Spring Time is Bike Time

The Kewaskum Police Department would like to take this time to remind everyone about bicycle safety and laws pertaining to them.

Wis. §346.03(9), Rules of the Road, states: "Subject to the special provisions applicable to bicycles, every person riding a bicycle upon a roadway is granted all the rights and is subject to all the duties which this chapter grants or applies to the operator of a vehicle." In short, this means that all laws pertaining to motor vehicles apply to bicycles, including, but not limited to: Riding on the right side of the road, abiding by all traffic signs and signals, riding single file, etc. NOTE: In the event a child needs to ride on the side walk due to safety reasons, they should be aware that pedestrians have the right of way and ride only in single file.

Also, Village of Kewaskum ordinances require that all bicycles operated on the streets of Kewaskum to have a current license affixed to them. The cost of these licenses, which are non-expiring, is \$5.00. They can be obtained at the Municipal Building between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

A few safety tips to everyone operating a bicycle are: Keep your bike in good working order, wear bright colored clothing to make it easier for motorists to spot you, put a safety flag on your bike, ride single file, be aware of the area you are riding in and be ready to take evasive action if an obstacle appears and make sure the bike is the right size for the person riding it.

If we all follow these rules and safety tips we should have a safe bicycle season.

A Sentimental Bouquet For Mother's Day

(NAPS)—Daughters, sons and grandkids across the country can take a cue from the Victorians this Mother's Day: let your flowers do the talking.

According to the California Cut Flower Commission the Victorians used herbs and flowers, each with its own particular meaning, to compose "tussie mussie" bouquets that conveyed special sentiments.

The traditional Victorian bouquet was arranged with one large flower in the center and smaller flowers arranged in concentric rings around it. The whole bouquet was outlined with leafy green foliage and tied with a piece of lace.

To make your mother a special Victorian bouquet, try choosing flowers with motherly meanings such as pink roses for grace and beauty, cream colored roses for perfection, chrysanthemums for long life and joy, and pink carnations for maternal love. It's also nice to add something for kindness (delphinium), wisdom (sage), and affection (stock). Or use your mother's favorite flowers in her favorite colors.

Another special bond is between a child and a grandmother. To honor Grandma have your child make her a Victorian "tussie mussie." Here's how:

Step One: Start with three rose buds or a large headed single flower. Surround it with some mini carnations or other small headed flowers.

Step Two: Wrap yarn or string around the stems to hold them in place. Cut stems to 4-5 inches in length.

Step Three: Use some broad green leaves, such as ivy or galax, to form a border around the flowers. Again wrap the stems with yarn to hold them in place.

Step Four: Cut an "X" in the center of a paper doily, creating an opening large enough to slip the stems through. Push the doily snug against the underside of the flowers and tie it in place with a narrow ribbon. (Or you can use real lace instead of a doily.)

Step Five: Attach a small gift card.

