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## New Library Director Hired

## **Board Votes for No Parking Along** Portion of Parade Route on July 12

A discussion regarding the possibility of limiting parking on Fond du Lac Avenue and Main Street during the Kewaskum Firemen-Legion parade on Sunday, July 13 opened the April 7th meeting of the Kewaskum Village Board.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt passed out a sketch of the area, depicting the number of parking spaces which would be lost along the route, adding, "There are some parking lots that some of the businesses have along there where parking has been allowed in the past and we would try to work with those people and help promote parking this year."
Trustee David Goeden

asked, "Do we have a problem with the width of the road, as far as corners, or

what?

Schmidt answered, "No. It's basically for the vision. It's been asked for by a group of citizens, maybe three or four years ago, and at that time, the board rejected it and it came in again through requests made to the fire department and Legion.

Trustee Goeden suggested, "Another idea would be, because you have alot of older people that sit right in their cars, maybe just allow parking on one side and then the chairs on the other

President Bob Wagner asked, "Didn't part of the discussion (during the Park and Rec meeting) entail offering permits for the handicapped and elderly that they could contact the village?'

Schmidt stated something could possibly be worked out on the village lot (former Sentry property) and the Engelhardt lot.

Trustee Gary Gavin added, "I think having no parking will help promote

Kewaskum because then people are actually going to have to walk past what businesses we do have. It's going to give them a chance to maybe get out of their car and mingle with people instead of being isolated in their vehicle and then leave. At least they're going to have to walk and maybe even socialize.

Police Chief Richard Knoebel asked the board how they wanted to enforce the parking rules and it was decided the No Parking signs be put up the night before if necessary

Trustee Bob Stoltzmann brought up another good reason for the parking limitations and that was the safety factor of children darting out from between parked cars. He added, Make it a wider street so you don't have quite so much congestion. We (the firemen) do not allow the throwing of candy, but we do encourage the giving out of candy by people walking. And that rule is not always adhered to. The (parade) committee felt with the wider street, it would be easier for the people to walk along the parade route and hand out the candy.

Trustee John Kenworthy added another point, stating, "You can't even walk on the sidewalk half the time because you have 15 chairs sitting there, so you have to work your way through families doing that. I think it makes sense to do the whole thing.

Trustee Gavin made a motion to eliminate parking on Main Street, both sides, and Fond du Lac Avenue, both sides, as was indicated on the map passed out by the Administrator. To clarify, the map shows the elimination of 25 parking spaces on Fond du Lac Avenue from Second Street to Main Street, and 26 parking spaces on Main Street from Fond du Lac Avenue to

The motion was seconded but more discussion followed, before the board got a chance to vote on the motion.

Trustee Goeden stated, "So on the widest road that we have, which is Fond du Lac Avenue, we're going to take parking away on both sides. The parade does go past Railroad Street down to Riverview and there we're not taking any parking away.'

Trustee Stoltzmann explained, "That was the suggestion that was brought up at that committee meeting to give this a year's trial, this far, rather than take the whole Main Street, you take half of it the first year. If it works out as well as everybody feels it's going to, next year they're going to ask for the rest of it.

President Wagner commented, "I would like to see us work something out for anyone that is handicapped, disabled or the elderly where we could give them the privilege of at least getting the choice spots along a couple of parking lots that face the streets.

However, Wagner added, "Most people that are parked along the street in their cars are being very inconsiderate to most of the other people that want to come and watch the parade. For the most part, they don't really have to be parked along the street. There's a few elderly people... but the mentality of most people nowadays is if you can't do it in the car, you don't do it. They want drive-up hamburgers, driveup marriages, drive-up banking... that I think it's being a little inconsiderate for the majority of the people when they take up sidewalk space and viewing space for alot of the people that came to watch the

parade. Trustee Goeden reiterated his position on allowing the parking on one side, to which Trustee Kenworthy added, "If you look at West Bend parades, they don't allow parking. The unobstructed view is nice. The area where people are going to be congested, that's the natural center of the parade. I think that's the area to open up both sides. Go ahead and do it on a trial basis and if we find we have problems, it's a one year thing and we can change it."

