum Swing Choir on Monday, Dec. 9 at 7:30 p.m. Tickets are \$2.00 (donations for more than that will be welcomed) and are available at Miller's Furniture, Kewaskum; Kewaskum High School and at the door on the evening of the concert.

KMS Christmas Concert Dec. 19


The Kewaskum Middle School music department will present it's Christmas concert on December 19.





An innovative program in the School District of Kewaskum's elementary schools is designed to help with the latter. Early Intervention in Reading (EIR), used in addition to the regular reading program, provides strategies and practice to ensure that minor developmental reading difficulties in the early grades don't turn into largescale reading problems later down the line.

EIR is used to provide an extra boost in reading for the students that are reading at a different developmental pace," said Marirose Lucey, Reading Specialist for the Wayne and Kewaskum Elementary Schools. "We've had some very positive response.

Farmington Elementary Reading Specialist Beth Hubbard agrees. She thinks a key to the program's success is that the teachers are involved, as well.

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



An Open Letter To the Statesman:

On Friday, October 25th, my family's beloved dog of 12 years was hit by a car and died. The person that hit him, my father and I believe, did it deliberately. Barnee's injuries lead us to believe that he was dragged.

Why do people do things like this? What possesses a person to hurt an animal? I can understand if he was in the middle of the road and you couldn't stop. Why didn't you stop after you killed him? His collar (which is missing) had my parent's address and phone number on it. You could have left a note. Barnee was probably sitting by the driveway waiting for his mom and dad to come home. When they did he was already dead. You could have taken him to a vet to see if he could be saved. There is a vet less than two miles down the road.

If you thought that just Barnee's life would be affected, you were very wrong. You affected about six lives. My parents, who raised him from a puppy, found him dead on the road. My mother is still very upset; he was part of our family, her oldest "son." It's like losing a child. Part of you is gone, having died too soon. The only blessing for my mother is now she won't have to make the decision to put him to sleep, because he was killed by someone who doesn't care about life.

My father was the one who fed him everyday. He was the one who had to take him off the road before someone would hit him again. The lives of my sisters and I were affected too. He was the first dog we

every had. He meant something different to each one of us. My sister would take care of him when my parents were away for a short trip. For me, he was someone to take a walk with; play with; give a bath to, and someone to spoil with doggie treats. Most of all his younger brother misses him the most. He keeps looking for him everyday, wondering where he went; wondering why his parents took away Barnee's bed and bowls. How do you tell a dog that his brother died. We wonder if he saw the whole thing. If only dogs could talk. For my family, it will take a long time to get over

the loss of Barnee.

I hope the person who hit the dog on Highway H on Friday the 25th, can sleep with what they did. I hope that every time you hear a dog bark, howl, or even just look at you, that you remember the dog that you killed! I hope that every time you see a beagle that it reminds you of what you did. I wouldn't watch Snoopy, if I were you, because it will remind you of the beagle that you killed. If you can find it in your soul it would be nice of you to return the collar and/or tell my family why you killed one of man's best friends.







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Opening Weekend Deer Registrations Hit 168,120

MADISON -- Opening weekend deer registrations for the 1996 nine-day Wisconsin gun deer season topped 168,000, making it the third highest total for Wisconsin. The season opened amid a patchwork of weather situations statewide ranging from ideal to wet and foggy.

Hunters registered a total of 168,120 deer during the opening two days. Add the 25,107 deer registered during a special, four-day Zone T hunt in October and hunters have registered 193,227 deer so far during the 1996 gun season.

"Distribution of the harvest is good statewide," said Bill Mytton, deer and bear ecologist for the Department of Natural Resources. "In the north where the harsh winter last year had a negative effect on the herd, the registrations are down. But in those areas of the state targeted for a higher kill, the numbers are looking real good."

Even with the severe

winter that gripped the state last year and overwinter losses to the deer herd, the buck registration total hit 73,896. That is second only to the 1995 record pace of 96,242. The antlerless registration of 94,224 was the highest two-day total. The high kill reflects the large number of antlerless and bonus permits available in many areas of the state, especially in Zone T units.

"Snow cover throughout much of the state made hunting visibility and tracking very good for the hunters," Tom Hauge, Bureau of Wildlife Management Director, said.

Sauk County boasted the highest early buck registrations with 3,175, followed by Waupaca 2,499, Clark 2,436, Marinette 2,336, Monroe 2,308, Marathon 2,294, and Columbia 2,238. Waupaca County topped the antlerless registrations with 3,589 followed by Sauk 3,520, Trempealeau 3 498, Columbia 3.298, Marinette 3,229, Vernon 3,087, Jackson 2,900, Iowa 2,863, Clark 2,758, Marathon 2,574 and Monroe 2,526.

There were only seven gun related accidents recorded during the opening weekend and no shooting fatalities. That compares to 17 for opening weekend last year and the single fatality for the whole season.

"Usually accidents occur later in the season," Tim Lawhern, DNR hunter safety program administrator,

The accident reports show a high rate of self-inflicted wounds, Lawhern stated. Several accidents were related to violations involving loaded guns in or on vehicles. There were a total of 32 hunting accidents for the season last year.



1996 Deer Season Summary

The 1996 deer gun season ended on Sunday and the big question was, where are all the deer? Maybe there was not as many deer as thought.

The total registration for Dins and Mauthe Lake was at 990, compared to 984 in 1995. Almost the same, even with 12,075 Hunter's Choice Permits available compared to 5275 in 1995. The bottom line is there were not as many deer taken as was predicted going into the season.

Why the lower harvest? Several things came into play. The opening day snow which began at about 5:30 am limited the deer movements. Most were bedded down and unless pushed they remained there. The snow caused many hunters to leave their stands early because they were set and many did not return in the afternoon. After the opening weekend the registration at Dins was down 112 compared to 1995, a 20% drop, which is difficult to make up with a lot of hunters not hunting after the opening weekend.

Many hunters also reported not seeing as many deer as last year. Most of these hunters were on the state properties. Hunters that were doing drives had better success than those just sitting. The hunters doing the drives commented on how the deer had to be stepped on before they would move.

The vast majority of the hunters contacted expressed strong opposition to the T Zone and especially the expansion of the T Zone in1997, which could include unit 69A.

It was the safest hunting season ever with only one fatal hunting accident and 14 other non-fatal accidents statewide. This is very good news for all hunters!

Statewide it is predicted that the harvest will be down from 1995. Final registration totals should be out within the next couple of weeks. One reminder, the muzzle loader season is open through Sunday, Dec. 8th, so the blaze orange requirement is still in effect for all hunting except goose hunting.

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
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
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