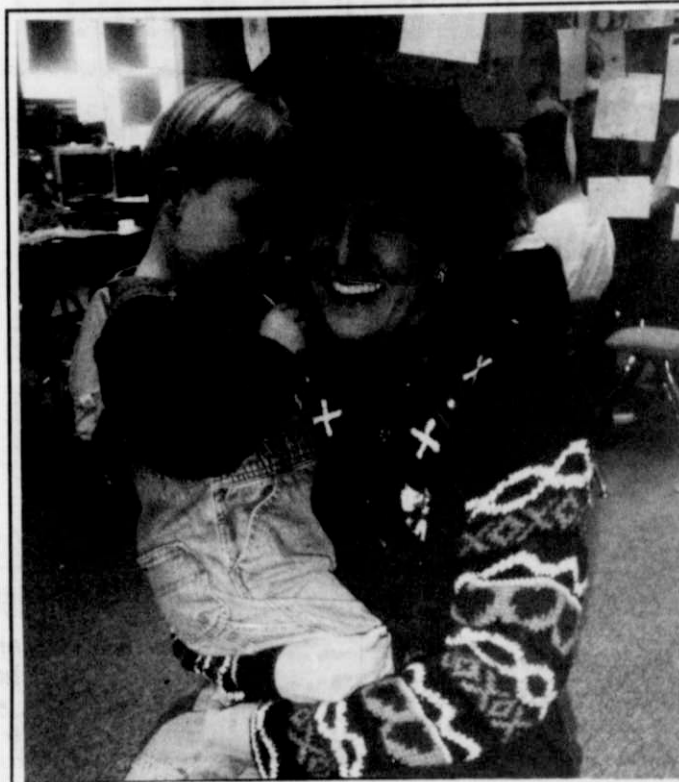

ham (1/2 to 1 lb.), chopped
carrots (4 to 6), chopped into coins
onion (1 to 2), chopped
5 Tbsp. butter
5 Tbsp. flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. garlic powder
1/2 tsp. Mrs. Dash
1/4 tsp. pepper
1/4 tsp. red pepper (optional)
4 c. milk.

Place vegetables and ham in a 2-quart casserole dish. Mix. Prepare white sauce in saucepan over low heat. Melt butter. Blend in flour and spices. Heat until bubbling. Slowly add milk. Heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Boil 1 minute. remove from heat. Pour over potato/ham mixture. Dot with additional butter. Cover and cook at 350 degrees for 45 minutes. Uncover and cook for 70 to 75 minutes or until potatoes pierce easily with a potatoe. Let stand 10 minutes before serving.

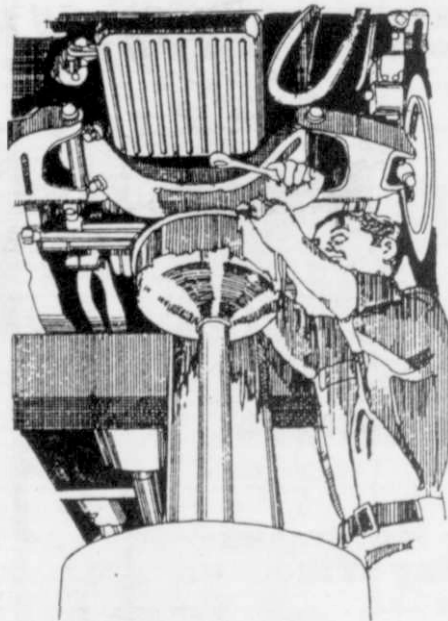

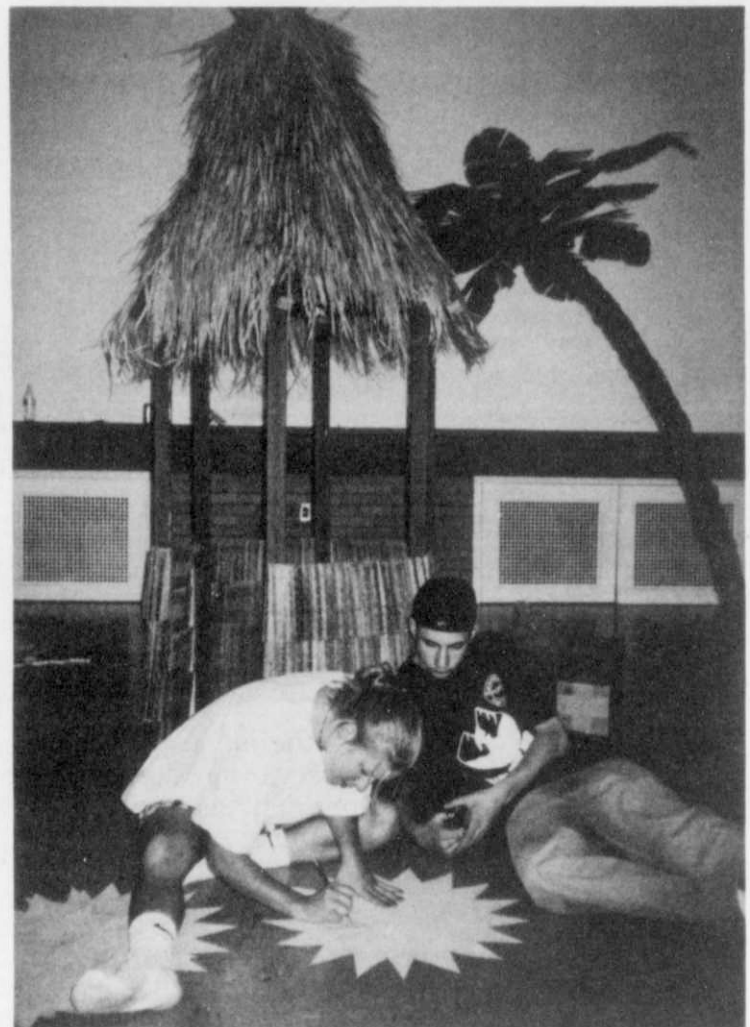
Wildflower and Perennial Sale At Lac Lawrann Saturday