With there being no further discussion on the issue, the board proceeded to vote, 6-1, on the no parking stated in the motion. Trustee David Goeden was the lone dissenting vote.

In other matters, the board gave authorization to Police Chief Richard Knoebel to begin the process of hiring a new police clerk to replace the part-time clerk who resigned to seek a full-time position, and also authorized Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles to prepare specs and advertise for bids for the construction of a salt shed.

District Administrator Schmidt reminded board members that the assessor's Open Book is scheduled for Tuesday, April 15, from 1:30 to 6:30 p.m. and the Board of Review is set for Monday, May 12, from 12:30 to 4:30 p.m.

Representative to the Library Board, Trustee John Kenworthy, asked the board for authorization to hire Ms. Shellie A. Anderson of Milwaukee as the new Kewaskum Library

Director. Library Board Chairperson Clark Pearson commented, "(Ms. Anderson) is a real strong candidate and we're pretty happy to get her because it's very difficult to get candidates because it is a part-time job." Pearson added, "The Library Board may sometime down the road, recommend to the village board that they may want to increase it to a full-time position but this is not why we're hiring her at all.'

Kenworthy stated,
"There were others who
indicated they wanted it
full-time down the line, and
we weeded them out immediately because we couldn't
offer them that."

Pearson added, "We had 13 applicants. We set up seven interviews. One couldn't make it, so we interviewed six people and this is the one we chose."

Kenworthy also said, "They all knew the hours; they all knew the pay rate. I think that says something about Kewaskum and what are people's perceptions of us. They want to come here to work."

Trustee Goeden again brought up discussion on saving tax dollars by combining the school library and the village library.

Kenworthy gave his opinion, stating, "If you're talking about putting the community library on school property you're killing the community library. It will only be perceived as a really cool school library. If you have a separate unit where you have a joint school library-community library, it might be an ideal thing but it won't be accessible to the schools then. It'll be separate from the school building. They're just different animals. Right now, part of our funds come from Washington County. Alot of those folks aren't going to go into a school to get their books. Here we have a community library that folks can go into and use and we get funding for that."

Following further discussion, the board voted unanimously to hire Ms. Anderson. Trustee Kenworthy also brought up for discussion the possibility of installing a used 24-hour book drop for the library. According to a survey, this was the most requested item by library patrons. The board agreed the proposed \$150 expenditure for the

used book drop would be worth it to use on a trial basis before spending money on a new one.

Library Board member Frank Beesten added the unit could always be resold if it did not work out for some reason.

President Wagner thanked the Library Board for all their time, effort, work, and dedication, stating, "I deeply appreciate the work the Library Board has done and I imagine the rest of the board feels the same." He also asked the Administrator to draft a letter to the Library Board stating the same.

Under unfinished business, the board unanimously approved the installation and adjustment of street lights on Edgewood Road between Knights Avenue and Forest Avenue and the discussion was held on future relief sewer installation adjacent to the railroad tracks.

Under new business, low bids were approved from Payne and Dolan for \$39,120 for resurface/overlay asphalt work for 1997 and to Gitter Construction for \$11,400 to remodel the main lift station.

The board also designated April 26 Spring Cleanup Saturday in the Village from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Trustee Stoltzmann said, "It must be working. I already got two phone calls asking when it's going to

President Wagner concluded the meeting by thanking outgoing senior Board Member David Goeden, who chose not to run for re-election. Wagner stated, "It's good to have people like you in the village that serve their community the way they do." Goeden interjected, "And actually have a difference of opinion once in awhile."

Goeden received a round of applause for his dedication to the community, serving on the Village Board for the past four years. He is officially a member of the board until April 15 when he will be replaced by newcomer Andrew Pesch, who was in attendance and was also introduced by President Wagner.





