



District Elementary School's Just Say No Clubs Receive Statewide Recognition

Just Say No Clubs from Kewaskum's Elementary Schools, namely Wayne, Farmington and Kewaskum, received recognition from Governor Tommy Thompson for "leadership in the prevention of substance abuse in Wisconsin" at a recent awards ceremony held in Madison.

The Just Say No club organization in the Kewaskum Elementary Schools was one of just six programs statewide to receive such recognition, and the only one at an elementary school level

Two of the Just Say No Club advisors, Jody Mundigler and Cheryl Taylor were on hand to accept the award.

In a press release announcing the awards, Governor Thompson said, "We must continue to develop comprehensive programs to educate young people about drug and alcohol use. (Such) programs must not

be left only to the schools, but must also be integrated throughout the community.'

In addition to their school activities, the Just Say No Clubs here have recently participated in community events such as marching in the Christmas Parade, promoting the Great American Smokeout, and raising money to purchase holiday gifts for families throughout Washington County.





Youth Apprenticeship **Program Sets Record**

A record number of county high school students are enrolled in Youth Apprenticeship programs this school year, according to statistics just released by the Washington County School-To-Work Partnership.

"There are 50 students enrolled in printing, banking and finance, and manufacturing from all five public high schools," announced Jan Shane, executive director of the School-To-Work Partnership. "That includes 20 seniors completing the final year of their technology-related educational programs and 30 juniors who have now completed their first semester of their first year.'

Youth apprenticeships are two-year programs in which high school students spend half of every school day at school and half of the day learning technical skills at participating businesses. Besides getting paid for their work-based training, the students also complete their high school education, earn up to 12 credits that can transfer immediately into related technical college programs, and have opportunities to be hired after high school graduation at wages higher than untrained entry level personnel could expect.

Youth Apprenticeship expands career options for our students," Shane said. "Depending on what they want to do, they can enter their work force immediately with great opportunities for advancement, go on to technical college to learn more about their chosen profession, or continue on with four-year college, if they like."

Since 1992, when 12 youth apprentices enrolled in the first printing program (one of two pilot programs in the state that year) through the West Bend School District and Serigraph, Inc. of West Bend, youth apprenticeships have shown steady enrollment increases. "We've more than doubled enrollment since that first

year," Shane said. "We're pleased with the growth in interest our students and their parents are showing in Youth Apprenticeships," Shane said. "We're pleased with the steady growth all of our school-to-work educational programs have had. 'As we continue to spread the word about the importance of modern workplace skills education, we are confident even more students will participate in the future.

A combined total of 293 students participated in all of the School-To-Work Partnership programs last year. "That was a record, too," Shane said. "Although we haven't completed tabulating figures yet for this school year, we expect the number of participating students will easily top 300."

In addition to the twoyear youth apprenticeship programs, the School-To-Work Partnership also offers job shadowing projects, career mentoring programs, tech prep classroom work and work-based learning co-ops, which can range in length from several class periods to one year.

"It is our goal to eventually give every student in Washington County an opportunity to experience workplace technology and career planning assistance," Shane said.

Participating Kewaskum High School youth apprentices include: Cherie Christian, junior, and Rebecca Heisdorf, senior, both in Banking and Finance.






Kewaskum is 'All Dressed Up' for the Holidays

Applications for Energy Assistance are being accepted by the Washington County Department of Social Services, 333 E. Washington Street, Suite 3100, West Bend, WI 53095.

To make an appointment, or for information, call 335-4610. The office is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Eligibility is determined by the number of people in the household and the total gross household income for the three months prior to the month of application. One person, \$2902.50; two people, \$3885; three people, \$4,867.50; four people, \$5,850; five people, \$6,832. 50; for each additional person add \$982.50.

The Energy Services Program is a three-part program offering: 1) Heating Assistance; 2) Crisis Assistance; and 3) Weatherization Services.

Heating Assistance is a one-time benefit payment during each heating season (October 1 through May 15). It is intended to help pay a portion of the annual heating costs for eligible applicants. The amount of the heating assistance benefit is determined by family size, income level, and heating costs. avoid future emergencies.

Weatherization Services can conserve energy and help to reduce heating costs. Applicants who are eligible for heating assistance may also be eligible for the Federally funded Weatherization Services. All services and material are provided at no cost to eligible applicants.



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Minutes of Village Plan Commission

Village of Kewaskum Plan Commission October 29, 1996 7:00 p.m.