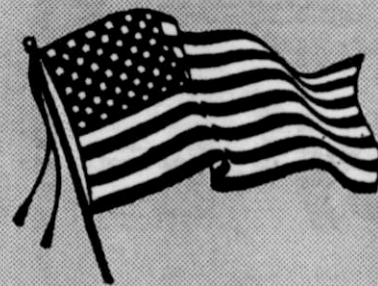

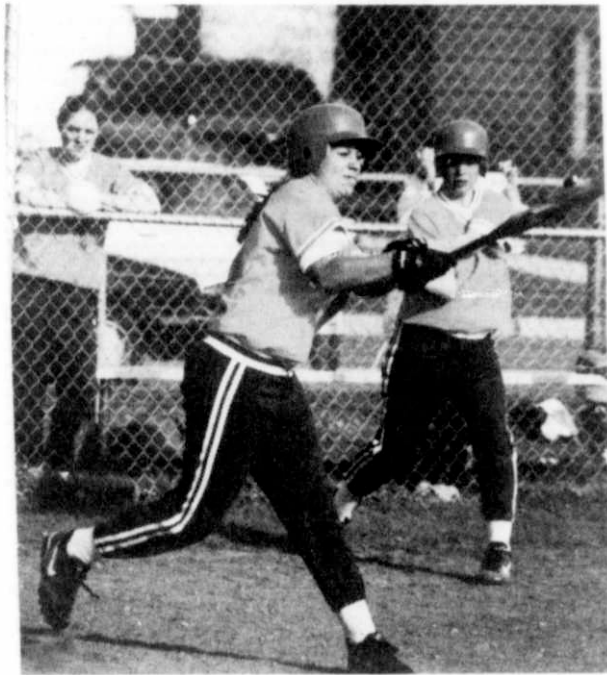
The next home game is Tuesday, May 6. The Indians will take on Plymouth.

The JV team also played against Sheboygan Falls but took a hard loss, 7-6.

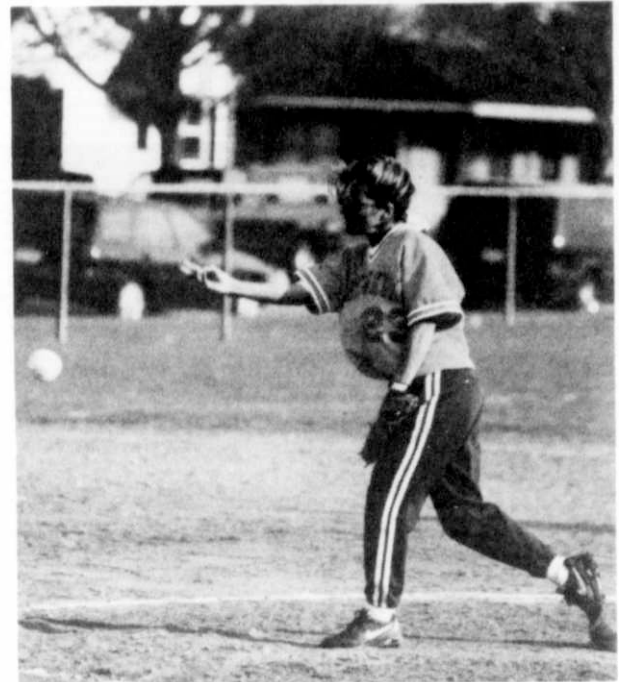



KHS Girls Win County Track Crown!

The Kewaskum High School girls' track team came roaring back into the spotlight with an outstanding team performance and won the Washington County Outdoor Championships Tuesday, April 29, at Slinger.

Scoring in 15 of the 17 events and double placing in six of those 15 events meant that the girls came home with bragging rights for the county.