## Where There's Smoke ... There's FIRE!



Smoke billows out the kitchen window as a result of an overheated toaster which caught fire in a fire training exercise on Saturday, April 5th. The event was coordinated by the Washington County Fire Investigators Association Training Committee, the U.S. Department of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, and the Criminal Investigation Division of the State Department of Justice at the home of Sue and Bill Kohlwey in the Town of Farmington. The Kohlweys have built a new home and offered this building for fire training.

Approximately 70 fireattended from fighters Allenton, Boltonville, Fillmore, Hartford, Jackson, Kewaskum, Kohlsville, Newburg, Slinger and West Bend departments, as well as representatives from the Washington County Sheriff's Department and West Bend Police Department.

Four different fires were

set using different combustibles. Special cameras were mounted inside the home which projected on TVs in a nearby garage what was happening in a room. Heat sensors were also mounted in the room where temperatures were recorded at four different levels: floor, ceiling and two in between.

The first fire was in the family room where a trail of newspapers was set on fire to simulate an arson. After 4 1/2 minutes, the temperature at ceiling level registered 994 degrees! The heat sensor data will be used for statistical reports while the camera action recorded on videos will be used in fire training.

Another fire was in a bedroom where a lighted cigarette was carelessly thrown away in a wastebasket and the final blaze took place in the attic where papers were accidentally lit on a couch.

After the fires were extinguished, firefighters and investigators walked through the rooms to view the extent of damage, find evidence and determine the causes of ordinary home fires.

The Boltonville Fire Department will burn down the house in another training exercise later in April.



**RECYCLING TIPS** 

\*\* CORRUGATED CARDBOARD \*\*

Type of Corrugated Cardboard: The cardboard that peels apart with two outside layers is corrugated. The middle section not exposed is wavy or corrugated.

Colors: Some waxed and pressed cardboard may also be recycled.

**Preparation:** Flatten boxes and cut into 2' x 2' pieces. Tie in bundles with twine or strong string. Bundles should be limited to 8" in height.

Place bundles at the curb next to the dark green recycling bin or blue recycling bag. Place the bin or bag, at the curb on the same day that your solid waste is to be collected. Pick up will be Wednesdays for both solid waste and recyclables. Multi-family dwellings of six or more, remember, your recycling pick up will be the first and third Wednesday of each month.

Note: If raining on collection day, please hold cardboard until the following week.

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
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## Donations for Fireworks Deadline Nears

## Strengthening Stepfamilies Reassures Washington County Stepparents

The potential rewards -and -- challenges of stepparenting will be the focus of a three week series of discussion sessions beginning Monday, April 14 from 6:15 to 8:15 p.m. The program is sponsored by The Family Center of Washington County.

The discussion will be based on Strengthening Stepfamilies, by Linda Albert, syndicated columnist and author of the Coping with Kids parenting books, and Elizabeth Einstein, stepfamily expert and author of nationally acclaimed The Stepfamily: Living, Loving, and

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Learning.

With Strengthening Stepfamilies, Albert and Einstein have combined their expertise to produce a program that helps stepfamilies build the rewarding family lives they want so badly. Among the topics discussed:

\* the myth of instant love \* the difficulties children face in sharing a parent and acquiring new stepsiblings

\* how to recognize and overcome unrealistic or incompatible expectations about new stepfamily relationships

\* the discipline dilemma Stepparents will begin developing communication and listening skill, a process for resolving conflicts and making decisions, a way to structure family meeting, and methods for building new family traditions.

An important feature of the course is the support participants receive from one another. As one stepparent says, Just learning that my secret worries are okay was invaluable. Or another -- This was great! I realize even with all our uniqueness we have problems that are normal.

In addition to the reassurance stepparents receive at group sessions, they learn how others have dealt with difficulties they are now facing. These experiences help them work out similar issues in their own families.

The program also provides at home activities where the entire stepfamily gathers to get to know each other better, to listen to needs and feelings, and perhaps most importantly, to just have fun. As another participant reports, "Strengthening Stepfamilies taught me how to know my family."

