### Spring Time is Bike Time

The Kewaskum Police Department would like to take this time to remind everyone about bicycle safety and laws

pertaining to them. Wis. §346.03(9), Rules of the Road, states: "Subject to the special provisions applicable to bicycles, every person riding a bicycle upon a roadway is granted all the rights and is subject to all the duties which this chapter grants or applies to the operator of a vehicle." In short, this means that all laws pertaining to motor vehicles apply to bicycles, including, but not limited to: Riding on the right side of the road, abiding by all traffic signs and signals, riding single file, etc. NOTE: In the event a child needs to ride on the side walk due to safety reasons, they should be aware that pedestrians have the right of way and ride only in single file. Also, Village of Kewaskum ordinances require that all bicycles operated on the streets of Kewaskum to have a current license affixed to them. The cost of these licenses, which are non-expiring, is \$5.00. They can be obtained at the Municipal Building between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. A few safety tips to everyone operating a bicycle are: Keep your bike in good working order, wear bright colored clothing to make it easier for motorists to spot you, put a safety flag on your bike, ride single file, be aware of the area you are riding in and be ready to take evasive action if an obstacle appears and make sure the bike is the right size for the person riding it.

If we all follow these rules and safety tips we should have a safe bicycle season.

## District Speed Rope Jumping Contest Held

Jessica Butler, a fourth grade student from Kewaskum Elementary School, is the 1997 Kewaskum School District Speed Rope Jumping Champion. However, a jump-off was needed to determine the championship this year.

The students perform at Wayne, Kewaskum and Farmington Schools.

Jessica's scores were 45, 36 and 46 for a cumulative total of 127. This total matched Nicole Sabish's total. Her scores were 43, 39 and 45. Nicole is a fourth grader at Wayne.

In the jump-off, Nicole's score was 34, while Jessica's was 48. The Butler name will be engraved on the traveling plaque, housed at the champion's home school.

Last year, Jessica finished first in Division II in the district, while her sister, Megan, became the district champion. This year the two sisters competed in the same division at the local school level.

First place in Division I went to Ben Butler, Jessica and Megan's brother. Ben is a first grader. His cumulative score of 103 was achieved on jumps of 34, 36 and 33.

Another Kewaskum student, Bridget Dreher, finished first in Division II with scores of 42, 37 and 42 for a 121 total. Bridget, now a second grader, placed first in Division I in 1995 and 1996.

Liz Harris, a third grader at Farmington School, had represented Farmington in the district contest when she was in first grade. She finished second then as she did this year. Other students made their first appearance in the district contest.

All participants received trophies, which were financed by the Farmington PTO and provided by LR Trophy in Kewaskum. Dairy Queen supplied coupons to all students in the district who participated in the contest.

## KHS Girls Win County Track Crown!

The Kewaskum High School girls' track team came roaring back into the spotlight with an outstanding team performance and won the Washington County Outdoor Championships Tuesday, April 29, at Slinger

Scoring in 15 of the 17 events and double placing in six of those 15 events meant that the girls came home with bragging rights for the county.

The Kewaskum win was made possible by their five first places, four seconds, two thirds, four fourths, three fifths and single places in sixth, seventh and eighth.

The Kewaskum Indians scored 128 points followed by 106 points for the Hartford girls who had won the Washington County Indoor Championships at end of March. the Germantown was close behind with 102.5 points, with West Bend West in fourth with 93, West Bend East in fifth with 75, Slinger in sixth with 68.5 followed by Kettle Moraine Lutheran with 58 points. 