The Kewaskum win was made possible by their five first places, four seconds, two thirds, four fourths, three fifths and single places in sixth, seventh and eighth.

The Kewaskum Indians scored 128 points followed by 106 points for the Hartford girls who had won the Washington County Indoor Championships at the end of March. Germantown was close behind with 102.5 points, with West Bend West in fourth with 93, West Bend East in fifth with 75, Slinger in sixth with 68.5 followed by Kettle Moraine Lutheran with 58 points.

Seniors Katie Yogerst and Rachel Nysse helped show the way to what needed to be done Tuesday when they started the meet with a 1-2 finish in the discus. Yogerst's 119'5" missed the meet record by only one inch, but when added to Nysse's 107'10" second place throw in the finals, gave Kewaskum 18 points and the lead early in the meet. Later they reversed their order with Rachel Nysse's 36'4" upsetting the West Bend East thrower for first place and Yogerst throwing 35'1" for third place.

The impressive 1-2 finish of senior Marni Lynn and sophomore Carol Neumann in the 1600m run and the 800m run gave Kewaskum 36 points. Lynn led from start to finish in the

1600m run with her teammate in fourth until Neumann passed both girls that had attempted to stay with Lynn's strong pace with 500m to go. Lynn's 5:25.5 and Neumann's 5:34.9 are season best times for each.

In the 800m run, Marni Lynn again led from start to finish, but in this race Carol Neumann got behind her teammate right from the start and posted a personal best time of 2:28.2. Lynn finished with a season best time of 2:25.9. Both Neumann and Lynn capped off their successful night by running very good splits on the 1600m relay team which finished fourth. Both girls were very happy and excited after their 1-2 finishes in their open races.

Coaches and spectators commented on the awesome performance by the two Kewaskum distance runners in the 1600m and 800m runs. "I am extremely proud and happy for Marni and Carol. They deserve all the credit for their success. They both put in a lot of hard work," reported distance coach Jerry Gosa.

Junior Mackenzie Downs has done very well the last couple of weeks and again placed first in the triple jump with a good jump of 31' 11 3/4."

The hurdles also again proved to be a strong area for the Kewaskum girls with junior Carrie Wiesner running a season best time of 48.8 in 300m hurdles for second place and sophomore Jackie Michaels taking fourth in a personal best time of 50.5. In the 100m hurdles Wiesner finished in 17.2 for third and Joanne Thull placed fourth in 17.4. These two hurdling events continue to be strong and accounted for 26 points.

The Kewaskum 800m relay team took fourth in 1:55.1, just 0.1 seconds behind the Hartford quar-

ter. The Kewaskum unit consisted of Mackenzie Downs, Ann Bodden, Carrie Wiesner and Jenny Jagielski.

The 1600m relay team took fourth with a season best time of 4:30.2. Jamie Gaffke and Jessica Repovsch, who ran season best splits, teamed up with Carol Neumann and Marni Lynn.

The 3200m relay team of Lauren Steinhardt, Jenny Immel, Michelle Sager, and Emma Chambers all ran season best splits, and placed fifth in 11:26.2 for the Kewaskum team.

Additional fifth places were senior Ann Bodden

with a time of 13.6 in the 100m dash and Jessica Repovsch's 4'8" in the high jump. Jill Wichtoski took sixth in the long jump with a personal best jump of 14'7." Senior Jenny Jagielski took seventh in the 200m dash in 27.7 and Rachel Chambers eighth in 14:21.3 for the 3200 run.

The Kewaskum 400m relay team of Mackenzie Downs, Ann Bodden, Joanne Thull, and Jenny Jagielski ran well but did not place because of a uniform disqualification.

When asked to comment on the win, head girls coach Joe Kinney replied that "there was 100% effort from everyone -- not just the

champions. Even the people fighting to be varsity also gave a solid 100% effort. We had a lot of double places in many events that really helped."

Next for the KHS girls' track team was the New Holstein Relays on Wednesday, May 7, and then on to the Vanderpan Invitational at Sheboygan Falls on Friday, May 9. All field events and the 3200m relay start at 4 p.m. Trials for the 110 and 100 hurdles, 100m, and 200m dashes start at 4:25 with finals scheduled to start at 5:30 p.m.