## **Long Term Caregiving Program Set for April 16**

Nearly everyone has been touched by a friend or relative who has suffered from a long-term illness such as cancer, Alzheimers or AIDS. Millions of Americans each year are caregivers for those dealing with prolonged illness.

Family members, friends, hospice staff, health care professionals, social workers, teachers, members of the clergy, funeral direc-tors and others working with persons with long-term illness and their families are invited to a national video satellite program, "Living With Grief: When Illness is Prolonged," April 16 from 12 to 3 p.m. at the Public Agency Building, 333 East Washington Street in West Bend.

Co-sponsors are the Association for Death Education and Counseling, the American Medical Association, Project on Death in America, and the Washington County Community Health Nursing Association and the Washington County UW-Extension.

Most locations will include a discussion after the program. "The program is designed to help professionals and families in mourning deal with the complex set of emotions and circumstances occurring when a loved one has a long-term illness," said Faith Lerner, director of bereavement services at

Dane County's Hospice

Experts from around the country participating in the program include: Betty Davies, Ph.D., professor of nursing at University of British Columbia; Kenneth Doka, Ph.D., Lutheran minister and professor of gerontology at the College of New Rochelle; Dr. William Lamers, Jr., a founder of the American Hospice Movement; Therese A. Rando, Ph.D., clinical psychologist and executive director of the Institute for the Study and Treatment of Loss.

The program will be hosted by Cokie Roberts of ABC News, and will include interactive call-in segments to the panel.

Participants will discuss how grief is defined and how specific losses influence individuals' experiences of grief; factors complicating the grief process when illness is prolonged; end-of-life decisions and caregiving during different stages of illness; sources of assistance when anticipating death and after death; self-care for caregivers; how caregiving changes over time, especially when the caregiving period stretches from months into years.

## Controlled Burns Proposed To Improve Wildlife Habitat

MILWAUKEE -- The Department of Natural Resources is proposing to conduct controlled burns this spring in Washington, Ozaukee and eastern Dodge counties

The parcels are located on the Theresa, Allenton and Jackson Wildlife Areas and include scattered parcels on private lands. Parcels range in size from one to 200 acres.

Controlled burns, also known as prescribed burns, are conducted to increase plant diversity and improve grasslands. A primary goal is to improve nesting habitat for grassland bird species such as mallards, blue-winged teal, pheasants, bobolinks, dickcissels

and grasshopper sparrows.

This type of project typically does not have the potential to cause significant adverse environmental impacts; therefore, the DNR has made a preliminary determination that an environmental assessment is not required for this project.

Public comments on the proposed projects are welcomed and should be received no later than April 15, 1997. 



#### **April Showers Bring May Flowers**



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

form 14 inch minimum length for largemouth and small-mouth bass on most inland waters, and combine the daily bag limit for both bass species from five of each to five in total on all inland waters. There is also a proposal to expand the area closed to coyote hunting during the firearm deer season. The purpose is to protect timber wolves which are slowly moving southward into the state's central forest region.

Local proposals include changes on Waukesha County's Lac La Belle and Oconomowoc Lake. On Lac La Belle, the proposal would reduce the minimum length limit for walleye from 20 inches to 18 inches and increase the daily bag limit from one to three. The purpose is to bring walleye regulations on this lake into compliance with current policy for low density walleye populations. Because of heavy fishing pressure on

Oconomowoc Lake, the proposal calls for an increase in the minimum length from 15 inches to 18 inches for walleye and reducing the daily bag limit from five to three.

There are two proposals that would affect the Loew Lake Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest in Washington County. One proposal would create a turkey hunting zone for disabled hunters in the spring and fall seasons. The purpose of this measure is to create a disabled hunters only turkey zone (25A) to expand high quality hunting for disabled individuals. The other would allow muzzleloader hunting by permit only for deer during the regular nine-day gun deer season and the seven-day muzzleloader season. Currently, hunting is not allowed in the Loew Lake Unit. Allowing muzzleloader hunting will address serious deer damage concerns and provide a quality hunting

experience consistent with the Master Plan approved for the property.