The Plan Commission of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Robert H. Wagner called the meeting to order. Members present were David Goeden, Richard Schmidt, Theodore Meilahn, Frank Beesten, Administrator Daniel Schmidt and Richard Zarling. A quorum was present. Member Charles Waala asked to be excused and was absent.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and the Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Frank Beesten, seconded by David Goeden and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Commission approved the minutes as printed for October 1, 1996.

The request for rezoning of 1551 Fond du Lac Avenue also known by Tax Key No. V4-0021 from R-3 Two-Family Residence District lots to B-1 Limited Retail and Service District. The Request is being made by the Butler Financial Group. Mr. and Mrs. Butler were present and shared their plans for the building and remodeling thereof with the Commission. On a motion by David Goeden and seconded by Richard Schmidt and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Commission recommended the rezoning as requested and sent the matter to the Board for public hearing.

On a motion by Richard Schmidt and seconded by Theodore Meilahn and unanimously carried by voice vote the Commission authorized sending a request with a recommendation to the Village Board to request SWERPC to prepare a Zoning Ordinance update to correspond with the new Land Use Plan upon its completion.

Mr. Rick Kania of SEWRPC was present for discussion on the Master Plan. Mr. Kania reviewed the ratios of lots to zoning classification as selected as goals for the Village by the Plan Commission. It was noted as previously established the ratios are 65% single-family, 10% two-family and 25% multifamily. These ratios are based on land as perceived to be developed within the sewer service area and using the suggested zoning.

Mr. Kania noted that a meeting was scheduled with the School District in reference to proposed school land uses. The plan and area of the plan were reviewed on October 14, 1996 at the School Administration Building. Several Administrators were present and an Architect for the School District. The variety of matters were discussed as well as possible future locations for diffeent school facilities. It was noted at the conclusion of Mr. Kania's presentation that the Distrect did not want any proposed school facilities shown or noted in the plan, with the exception of elementary schools. Mr. Kania stated that this was the School District's prerogative and it was their duty to take care of their own facility planning and time table as to needs. There would be mention that areas have been looked at for the varied facilities and that with the development of the area within the land use plan numerous expansions will be required.

It was noted the next Plan Commission Meeting is scheduled for December 10, 1996.

On a motion by Richard Schmidt, seconded by Frank Beesten and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Commission adjourned the meeting. Roll call vote was 5 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 2 "Absent."





The Rock River League Oldtimers' Association recently announced the names of the 1996 award winners that were honored at the Annual Awards Dinner held in October in Horicon.

Inducted into the Rock River Hall of Fame were: Roy Maass, an outfielder for the old Lebanon Elms; Bill Bergin, scorekeeper for Ashippun, Watertown and Lebanon and a league officer for many years; Marv Grahl, a pitcher and outfielder for Eden, Campbellsport and Long Lake; Jim Pirkel, a catcher for Watertown and Earl Roberts, an infielder for Randolph and Beaver Dam. Also, Alvin "Carp" Reinhard was posthumously inducted into the Hall of Fame.

For the first time, the membership voted for the recipient of The Rock Diamond Award for outstanding service to amateur baseball. This year the award will go to Elmer Marks, long-time manager and Commissioner from Ashippun, now living in Watertown.

Elmer started his career in 1931 (at the age of 17) as a pitcher with Hustisford in what was the Central Rock River League, also managing for a short time. In 1946, he organized and managed a team in Ashippun in the Land O' Lakes League and later switched to the Rock River League. He continued as manager in Ashippun for 29 years.

In 1961, he, along with

Jerry Rabbach of Watertown, started the Tri-County Nite Baseball League. In 1964, he was elected Commissioner of the Rock River League and in 1970 accepted the additional role of Commissioner of the Tri-County Nite League.

In 1981, he organized the Rock River Oldtimers' Association. In 1984 Elmer was very instrumental in organizing the Southern Wisconsin Amateur Baseball Association (SWABA) Tournament, a tournament for local amateur teams emphasizing participation by the smaller town teams in the area.

He was named the first Commissioner of SWABA and held the post along with commissioner of both leagues until 1990, when he decided to retire. Elmer found out he couldn't get out of baseball totally. He was recently elected to a third year as secretary of SWABA and is mainly responsible for raising the prize money for the tournament. On Sundays in the summer, you will still find him on the job as scorekeeper for the Ashippun Mudcats Baseball Team.


